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SEE WITOS MOVE TO CRUSH JEWISH INFLUENCE

Warsaw, Kime 1 (Dewish Telegraphic agency). The Jewish press of Poland is rather fearful of the results the change in the cabinet will bring as far as Polish Jews are concerned. It is clear that Prime Minister Witos will seek to isolate the minorities, particularly the Jewish deputies, and prevent their exercising any influence upon Polish policy in order that Wae nationalist majority shall remain loyal and intect. In this respect Witos will most likely follow the course pursued by his predecessor Sikorski. It will be recalled that Premier Sikorski's last speech contained an obvious slight of the Jews. Prior to the vote which sent him to defeat Sikorski had declared his Government was purely Polish and was dependent only upon the Polish National, majority. The Jewish deputies who had voted for the socialist resolution against the inclusion of the extreme Right parties in the new government, were bitterly disappointed when this resolution was defeated by a vote of 210 against 180.

It is expected that Premier Witos will inaugurate an anti-Jewish policy by giving official sanction to the agitation favoring the restriction of Jewish students in universities.

PRUSSIAN PRESS REPORTS EXCESSES IN POLISH UPPER SILESIA

Berlin, June 1 (Jewish Telegraphic agency). A series of anti-Jewish excesses have occurred the last few days in the Polish part of Upper Silesia formerly belinging to Germany, according to reports of provincial newspapers in Prussia. Buk, Neutomischel, Culm and Wronke are among the places mentioned in the dispatches where anti-Jewish attacks are alleged to have occurred. The reports add that the Jews are constantly being threatened by anti-Semites and that anti-Jewish placards are prominently displayed throughout the country.

The Breslauer Zeitung reports twenty soldiers in uniform invaded the Symagogue at Beuthen during divine services, with the intention of attacking the Jewish worshippers. The attempt having miscarried because of police intervention, the hooligans the same night threw hand grenades in the Jewish cemetery demolishing tombstones of the graves of dead soldiers.

HAKENKREUZLER PARTY DECLARED "LEGAL"

Vienna, June 1 (Jewish Telegraphic agency). Tried for removing and destroying an anti-Semitic placard, a Christian workman was sentenced in a court here to pay a substantial fine or undergo imprisonment. The judge who sentenced the accused declared the Hakenkreuzler was a legal political party and interference with its propaganda a misdemeanor.

LUDENDORF CLEARED OF ANTI-JEWISH CHARGE

Berlin, June 1 (Jewish Telegraphic agency). General Ludendorf did not mean to cast aspersion upon the Jews of Germany in passages in his war memoirs said by Jewish leaders to be distinctly uncomplimentary, is the opinion of the court of the second instance which considered the charges preferred by the German Bnei Brith lodge against the Generalissimo.

PLAN LAND ROUTE THROUGH SYRIAN DESERT

London, June 1 (Jewish Telegraphic agency). A land route from the Mediterranian over the Syrian Desert to Bagdad and India using Haifa in Palestine and Beirut in Syria as service stations, will be inaugurated in the Fall, according to Norman Mairu who participated in the trial trips automobiles recently made across the Syrian Desert. Mr. Mairu states a passenger and mail service over the desert by a quick land route is readily possible. The authorities of Mesopotamia and Palestine are in thoroughly interested in the arrangements. Mr. Mairu states. His trip over the Syrian Desert has convinced him of the great fertility of which the desert land is capable. By using the water power of the Epphrates and of the Tigris, which he says are now running waste, and with efficient irrigation, the desert could be made to "grow anything" in his opinion.

VAAD LEUMI ASKED TO NAME JEWISH REPRESENTATIVES

Jerusalem, June 1 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). The national Council of Palestine Jews (Vaad Leumi) has been asked by the government to name two candidates for the place reserved for Jews on the Advisory Council which, because of the temporary annulment of the Legislative Council, is to function as the only body representative of all sections of the Palestine population.

It is learned Mousa Kasim Pasha, in his capacity of President of the Moslem Christian Executive Committee, has cabled to King Hussein his congratulations upon the successful issue of the King's negotiations with the British over the formation of the Arab Federation. Palestine is proud to be included in the Federation, Kasim Pasha asserts.

MAYOR OF TEL-AVIV HERE ON MUNICIPAL LOAN.

NEW YORK, June 1, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Meyer Disengoff, the Mayor of Tel-Aviv, has arrived in New York in order to dispose of the remainder of the municipal bond issue of £75,000 which was floated by Bernard A. Rosenblatt, of the Zionist Executive. The issue is in the hands of Harvey Fiske and Sons, brokers.

