SAMUEL RETURNS SAFELY TO JERUSALEM; 2 MORE BRITISH ESCORT DEAD.

JERUSALEM, June 13, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The High Commissioner, Sir Herbert Samuel arrived safely in Jerusalem yesterday after presiding at the exercises celebrating the inclusion in the Palestine territory of Mattulah, the northernmost Jewish colony.

Two more British gendarmes of the ten who were ambushed by Bedouins after escorting the High Commissioner, are dead of wounds. This makes a total of five dead, and one captured. It is now stated the brigands' attack took place as the escort which served as a vanguard for the High Commissioner, who was with a rear party, was proceeding north toward Mattulah, and not on its return trip south, as previous reports had it. The brigands, it is asserted also, were Bedouins from across the Jordan, and not members of a Palestine tribe.

Sir Herbert is leaving for London the end of this month for an extended vacation. Sir Gilbert Clayton, Civil Secretary, will act for the High Commissioner until the latter's return in September.

Completion of arrangements for the Palestine loan and the jurisdiction of the local Jewish communities in Palestine, are among the questions the High Commissioner is expected to consider with the British government during his holiday.

POLISH SOLDIERS SHOOT AT JEWISH OMNIBUS; TWO KILLED.

WARSAW, June 12, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Isaac Pagura and Lasaz Lass, two Jewish passengers in an omnibus proceeding from Sokolow to Wegrow, were shot dead by bullets alleged to have been fired by a Polish captain and his four soldiers.

The omnibus contained only Jewish passengers and the escape of the rest of them from the salvo which was fired four times is considered remarkable.

No grounds are known for the shooting. A police record of the tragedy has been made but the soldiers, although identified, are still at large.

JEWS MAY SHARE IN RUSSIAN LAND GRANTS.

NEW YORK, June 11, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Jews may now share in the distribution of land in Russia, according to advices received by the Idgescom here.

The regulations of 1920 regarding the parcelling of the agricultural lands provided that only those citizens who were entitled to own land before 1917 were entitled to share in its redistribution. This automatically prevented the Jews from sharing in the distribution as no Jews were permitted to own land under the Czar.

This regulation has now been done away with by the Soviet government and Jews may share with others in the land grants.

AMERICANS IN PALESTINE MAY BE TRIED IN BRITISH COURTS.

JERUSALEM, June 12, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) American, European and Japanese residents, while amenable to the Palestine courts, are entitled to the right of trial before a British magistrate, if they prefer.

An official statement to this effect has been made here in order to remove misunderstandings which have arisen in regard to the legal status of Americans and British subjects in Palestine.

The provisions of Article 8 of the Mandate, it is stated, definitely abrogate "the immunities and privileges of foreigners, including the benefits of Consular jurisdiction and protection, as formerly enjoyed by capitulation or usage in the Ottoman Empire."

Under the Palestine Order of Council, 1922, however, "any person who is a national subject of a European or American state, may claim to be tried by a British magistrate for any offense except those of a very light nature."

ANOTHER RITUAL BLOOD ACCUSATION EXPLODED.

WARSAW, June 12, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A murder accusation which threw the entire Jewish population of the township of Nasielsk in turmoil was exploded today by the discovery of the alleged victim alive and sound.

A Jewish merchant of the town was accused of having murdered for ritual purposes the 13-year old son of a peasant. The story spread among the peasants, and the menace of an attack by the peasants was averted only when the police found the boy unharmed.

SON OF FELIX WARBURG WEDS.

VIENNA, June 12, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Gerald F. Warburg, son of Felix M. Warburg, prominent banker and Jewish philanthropist, was married to Miss Marion Bab, of Vienna. Mr. Warburg met his bride while studying music in Vienna.

WARSAW RABBIS PLAN MEATLESS DAYS.

WARSAW, June 12, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The continued advances in the price of meat has become so serious a matter that the Warsaw Rabbinate is considering steps to meet it. The rabbis intend to introduce two meatless days a week, by which device they hope to so reduce the demand for meat, as to cause a reduction in its price.

STRAUS LEADS VOTE FOR BEST CITIZEN.

