QUESTIONS BRITISH GOVERNMENT ON UKRAINE MASSACRES.

London, June 21. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). The Assistant Foreign Minister McNeil was asked in the House of Commons this morning by Noel Buxton whether Sir Halford MacKinder, acting as British High Commissioner of the Military Mission in South Russia, made a report on the wholesale persecutions of the Jews there during the time. Mr. McNeil replied that owing to the military situation then existing in the Ukraine, it was impossible for MacKinder to furnish any such report.

"How was it," continued Buxton, "that no reports were made when it was known that Jews were being massacred, that many of them were drowned in the Dneister?"

"A great many reports to that effect were received, some reliable, some not," McNeil said, "but the reports were not sufficiently accurate and MacKinder was unable, as previously said, owing to the military situation to furnish any reports."

SAMUEL TO QUIT UNLESS POLICY IS CHANGED, LONDON DAILY THINKS.

London, June 21. (J.T.A.) THE EVENING STANDARD publishes a report saying that it has authentic information to the effect that Sir Herbert Samuel is coming to England for the purpose of reviewing with the Government the "somewhat serious situation" that has arisen since the Arab boycott of the elections. The STANDARD predicts that Samuel will resign unless the policy he is obliged to administer is modified. It is probable, the correspondent asserts, that the change will be similar to that made in the Mesopotamian policy a few months ago.

The report of the London JEWISH WORLD that the High Commissioner would upon resigning settle in Palestine as a private individual is scouted by the STANDARD, which declares that Sir Herbert is an extremely able man and might have a political renaissance like that of Stephen McKenna.

POLISH ZIONISTS MEET

Warsaw, June 21 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). The Polish Zionist Congress is now in session in Warsaw. Over 250 delegates representing almost as many towns are in attendance. Among the speakers are Isaac Gruenbaum, Dr. Matenson, Dr. J. Thon and Dr. Brande.

ARABS PROTEST SALE OF 22 VILLAGES TO JEWS

Condemn Palestine Policy of British Treaty.

Jerusalem, June 21 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). The Arab Congress meeting in Jaffa has resolved to protest against the Palestine policy of the British government as indicated in a version of the treaty with King Hussein of the Hedjaz, as announced by Sir Herbert Samuel. They also are up in arms against the Ruttenberg electrification conception.

The Congress demands likewise that the government should not confirm the sale of twenty-two villages in the Jordan valley near Beisan, for which Jewish purchasers are said to be negotiating.

WOMAN MISSIONARY CALLS MONTREAL JEWS BOLSHEVIKI.

Montreal, June 21, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Sixty per cent. of Montreal Jews are Bolsheviks, Mrs. J. C. Thompson, a missionary who addressed a church gathering here declared today.

Moreover, even the Jewish schools teach unbelief in God, government and authority, the missionary asserted, unchallenged.

ATTACKS JEWS, IMPRISONED ONE DAY; ATTACKS ANTI-SEMITES, IMPRISONED TWO WEEKS.

Budapest, June 21 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). Stefan Lendvai accused of publishing a violently anti-Semitic article, was sentenced to one day's imprisonment and was immediately released.

In asking for his acquittal, his counsel admitted that Lendvai had trespassed against the law, but "not against the interests of Hungary".

The court in imposing the day's sentence said that it was true that the Jews are a peril to the country but that Lendvai had gone a bit too far in saying that they destroyed the trade and the integrity of the country at the same time.

While the anti-Semitic Lendvai thus escaped with virtually no punishment, the Liberal Journalist Geza Felek, who was accused by Magistrate Zilahi of attacking him for inciting school children against the Jews, was sentenced to fourteen days imprisonment.

PALESTINE AGRICULTURALISTS TO BE REPRESENTED AT SOVIET EXHIBITION.