Tel Aviv, which was founded in 1908, is the first completely Jewish town in Palestine. In May, 1921, it was declared a separate township with municipal authority. It has an area of 5,000 dunams, a population of 12,00, private property valued at £22,000,000, and municipal property worth £250,000. It was originally intended as a garden suburb of Jaffa, but the constant arrival of fresh immigrants and the annexation of neighboring Jewish quarters had led to its constant growth.

It is now proposed to add a commercial quarter and a tract of land has been acquired on which it is proposed to erect 150 shops, stores, offices, warehouses and bank premises. To carry out these various plans the town meeting has approved a loan of £275,000 for public utility purposes, including sewerage, electricity, water installation, road construction, etc.

The Municipal Bonds of Tel-Aviv have been placed with a firm of brokers in New York for the purpose of raising the loan, and it is to sign the bonds alredy placed that Mr. Disengoff has come to the United States.

MEN OF SCIENCE AND LETTERS ASK AID FOR PHYSICIANS IN RUSSIA.

GENEVA, June 1, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) An appeal to men of science the world over, signed by Madam Curie, H.C. Wells, George Bernard Shaw, the Bishop of London, Lord Dawson of Penn, George Lansbury, Prof. G. Urbain, member of the Institute of France, Prof. C. Achard, member of the French Academy of Medicine, Prof. A. Beresdka, of the Pasteur Institute; Prof. A. Bracnet, of the University of Brussels; Professors Mendes and Ettore Levi, of the University of Rome; Mayor Herriot, of Lyons, France; Prof. Emanuel Levy, of the Law Faculty or Lyons; Dr. Bloch of Zurich, and a haif a hundred other well-known names, has been made in behalf of the physicians of Russia by the High Commission of Dr. Fridjof Nansen for Relief of Russia, in cooperation with the Epidemics Commission. of the League of Nations represented by Dr. Norman White, it was announced today at the New York office of the Nansen High Commis sion, 1 Madison Avenue. An American committee of distinguished physicians will be formed to act in concert with the European committee named.

According to Dr. Haigh, the Russian physicians are less worried about their lack of food and clothing than by their lack of recent medical publications by which to keep abreast of the progress of modern medical science. The International Nansen Medical Relief Committee has already sent out lists of the names and addresses of 200 physicians or their families in Ekaterinoslaw district who are destitute, 6 in Novomoskovsky uyezd, 2 in Verchnekravsky uyezd, 2 in Pavlogradsky uyezd, 1 in Nikopolsky uyezd, 61 in the Kiev district, 114 in the city of Kherson and 24 widows of physicians in the uyezd of Kherson. All are reported to be in desperate need of food and clothing. A large proportion of the physicians and dependents are Jews.

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SAYS HARVARD STAND MAY END DISCRIMINATION.

WORCESTER, Mass., May 31, (Jawish Telegraphic Agency) The defeat of the attempt to discriminate against Jews at Harvard University would prevent further such disagreeable affairs against any race or group in American institutions of learning, B. Loring Young, speaker of the Masschusets House, and an overseer of Harvard, told members of the Maccabees and Young Men's Hebre v Association at a banket here Wednesday.

Mr. Young was given a testimonial in recognition of his opposition to anti-Jewish propaganda.

HUNGARIAN JEWS VOTE FORD A MENACE.

NEW YORK, May 31, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A plea for the elimination of Henry Ford from the Presidential race was made yesterday by the5th annual convention of the Federation of Hungarian Jews in America, at the Hias Building, 425 Lafavette Street.

The appeal charges Ford with being a menace to the peace and prosperity of the inhabitants of the land, and states that his only virtue is that he is the richest man in the country.

Another resolution was adopted requesting the replacing of Count Szchenyi, Consul General of Hungary to the United States, because of his alleged refusal to intercede in behalf of Jews in Hungary who, the resolution asserts, are being inflicted with "unspeakable persecution".

In his report as President Dr. Buchier declared that conditions in Hungary have not improved much in the last few years as they affect the Jews. They are still being discriminated against, ridiculed, beated and imprisoned because of their religion, he charged.

Dr. Buchler read messages from President Harding, Governor Smith, Senator Copeland, U.S. Supreme Court Justice Louis Brandeis, Otto H. Kahn and Murray Hulbert.

NEW LABOR COLLEGE GRADUATES FIRST 15.

NEW YORK, June 1, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Fifteen students, among them six young women, were in the first graduating class of the first labor college which went forth from Eatonah, N.T., after completing a two year course at Brookwood College in sociology, psychology, labor journalism, statistics and labor problems. They will return to the labor unions to which they belong to take their places as workers for trade unionism.