NEW YORK, June 12, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Nathan Straus is leading in the poll which the city of New York is taking to determine who has achieved the most good for the city in the past twenty five years.

The poll is being conducted by City Chamberlain Philip Berolzheimer as part of the city's Silver Jubilee.

Silk flags mounted on oak staffs, each with a silver plate bearing the name of the recipient, will be presented to the six winners at the closing day of the Jubilee by the Mayor.

NEW JEWISH FARM SCIENTIST HONORED BY RUTGERS COLLEGE.

NEW BRUNSWICK, N.J., June 12, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The degree of Doctor of Science was conferred upon Dr. Jacob G. Lipman, director of the New Jersey Experiment Station, by Rutgers College and the State University of New Jersey at the commencement exercises held today. Others who received honorary degrees were Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, Governor Silzer of N.J. and Edward Bok, former editor of the "Ladies' Home Journal".

Dr. Lipman is rated as perhaps the world's foremost authority on soils. He is the discoverer of the bacillus vinelandii, which is employed in the extraction of nitrogen from the air. He is also a discoverer of many other agricultural processes, one of which has been notably successful in combatting potato diseases.

Dr. Lipman is a director of the Jewish Agricultural Society. He has also taken a keen interest in other phases of Jewish activities, and it is understood will visit the Palestine Jewish farm colonies this summer under the auspices of the Palestine Development Council.

ISSUE WEIZMANN'S SPEECHES IN BOOK FORM.

NEW YORK, June 11, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The principal speeches of Dr. Chaim Weizmann, President of the World Zionist Organization, delivered by him in the course of the Keren Hayesod campaign, have been gathered together and will shortly appear in book form. A preface for the volume has been written by Samuel Untermyer. The book is intended both as a souvenir of the visit of the Zionist leader to America and as a contribution to the literature of Zionism.

TEL AVIV LIGHTED BY POWER FROM RUTENBERG STATION

New York, June 13 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). A cable received today by the Palestine Development Council announces that the light from the Rutenberg station at Jaffa was turned on at Tel Aviv Sunday at 8 P. M. The event, says the cablegram, was marked with great ceremony and rejoicing.

DR. KRAUSKOPF'S DEEDS HIS MONUMENT, SAYS DR. BERKOWITZ.

Atlantic City, June 13 (J. T. A.). Dr. Krauskopf's life-long and distinguished services for his people "will prove his noblest and lasting monument", Dr. Henry Berkowitz declared in a message to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, paying tribute to his colleague who died at Atlantic City Tuesday.

Dr. Berkowitz wired today: "Your request for a tribute to Dr. Joseph Krauskopf stirs memories of nearly half a century. In February 1876, when I entered the pioneer class of Rabbinical students at the Hebrew Union College, Cincinnati, we became comrades and roommates. Through eight years we continued as schoolmates. We were ordained together by Dr. Isaac M. Wise in July, 1883, being among the first to receive the Rabbinical degree in America. Dr. Wise also solemnized the double marriage, which made us brothers-in-law, in October of that year. As co-workers in the Jewish ministry and in public life during the past thirty years in Philadelphia our careers have been closely blended. We have shared so intimately in each other's sorrows and joys, struggles and achievements, that I am unable to consider objectively the tremendous tasks his fertile mind conceived, and his dauntless courage and boundless energy achieved. The services he rendered his people as head of one of our greatest congregations as founder of the National Farm School and as their representative and spokesman in important civic and national movements will prove his noblest and lasting monument".

SIMON WOLFE'S BEQUESTS TO CHARITY

Washington, June 13 (J. T. A.). Four charitable institutions in Washington, one at Atlanta, Ga., and one at Denver, Col., are to receive bequests under the will of Simon Wolfe, lawyer and philanthropist who died June 4th, according to the document filed in Probate Court. The Hebrew Orphans Home at Atlanta is to receive \$1,000, the National Jewish Hospital for Consumptives at Denver \$100 and a like amount is to be received by the Jewish Foster Home of this city, the German Orphan Asylum Association of this city and the Christian and Eleanor Ruppert Home for Aged.
