DENIES FORD CONTRIBUTED TO HITLER FUNDS.

MUNICH, June 25, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The question whether Henry Ford has contributed to the support of the anti Semitic propaganda of the Bavarian Fascisti will play a prominent part in the trial of the damage suit of Adolph Hitler, leader of the Bavarian Fascisti against Stephen Grossman, a Bavarian newspaper publisher.

Grossman charged in his paper that Hitler had been largely financed by foreign interests, and had received in particular much assistance from Henry Ford.

The prominent Social Democrat spokesman, Auer, is expected to testify in support of the charges.

Christian Weber, a leading Fascisti and Hitler follower, admits that the Fascisti had received much support from America, but denies that Ford was one of the contributors.

SAMUEL SENDS TROOPS TO AID ABDULLAH.

JERUSALEM, June 25 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The recently recognized Arab government of Transjordan is facing the most serious disturbance since the official recognition of its independence by Great Britain last month.

Nine thousand Bedouins of the Wahabi tribe are said to be concentrated at Karaiith Milch between the capital city of Amman and El Jouff. The Arab garrison has been completely destroyed.

The Palestine government in response to an appeal for assistance from Emir Abdullah has dispatched nine armored cars with troops.

The Emir also appealed to the chief of the Beni Shakar tribe but the latter refused to lend his tribe's aid in fighting the Wahabi.

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DECIDE NOT TO PUSH NUMERUS CLAUSUS.

WARSAW. June 22, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A report which seems to be substantially backed circulated today says that the money panic in Poland has caused the Sejm leaders to go slow about the pushing of the Numerus Clausus measure.

Political leaders are said now to favor delay of the percentage norm legislation until the Fall session fearing that the discriminatory measure may aggravate the financial difficulty.

19 POGROMISTS HELD IN BETHLEN COUP.

BUDAPEST, June 22 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Nineteen members of the anti-Semitic "Awakening Magyars" have been arrested in connection with the recent unsuccessful conspiracy to depose Premier Bethlen and his cabinet. All of the nineteen are well-known pogrom agitators.

ROUMANIAN MINISTER PRAISES DEAD JEWISH BANKER

SUCHAREST. June 22, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A glowing tribute was paid in Parliament to the dead Jewish banker Jacques Elias, by the Minister of Education Anghelescu. The Minister termed Elias a great Roumanian citizen and declared that his life was a worthy pattern for others to follow. Elias left a million lei for benevolent and educational Roumanian institutions.

The Jewish press laments that the Jewish banker left very little for distinctly Jewish purposes. Among the Jewish beneficiaries were the Bucharest synagogue which is bequeathed 20,000 lei, the Sephardic synagogue, 10,000 lei, and the Sephardic school for girls 5,000 lei. The Sephardic Synagogue of Vienna is left 10,000 lei.

ROUMANIA PREPARES REFUGEES' EXPULSION.

BUCHAREST, June 23, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The Roumanian government is apparently determined to carry through its proposals for the expulsion of all Jewish refugees not only from Bessarabia but from other parts of Roumania as well.

Not only are refugees from Russia and Ukraine slated to be expelled, but others from the former Austrian Empire, who have not become naturalized Roumanians, are also to be on the list.

POLISH POLICE LEARNING YIDDISH.

WARSAW. June 23, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Holding that the police in Jewish sections, to properly carry out their tasks, should be acquainted with the language of the Jewish populace, a manual of instruction in Yiddish for the Polish police is being prepared.

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JEWS STRANDED NEAR CONSTANTINOPLE, YIDGESCOM HEARS.

MOSCOW, June 22 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The Moscow offices of the Idgescom (All Russian Jewish Public Committee) reports the receipt of a note from the Joint Distribution Committee, according to which hundreds of Jews who have wandered into Constantinople without Russian or Turkish passports are now helplessly stranded.

