POPE CALLS CATHOLICS TO DEFEND HOLY PLACES.

ROME, May 29, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The "overhelming rights" of the Catholics to the holy places in Palestine were streamed by Pope Pius addressing the secret Consisterium on May 23 last, it is learned.

"It is hardly necessary to say that we will, as hitherto, defend the undeniable, obvious and overhelming rights of Catholics to the Holy places in Palestine", the Pontiff is reported to have said.

SAMUEL STEADFAST ON ZIONIST POLICY.

JERUSALEM, May 29, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The High Commissioner, Sir Herbert Samuel, took occasion yesterday to reiterate his belief in steadfastness of the Jewish National Home Policy, which, he said. "will always remain".

The occasion was the dedication of the Rabbinical House built by Harry Fischel, of New York, as a residence for Chief Rabbi Kuk. The American Consul was also a speaker at the ceremony.

TRY TO KILL PRO-JEWISH PROFESSOR.

BUCHAREST, May 28, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Acting rector Jacobovici of the University of Klausenberg had a narrow escape from death when a bullet was fired at him by one of a crowd of Fascieti students. Professor Jacobovici is one of the teachers opposing the enforcement of the percentage norm against Jewish Students.

A number of University professors in Jassy, among them Prince Contacuzina, have received letters threatening them with murder for persisting in siding with the Jews.

CHAB ZEDEK AND PINCUS ELIJAH CONGREGATIONS UNITE.

NEW YORK, May 28, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Announcement has been made of a consolidation which will bring about one of the largest Orthodox Jewish Congregations in America, through the merger of the First Hungarian Congregation Onab Zedek, 18 West 116th Street, and the Congregation Pincus Elijah, West Ninety-fifth Street.

The plan has received the ratification of the trustees of each congregation and will go into immediate effect. The plans include the erection in the near future of an additional synagogue by Omah Zedek on the West Side, which he intended to be one of the largest in the city.

The Rev. Philip Klein, rabbi of the Onab Zedek, will officiate at both synagogues with Rabbi Joseph J. Schwartz of Pincus Elijah as assisting rabbi. The Rev. Joseph Rosenblatt, for eleven years cantor of Ohab Zedek, will be cantor for both synagogues.

ASK JEWISH AID FOR BOMB WRECKED PAPER.

CRACOW, May 28, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) NOWZ DZIENNIK, whose editorial rooms have been wrocked by a bomb hurled by anti-Semitic students, appeals to the Jewish population to help in the rebuilding of their offices.

PREMIER SIKORSKI RESIGNS; JEWS VOTE LACK OF CONFIDENCE.

WARSAW. May 28, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Prime Hinister Sikorski of Poland and his Cabinet resigned Saturday night following an adverse vote in the Diet on the Premier's move for a vote of confidence. the Christian Socialists, the Peasant Party Deputies and representatives of virtually all minority nationalities joined in the vote against the Government. Deputy Reich, on behalf of the Jewish members, declared he took the occasion to voice their protest against Premier Sikorski's treatment of the homeless refugees of the Ukraine whose expulsion from Poland the Premier directed in an order issued April 15.

The discussion leading up to the Cabinet's defeat was occasioned by the Premier's request for approval of the provisional budget as a whole, including an appropriation for Secret Service. The Government was defeated by the newly formed coalition of Witos, the Peasant Party leader, with the Right bloc, the vote being 379 against 117.

PALESTINE WITHIN ARAB ZONE, BUT GOVERNMENT UNCHANGED.

JERUSALEM, May 29. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency: It is learned King Hussein of Hedjas has agreed to the treaty with Great Britain, providing for an Arab Confederation and has appointed Dr. Naji El Assii to proceed to London where the formal signing of the Treaty will take place. Under the Treaty, Palestine is recognized as within the "Arab Zone", but there is to be no change in the present form of government with Great Britain as the Mandatory Power, charged by the League of Nations with the erection of the Jewish Mational Home.

ROTHSCHILD QUITS DEPUTIES' PRESS COMMITTEE.

Meeting of Jewish Board of Deputies Breaks Up When Henriques Leaves Chair.

LONDON. May 28, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The monthly meeting of the Jewish Board of Deputies broke up unexpectedly yesterday when Lord Rothschild resigned and Mr. Henriques, who presided, left the chair and withdrew from the meeting. The incident arose over the question of the acceptance of a motion to appoint a paid secretary for the press committee. The proposal was opposed by the Press Committee itself which asked that the decision be postponed until the Board's special committee investigating the Press Committee's activities had time to report. The motion having nevertheless been accepted, Lord Rotschild informed the meeting of his resignation from the Board.

