HITLER AWAITING TO SUCCEED CHANCELLOR STRESEMANN.

Jewish Exodous From Germany Promised When He Gets Power.

SERLIN, Sept. 27, (Jawish Telegraphic Agency) Adolph Hitler, anti-Semite and Fascisti leader, is writing anxiously ready to seize the reigns in Germany immediately on the fall of the Stresemann Ministry, which is generally expected to be a matter of only a snor time.

Another anti-Semite, Wulle, a Reichstag member, is preparing to go with Hitler as Berlin's new chief of police. Wulle declared at a private conference of the Hitlerites here, according to reports, that as soon as they came into power, he would inaugurate a forced exodous of the Jews from Germany that would make the exodous of the Jews from Egypt appear as child's play in comparison.

All of the 111s of Germany were blamed on the Jews at the meeting. Jews, it was said, were responsible for the French occupation of the Ruhr, as they were also responsible for the crashing slump of the German mark.

KUHN LOEB CO. WILL JOIN IN HUNGARY LOAN, OTTO KAHN ANNOUNCES.

Rumor First Denied By Felix Warburg.

BUDAPEST. Sept. 27, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Ruhn. Lueb and Co. will share in the international loan to Hugary, Otto Kahn, of the New York banking firm declared in an interview with newspapermen here.

A report of the likelihood of the famous banking house taking part in the Hungarian loan was in circulation in Europe about two months ago when Count Bethlen, the Hungarian Fremier, toured European capitals in the interests of the loan. Felix Warburg, in Europe at the time, declared there was no truth about the reports.

DEATH OF MINISTER OF BERLIN'S REFORM COMMUNITY.

BERLIN, Sept. 9, (J.T.A. Correspondence) Dr. Felix Coblenz, Minister of the Berlin Reform community, has died here at the age of 59, after a long illness. Dr. Coblenz's first post was as teacher of religion and preacher to the community at Bielefeld. He studied at the Theological Faculty of Berlin University. From Bielefeld he was called to the Berlin Reform community, to which he was attached ever since.

In religious matters, Dr. Coblenz held extremely radical views. He used his influence, however, always in favor of the Reform Community working in close association with the rest of the Jewish population.

FIRE DESTROYS 35 HOUSES IN JEWISH VILLAGE.

LEMBERG, Sept. 27, 'Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The small Jewish village of Rosniatow in Eastern Galicia. has been visited by fire, which seems to have become epidemic throughout the section.

The flames destroyed 35 houses, leaving as many or more Jewish families homeless.

JEWS IN CARPATHO-RUSSIA HOPE TO ELECT DEPUTY.

PRAGUE, Sept. 27, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The population of the province of Carpatho-Russia, in the Republic of Czecho-Slovakia, will have to elect on October 22 new deputies to the Czecho-Slovakian Chamber, and four senators. The Jewish Party hopes it will succeed in electing one Jewish deputy.

Under the electoral law, the total number of votes obtained by a party in the Parliamentary elections are not added up for the purpose of determining the number of representatives to which the party is entitled unless the party succeeds in at least one constituency by means of direct election.

Because the Jews have not yet returned a direct representative, they have been unable to obtain their proportional representation, which on the total number of votes cast for their candidates would entitle them to five deputies and three senators.

Carpatho-Russia, the only province in Czeono-Slovakia with a Jewish mass population, did not vote in the last elections.

JERUSALEM MAYOR QUITS ADVISORY COUNCIL; ONLY 3 ARABS REMAIN.

JERUSALEM Sept. 27, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The "Falastin" states that it is informed from trustworthy sources that Ragheb Bey Nashashebi, the Mayor of Jerusalem, has resigned from the Advisory Council.

Only three Arab members are now paticipating, in the Council, of the ten that were appointed.

JEWISH NEWS AGENCY OPENS OFFICE IN PARIS.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The rapid development of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency as a gatherer and distributor of Jewish news and news of Jewish interest throughout the world is indicated in a report made by Jacob Landau, director of Jewish Telegraphic Agency, Inc., who has just returned from Europe after five months of investigation on behalf of the news agency.

