STUDENTS RIOT IN JASSY

Wound Police Perfect, Demolish University Building and Threaten Jews.

Jassy, Roumania, August 28 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). Prevented by the authorities from holding their convention here, anti-Semitic students from all parts of Roumania clashed with the police wounded the Police Perfect and injured several officers, and threw the Jewish population into a panic.

The students' convention was to have opened Friday, but the authorities let it be known in advance by telegrams to all parts of Roumania that the meeting was illegal, and would not be tolerated.

On arrival here groups of students immediately repaired to the University campus, where they demolished the wing of one of the buildings. Forcefully ejected by the police from the campus, the fleeing students opened fire and bombarded the police with stones, some of the missiles striking the Chief of Police and his aids.

The disturbances continued until midnight when, after a short respite, the students appeared in the Jewish quarter, distributing hand bills urging the "destruction of the Jews". Windows of several Jewish homes were shattered. Unable to cope with the situation, the police appealed to the military authorities for aid. Soldiers aided by young Jews succeeded finally in quelling the riot.

TEN CHALUZIM INJURED IN SCUFFLE WITH ARABS OVER JEWISH GIRL

Jerusalem, August 28 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). Ten Jewish workmen were injured in a fight with Arab shepherds and Bedouins in an attempt to wrest from the shepherds a young Jewish girl whom they had carried off with the alleged intent to attack.

The fight occurred at Tel Joseph. The "Chaluzim" working in the fields on hearing the girl's cries made a rush at the kidnapers. Bedouins passing by were attracted to the scene, and took the part of the shepherds. The "Chaluzim", outnumbered, were injured in the scuffle, but managed to bring the girl back unharmed to Tel Joseph.

EINSTEIN ONE OF CHAIRMEN OF "OZE" CONFERENCE.**Plan International "Red Mogen David" For Sanitary Relief.**

BERLIN, Aug. 28. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The medical and sanitary needs of Russian Jewry form the principal part of the discussions at the Conference called by the provincial committee of the "OZE", an association for the improvement of health conditions among Jews.

Seventy accredited delegates are taking part in this conference, which was opened Monday evening. In addition, a number of representatives of friendly organizations are participating. The establishment of a Jewish World Union for sanitary relief, to be known probably as the Red Mogen David, on the lines of the International Red Cross, will engage the attention of the Conference.

The unexpected appearance of Prof. Albert Einstein was the occasion for many cheers. The scientist who was made an honorary chairman of the Conference, declared this meeting showed that all Jews were united on the question of public health, and that the efforts of the OZE merited the sympathy of the whole world.

The distress of the Jews of Russia should force those engaged in improving health conditions to redouble their efforts, said Eliezer Rosenthal, in opening the Conference.

The Health Department of the Ministry of Interior sent a representative to the meeting. He declared the work of the OZE was essential, inasmuch as it helped "to shield all countries bordering on the East against the epidemics of the East".

Dr. Klee, representing the Jewish community of Berlin, expressed the hope that the East European Jews and those of the Western countries would unite in solving the problem of building up Jewish health and Jewish physique.

Representatives of the Jewish World Relief Conference, the ORT and the J.D.C. welcomed the Conference. The Sanitation Department of the League of Nations sent a telegram extending its greetings to the meeting.

MUNICH JEWS CALLING BERLIN BROTHERN NAMES.

MUNICH, Aug. 28. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The spectacle of Bavarian Jews calling the Berlin Jews names, is being enjoyed by all who read the Bavarian press.

Jews of Munich calling themselves "National German Jews" have "vigorously protested", in letters printed by some of the anti-Semitic Munich papers, against the "Central Society of German citizens of the Jewish Persuasion", because the "Centralverein" assailed General Ludendorff, "the German leader and hero". The Munich Jews are "shocked" because leading German Jews in libel proceedings recently ended, accused the Generalissimo of virulent anti-Semitism.

ANOTHER ORTHODOX SYNAGOGUE A WORKMEN'S CLUB,

MOSCOW, Aug. 27, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Another synagogue has been converted into a workmen's club, at the request of the Jewish communists. The last of the houses of worship to be transferred to workers is at Horodok, province of Minsk.

