FORMER POLICE CHIEF KILLED; ARABS ATTACK JEWS.

JERUSALEM, Jan. 18, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Several Jews were attacked and severely beaten in Jaffa yesterday by members of a procession numbering 7,000 Arabs, taking part in the funeral of the former police commander Tewfik Bey, who had been killed the day before by unidentified persons. Several arrests have been made, the arrested including Jews as well as Arabs. The large funeral procession and the attacks following it produced a panicky feeling in the town, merchants closing their shops for fear of widespread rioting and looting. Prompt intervention by the British police restored order within a comparatively short time.

SAMUEL TO AID PUBLICATION OF BEN-YEHUDA'S LEXICON.

JERUSALEM, Jan. 18, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A committee of scholars and public-spirited men of the various faiths has been formed to complete the publication of the lexicon and other works of the late Eliezer Ben-Yehuda, the famous lexicographer, who died a month ago. Sir Herbert Samuel has accepted the honorary chairmanship of this Committee.

Memorial services were held yesterday on the completion of the 30 days of mourning. The High Commissioner was one of the speakers. His son, Edwin Samuel, acting Governor of Jerusalem in Governor Storrs' absence, also spoke, declaring there would have been no possibility of a Jewish National Home without the revival of the Hebrew language for which Ben-Yehuda was responsible. Ben-Yehuda's name has been inscribed in the "Golden Book" of the Jewish National Fund.

MAX NORDAU SERIOUSLY ILL.

PARIS, Jan. 18, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) Max Nordau, famous author and Zionist leader, is seriously ill at his home here. His friends are anxious about the turn the savant's health took for the worse. Mr. Nordau is 75 years old.

ASK BRITAIN TO FACILITATE ZIONIST TASK.

BERLIN, Jan. 17, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A memorandum describing the Zionist position in Palestine and explaining the need of British aid in facilitating the reconstruction of the Jewish Homeland has been submitted by the Zionist Executive Committee to the British Colonial Office, Nahum Sokolow today informed the Greater Actions Committee in semi-annual meeting here.

The presentation of this memorandum followed the report Dr. Weizmann made to his colleagues on the Zionist Executive, after his return from Palestine. The Colonial office was urged to remove restrictions hindering the Zionist progress in Palestine, Mr. Sokolow declared.

Removal of the head office of the Palestine Foundation Fund from London to Jerusalem is urged in cabled resolutions received by Zionist leaders from the National Executive Committee of the Zionist Organization of America and from the American directors of the Fund, the American Zionists insisting that the elimination of the London office of the Keren Hayesod will result in a considerable saving of expenditure.

BAVARIAN JEWS FEAR POGROMS.

MUNICH, Jan. 17, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Adolph Hitler, leader of the National Socialists, the nucleus of the Bavarian Fascisti Organization, announced today that he will review on Saturday 200,000 Bavarian Fascisti armed to resist the French occupation.

This announcement has given rise to grave anxiety in Jewish circles where it is feared that a possible uprising in Bavaria will result in anti-Semitic attacks.

FASCISM SPREADING TO UPPER SILESIA.

BERLIN, Jan. 17, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) There are clear indications that Fascism is spreading to Upper Silesia, anti-Jewish and anti Republican tendencies having become so pronounced as to cause misgivings in Government circles.

Armed bands are said to be forming along the lines of Hitler's forces in Bavaria. Collisions between these forces and the authorities have become frequent. Persons in position to know trace this development to the influence of the Bavarian Chauvenists and anti-Semites.

NEW AIRLINE SERVICE TO PALESTINE.

LONDON, Jan. 16, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The Instone Airline, now operating between London and Berlin, is extending its service to Constantinople and Palestine. The new Mid-East service will be by way of Vienna.

BIALIK ABSENT FROM FUNCTION IN HIS HONOR.

BERLIN, Jan. 16, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The fiftieth anniversary of Chaim Nachem Bialik, the Hebrew poet Laureate, was celebrated Tuesday evening by his admirers who overflowed the large Philharmonic Hall. Zionist leaders attending the meeting of the Greater Actions Committee took part, Nahum Sokolow, Vladimir Jabotinski and Rabbi Chajes delivering addresses extolling the poet. Saul Tchernichowski and Zalman Schneer, two distinguished Hebrew poets, joined in the public tribute to Bialik.

Mr. Bialik did not attend the function in his honor, having previously voiced his distaste of public celebrations of this sort.

TO EXCAVATE DAVID'S CITY IN JERUSALEM.

LONDON, Jan. 18, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) The Palestine Exploration Fund announces that it is raising £5,000 with which to commence the excavation in Jerusalem of the historic sites of Mount Zion and the City of David.

PREDICTS REVOLUTION, POGROMS IN GERMANY.

BERLIN, Jan. 17, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) The National Socialists are preparing to spring a revolution and bring about a pogrom wave throughout Germany, the "Welt am Montag" today warns the Government, urging it to take precautions to frustrate the Fascisti plans.

KING HUSSEIN WOULD BE CALIPH.

LONDON, Jan. 16, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) King Hussein of the Hedjaz may assume the Galiphate, in opposition to the new Caliph appointed by the Turkish Nationalists, the "Daily Mail" declares it learns.

YIDDISH PRESS IN RUSSIA FACES CRISIS.

MOSCOW, Jan. 18, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Considerable fear is entertained in Communist circles for the Jewish Communist dailies which since January 1 ceased to receive Government subsidies, on which they had been largely dependent for their financial resources.

The "Emes", the "Weker" and "Communistische Fon" are making great efforts to increase the number of their subscribers, hoping that they will thus be able to continue their existence as daily newspapers.
