BRITAIN FOR JEWISH NATIONAL HOMELAND, NOT JEWISH STATE, ORMSBY-GORE SAYS; STILL ADHERES TO BALFOUR DECLARATION.

LONDON, July 3, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) In reply to a query by Colonel Bury in the House of Commons, Ormsby-Gore issued a statement of the government's attitude declaring that "the government certainly intends to safeguard the civil and religious rights of the inhabitants of Palestine.

"As the mandatory power in accordance with the terms of the mandate, the government is charged with facilitating the development of the Jewish national homeland in Palestine but the creation of a Jewish state or government is no part of such policy.

"As the trustees of the Holy Land on behalf of the League of Nations, it is the object of the British Government and of the British administration to promote the harmony and development of all races and creeds in Palestine and prevent the domination of any one over others."

Replying to a further question by Captain Barkely if the Government still adhered to the Balfour Declaration, Ormsby-Gore said "Yes".

Gore in further speaking of the situation in Palestine declared that the Rutenberg concession had made great progress and that 225 applications for connection with the Rutenberg station had been received, many coming from Arabs.

The report previously published of a special committee appointed to consider the Palestine situation is erroneous. The report probably originated from the proposed meeting of Sir Herbert Samuel with the Irak committee.

The London Post this morning takes a surprising attitude toward the Palestine situation, declaring in an editorial that Palestine is too near the Suez to make it safe for England to withdraw. If England surrenders the mandate, France and Italy will start a keen campaign for its control, it warns.

The Post takes great pleasure in the fact that according to the government the creation of a Jewish state is no part of the government policy.

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ANTI-SEMITES SUE FRIEND OF JEWS.

BUDAPEST, June July 3, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Court proceedings have been started against the former Minister of Justice, Count Vasczeni, one of the few outstanding liberals and friend of the Jews in the public life of Hungary. The mover of the charges is the present minister of Justice, Gani.

The real backers of the suit is the anti-Semitic group generally, which contends that both in and out of Parliament, Vasczeni maligns them unmercifully and they allege unjustly for their anti-Semitism.

RABBI SIMON ELECTED PRESIDENT CENTRAL CONFERENCE RABBIS.

CAPE MAY, N.J. July 3, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Dr. Kaufman Kohler was elected honorary president and Rabbi Abram Simon, Washington, D.C. president of the Central Conference of Rabbis at the concluding session of the convention held here.

Rabbi Wolsky of Cleveland was chosen vice-president; Rabbi Morris Newfield, Birmingham, treasurer; Rabbi Marcusson, recording secretary.

The conference went on record as approving President Harding's proposal for a world court. The conference also approved a project for the publication of a "practical" edition of the Bible.

A resolution condemning the Soviet attitude and persecution of religions was also adopted.

GREATER JEWISH THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY IS PLANNED BY RABBIS.

Seminary Gets 48 Calls For Its 3 Rabbis.

LONG BRANCH, N.J., July 2, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The launching of a million dollar campaign for the Jewish Theological Seminary and its affiliated institutions and the establishment of a publication as a forum for scholarly work among American rabbis were the principal steps that marked the convention of the Rabbinical Assembly of the Jewish Theological Seminary which is meeting at Long Branch.

Dr. Louis Epstein in his presidential message urged that means be provided to enlarge the faculty and student body of the Seminary and to make the great Jewish library of the Seminary available for scholars generally.

Dr. L. Finkelstein reported for the placement committee that applications for Seminary rabbis had been received from 48 congregations.

There were three graduates this year and 48 calls for them, Dr. Finkelstein declared "We cannot get enough rabbis to fill the demand."

Dr. Cyrus Adler and Elias L. Solomon also addressed the convention.

ORDER BNAI ZION ELECTS CHAZAN TO SUCCEED SHOMER.

Palestine Insurance Company May Start Business Next Year.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., July 1, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Nathan Chazan was elected Nasi of the Order Bnai Zion at the convention held here today succeeding Abraham Shomer.

An effort made on the floor of the convention to have the order dissociate itself from the Judean Industrial Corporation which is sponsoring the new Judean Insurance company in Palestine was defeated by a decisive vote.

The Judean Industrial Corporation is the fiscal agent of the order in commercial enterprises looking towards the development of Palestine. Announcement was made that the Judean Insurance Company may be open for business in Palestine next fall.

Abraham Shomer was offered but declined renomination. He and Henry Eisner were chosen delegates to the World Zionist Congress at Carlsbad.

The convention went on record as favoring the convening of a World Jewish Congress as soon as possible.

Other officers chosen by the Order are Sol Friedlander, Sgan Rishon; Dr. Levinson, Sgan Shani; Jacob IshKishor, Mascir; Max Fenwick, treasurer; Dr. S. Neuman, Chief Medical Officer; Leo Wolfson, Counselor of Order.

SOVIET REVIVES JEWISH COMMISSARIAT, SAYS REPORT.

VIENNA, July 3, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The Vienna "Morning Journal" contains a report that the Soviet has ordered the Jewish Commissariat revived.

This action is said by the paper to be part of a comprehensive plan to develop a council of nationalities.

There have been other reports of a similar nature regarding the recognition by the Soviet of the Jews as a distinct nationality among the other nationalities comprising Soviet Russia. Preceding reports have lent color to the theory that the Soviet aims to constitute itself a Federated union of nationalities.

DAVIS TO STUDY IMMIGRANTS AT SOURCE.

WASHINGTON, July 3, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Secretary of Labor Davis will leave July 4th on the Leviathan for a trip abroad to study the immigrant situation at first hand. Davis, it is understood, will devote himself considerably to the Jewish phase of the problem.

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YOUNG JUDEANS TO DEVELOP "ALUMNI" CLUBS.

Samuel Wants More Intellectuality in Organization.

New York, July 3. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). A movement to start groups for the "alumni" of Young Judea was started at the Convention of the association held yesterday.

The original motion for the formation of the ex-Young Judeans into a national organization was presented by Sylvan Kohn. An amended resolution was offered by Simon Greenberg, chairman of the Organization Committee, providing that all delegates endeavor to organize in their communities adult Zionist and cultural groups for practical Zionist work and for assistance to the Young Judea organization.

Resolutions were also adopted providing for the encouragement of the study of Hebrew and for the initiation by the League of work of a constructive nature in Palestine.

The Education Committee also recommended the formation of leadership courses and the organization of Jewish libraries.

The convention at its meeting Sunday wiped out its deficit by raising \$8,000.

President Borowsky's report showed 650 Young Judea Clubs. The sum of \$10,000 was raised by these clubs for the National Fund during the past year.

In his address to the convention, Maurice Samuel urged the infusion of more intellectual and spiritual content in the work of the organization.
