45 JEWS SERIOUSLY WOUNDED IN BUCHAREST POGROM.

Roumania Believed to Be Suppressing Stories of Atrocities.

BUCHAREST, March 27, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The anti-Jewish riots here which are unparalleled for severity are now in their third day. Neither the government nor the police is taking any measures to protect the Jews.

VIENNA, March 27, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Forty five are reported wounded in the anti Semitic disturbances which have been going on the past several days in Roumania.

The anti-Semites first besieged a Jewish Theatre in Bucharest where American Jewish actors were performing and brutally assaulted Jewish theatre goers and passersby. According to reports the government has finally decided to take steps to end the riots, fearing the unsavory impression the disorders will create outside of Roumania.

(In view of the brevity of the above Bucharest cablegram despite the seriousness of the disturbances described, the J.T.A. is of the opinion that reports are being censored by the Roumanian government. The seriousness of the situation is confirmed by the cablegram from Vienna.)

DEATH TAKES SARAH BERNHARDT AT 78.

PARIS, March 27, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Madame Sarah Bernhardt, generally considered as "the world's greatest emotional actress" died Monday evening.

Bernhardt was of Jewish parentage. At the age of twelve she was baptized into the Catholic faith. Her childhood name was Rosinne Bernard.

JEWISH PUBLICATION SOCIETY RESPONSIBLE FOR 125 BOOKS.**To Issue Translation of Poems of Gabirol.**

PHILADELPHIA, March 26. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The Jewish Publication Society has issued 125 books during its existence, attaining a total of 1,300,000 copies, Simon Miller, president of the Society declared at the thirty-fifth annual meeting held Sunday. The Society will issue next fall a selection of the first poems of Solomon Ibn Gabirol. he text was edited by Professor Israel Davidson and translated into English by Israel Zangwill.

"Jews must produce a literature that will educate Jews to know themselves and with this knowledge ward off the insidious slanders that are cast upon Jews", Mr. Miller declared in his address.

The following were elected officers: President, Simon Miller, Philadelphia; First Vice President, Adolph S. Ochs; Second Vice President, Horace Stern; Treasurer, Henry Fernberger; Secretary, George Dobsavage, and Dr. B. Halper, Editor.

The Society has issued the "The Feet of the Messenger", a volume of travels through Palestine by the Jewish poet Yehoash (Solomon Bloomgarten). The English version is the work of Isaac Goldberg, the translator of Ibanes' "Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse".

JEWS WIN LIBERALIZATION OF ROUMANIAN CITIZENSHIP CLAUSE.

BUCHAREST, March 27, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The Commission in charge of the new Roumanian constitution has made an eleventh hour concession to the Jews on the citizenship clause. Upon persistent efforts of the Jewish members of Parliament the commission has agreed to amend the citizenship clause giving all those residents of Roumania since 1918 the right of citizenship.

The original clause excluded from citizenship those coming to Roumania after 1914.

BERLIN TO NAME STREET AFTER RATHENAU.

BERLIN, March 27, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A new street just laid out in Berlin will be named "Rathenau Strasse", the Berlin City Council has decided.

The proposal by the Centre and Democratic parties to rename the Berliner Strasse in Charlottenberg suburb as the Erzberger Strasse and the Dorf Strasse in Templehof as the Rathenau Strasse were rejected by the votes of the Right and the Communists.

DETAILS OF NEW EINSTEIN THEORY TO BE MADE KNOWN.

BERLIN, March 27, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) The German Academy of Science is planning to publish within the next few weeks a detailed explanation of Professor Albert Einstein's new theory.

RUSSIAN CHALUZIM AMONG EXILES FROM POLAND.

BERLIN, March 27, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) Four hundred Chaluzim who had managed after great effort to reach Poland on their way to Palestine are included among the Jewish refugees expelled from Poland to the Ukrainian frontier.

Jewish relief organizations here have been asked to provide them with funds to continue their way to Palestine.

EXILED FROM POLAND, JEWS SEEK RETURN TO RUSSIA.

NEW YORK, March 27, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) A large number of Russian Jewish refugees expelled from Poland are planning to return to Russia, and Jews of Kiev and other centers are making preparations to take care of them, according to a cable received by the Joint Distribution Committee from Dr. Boris D. Bogen, the JDC's representative in Moscow.

DEPORTED IMMIGRANTS MAY RETURN NEXT JULY.

NEW YORK, March 27, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) Immigrants prevented from landing because of the exhausted quotas may return to the U.S. next July with their old passports and visas, if the time for which they are valid has not expired.

A ruling to this effect has been received by the Hias (Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society) from the State Department.

IDGESCOM QUESTIONS ARA ACTION.

NEW YORK, March 27, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) The action of the ARA in discontinuing the remittance of food packages to Russia on the ground that food can be purchased cheaper in Russia than here is unwarranted, according to a statement issued by the Idgescom here.

The Idgescom claims to have authentic information that the American dollar will buy less food in Russia than here. notwithstanding information of other Jewish agencies to the contrary.

N.Y. JEWISH HOSPITALS PLAN ADDITIONS.

NEW YORK, March 27, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) This week has been eventful for Jewish hospitals of New York. The Mt. Sinai Hospital, it was announced at the annual meeting of the trustees, will erect a new training school for nurses to cost \$1,500,000. It will be the eighteenth building maintained by Mt. Sinai.

The Jewish Hospital of Brooklyn was the scene of the laying of the cornerstone of the \$500,000 wing of the Abraham Memorial.
