AUTHORITIES TO COMBAT ANTISEMITISM IN ROUMANIAN SCHOOLS.

BUCHAREST, Jan. 5, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) In consequence of the nationwide propaganda for the exclusion of Jewish students from the Universities and High Schools, the Minister of the Interior has under consideration a proposal to call a conference of all district officials to take measures looking to the suppression of the disorderly conduct by students.

In the meantime reports received from various parts of the country indicate that there has been no change in the students' attitude. The students at Jassi decided to bar Jews from the campus by force, until the percentage limit comes legally into power.

The Gzernowitz student body decided to boycott the

university, until such time as Parliament adopts the percentage limit against Jews.

Interpollations submitted by the Jewish Deputies Zirelson, of Kiehlneff, and Stern of Bucharest, demand emergency legislation empowering the Minister of Justice Altenau to take steps for the "energetic suppression" of the anti-Semitic agitation.

RUSSIAN JEWS IGNORANT OF PALESTINE VISAS AWAITING THEM.

MOSCOW. Jan. 3, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). Hundreds of Jews in Russia whose relatives in Palestine have secured for them the right to join them there, are ignorant of the ract that there are visas awaiting them, the British Consul here told your correspondent.

During the last year the Consul granted only 150 visas to Palestine. During the last three months, however, he had been instructed to grant visas only to those whose names appear on a list from the Immigration Department in Jerusalem, mostly women and children whose relatives are in Palestine. Chaluzim are practically excluded, because the Consul is not authorized to accept direct applications for these themselves of the lists arriving from Jerusalem remain.

THREATEN "PITILESS EXTERMINATION" OF VIENNA JEWS.

Aryans Invoke Aid of "German God" In Ridding Vienna of Jews.

VIENNA, Jan. 1, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The "pitlless extermination" of Austrian Jews is threatened in letters which are being widely distributed with the help of district officials of lower Austria demending that the Jews leave the country voluntarily. The penalty for not complying with this threat are all manner of violent death imaginable.

A typical letter which the "Wiener Morgenzeitung" handed over to the authorities has this peroration: "In the near future the Aryan people will arise and mercilessly put an end to the Jewish domination. The Jews will first of al. te stricken down, then indiscriminately murdered, exterminated and hung, their bodies being thrown in the Damube. Then and then only shall Vienna be free of this vampire. Help us, oh God of the Germans, in this task."

DR. WEIZMANN IN ROME.

ROME. Jan. 2, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) Dr. Chaim Weizmann arrived here today from Jerusalem where he spent several weeks in reviewing the Zionist situation with the Administration and the Zionist officials on the spot. It is understood that the Zionist leader will communicate with the members of the Mussolini Government and Vatican circles, whence certain opposition to Zionism still persists.

... COO CHILDREN'S CLOTHING WORKER'S LOCKED OUT.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) Several thousand children's clothing workers were locked out yesterday by contractors who expect to secure better prices thereby from jobbers and manufacturers giving them orders for children's jackets and knee pants.

Spokesmen for the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America, representing the locked-out workers, regarded the contractors' action as ill-advised, and it was declared that active measures will be taken unless the Union members are put back to work.

Managers of the Children's Clothing Contractors' Association and the Knee Pants Contractors' Association claimed to have a large percentage of their association shops locked.

A conference was held yesterday between union officials and the men's clothing contractors with a view to securing an adjustment which will prevent any general disturbance in the New York clothing market.

CAP MAKERS PROPOSE NEEDLE TRADE ALLIANCE.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) A second effort is being made by the Cap Makers Union to form a working alliance in the garment industry. The five unions in the needle trade, estimated to number in excess of 300,000 members are the Amalgamated Clothing Workers, the International Ladies' Garment Workers Union, United Cloth Hat and Cap Makers of North America, International Fur Workers' Union and the Journeymen Tailors' Union.
