AGUDATH ISRAEL SENDS BLESSINGS TO COOLIDGE.

Efforts To Compose Differences with Orthodox Foes.

Large Delegation of Famous Rabbis Coming Here.

VIENNA, Aug. 22, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The "Agudath Israel" today, at the final session of its Congress, or "Knessish Gedolah", adopted a resolution conveying its blessings and hopes of a successful administration to President Coolidge.

While expressing gratitude over the fact that America has served as a refuge for large numbers of Jews the Agudath also asks the President of the United States to use his influence for a liberalization of the immigration laws.

The Assembly also protested the persecution of the Jewish religion in Russia, adopting a resolution urging the Soviet to modify its attitude on the subject.

Resolutions upholding Schechita and urging greater Saboath observance on the part of the Jews were also adopted.

A plea that the Agudath Israel modify its antagonistic attitude towards organized Zionism and at least work together with the Misrachi was voiced today by the Rabbi of Trier.

The rabbi declared that the Agudah's unyielding stand has caused many leading rabbis and "gaonim" to remain aloof from the Agudah.

His plea was attacked by Rabbi Weiss of Czecho-Slovakia who said that the Agudah already had made too many compromises

and concessions.

"We want to develop a dominion absolutely true to the Torah. In our schools stringent orthodoxy should be taught and

no secular instruction", Rabbi Weiss said.

Similar views were expressed by others. one of the delegates declaring that it was impossible to work with Misrachi, who, he said, at the Zionist Congress in Carlsbad, vacillated and followed the leadership of Weizmann rather than the injunctions of the rabbis.

A delegation compose of the famous "Chefetz Chaim" of Radom, the Gerer Rabbi, the Trotckow Rabbi also Rabbis Zirelson, Schapiro and rodzenski will come to America to recruit followers for the Agudah.

EXPEL JEWISH REPATRIATES FROM POLAND.

WARSAW. Aug. 22, 'Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A considerable number of Jews who had been repatriated from Russia have recently been expelled from Poland by order of the Polish Ministry of Interior.

The repatriates, it is pointed out, were all legally entitled to reside in Poland, as they could not otherwise have obtained the visa of the Polish Consul in Russia nor would they have been able to pass the Polish border, if their papers were not in perfect order.

JEWISH COLONISTS EXHIBIT AT MOSCOW.

Agriculturists Frm Russia, Palestine and Argentine at Russian Land Show.

MOSCOW, Aug. 22, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Jewish colonists from South Russia are represented in the Russian agricultural and industrial exhibition in Moscow. The colonists have a pavillion of their own.

At the foreign section of the Exhibition, the Jewish Labor Federation of Palestine is represented, as are many private Jewish firms of Palestine.

More exhibits are awaited, among them that of Jewish colonists of Argentine.

ARAB FIRST BANKRUPT OF YEAR IN PALESTINE.

JERUSALEM, Aug. 22. Jewish Telegraph Agency) The Palestine Courts recorded today their first case of bankruptcy this year.

The applicant for a receiver is an Arab merchant of Haifa, Said el Haiek. His liabilities are set at \$E25,000.

ARAB RULERS GATHER FOR CONFERENCE.

JEPUSALEM, Aug. 22, (Jewish Telegra hic agency) The question of the proposed federation of Arab states will be discussed at a conference of the Arab rulers to be held at Amman, the capital of Transjordania in October, it is announced.

Among the potentates who will attend the conference are King Hussein of the Hedjaz, King Feisul of Mesopotamia, the Emir Abdullah of Transjordania, the Emir Zeid and Prince Lutafallah. Hussein's European representative.

PROMISE MORE POGROMS IN AUTUMN.

BUCHAREST, Aug. 22, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The anti-Semitic "National Protection League" appears very much satisfied with the success of the attacks last week on Jews in Ungheni and Pitteeti, in Bessarabia, led by student-followers of Professor Cuza.

The task of the League, the officials announce, is to keep the Jewish question epen by propaganda and "public demonstrations".

JEWS ACCUSE SOVIET OFFICIAL, FORMERLY A PETLURIST.

MOSCOW, July 26, (J.T.A. Correspondence) The Moscow "Emee" today publishes a letter to the editor", telling of an occurrence reminiscent of the days of Czarism in Russia.