Rabbi Maase who has been in poor health for some time is rapidly improving and the hope is expressed of his complete recovery in a short time.

NOTABLES OF JERUSALEM HONOR JUDGE MACK.

JERUSALEM, Aug. 12, (J.T.A. Correspondence) A reception was given here yesterday afternoon at Judge Gad Frumkin's house, in honor of Judge Julian Mack, Chairman of the Palestine Development Council, who is here on a visit.

Among those present were Sir Gilbert Clayton, the Acting High Commissioner, several high Government officials, the Orthodox Patriarch of Jerusalem, and the Armenian Patriarch of Jerusalem. There were also representatives of Jewish and Arab society in Jerusalem.

OVER 1,250,000 STRAY CHILDREN IN THE UKRAINE.

MOSCOW, Aug. 28. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Official census figures just published show there are 1,165,290 waifs and stray children registered in the Ukraine alone. This number is exclusive of the 115,000 homeless or "Bedouin children" in the cities of Odessa and Nikolaiev.

In general this is taken to be a conservative estimate, unofficial statistics having previously disclosed that in all Russia there are over three million children in need of homes, or care, or both, and that the majority of these children are scattered over the Ukraine.

ABDULLAH VISITS JERUSALEM.

JERUSALEM, Aug. 28. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The ruler of Transjordan, the Emir Abdullah, arrived today in Jerusalem on what is described as a "private visit" to Governor Storrs, and General Tudor, Commander of the British garrison in Palestine.

DEATH OF MRS. BERTHA AYRTON.

LONDON, Aug. 28, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Mrs. Bertha Ayrton, noted inventor and designer, died at her home in North Lancing, Sussex. Mr. Ayrton, who was the second wife of Mrs. Israel Zangwill's father, was born of Jewish parents.

RUMOR JUDGE LEVY SLATED FOR SUPREME BENCH.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) According to a report in the New York Times recently, Aaron J. Levy who recently resigned as Chief Justice of the Municipal Court of New York City, will be among the Democratic candidates for the Supreme Court bench. There are ten candidates to be named. Among the Jewish justices, whose term will expire are Justice Nathan Bijur, Judge Proskauer, and Justice Joseph E. Newburger. The latter will be retired because of having reached the age limit.

JEWS COOPERATE WITH CHILD STUDY ORGANIZATION.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Cooperation with all organizations dealing with child study and education is a feature of the policy of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies.

An announcement issued yesterday says that five of the 91 institutions maintained by the Federation in New York were taking part in the closing exercises on August 29 of the summer play schools directed by the Federation for Child Study of which Mrs. Fred M. Stein, a director of the Jewish Federation, is chairman.

"We believe in offering the children of working parents opportunities when young that will help them to be independent when adults", said Mrs. Stein. "Both the Federations in which I am interested are necessary to each other and we are gratified by the results obtained".

During the summer the kindergartens of the Brightside Day Nursery and the Emanuel Sisterhood supported by the Federation of Jewish Philanthropic Societies have been under the supervision of the Federation for Child Study. Montessori teachers have directed the children so that although their mothers are employed, the children have not suffered by the separation.

In all, more than 450 youngsters have been registered during the summer at play schools conducted by the five institutions mentioned.

MS. LETTERS FROM FAMOUS JEWS FOR PALESTINE MUSEUM.

JERUSALEM, Aug. 28, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A large collection of manuscript letters and portraits of famous Jews will soon pass into the possession of the Jewish National Museum here. The collection includes altogether about 2,500 portraits and letters.

The letters were written by Mendele Mocher Seforim, Achad Ha'am, Lord Beaconsfield, Bialik, Bardiczewski, Sara Bernhardt, Ludwig Boerne, Cremieux, Rabbi Elijah Gaon of Wilna, Rabbi Akiba Eiger, Jehuda Leib Gordon, Gambetta, Graetz, Herzl, Heine, Gustav Landauer, Max Liebermann, Ferdinand Lassalle, Caesar Lombroso, Karl Marx, Gustav Mahler, Max Nordau, Arthur Schnitzler, Otto Weininger, etc.

It is intended to add to the exhibits continually. The collection was first placed on exhibition at the hall of the Zionist Congress in Carlsbad.
