STORRS DESCRIBES REHABILITATION OF JERUSALEM PLANS.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) Governor Ronald Storrs of Jerusalem, was the guest at an informal luncheon today at India House, at which he described plans for the general rehabilitation of the Holy City, in the carrying out of which he stated that he hoped to enlist the cooperation of all the racial and religious elements represented in Jerusalem's cosmopolitan population.

The luncheon was given by the New York and National Officers of the English-Speaking Union of the U.S., those present including members of the local committee and the national Board of Directors with a number of men and women especially interested in the objects of Governor Storrs' visit to America. Dr. John H. Finley, Chairman of the New York Chapter of the Union, presided.

Governor Storrs emphasized the importance of technical education as in his judgement one of the best means of promoting initiative and the habit of industry among the people of Jerusalem. These and other activities now under way or in view, he said, are conducted under the auspices of the Pro-Jerusalem Society, which is "strictly and exclusively undenominational and gives employment to Christians, Moslems and Jews, of both sexes, without any distinction whatever of race or creed." These plans were outlined to him by President Harding in a conference at the White House last Wednesday.

The guests at the Speakers table included Capt. Gloster Armstrong, British Consul General at New York, and Mrs. Armstrong; Mr. Edward Gray, British Consul General at Boston, and Mrs. Gray; Hon. John V. Davis, formerly American Ambassador to Great Britain, and President of the English-Speaking Union; Hon. George W. Wickersham, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Union, and Chas. C. Goodrich, its Secretary-treasurer. Among the others present were:

ARABS TELL SAMUEL THEY WON'T VOTE.

JERUSALEM, Feb. 8. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) An eleventh hour attempt by Sir Herbert Samuel to induce the Arabs to give up their opposition to the elections for members of the Legislative Council has failed, it is learned. The High Commissioner called members of the Executive Committee of the Moslem-Christian Union to officially advise them that the elections had been fixed for from February 20 to 22.

To the High Commissioner's request for cooperation, Mousa Kazim Pasha, Chairman of the Arab Committee, replied they intended using all legitimate means to boycott the elections, undertaking, however, to use no coercion against Arabs wishing to vote. Sir Herbert Samuel undertook on his part that the Government would not force anyone to vote.

EINSTEIN LECTURE A SUCCESS, DESPITE ARAB BOYCOTT.

JERUSALEM, Feb. 8. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A very representative gathering of notables, with the exception of the Arabs, gathered to hear Professor Albert Einstein lecture on his theory of relativity at the Hebrew University House on Mt. Scopus, Wednesday night. Prominent Arab residents declined the invitation presumably because they did not wish to honor the Jewish scientist.

Speaking in Hebrew, M. Ussishkin welcomed the Professor on behalf of the Jewish community. Prof. Einstein began his speech in Hebrew and continued in French evoking great enthusiasm, as he touched on the phases of his theory. Sir Herbert Samuel, the High Commissioner, thanked the Professor for his work in the interests of humanity. He added: "It is a good sign for the Hebrew University that the first lecture is delivered by the greatest physicist in the world".

Zionism is not only a spiritual movement. Its practical work in Palestine is of equal consequence, Prof. Einstein told a Jewish audience at a reception arranged by leading organizations here. The address of welcome was delivered by David Yellin, President of the Council of Jerusalem Jews who handed the Professor an illuminated testimonial with the signatures of the representatives of Palestine Jewry.

"The international recognition of Zionism has strengthened my belief in its success", the Professor said in the course of his address. Leaders of the Jewish community met Prof. Einstein and his wife at a tea in his honor arranged by M. Ussishkin.

FORCE LUDENDORFF TO QUIT VIENNA.

VIENNA, Feb. 8. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) General Ludendorff, the German Generalissimo, has been ordered to leave Vienna in advance of the date he had fixed for his departure, it is learned.

In an interview with newspaper men here, Gen. Ludendorff asserted that war clouds are gathering. He declined to predict the constellation of such a war, definitely rejecting the possibility of a German-Russian alliance.

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LITHUANIAN "AUBER ALLES" - KOVNO VANDALS' SLOGAN.

KOVNO, Feb. 8, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) "Lithuanian neber alles" is the slogan of nationalists who startled Kovno the other morning by smearing with pitch and black paint all shop windows and private houses displaying signs in Yiddish, Polish or German. No institution was spared, the shield over the offices of the Ministry for Jewish affairs having also been given a coat of pitch. Street names in Yiddish, Polish or German were be-spattered beyond legibility.

This vandalization is said to have been perpetrated by about 200 soldiers and civilians who toured the city in automobiles the early hours of the morning. The zeal of the nationalists is best illustrated by the fact that visiting cards of apartments on the second and third floors were obliterated, if printed in a language other than Lithuanian.

As far as it is ascertained, the police did not interfere with the nationalists, as it is highly improbable that the work could have been accomplished with such thoroughness as to leave not a single sign bearing a non-Lithuanian inscription had the Police intervened.

Jewish shopkeepers have met and decided to demand the dismissal of the town commandant, threatening to close the shops for seven days if he is not removed.

HUYLER WITHDRAS OFFENSIVE "AD" FOLLOWING KEHILLAH PROTEST.

NEW YORK, Feb. 8, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) A discriminatory want advertisement inserted in a Brooklyn newspaper by a Huyler candy store asking that only "two neat Christian girls" need apply was repudiated today by Frank de K. Huyler, President of the chain of stores bearing his name, in a letter to the Executive Committee of the Jewish Kehillah, 114 Fifth Avenue.

The advertisement, Frank de K. Huyler wrote, "was placed by the manager of the Brooklyn store 'in direct violation to instructions issued by our store managers, as it is strictly against our policy to discriminate against any creed in the employment of our help'".

In drawing Mr. Huyler's attention to the advertisement, William Lieberman, Counsel for the Kehillah, wrote: "We have frequently found that subordinates have used discriminatory designations which are offensive to a large part of the community without authorization from the responsible heads. We are reluctant in believing that you are apprised of the contents of this advertisement".

DAVID A. BROWN FILES PETITION FOR MAYOR OF DETROIT.

DETROIT, Feb. 9, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) David A. Brown, former director of the \$14,000,000 relief campaign for Jewish war sufferers, was first to file petitions for Mayor of Detroit. Mr. Brown submitted 12,350 signatures. Under the law, a candidate for the Detroit Mayoralty must submit at least 6,80 names.
