DENMARK'S RRICHEST JEWISH BANKER DIES IN PRISON.

FEELIN, June 25, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Emil Glueckstadt, director of the famous Landsmanns Bank of Copenhagen, was found dead in his cell in the Copenhagen prison Sunday.

Herr Glueckstadt was being held in connection with the sensational trial against the managers of the bank whose crash percipitated a cabinet crists recently. In consequence of Clueckstadt's ceath the reason for which is said to be "unknown", the trial has been interrupted.

The banker's tragic death is as remarkable as the bankruptcy of the Gibraltar-like institution over which he presided as director. He was a Jew and was considered one of the richest men in Europe, the friend of rulers and statesmen.

He participated in many diplomatic missions in behalf of Denmark and was the leading economic expert of the Dannish delegation to the Genoa Conference.

NO CHANGE IN ZION POLICY, SAMUEL TO RETURN TO JERUSALEM, OFFICIAL.

LONDON. June 26 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Apparently by way of silencing the various rumors in connection with Sir Herbert Samuel's visit to London, a statement has been issued from an official quarter that no change in the Palestine volicy is contemplated and that the High Gommissioner will return to his post.

An opportunity will be taken to consult Sir Herbert on conditions in Palestine and on matters affecting the Government policy, but there is no intenton of any alteration in the Palestine policy, the statement declares. Sir Herbert Samuel is expected to return to Jerusalem after his leave of absence, the statement concludes.

The "Evening Standard" says Sir Herbert will press the government for a full recognition of the Zionist policy in Palestine, putting forward his resignation as an alternative. This paper asserts, however, that although he is an excellent administrator and a devoted public servant, it is unwise to try and force Premier Baldwin to continue a policy which experience proved to be "impossible".

QUESTIONS "SLOW PROGRESS" OF RUTENBERG SCHEME.

Hussein Treaty Involves No Change In Palestine Policy.

LONDON. June 25, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The government is not aware of the "slow progress" of the Rutenberg concession for the electrification of Palestine and does not contemplate withdrawing the concession, Mr. Ormsby Gore of the Colonial office declared in the House of Commons, in reply to a question by Mr. Becker. The latter has asked the same question on June 18 and received substantially the same reply.

Sir Robert Hamilton asked of whom the Arab Congress now meeting in Jaffa consists, by whom it was summoned, and who is presiding over it. Mr. Gore replied the Government has received no official information, adding that the House was of course aware that the Arab Congress is not in any sense an official body He added that he "understood" that Mussa Kazim Pasha was the presiding officer.

colonel Wedgewood asked the Premier to state if and how iar does the treaty now being negotiated with King Hussein affect Parestine, and whether it involves any modification of Britains' obligations under the Palestine Mandate, and whether recognition by King Hussein of Great Britain's special position in Mesopotamia, Transjordania and Palestine includes his recognition of the government's international obligations regarding the Jewish National Homeland.

In a written statement Mr. MacNeil replied for the Premier that the negotiations with King Hussein were still in progress and he was unable to say what the precise form of the treaty, if concluded, may ultimately take. He was assured, he said, that it will not, however, involve any modification of the obligations into which the Government had entered under the Palestine Mandate.

DEPUTY SANDOR UNRECONCILED AFTER DUEL WITH BESNARD.

BUDAPEST. June 25. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Deputies Sandor and Besnard fought a duel last Saturday both receiving slight wounds. They parted unreconciled.

Deputy Sandor, who is the only Jewish member of the Hungarian Assembly, was challenged by M. Beenard, known as an anti-Semite, for slighting remarks that M. Sandor was alleged to nave made regarding the Awakening Magyars.

HAKENKREUZLER BEAT JEWISH COMMERZIENRAT.

MUNICH, June 25, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The President of the Chamber of Commerce i. Munich, Herr Fraenkel, was attacked by a gang displaying the Swastika padge as he was traveling with his son in a trolley car. Herr Fraenkel, who is also a Commerzienrat, was left unconcious by his assailants.

PROPOSE MILLION DOLLAR JEWISH COLONY IN CRIMEA.

VIENNA, June 25, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The foundation in Crimea of a series of colonies for Jewish agriculturists is contemplated by the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Colonization Association, in accordance with the plans the former received from Dr. Bernard Rosen, director in Russia of the J.D.C.'s reconstruction activities.

It is learned that Dr. Rosen submitted his plan to the Confirence of J.D.C. workers held here recently under the presidency of Felix M. Warburg. The J.D.C. representatives agreed in principle to the proposal, stipulating, however, that the \$1,000.000 the undertaking would require should come out of the moneys allocated for Jewish reconstruction in Europe, and that the Jewish Colonial Association be asked to assume part or the activities now carried out by the J.D.C.

ur. Ungar, the ICA representative, gave his hearthy approval of the plan, proceeding to Faris with a view to having it sanctioned by the Association's heads.

Assurances were given that the Soviet Government is favorably disposed toward the plan.

40,000 VOTE IN JEWISH CONGRESS ELECTIONS.

NEW YORK, June 25, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Approximately 40,000 Jews of New York cast their votes last Sunday, June 24, in the election of delegates to the American Jewish Congress. The elections were also held in a number of other cities from which reports are not yet available.

Those cities which did not nold elections last Sunday will continue the work throughout the summer and by the time the American Jewish Congress convenes October 14th it is expected that every city will have elected its representative.

Despite the intense hdat which prevailed in the city last Sunday, there was a lively interest exhibited in the elections. The campaign in Brownsville was particularly vigorous and the contest among the candidates was very keen.

The ballots are now being counted in the respective districts or the City and the result will be announced next week.

DEGREE FOR B.M. BARUCH.

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass., June 25, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Williams College at its commencement excercises today conferred the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws upon Bernard M. Baruch, New York financier.

It was contributions from Mr. Baruch that made possible the establishment of the Institute of Politics which has become an annual summer event at Williams.
