SEEK TO DIVERT H.C. of L. DEMONSTRATION AGAINST JEWS.

BERLIN, June 8. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A demonstration in Leipzig, organized by the Socialists to protest against the high cost of living resulted in the killing of three of the participants and the wounding of 22 others.

The casualties were sustained when someone in the crowd fired on the police, who answered with more volleys. The demonstration for a time threatened to go off on a tangent and become an anti-Semitic rally instead when some of the participants sought to incite the others with anti-Jewish cries. There were however no special anti-Jewish excesses.

JEWISH STUDENTS FLOCK TO ITALIAN UNIVERSITIES.

Virtually Boycott Austrian Institutions.

VIENNA, June 8. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Vienna, which until recently drew so heavy an enrollment of Jewish students from all parts of the world will soon be entirely without Jewish students, if the present conditions are any indications of the future.

Even the Jewish students of Hungary are avoiding the Austrian universities. Guided by the Secretariat of the World Federation of Jewish Students, the Jewish young men and women are leaving for the colleges of Italy, Belgium, Czechoslovakia and other points. In particular the Italian universities seem to be drawing a heavy enrollment of Jewish students.

The once famous Jewish center of learning, Padua, seems to be regaining something of its ancient Jewish strength with the concentration of large numbers of Jewish students there.

Committees are being organized at Rome, Trieste, Padua and other places to make the path of the students more inviting. Opportunities are being provided whereby the Jewish students may in their leisure hours earn towards their maintenance.

SEEK TO BAN SHECHITA IN POLAND.

WARSAW, June 7, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Great excitement was aroused in Jewish circles here yesterday when representatives of the anti-Semitic group brought before the Administrative Commission a proposition for the prohibition of Shechita.

The proposal was bitterly fought. No final action on the measure has been decided on as yet.

BURN HOMES OF PEASANTS WHO BURNED JEWISH HOMES.

WARSAW, June 7, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The homes of six Jewish families in the village of Zegilovka, Volhynia, were set fire to and completely destroyed by peasants of the township, according to reports of the Lemberg papers. The peasants seeking to justify themselves contended that the Jews had informed the Soviet administration that the peasants were disloyal.

A Soviet punitive expedition, following the firing of the homes was dispatched to the village and the homes of a number of the peasants were burned in punishment for their action, the papers allege.

WARBURG EXPLAINS LOAN TO HUNGARY AND AUSTRIA.

VIENNA, June 8, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) In an interview with the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today, Felix Warburg, who has come here to attend the Joint Distribution Committee conference, declared that the first news of the participation of Kuhn, Loeb and Company in the international loan for Hungary came to him after his departure from America.

Mr. Warburg said that he had since learned that the share of the Kuhn, Loeb and Company in the loan was principally in the Austrian phase. Conditions in Austria were much better, he said, and the further improvement of the situation by means of the loan would be reflected also in improvement of the situation of the Jews there.

Before leaving Austria, Mr. Warburg will confer with the President of Austria, Herr Hainisch.

VISAS ONLY TO THOSE WHO HAVE RELATIVES IN U.S.

VIENNA, June 7, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The American Consulate at Vienna has put a stop temporarily to the issue of visas to all immigrants except those having blood relatives in America.

The resumption of the issue of visas to those not having relations in the United States is not expected for a month or two.

DETROIT U. GIVES RABBI FRANKLIN LL.D. DEGREE.

DETROIT, June 8, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The University of Detroit, a Roman Catholic institution, today conferred the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws upon Rabbi Leo M. Franklin, of the Detroit Temple Beth El. The citation giving the reasons for the honor is as follows:

"Upon Leo Morris Franklin, Bachelor of Arts of the University of Cincinnati, rabbi for the duration of his life of the Congregation Beth El in the city of Detroit, for that, during nearly a quarter of a century of leadership of his people he has been an apostle of amity between citizens of all religious beliefs in his community and a participant in every worthy endeavor for the development of culture, tolerance and kindly living among men and women of good purpose, the University of Detroit, in a solemn session of its faculty, confers the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws. It welcomes him to the companionship of its sons and daughters of its schools upon whom, for their deserts, it has from time to time, conferred its educational honors."

Dr. Franklin recently played a prominent part in the campaign which resulted in the defeat of a bill in the legislature which proposed to make Roman Catholic, Lutheran and Seventh Day Adventist private schools illegal.

HERMAN BERNSTEIN APPOINTED EDITOR JEWISH TRIBUNE.

NEW YORK, June 7, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Herman Bernstein, prominent newspaperman and particularly well known for his achievements as foreign correspondent for the metropolitan press has accepted the position of editor of the JEWISH TRIBUNE.

In 1908 Bernstein toured Europe for the NEW YORK TIMES. During the period of the Russian Revolution, Bernstein represented the NEW YORK HERALD and a syndicate of other papers in Russia. In 1917 he was instrumental in obtaining possession of the letters commonly known as the Willy-Nicky correspondence - a mass of letters exchanged between the former Kaiser and the Czar of Russia.

He is the author of several books and has translated a number of Russian works. He was the founder and for a time the editor of the Yiddish daily THE DAY.

DR. WEIZMANN TELLS OF JEW AS FARMER.

PHILADELPHIA, June 8, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Dr. Chaim Weizmann was a visitor at the National Farm School today. The Zionist leader was given a great ovation by the students. Many questions of the students as to the situation of the Jewish farmers in Palestine were answered by the Dr. Weizmann, following a talk which he made on the "urge of the Jewish people for farm life."
