SAMUEL TO CONFER WITH HUSSEIN

Will Refuse to Discuss Caliphate, States Times.

Jerusalem, January 18 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). Sir Herbert Sammel, High Commissioner of Palestine, his ciwil secretary, Sir Gilbert Clayton and General Ronald Storrs will proceed to Amman Monday to confer with King Hussein of Hedjas.

A Hundred Arab Representatives from all parts of the country proceeded to Amman today.

London, January 18 (Jowish Telegraphic Agency). Sir Herbert Samuel will refuse to discuss the Caliphate with King Hussein, the Times states it learns today from authoritative sources.

POLISH GOVERNMENT THREATENS TO MAKE REPRISALS.

Warsaw, January 18 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). Failing in amperior to intervene on behalf of the Polish citizens ordered expelled from Bavaria, the Polish Government has reiterated its demand that the orders of expulsion be withdrawn and the victims compensated. If this demand is not complied with forthwith, the Polish Government will take reprisals, states the official announcement.

BEILIS CASE TO BE REVIEWED

Moscow, January 18 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). A special juridical body has been organized by the Government in order to review the Beilis case which was decided in 1912. Mendel Beilis, who is now in the United States, had been tried on a charge of ritual murder, his case attracting world-wide attention. The government has ordered the review at the request of M. Sarudny, one of Beilis' lawyers, who asserts that he has uncovered new evidence which will completely exonerate Beilis.

COOPERATIVE BANK OPENS

Jerusalem, January 18 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). A cooperative Bank of Bnai Binyamin, an organization of native Palestinian Jews, has opened offices here. The bank is largely financked by Mrs. Mary Fels of New York. The Bank's capital is £25,000.

OKO'S PUST BY EPSTEIN ON EXHIBITION.

1092 JEWS SETTLE IN ARGENTINA DURING NOVEMBER

Paris, January 18 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). The Jewish Colonization Association reports that 1098 Jews (mostly Polish Jews) were amongst the 25025 immigrants who entered Argentina in the month of November, 1923. Employment was found for a number of these Jewish immigrants on the farms in the Jewish colonies established by the Jewish Golonization Association, states the report.

BOMB PLOTTERS LEAVE NO CLUES.

ASSIMILATION OF JEWS WRONG REMEDY SAYS HALLINAN

New York, January 18 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). "The right of a Jew to remain a Jew--that's where we should have nailed our Christian colors to the mast" -- says Charles Thomas Hallinan, former Birector of the American Union against Militarism, in The Nation for January 23rd.

Mr. Hallinan corroborates Horace M. Kallen, who said in an earlier article in the same serbes, that enti-Semitism is fundamentally a religious protlem. He insists that liberal Gentiles have offered the wrong remedy when they urged the Jew & forsake his Jewishness through the process of assimilation. Their tolerance is meaningless unless they accept the Jew as he is. "It is our business to see that religious *y** bigotry is stamped out and that great democratic masses are educated out of errors as old as Christendom. If we make room for Judaism amon; the religious of the modern world, we shall discover — over-night, as it were—that we have fulfilled our pledge and made room for the Jew. Y. a fine, serious sensitive fellow with a rich and interesting tradition, a strong passion for justice, and a stubborn history of which *kmexx* any Irishman, if I may say so, would be proud!"

A resolution was adopted at this conference calling upon the Rabbis of every Community in the Country to register their protest against the proposed restrictive immigration bill with their respective Senators and Concressman.

The conference also passed a resolution expressing the desire that laws be formulated whereby relatives of both citizens and non-citizens would be admitted despite the quota.

MOTHER OF PEARL INDUSTRY IN PALESTINE

Jerusalem, December 25 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency, By Mail). Bethlehem is the centre of an industry in mother-or-pearl which supplies beals, rosaries, inlaid work, carvings, and miscellaneous ornaments or souvenirs to all parts of the world. This industry is about 50 years old and supports the majority of the population in the Bethähem district. Rosaries, composed of mother of pearl bears strung on silver wires, are the most important product of this industry.

Mother of pearl work is almost entirely a home industry? In addition to the fact that most of the population of the Bethlehem district has some direct or indirect income from the industry, there are approximately 500 people actively and closely engaged in the work. The work is all done by hand, and but a few tools of simple style are employed. The Bethlehem worker says that these beads can be as cheaply made by hand as by machinery and with a smaller percentage of breakage.

The raw material for this industry is largely waste from button factories - much of which is imported from United States - and shells imported partly from various other countries.
