**JEWS OF FINLAND BUY KOSHER MEAT ABROAD.**

**FIGA, May 2, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The government of Finland having prohibited Schechita, observing Jews are obliged to import meat from the neighboring countries. A number of Jews from Helsingfors are now in Riga, others are in Reval, Esthonia, making arrangements for the importation of kosher meats into Finland.**

**SOVIETS FORBID REHABILITATION OF KEHILLAHs.**

**WARSAW, May 2, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The Soviet authorities have set their faces against any attempt to reorganize the Kehillahs in Russia, which are in a chaotic condition, according to a report circulated by a Russian press agency here. The report states that an organization having as its aim the rehabilitation of the Jewish communities throughout Russia was discovered in Charkov, and that it was promptly ordered "liquidated" by the Commissar for Internal Affairs.**

**A number of Zionists are under arrest at Elizabethgrad following the discovery there of a secret Zionist organization.**

**PRAISE U.S. CONTRIBUTION TO THE KEREN HAYESOD.**

**LONDON, May 2, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A statement from the headquarters of the Keren Hayesod reports that half a million dollars has been received from America within the last four months.**

**Continuation of this effort, it is declared, will improve the economic position of Palestine, raise the moral prestige of the Zionist Organization and strengthen its political position by destroying the argument the Jews have shown themselves unprepared for sacrifices in behalf of their national home.**

**JEWISH PUBLIC ASKED TO AID STUDENTS' STRUGGLE.**

VIENNA, May 2, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) An appeal to the Jewish public to come to the aid of the Jewish students in European Universities, has been issued by the executive committee appointed at the recent meeting of representatives of European Jewish students associations.

The provisional committee is located in Vienna and has a temporary representative in London. It is proposed to convene a World Congress around the beginning of October, the object of which will be to adopt measures looking to the mitigation of admission limitations in force or about to come into force in the universities in the various European capitals.

The "moral and material help" of the Jewish public is invoked in this task.

**JEWISH WOMEN'S CONFERENCE IN VIENNA TO HEAR AMERICANS.**

VIENNA, May 2, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The Delegation of the American Council of Jewish Women has arrived in this city to attend the American-European conference of Jewish Women which has been called by the American Council.

At the opening session on Sunday, May 6th, the following American delegates will speak: Mrs. Alexander Kohut of New York on "Our Interest in Europe"; Mrs. Nathaniel E. Harris of Bradford, Pa., on "Cooperation Between Europe and America"; Mrs. Estelle M. Steinberger of New York on "The Council and World Jewish Womanhood"; Miss Cecelia Rasovsky of New York on "A History of Post-War Immigration".

Representatives of Jewish Women's organizations in Europe include Mrs. Eicholz of England, Mme. Zadok Kohn of France, Mme. Wiesenbeck of Holland, Frau Rappenheim of Germany, Mme. Boracs of Hungary, Mrs. Melzer, member of the Polish Sejm, and Dr. Klaranska of Lithuania.

**JEWISH RECONSTRUCTION HELD UP IN HUNGARY.**

BUDAPEST, April 20, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) A difficult position has been created for the the reconstruction activities of the Joint Distribution Committee in Hungary by the refusal of the Hungarian government to permit the organization of Jewish credit co-operatives. The authorities have also been placing obstacles in the way of the local committees, as a result of which it has become necessary for the "Joint" to conduct its work in the country through its own officials.

Up to April 1st, 240 credits have been granted to Jewish traders and artisans, amounting to the total value of 24 million Hungarian Kronen.

## LATVIAN MINISTER ASSAILS JEWISH STUDENTS.

RIGA, April 19, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau. Speaking at the conference of the Latvian Peasants' Union, Mr. Gajlit, the Minister for Education, declared that the Jewish students had overflowed the Russian, German and Latvian schools of the country. Only 32 per cent of the Jewish youth in the country attended the Jewish schools, he stated.

The Jewish students "had offended the soul" of the Latvian university youth, and this was the sole cause of excesses which had taken place at the Riga high school. The Government, he concluded, will make it its aim to carry into effect the well-founded demands of the Latvian students.

It having been stated that the Latvian government, on the initiative of Mr. Gajlit, the Minister for Education, was preparing a new numerus clausus project against the Jewish students, the Jewish deputies Fischman, Dubin and Nurok have interviewed Mr. Bernis, the Minister for the Interior, to inquire regarding the attitude of the Government. Mr. Bernis replied that it was still undecided when the Cabinet would be able to deal with the question. Nothing had been said about formal restrictions against Jews at the universities.

A proposal was made that students of means should pay the fees for students unable themselves to pay. The Minister for Education had prepared a bill providing that about 500 students without means, including twenty-five Jews, would not be called upon to pay tuition fees. Instead, those students who are possessed of means would be required to pay 15,000 Latvian roubles annually each to meet the difference.

Mr. Gajlit is understood to have instructed the University authorities that at the enrollment of students, particular attention should be paid to the knowledge of the Latvian language possessed by the candidates.

## JEWISH DEPUTIES EXPLAIN ROUMANIAN CONSTITUTION STAND.

CZERNOWITZ, May 2, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The Jewish deputies for the Bukowina have published a statement defending themselves against the attacks made on them by the Zionists and the Jewish Nationalists in the province for their action in voting in favor of the Jewish articles in the Roumanian constitution. They declare that they were faced with the alternative of accepting certain measure of rights or of losing everything.