In addition to the existing central bureaus in London, Berlin and Warsaw, a bureau has been established in Paris, known as the "Agence Telegraphique juive". This bureau will collect and distribute news of Jewish interest not only in France but also throughout Belgium, Switzerland, Morocco, Tunis, Algeria and the Levant. It will also serve the Jewish and general press of the Balkan countries.

The facilities for news gathering in Poland have been greatly increased in consequence of the appointment of correspondents in the more important centers of the country, including Lodz, Bialystok, Lemberg and other towns.

News of Jewish concern from Russia will be gathered and dispatched by correspondents in central points with headquarters in Moscow and Kiev.

Palestine and the adjacent countries in the Middle East have not been overlooked in the consolidation of the world-wide news gathering system, a central office having been opened in Jerusalem and additional correspondents appointed throughout the East.

In Poland, Mr. Landau was received by the highest officials, including Prime Minister Witos, and the Foreign Minister Seyda. Officers of the Foreign Office in Paris expressed great satisfaction over the establishment of the news agency office in Paris, welcoming it as a means of informing Jewish public opinion abroad of events in France.

LAUD FRENCH TRASLATION OF ASH'S WORKS.

PARIS, Sept. 26. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Reviewing the French translation of Sholom Ash's works, a critic in the "Libre Parole" expresses appreciation of the talent shown in the French version. The translation was made by M. Blumenfeld.

As to the work itself, the reviewer says it throws new light upon the traedy of Jewish life.

ARTISTS INVITED TO JOIN PALESTINE OPERA CAST.

JEPUSALEM, Sept 26, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Five operatic artists of Russia have been invited to join the cast of the Hebrew Opera enterprise which is touring Palestine in "Traviata". It is expected that the Hebrew Opera company will soon add "Rigoletto" to its repertoire, in view of the success which has met the production of Traviata.

According to present indications, the first presentation of Rigoletto will be made in the next few days or in the beginning of October.

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EVENING POST LOOKS FOR PEACE IN ZIONIST CAMP.

Quotes Mond That British Policy is Unchanged.

NEW YORK. Sept. 26, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) A better understanding between the two camps of opinion "in which the American Zionist movement is at present divided" is looked forward to by the New York Evening Post in an editorial of September 25th entitled

"The Outlook in Palestine".

The editorial quotes Sir Alfred Mond, Minister of Health under Lloyd George, who told an audience of American Zionists on Sunday that the attitude of the British Government on the subject of the Jewish Homeland in Palestine has not changed.

After declaring that the anti-Zionist pressure in Great Britain would have to be much more powerful than it has shown itself in order to bring about the repudiation of the policy so formally laid down in the famous Balfour Declaration, the Evening Post says that the rapid reduction of the British garrison in Palestine with consequent relief for the British tex-payer has taken most of the wind out of the campaign against the Zionist project.

The editorial in part follows:

"Arab hostility to the Zionist movement has also given signs of slackening. One element among the Arab population seems now to be willing to cooperate with the Government under which the gradual realization of moderate Zionist aims can be promoted without infringing on native rights. Concessions have come from the other side.

"There is little doubt that in the first flush of enthusiasm engendered by the Ealfour Declaration there were put forth from the Zionist camp claims that took too little notice of existing political and social conditions and programmes that outran the economic facts in Palestine. Much greater stress is now being laid upon the upbuilding ofthe Jawish homeland through agricultural and industrial development than on the creation of a homeland by fiat.

"With the growth of the spirit of moderation in the Zionist world organization the chances have been growing for a better understanding between the two camps of opinion in which the American Zionist movement is at present divided."

SIR ALFRED MOND'S INTERVIEW.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The interview sent by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency representative by radio from the SS Berengaria September 21, quoted Sir Alfred Mond as saying that Sir Herbert Samuel was tired of his task as High Commissioner.

This is erroneous, Sir Alfred, on the contrary, having stated it was untrue that the High gh Commissioner was tired. He added, however, that Sir Herbert's task was difficult indeed.