A Petlurist, who went over to the Soviets, was sent out to the township of Snitkov, in the province of Podolia, as President of the local Soviet. On June 22nd, the new head of the township called a local Jew, over sixty years of age, and ordered him to collect the labor taxes from the rest of the inhabitants, on the ground that his house was No. 10 on the street and the tenth citizen should callect the taxes.

The Jew pleaded that he was an old man and could not go about as a tax-gatherer. The President of the Soviet became furious that a Jew dared talk back to him and ordered his arrest. A second Jew, also past sixty who was present at the time, asked why his friend was to be arrested. The President thereupon seized a rifle and pointed it at the Jew.

The latter's daughter rushed to the window and raised an alarm. A crowd gathered but quickly dispersed as the President began to shoot wildly into the air. The case has been reported to the Public Prosecutor of the district, who is making inquiries.

The President of the Soviet has meanwhile submitted his own version of the affair to the local authorities, stating that a number of Jews came to his office and attempted to shoot him, and that he had acted in self defense. He further alleges that the whole Jewish population of Snitkov consists of counterrevolutionaries.

Practically all Jewish men have been arrested and are already for some weeks in prison. No inquiry has been started yet. Three of the prisoners are men over sixty years old.

The letter is signed by two Jews from Snitkov who were not arrested, M. Lifschitz and Ch. Teppermeinster. The name of the President of the Soviet and the names of the arrested Jews are not given in the letter.

The editor of the "Emes" adds a footnote that the Central Committee of Jewish Communist Organization has taken steps to investigate the report. At the same time, the matter will be brought to the attention of the Public prosecutor for the whole of the province.

110 M.P'S PLEDGED TO ARABS, SAYS EXECUTIVE.

JERUSALEM. Aug. 22. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) According to a statement by the arab Executive here, 110 conservative members of the British Parliament have agreed to support Arab demands relating Palestine.

This statement also expresses the belief that all Arab members nominated for the Advisory Council will refuse the nomination.

ORGANIZE HOLY DAY SERVICE FOR YOUTH.

Young People's League of United Synagogue Meet Younger People's Need.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22, 'Jewish Telegraphic Agency') The Young People's League of the United Synagogue has decided to organize a service to which will be invited the College students in the community, and the Jewish youth in general, (those above eighteen) and the soldiers and sailors who are in New York during the High Holy Days.

A committee has been formed which is getting in touch with the various colleges, the Jewish Welfare Board, and the soldiers' and sailors' organizations, to inform them of the service and to extend them an invitation to be present.

The services will be held at the Congregation B'nai Jeshurun, which is offering for the purpose the use or its Community House, 580 West End Avenue.

Rabbi Israei Goldstein is president of the Young People's League of the United Synagogue, and rabbi of B'nai Jeshurun.

JUDGE MACK ATTENDS JEWISH COLONISTS' MEET.

JERUSALEM July 19, (J.T.A. Correspondence) A conference of Jewish colonists throughout Palestine was held at Petach Tikvah on July 17th and 18th, eighty delegates being in attendance. Mrs. Fels and Judge Mack, of the Palestine Development Company, welcomed the delegates. Judge and Mrs. Mack had arrived in Palestine on the day the conference was opened.

Following detailed reports on the present situation, it was decided to establish a united organization representing all the Jewish colonies in Palestine. An Executive of thirteen members was elected. The conference sent a telgram of greeting to Baron Edmond de Rothschild.

INFANT WELFARE WORK IN JERUSALEM.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Among indications marking the advancement of civilization and the introduction of modern methods into Jerusalem is the institution there of infant welfare work, the American Child Health Association announces, Miss Bertha Landsman, of the Hadassah Medical Organization, Jerusalem, has written to the Association of which Herbert Hoover is president, saying that this work is expected to be the forerunner of many other branches of public health service particularly that dealing with prenatal care, the care of child of school age and tuberculosis work.

One of the main purposes of the health expansion will be the training of nurses whose services later will be of general use throughout all of Palestine. The holding of a baby show to take account of the health of all the infants of the city is expected to be an early outcome of the infant welfare work.