Mr. Henriques then proposed that the meeting be adjourned, while a number of members insisted on proceeding. It was then Mr. Henriques left the chair and the meeting broke up.

EXPLOSION ROCKS JEWISH STUDENTS' HOME IN WARSAW.

WARSAW, May 29, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Unidentified persons threw a bome at the Jawish Students' Home here, causing considerable damage but no loss of life. Four members of the Home's administrative committee were arrested on suspicion and released after being grilled for twenty hours.

The Jewish Deputies' Club has contributed one million marks towards the repair of the editorial rooms of the NOWY DZIENNIK of Cracow, wrecked by a bomb recently.

DR. WEIZMANN URGED TO REVISIT EAST SIDE.

NEW YORK, May 28, (Jewish Correspondence Eureau) An urgent invitation to Dr. Chaim Weizmann to revisit the East Side and address a huge demonstration sometime in June was extended by a conference of representatives of a few hundred East Side Jewish organizations at the Educational Allianco Sunday.

The meeting was addressed by Dr. Schmarya Levin and Bernard A. Rosenblatt. Following the opening of the convention by Harris L. Selig, a director of the New York Campaign, Issac Carmel reported the East Side has raised \$75,000 for the Keren Hayesod.

YIDDISH DRAMA GUILD ORGANIZED.

NEW YORK, May 28, (Jewish Correspondence Bureau) Announcemet of the organization of the Yiddish Drama Guild has been made by Mendel Helkin, its Executive Secretary. A large number of men and women interested in developing the Yiddish theatrical art, Mr. Henkin said, have already joined. The first club evening of the guild will be held on June 26, when Mr. Helkin will speak on "The Present Crisis in Dramatic Productions". David Dinski, playwright, will read from his works.

LAYOR HYLAN PAYS TRIBUTE TO KEREN HAYESOD ON PALESTINE DAY

New York, May 29 (J. C.B.). Prevented by the Educational Exposition of New York Silver Jubilee at the Grand Central Palace tonight from attending the meeting of the Palestine Foundation Fund at Town Hall, Mayor Hylan wrote to Judge Bernard A. Rosenblatt, Chairman of the New York Campaign of the Keren Hayesod, denouncing racial prejudice and praising the spirit of "amity and concord prevailing among the cosmopolitan population of Greater New York". The Mayor pays special tribute to the Keren Hayesod and expresses the hope that Palestine Day celebrated throughout today will elicit a hearty response. The Mayor's letter is as follows:

"As you doubtless know the opening tonight of the Educational Exposition at the Grand Central Falace in connection with New York's Silver Jubilee will require my personal attendance. May I therefore ask that you kindly convey an expression of regret at my inability to be present at the meeting of the Palestine Foundation Fund this evening.

"The City of New York has long been noted for its live and live spirit and despite many racial customs of our cosmopolitan population, the people from every land dwell here in amity and concord. It is true that the darkhead of racial prejudice is occasionally reared by those with private purposes to serve, but the spirit of neighborliness is always most manifest.

"It was with this thought in mind that I took pleasure in issuing a proclamation urging upon the citizens of Greater New York to remember generously the ralextine Foundation Fund on Tuesday, hay 29th, which has been designated as 'Palestine Day'.

"I am sure that the response will be hearty and give needed encouragement to the sturdy pioneers who are building the roads, planting the trees, cultivating the soil, erecting the schools, and maintaining a sanitary organization for the new home of Israel in Judaeu, Galillee, and in the Valley of Nazareth.Q

MEMORIAL TO JEWISH WAR DEAD DEDICATED 400 BEDS

New York, May 27 (J. C.B.). The Jewish Lemorial Hospital at Dyckman Street and River Road was formally dedicated Sunday to the memory of soldiers; sailors and marines who made the supreme sacrifice in the late war. Letters from President Harding, Vice-President Coolige, Governor Smith, Theodore Rossevelt, Ceneral Pershing and Herbert Hoover were read

The grounds overlooking the Hudson River, were crowded with friends and fellow workers who had been active in securing the \$500,000 raised by voluntary contribution. Lembers from the neighboring American Legion Posts, wearing uniforms and carrying flags, attended, and there was music by the Boys' band from the Hebrew Orphan Asylum.

A bronze tablet was unveiled. It bears a bas-relief of a battlefield showing the wounded receiving medical aid, and also contains the names of the officers and directors of the hospital and of the Ladies' Auxiliary.

Edmond Schwarz, President of the hospital said that the institution now has 100 beds, and in a short while it was hoped to make the number 400.
