FIGHTING RENEWED IN BUCHAREST; EIGHT JEWS MALTREATED.

Bucarest, May 22. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). Serious fighting broke out anew on the campus of the Bucharest University yesterday when anti-Semitic students of the Commercial, Chemical and Mineralogical Departments hurled stink-bombs at Jews in classes. Eight Jewish students were so badly beaten as to require hospital treatment and are still under physicians' care.

KLAUSENBURG TEACHERS JOIN STUDENTS' STRIKE.

Bucharest, May 22. (J.T.A.) Sixty assistant professors and instructors joined the striking anti-Jewish students, declaring that since only Jews attended the lectures, they saw no purpose in continuing to teach. Appeals by the Jewish student body to the instructors to disregard the anti-Semitic Boycott proved unavailing.

AUSTRIAN OFFICIALS BAR JEWS FROM HEALTH RESORTS.

Vienna, May 22. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). Resolutions declaring Jews as inadmissible were adopted by the municipalities of Spitzbrunn and Krensmuenster, two well-known Austrian health resorts. Appeals against this decision, which is in violation of the constitution, have been lodged with the officials of the districts in which the resorts are situated. Failing satisfaction in this quarter, Jewish leaders declare they will start proceedings in the higher courts against both the municipalities and the district officials.

AMBASSADOR HOWELL ASTONISHED BY PALESTINE PROGRESS.

JERUSALEM, May 20, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) J. Morton Howell, American Ambassador and Consul General to Egypt, told newspapermen here today he was agreeably astonished at the rapid development Palestine has made. He visited Palestine fifteen years ago, he said, and it was impossible for him to recognize it was the same country, owing to the remarkable progress that has been made since that time.

HISTORY OF THE JEWS OF FRANKFORT.

BERLIN, May 7, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) It is stated that Prof. J. Krakauer, known as the historian of Frankfort Jewry, completed before his death his "History of the Jews of Frankfort". The manuscript is in the hands of the Board of Frankfort Jewish community, on whose commission it was written. Publication will be commenced shortly. The volumes represent the lifework of Prof. Krakauer.

UKRAINIAN JEWS DECIDE TO CONTINUE AID.

NEW YORK, May 22, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) Continuance of aid for the nearly three million Ukrainians who in the Ukraine was strongly urged, and propaganda tending to show the emergency had passed as strongly denounced, by all speakers at the third annual convention of the National Federation of Ukrainian Jews, Monday, in the Hotel McAlpin.

The speakers included Dr. Benjamin Dubowsky, President of the Federation, who presided, Captain Eakton Hibben, a representative of the Hansen Relief Mission, and Dr. Leo Moriski of Lwow, Chairman of the Jewish World Relief Conference.

Sixty delegates, including representatives from Detroit, Chicago, Philadelphia, New Haven and many other cities, were in attendance at the session, beginning with a dinner Saturday evening.

Reporting the Federation was instrumental in forwarding through the American Relief Administration to individuals in the Ukraine food and clothing drafts amounting to \$750,000.00, Dr. Dubowsky announced that following the suspension of the draft service by Secretary Hoover's Committee, the Federation of Ukrainian Jews decided on April 23rd last to avail itself of the Hansen Relief Mission for the forwarding of food and clothing to the Ukraine. Dr. Dubowsky indicated also that "for various reasons the Jewish Joint Distribution Committee will sooner or later discontinue its activities in Russia and in the Ukraine." "Since the necessity of helping the Jews in the Ukraine will continue for many years to come, we must be prepared to assume at least a part of the enormous relief work for our brethren", Dr. Dubowsky added.

That the Jews of the United States gave half of the relief that went from this country to Russia, the Jew giving an average of fourteen dollars to the 76 cents contributed by the Christian member, was asserted by Captain Hibben.

Mr. Rashkes, a member of the Executive Committee, of the All-Russian Jewish Relief Committee (Yifgescom) reported his committee was caring for 170,000 Jewish children and urged the continued support of the Federation in the maintenance of children's homes in Soviet Russia and the Ukraine.

Dr. Motzkin declared there were two false impressions that had to be dispelled if intensification of the relief effort in behalf of Russia was to be made possible. He said Herbert Hoover was responsible for the impression that the need passed with the famine. The other impression he said was the Jews in this country were weary of giving.

Dr. Motzkin invited the Federation to send representatives to a conference of Jewish Relief workers in Europe and urged the establishment of at least one large children's kitchen in some city in the Ukraine, in addition to founding of institutions to care for 50,000 homeless children. The visitor cited figures showing an appalling low birth rate obtaining among the Ukrainian population, especially the Jews.

Dr. Motzkin declared scientists found the famine sufferers were smaller of stature and that their head and breast measurements have been considerably diminished. He insisted further relief without sanitation was impossible.

Speakers at the dinner included Joseph Barondes, Dr. Joseph Krimsky, a former President of the Federation, John L. Bernstein, President of the Hias, Wm. Edlin, Editor of the DAY, and Dr. A. Coralnik, the Federation's Secretary. Mr. Dubowsky was elected for a second term. Dr. L. Smirnoff of Bridgeport, Conn., was elected honorary secretary and Frank Krevoruk, vice-president.

PROMINENT JEWISH SOCIAL WORKERS AT NATIONAL CONFERENCE.

WASHINGTON, May 22, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) Seven Jews figure prominently on the program of the National Conference of Social Workers which has been attracting nationwide attention, and has been addressed by Secretaries Hughes and Hoover. The most prominent of these is Dr. Alice Solomon, director of the Berlin School of Social Work, one of the six specially invited foreign visitors to the Conference. She made a great impression by her address the other day.

The others are Lee K. Frankel, of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, who has been nominated for first vice-president of the Conference, George J. Hecht, editor of BETTER TIMES, New York, Dr. Bernard Glueck, noted psychopathic expert, Dr. Sidney E. Goldstein, Director of Social Service, New York Free Synagogue, Mrs. Henry Moskowitz, Public Relations Councillor, New York, and Alfred Bettman, prominent Cincinnati attorney, who was formerly connected with the Department of Justice.

It is also a source of interest at the Conference that Ruth Mary Wolff, age 2 years and two months, whose father is a director of the Jewish Big Brothers Club of Pittsburgh, has the distinction of being the youngest member of the Conference, having been registered by her parents.

WANT \$500,000 FOR ORTHODOX HOME FOR INCURABLES.

NEW YORK, May 22, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) Nearly \$200,000 was realized in the first ten days of the campaign of the Beth Abraham Home for Incurables in the Bronx. The institution, the only strictly orthodox Jewish home in the United States, and having 70 patients, hopes to raise \$500,000 before next Sunday to erect a new building