Jerusalem, June 21. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The Soviet Government has extended an invitation to the "Histadruth Haavdim", the Jewish labor organization, to participate in the international agricultural exhibition which opens at Moscow on August 17th. The organization has accepted and will be represented by a delegate and will also bring a collection of Palestine agricultural products to the exhibition.

HADASSAH'S PROGRESS SHOWN AT CONVENTION.

Miss Szold Elected "Our Beloved Mother In Israel."

Baltimore, June 21. (J.T.A.) One hundred and twenty-one delegates representing fifty cities responded to the roll call of the annual Hadassah convention at the Belvedere Hotel here. The Hadassah since the convention last July has grown from 8,000 to 12,000 members, Alice Seligsborg, president of the organization, declared in her annual report.

Within the past sixteen months, Miss Seligsborg said, \$132,621. in cash, and supplies amounting to \$71,893. have been raised for the Hadassah hospitals and other services in Palestine.

The address of welcome was delivered by Mrs. Emil Crookin of the Baltimore chapter. Miss Henrietta Szold responded, expressing admiration of the progress Hadassah made during the past three years she was in Palestine.

Reports of Mrs. Bromenson, chairman of the Palestine Supplies Department; and of Mrs. Lefkowitz, treasurer, Mrs. Jacobs, chairman of publicity, Mrs. Fletcher, Milk Station Fund, were presented.

A new arrangement recently effected for the support of the Hadassah Medical organization in Palestine was announced. By this arrangement, the Hadassah organization is to provide \$100,000 and the Keren Hayesod and Joint Distribution Committee, \$70,000 each.

The Hadassah in addition is also sending in to Palestine \$11,670. for Hygienic work in the Palestine schools and in the chaluzim camps.

Louis Lipsky, chairman of the Zionist Organization, in an address to the convention voiced appreciation of the Hadassah contribution to the Zionist movement and congratulated the organization on its growth since it has become an autonomous organization.

At a luncheon given by the Baltimore chapter to the delegates, the following contributions were announced: Pittsburgh chapter, \$5,000; Baltimore, \$5,000; Bath Beach, \$1,000.

Among the speakers who addressed the convention were Mrs. Ehrlich, Detroit; Mrs. Blaustein, Norfolk, Miss Margolis, Boston, Miss Haddassah Shedrowitzky, a graduate of the Palestine Nurses Training School now taking a postgraduate course in America, Mrs. Harry Kaplan, Cleveland, Mrs. Vixman, Pittsburgh, Mrs. Joseph Goldman, Baltimore.

The convention resolved to bestow on Miss Szold, the founder of the organization, the degree "Our beloved mother in Israel."

The convention decided to send delegates to the World Zionist Congress at Carlsbad.

2 of 4 HARVARD COMMENCEMENT PARTS GO TO JEWS.

~~XXXXXX~~ Cambridge, June 21. (J.T.A.) Two of the four student parts in the commencement exercises of Harvard University were taken by Jews.

The commencement part in Latin was by Leon Medoff of Philadelphia. There were three English parts and of these one was taken by Franklin S. Pollak of '23, of New York City.

Franklin Pollak is the son of Justice Pollak, and author and publicist of distinction. On his mother's side, Franklin Pollak is descended from Michael Heilprin, distinguished Jewish scientist, who also took an active interest in Jewish affairs. Heilprin was the author of "The Historical Poet of the Ancient Hebrews" and of many works of a scientific nature. He is credited with having been the inspirer of Emma Lazarus in her latter years.

The fact that half of the honors of Commencement Day were awarded to Jews is causing considerable comment in view of the recent efforts at Harvard to limit the number of Jewish students.

MOVE TO CAPTURE 10,000 FOR JEWISH SCHOOLS.

New York, June 21. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). A campaign has been launched, under the auspices of the Jewish Education Association to "take 10,000 Jewish children off the streets this year and place them in Jewish schools."

Parents will be urged to send their children to Jewish schools, those who cannot afford the additional expense will be told that such expenses will be met by the organization.
