## JWS ABSTAIN FROM SHIKORSKI'S CONFIDENCE VOTE.

Warsaw, Jan. 25. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). Premier Shikorski obtained a vote of confidence on his address in the Sejm, outlining the new Government's policy, the vote being 230 to 110.

Because the minority deputies took exception to parts of the Prime Minister's program, it was predicted they would abstain from the vote of confidence. When the vote was taken, however, the White Russian and the Ukrainian representatives announced their support of the Premier. The Jews alone refrained from voting, which is believed to have caused a rift in the minority front, causing the practical isolation of the Jewish Sejm Club.

Discussion of the address of Premier Shikorski continued since last Saturday, addresses being made by Dr. Glombinski, former Cabinet Minister Thugutt, former Prime Minister Witos and Deputy Barlicky of the Socialists. In the course of the debate Premier Shikorski reproached the Jews for what he alleged to be their excessive sensitiveness. He recalled articles written by Georg Brandes against the Polish pogroms, as well as the protests of American Jews. He said Jews had the habit of referring to the "slightest excesses as pogroms."

## EINSTEIN TO BE SAMUEL'S GUEST.

Jerusalem, Jan. 25. (J.T.A.) Professor Albert Einstein is due to arrive in Jerusalem February 1, to observe the progress of the development of the Hebrew University, in which he has a vital interest. Prof. Einstein will be Sir Herbert Samuel's guest at Government House on the Mount of Olives.

### J.D.C. RUSHES AID TO ISOLATED TCERNIGOV

Moscow Jan. 24 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Despite the great transport difficulties caused by the narrow gauge railway being blocked by snow, the Joint Distribution Committee is rushing relief to the city and district of Tchernigov. This district is practically isolated and the situation there is more difficult than in other parts of Little Russia, owing to the slowly improving industrial conditions. By all reports however children's homes are now amply supplied for the winter, and homeless children adequately clothed.

### APOSTATES INCITES GALICIANS AGAINST JEWS

WARSAW, Jan. 24, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Senator Orlinsky, who was elected on the ticket of the "Christian National Union", is touring eastern Galicia delivering inflammatory speeches in which he urges all Polish parties to unite against their common enemy, the Jew.

Senator Orlinsky's name was Anshel Pizzeles, before he was baptized.

### SEES DANGER OF JEISH STATE IN POLAND.

WARSSAW, Jan. 24, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A curious manifesto is published in "Dwa Grosze" with reference to the recent suppression of the political activities of the Rozwoj party. After condemning this prohibition as a violation of Polish citizens' rights, the manifesto declares the Jews are hopeful of a mass emigration of Poles from Poland, leaving the country to them, wherein to found their Jewish State. The author of this manifesto is a priest named Boglewski.

### REPORT NEW 20,658 JEWISH ARRIVALS IN PALESTINE.

LONDON, Jan. 25, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Since the promulgation of the ordinance regulating the immigration into Palestine in accordance with the economic needs of the country, 20,658 Jews entered Palestine under the auspices of the Zionist Organization and other wise, says an official announcement by the Colonial Office. The ordinance was promulgated September 1920.

Jews entering Palestine in 1922 numbered 7,844, divided as follows: 3,285 men, 2,446 women and 2,113 children. In December of 1922 there were 614 Jewish immigrants.

# YIDDISH DENOUNCED AS "JARGON" AT REFORMERS' JUBILEE

New York, Jan. 25. (A.P.). In an effort to reclaim Jews to Judaism, regardless of the "orthodoxy, conservatism or radicalism of the synagogue", a series of obstacles will have to be overcome, chief among them the use of Yiddish by the Jewish masses, declared Rabbi Jonah B. Wise, of Portland, in addressing the Wednesday session of the Golden Jubilee Convention of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations.

"In New York there is the largest jargon-speaking population in the world", he said. "That this language is legitimately Jewish in America I deny, and shall deny though a million voices be raised in raucous denunciation of that denial.

"In Palestine, where the Jews already have an opportunity of establishing themselves along the lines of their language, cultural tradition and outlook, they chose Hebrew as their national language; and not the jargon which practically all of them have brought from their native lands. The jargon is a sign of the exile, and as such does not belong and will not thrive here. While its literature is extensive, and its drama is tremendously suggestive, the same genius which is cramped by the limitations of the language spoken by a few millions of persons certainly can be expanded into mighty powers of suggestion ~~which~~ when released in the tongue of the majority of men and women of this country".

Felix M. Warburg presided at the sessions Thursday, which ends the public meeting of the union. An executive session tomorrow will close the convention. There was also scheduled a meeting of the legislative committee this afternoon which will consider action on Julius Rosenwald's plea yesterday that the union ask congress to revoke the sacramental wine privilege of Jewish rabbis.

Rabbi Louis Witt of St. Louis, speaking on "The Call of the Synagogue to the Jewish Youth of America", deplored the spiritual apathy of Jewish young men and women and held it was largely a result of the example set by their elders.

Mrs. Sulzberger criticized the modern Jewish woman at an auxiliary meeting of the Sisterhoods of the Union.

## PRESIDENT HARDING'S MESSAGE

A letter addressed to Messrs. Adolph S. Ochs, Louis Marshall, Henry M. Morgenthau, Daniel P. Hays, David M. Bressler, dated Washington, January 10, was read Wednesday evening at the Jubilee dinner. The letter is in part as follows:

"One of the marvels of humanity's story has been the strength and persistence of the Jewish faith and the continuing influence and power of the Jewish people. I cannot but feel that these things are in a large measure owing to the Hebrew conception of a personal God and of the individual accountability of men and women.
