CLAIMS LEAGUE SANCTIONED JEW EXPULSION FROM AUSTRIA.

London Hears Negotiations Dealt With Evacuation, Not Expulsion.

VIENNA, April 12, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) That the Council of the League of Nations has approved the Austrian government measures looking to the expulsion of East European Jews from Austrian soil, was the statement made by the Vice Chancellor in Parliament yesterday.

The Vice Chancellor was replying, at the end of a heated debate on the Jewish question, to charges by Socialist deputies that the government was acting contrary to international sanctions in the eviction of the eastern Jews. Expulsion was in a large number of cases delayed, the Vice Chancellor explained, because transport difficulties rendered the task impossible.

LONDON, April 13, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The statement of the Austrian Vice-Chancellor that the League's Council had approved the expulsion of Eastern European Jews is due probably to a misunderstanding, it is learned. In the negotiations regarding this question conducted by the Joint Foreign Committee of British Jews with the Austrian government, through the Council, the gradual "evacuation" of the Jews, and not their expulsion, was considered, it was stated here today.

HOOLIGANS SMASH SYNAGOGUE WINDOWS IN POSEN; MOLEST JEWS ON TRAINS.

WARSAW, April 13, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The apparent quiet reigning in Poland notwithstanding, there is still considerable agitation against the Jews, in consequence of the protests against execution and persecution in Russia of Christian prelates.

Following a protest meeting in Posen, hooligans surrounded the synagogue, smashed the window panes, routing the terror-stricken worshippers.

Reports from Vilna reveal that Jewish passengers on trains from Warsaw to Vilna are molested and are not unfrequently thrown out of moving trains.

WOULD HANG POLISH RABBIS FOR SOVIET PERSECUTION.

WARSAW, April 13, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Resolutions adopted at a meeting in Biala, Poland, called by the "Rozwoj" party to protest the Soviet executions of Bishop Butchkevitch and the imprisonment of Bishop Cepliak, provide for the immediate arrest of all rabbis in Poland.

The resolutions urge the Polish government to notify the Soviet government that the rabbis will be hung unless Bishop Cepliak, under a ten year sentence, is released at once.

REPORT ORDER RESTORED IN ROUMANIA.

BUCHAREST, April 13. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Reports from various parts of the country indicate no further anti-Jewish attacks had taken place the last few days, the authorities appearing to have the situation well in hand. An attempt to foment an uprising in Jassy miscarried following stern measures adopted by the police.

BAVARIAN PEASANTS TERRORIZE JEWS.

MUNICH, April 13, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The police force of Kleinlangheim has been reinforced by additional men sent from Munich, following requests from Jews of that place for protection.

Jews often awakened to find their window panes smashed, and fruit trees uprooted. Several Jews have been told to liquidate their affairs and leave on pain of having their property burned.

POLISH SUBJECTS COMPLAIN OF PALESTINE TREATMENT.

SOBIA, (J.C.B. Mail Service) The Polish Consul in Bulgaria has received a letter from a Polish Jew now resident in Tel-Aviv, complaining of the treatment of Polish subjects in Palestine. He writes that on arrival at the port of Jaffa or Haifa, British and municipal officials control the passports of all passengers, but whereas they return them in all other cases they retain the passports of Polish subjects and file them in the archives.

APOSTATES ILLEGIBLE FOR POLISH OFFICERS' RESERVE.

WARSAW, April 13, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) The Reserve Officers' Club has adopted a ruling barring Jewish officers from membership. The term "Jew" covers also officers who in entering the service, or before had forsaken the Jewish faith.
