OPEN JEWISH ARCHEOLOGICAL MUSEUM IN JERUSALEM.

JERUSALEM, Jan. 31. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The opening to-morrow of the Jewish Archeological Museum in the Tower of David is announced, the principal contents being the antiquities excavated by Dr. Nathum Slousch near Tiberias two years ago. The museum was founded by the Jewish Palestine Exploration Society, and Dr. Slousch, now in New York, appointed Keeper of the museum. The recently discovered antiquities in charge of the society include a seven-branched marble candelabrum of rare beauty, an engraved door of an ark in which Hebrew scrolls of the law were kept, a chair which tradition has it was called Moses' chair, and several hundred household utensils of bronze and glass, clearly belonging to the pre-Christian era.

MILLION DOLLAR TEMPLE FOR SAN FRANCISCO.

SAN FRANCISCO, CAL. Jan. 31. (J. C. B.). Announcement has been made of the sale of Temple Emanu-el, dedicated in 1866 on Sutter Street, between, Stockham and Powell streets, to a client of Hugh Goodfellow for \$410,000. The conditions of the sale are that the congregation shall occupy the temple for two years, pending the construction of a new temple at First Avenue and Lake street.

The new Temple will cost approximately \$1,000,000 and will be one of the finest edifices of its kind in this country. Louis Bloch, member of the building committee, has returned from a visit in the East, where he viewed various synagogues, with a view to the building of the new one here.

RATHENAU SCHOOL IN BERLIN.

BERLIN, Jan.-13, (J. C. B.). The district school Committee for Higher Educational Institutions in Neukoelln-Berlin has decided, Town Councillor Dr. Loewenstein being in the chair, to rename the Reform Polytechnic in the Boddinstrasse the Rathenau School.

AID FOR JEWISH CHILDREN IN RUHR

Berlin Jan. 31. (J. T. A.) Children of Jewish laborers in the coal and iron mines of the Ruhr district are in need of immediate aid, say advices to Jewish institutions here. Jewish leaders have undertaken to provide for the starving children whose number is estimated to reach tens of thousands.

TWO-HEADED CHILD BORN TO JEWISH MOTHER.

Warsaw Jan. 30. (J. C. B.). A female child with two heads was born here to Sara Dymnik. The infant died yesterday, on its third day.

REFUGEE EXPULSION MARCH 1st, DESPITE PROMISE

Warsaw Jan. 30. (J. T. A.). Despite the promise by Prime Minister Schikorski that Jewish refugees from the Ukraine would be granted permission to stay until July 1st, the Minister of the Interior today confirmed a previous order that the expulsion of the homeless commence March 1st.

At the Sejm Commission meeting yesterday, Deputy Polakewitsch, leader of the Peasant Party, proposed the revoking of licenses for the sale of tobacco and liquor held by Jews.

PLAN WORLD CONGRESS OF JEWISH WOMEN

Berlin Jan. 31. (J. C. B.). The calling of a World Congress of Jewish Women during the early Spring is being seriously considered following the arrival here of a representative of the Council of Jewish Women of America, whose purpose is said to be to negotiate with Jewish women's organizations in Europe to join the proposed Congress of Women's organizations in Germany, England, Austria and France are said to have promised to participate.

SEVEN JEWS IN LIBAU COUNCIL

Riga Jan. 30 (J. T. A.). The newly elected Town Council of Libau includes seven Jewish members. Five are representatives of the National Bloc, one a Democrat, and one a Bundist.

SPECIAL EXAMINATION FOR ROUMANIAN RABBIS

Bucharest Jan. 31. (J. T. A.). No rabbi may be employed by a Jewish community in Roumania before passing a state examination, according to an ordinance published today by the Minister for Culture and Art. A special examining committee consisting of three rabbis has been appointed before whom rabbinical applicants are to appear.

HARVARD INVITES VIENNA JEW

Vienna Jan. 30. (J. T. A.). Professor Prizbram, the well known historian of Austria, has been invited to occupy the Chair of History of Modern Europe at Harvard University, it is learned.

HUGHES BIDS WARSAW CONSUL TO ISSUE VISAS

Secretary of State Informs Congressman Siegel Issuance of Visas Will Be Continued.

Washington, Jan. 30. (J. C. B.). The issuance of visas by the American Consul in Warsaw will under no circumstances be stopped, Secretary of State Hughes today informed Congressman Issac Siegel. This action followed the protest made by Congress Siegel to the State Department charging that in consequence of the conflict between the Polish authorities and American steamship companies, applications for the American visa were being rejected.

Secretary Hughes' letter, dated January 26, reads as follows:

"Dear Mr. Siegel:

"With reference to your letter of the 24th instant in which you state your attention has been called to the fact that the American Consul in Warsaw has announced that on account of the controversy between the United States' steamship lines and Polish authorities it must decline to issue any visas to immigrants holding current dating passports, I beg to inform you that while this Department had received word of the possibility of such announcement, immediate instructions were sent out to the Consul General that the office should on no account be closed. I feel confident, therefore, that the visa appointments are being filled as usual.

SOL BLOOM ELECTED TO CONGRESS IN 19th DISTRICT.

New York Jan. 31. (J. C. B.). Representative Walter M. Chandler, Republican, was defeated by Sol Bloom, Democrat, by 199 votes at a special election held yesterday in the Nineteenth Congressional District.

John J. Lyons, former secretary of state and manager of the Chandler campaign, said a recount would be demanded.

Chandler was defeated last November by Samuel Marx, Democrat, by a plurality of 3,625 votes. Mr. Marx died in December, and Governor Miller called the special election.

Representative-Elect Bloom came to New York twenty years ago from San Francisco and he has built up a large music publishing and phonograph business. He also has constructed numerous theatres along Broadway and never was in politics before.
