KEHILLAH MUSEUM IN BERLIN ROBBED; PRICELESS ANTIQUES TAKEN.

BERLIN, May 15, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A large number of sacred ancient vessels including a sacramental wine cup used in the seventeenth century were among the objects stolen when burglars entered the Jewish Community Museum adjoining the Oranienburger strasse Synagogue. Hundreds of priceless medals and coins including some from the Maccabean period in Palestine were also stolen.

Two men have been held under suspicion, but no trace of the valuables has been found, and it is feared the objects may have been smuggled out of the country.

DEATH THREATS FOR JEWISH STUDENTS AND PROFESSORS.

Fascisti Mobilize 40,000 at Temesvar.

BUCHAREST, May 15, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Continued attendance by Jewish students and professors at the University of Bucharest will mean their death, according to threats of Roumanian Fascisti who have relaunched an offensive against the Jews at the University here. A large number of Jewish students have been savagely maltreated and had their papers taken from them. Albert Gruenberg is among those actually captured by the Fascisti and held prisoner for several hours. Professor Reiner has been informed by telephone that he will be murdered if he attempts to resume his lectures.

Forty thousand students are reported to have enrolled in the "Faszia Nationala Roumana" in answer to a call issued by that organization to all patriotic Roumanians to join the life or death struggle against Jews, according to a report from Temesvar.

JEWES FLEE SMYRNA.

SMYRNA, May 15, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Many Jewish families are reported to be leaving Smyrna owing to the concentration of Turkish troops on the Syrian frontier. Nationals from foreign countries are asked by the Turks to produce papers entitling them to live in the city.

"ROZWOJ" REVIVES PROTOCOLS OF ZION.

WARSAW, May 14. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A new Polish edition of the forged protocols of the Elders of Zion is receiving widespread distribution at the hands of the Rozwoj party.

According to a decision of the conference of Polish Students' Corporation, members are urged not to give satisfaction to Jewish students by means of duel or otherwise, in the event of an altercation arising between a Jewish and a non-Jewish student over matters involving a point of honor.

CHARGES DISCRIMINATION AGAINST SEPHARDIC JEWS.

JERUSALEM, May 14, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The charge that Sephardic Jews in Palestine are not accorded equal treatment with Ashkenazim is contained in an article in the DOAR HAYOM, a Hebrew daily. The writer complains bitterly that Jewish public institutions are discriminating against Jews of Sephardic stock.

Among 356 officials and employees of the Zionist Executive, the Vaad Leumi, the Anglo-Palestine Bank and others, 13 Sephardim are to be found, he asserts.

NANSEN OFFICE STARTS CLOTHING SERVICE TO RUSSIA.**Flour Eliminated From Food Parcel.**

NEW YORK, May 14, (Jewish correspondence Bureau) The inauguration of a clothing draft service for relief of individuals in Russia is announced by the High Commission of Dr. Fridtjof Nansen for Relief in Russia, to begin immediately, in addition to the service of food drafts and duty-free relief packages which Dr. Nansen's organization has been forwarding to Russia from the United States ever since the suspension of the ARA individual relief service, on March 15. Four types of clothing drafts are issued by the Nansen Mission, according to the age and sex of the person for whom they are intended, and at four different prices.

At the same time, the Mission announces that, in accord with the policy followed by Dr. Nansen of sending into Russia only articles for relief purposes that cannot be readily bought in Russia, the contents of the parcels delivered for the Nansen Food Drafts will be changed to eliminate flour as one of the articles, as the prices of flour are lower in Russia than it costs to send flour into Russia, and the parcels will hereafter consist of such articles as condensed milk, sugar, tea, coffee, cocoa, fats, rice, preserved fruits and chocolate which can only be purchased in Russia at prohibitive prices. A parcel delivered for a \$5.25 Nansen Food Draft costs in Russia, it is announced, \$12.00, being a saving of over 128% over sending dollars.

The Nansen Relief Mission has opened a Chicago office for handling Food Drafts, Clothing Drafts and Duty-Free Relief Packages in the Victory Building, 3242 West Roosevelt Road.

ROCHESTER CLOTHING WORKERS GET WAGE INCREASE.

ROCHESTER, N.Y., May 14, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Clothing workers receiving less than \$40 a week will get a 10% increase while workers earning \$40 and over will receive an increase of approximately 5%, or an average of four dollars for each week.

More than 13,000 clothing wrkers benefit by this wage increase announced Sunday by Max L. Holtz, President of the Rochester Clothiers' Exchange, and Sidney W. Hillman, President of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America.

MONTAGUE GLASS STRICKEN.

NEW YORK, May 15, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) Montague Glass, author and playwright, of 601 W. 113th Str. was operated upon Sunday night at the Roosevelt Hospital by Dr. Thomas H. Russell of 165 W. 58th St. for appendicitis. His condition was reported as serious following the operation but he is improving slightly at present.

Mr. Glass is 55 years old. He was born in England, and came here as a boy. His best known works are his short stories of "Potash and Perlmutter", which he also dramatized.

3,000 ATTEND FEDERATION CHILDREN'S FESTIVAL.

NEW YORK, May 14, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau, More than 1,000 boys and girls representing eleven institutions Sunday evening entertained 5,000 persons at the Spring festival of the Federation for the support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies at the Century Theatre, Central Park West and Sixty third Street.

Arthur Lehman, President of the Federation said that last year the organization gave \$450,000 more than it had the year previous in maintaining various philanthropic societies, and that there was now a deficit of about the same amount for the current year. He advised increasing the membership of the Federation.

CONGRESSMAN PERLMAN TO FIGHT JEWISH GIRL'S DEPORTATION.

NEW YORK, May 14, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau, Congressman Nathan D. Perlman announced he proposed to fight any attempt to deport 14-year old Pauline Fink of 101 Margit Street, a pupil in Public School 47, who was declared mentally normal by experts at Bellevue and Post Graduate Hospitals and by a special Immigration Board sitting in Washington. At a re-examination by a Board sitting at Ellis Island on Wednesday, the girl was declared to be mentally defective for the second time.

Pauline Fink, who is deaf, is one of a large family who in November 1920, arrived here with their mother to join the father, Joseph Fink, already in this country.