The Yidgescom confirms this report from its offices in Constantinople and other eastern ports. It warns Jews who are planning to emigrate there to obtain first the necessary papers and to beware of swindling railroad agents seeking to fleece the would-be emigrant, regardless of consequences.

ROUMANIA HEAVILY REPRESENTED AT CHRISTIAN STUDENTS' CONGRESS.

SUCHAREST, June 23, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Roumania is heavily represented at the Christian Students Congress which is now meeting in Budapest. The Roumanian student delegates are all pronounced anti-Semites.

Lately there have been no anti-Jewish disturbances in Roumanian universities, but not more than 40% of the former Jewish enrolment at the universities are now pursuing their studies, as a result of the earlier persecutions.

LATVIAN PREMIER HOLDS ON TO HIS JOB.

RIGA, June 22, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The so-called crisis of the Latvian government and the resignation of the Premier Meyrowicz seems to be part of a false alarm. Meyrowicz is back at his job as Premier, and despite protest of the minorities, Gaillet, defender of the Numerus Clausus has been appointed Minister of Education.

SAMUEL TO INTERCEDE AGAINST SOVIET PERSECUTIONS.

JERUSALEM, June 23, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Sir Herbert Samuel assured a delegation of rabbis here that while in England he will exert his best influences to have the British government intercede with the Soviet towards the ending of the persecution of religions there.

The High Commissioner told the rabbis that he is always ready to remove obstructions in the way of rabbis from Russia who are seeking to settle in Palestine.

PALESTINE ARABS TO PROTEST TREATY OF HUSSEIN.

JERUSALEM, June 23, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The Arab Congress, now meeting in Jaffa, has resolved to send a delegation to London to protest the Treaty of Hussein, on the ground that it excludes Palestine from the jurisdiction of the Arab political confederation.

CZECHO-SLOVAKIA FREES WANDERING JEWS FROM TAX.

BERLIN, June 24, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Jewish exiles from Roumania passing through Czecho-Slovakia on their way to settle elsewhere will be permitted to pass through the latter country without paying the customary transit tax.

Announcement that the Czecho-Slovakian government had ruled to this effect was made today by the United Jewish Emigration Committee.

BRITISH CONSUL REPORTS ON PALESTINE-SYRIAN RELATIONS.

JERUSALEM, June 24, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The report of the British Consul General at Beirut on the commercial relations between British Palestine and French Syria has just been made public here.

Thanks to the recent treaty between the countries, business conditions in Syria have somewhat improved, the Consul said, but conditions will never be what they should until the near east becomes politically stabilized.

The report also complains of the poor railroad connections between the two countries and of the poor highways between Beirut and Tripoli to the Palestine border.

The tourist traffic, the report says, is just as vital to Syria as to Palestine, and consequently, a regular service is available for tourists from Constantinople and Egypt through Palestine.

10,000 MOURN ROSENFELD.

NEW YORK, June 25. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The high esteem in which the Jews of New York held Morris Rosenfeld, famous Yiddish poet, editor and playwright, was evidenced yesterday when more than 10,000 persons turned out to pay tribute to him at the funeral services held in the auditorium of the Jewish Forward Building, 175 East Broadway.

From 7 o'clock in the morning until 11:15, when the services began, thousands filed past the bier, which lay in state in the center of the auditorium.

The ceremonies began with chanting of Psalms of the Jewish burial rites by Cantor Hershman, after which there were addresses of eulogy by many of the best known Jewish writers and editors in New York, all members of the Jewish Writers' Club, under whose auspices the services were held.

Among these were H. Bogoff, president of the Club, Morris Winshefsky, Jewish poet; K. Marmour, Leo Kobrin, Alexander Harkavy, A. Sachs, Menachem the poet, Reuben Brainin and others.

Following the services the body was escorted through East Broadway to Clinton Street and north to the Williamsburgh Bridge and then to Mount Carmel Cemetery, where interment was in the Jewish Writers' Plot.
