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QUESTION IN ENGLISH PARLIAMENT OVER DEHAAN'S DEATH

Scrap Zionist Machinery Because of DeHaan's Murder, Demands London "Post."

London, July 4th (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). In the House of Commons yesterday, Colonel Bury, submitted a question to the Colonial Secretary for information concerning the assassination of Israel DeHaan in Jerusalem, and asking what steps the Government intends to take in order that the murderers may be apprehended.

London, July 4 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). "Scrap the whole Zionist machinery in Palestine, and you will win the gratitude of the Arabs, the Jews and the British," was the demand of the "Morning Post" upon Premier MacDonald, in an editorial yesterday on the death of Israel DeHaan.

The editorial expressed the suspicion that DeHaan was the victim of a political conspiracy, and stated that the old Zionists are gradually being submerged by unruly atheists and communists.

MURDER OF DEHAAN WILL NOT STOP WORK OF AGUDATH ISRAEL IN LONDON, DECLARES DR. PINCHAS KOHN

London, July 4 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). "The murder of DeHaan will not stop the work of the delegation of the Agudath Israel in its fight for the internal autonomy of the Jewish orthodox group in Jerusalem," was the statement made yesterday by Dr. Pinchas Kohn to the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency here.

Dr. Kohn, who is the President of the Agudath Israel, arrived here to head the delegation of the Agudath Israel to the Colonial Office, which will protest against the ordinance of the Palestinian Government granting communal autonomy to the Jewish communities of Palestine, under the leadership of the

Vaad Leumi. Other members of the delegation are Guggenheim of Basle, Rosenheim of Frankfurt, Goodran of London and Rabbi Horowitz of Jerusalem. Dr. Vallach remained in Jerusalem because of DeHaan's death.

"The Agudath Israel," Dr. Kohn continued, "is not engaging in this fight for the sake of fighting. We are anxious to reach an understanding that would enable the Palestine Jews to present a united front to the outside world, but we refuse to surrender the right of Jewish orthodoxy to internal autonomy in matters of religion, education, shechita, burial, etcetera. We refuse to submit our religious questions to the non-religious elements which govern the Vaad Leumi.

"We are willing to agree that a joint committee consisting of representatives of the Vaad Leumi and the Agudath Israel should be formed for the purpose of representing the entire Palestinian Jewry before the government."

Dr. Kohn then showed to the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency the text of the memorandum which the delegation will submit to the Colonial Office. The memorandum calls for the right of the orthodox Jews in Palestine to form separate communities outside of the proposed system under the leadership of the Vaad Leumi. It also asks for the right of the orthodox Jews of Palestine to elect a Rabbinate of their own, and to have their own shechita and burial institutions.

The memorandum was the last work of Israel DeHaan.

HEADQUARTERS OF AGUDATH ISRAEL RECEIVE CONDOLENCES

Jerusalem, July 4 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). Condolences over the death of Israel DeHaan have been received by the headquarters of the Agudath Israel here from Norman Bentwich, Secretary of Justice of the Palestinian Government, and from the French and Spanish Consuls in Jerusalem. Many cables have also been received from abroad.

It is expected that the Government will issue an official statement on the murder tomorrow.

SIR HERBERT SAMUEL VISITS PALESTINE PAVILION AT WEMBLEY

London, July 4 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). Sir Herbert Samuel and Lady Samuel visited yesterday the Palestine Pavilion at the Wembley Exhibition. They were received there by Governor Ronald Storrs of Jerusalem, former Chief of the Palestinian Military Administration, General Honey, Mr. Halpern and Mr. Leonard Stein.

"YOU MUST BE WEAK IN ARITHMETIC," SAYS BERLIN CONDUCTOR TO PROFESSOR EINSTEIN.

Berlin, July 4 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). The author of the theory of relativity is not necessarily skillful in everyday arithmetic, according to the opinion of one of the street-car conductors of Berlin.

He found that out because of the following incident: Prof. Einstein, upon paying his fare in one of the Berlin street-cars, received, what he thought, was incorrect change. He asked the conductor to correct his mistake, but in figuring the matter out, it was discovered that the mistake was Prof. Einstein's, and that the conductor had given him the right change. The conductor then triumphantly stated to Einstein: "You must be weak in arithmetic."

SIR ALFRED HOND MAY ASSUME LEADERSHIP OF LIBERAL PARTY IN ENGLAND.

London, July 4 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). Persistent rumors are afloat that Sir Alfred Mond, former Minister of Public Works in Lloyd George's cabinet, will succeed to the leadership of the Liberal Party. He is regarded as the only possible savior of the party. Possessing great brain-power, and popularity, it is believed, that when he is elected to Parliament, he will be chosen as the official leader of the party there.

Sir Alfred Mond has already consented to run for Parliament at the next election, and meanwhile is at the head of the campaign for the Liberal Party candidates in the country.

COUNCIL OF JEWISH WOMEN PLANS HOLIDAY OBSERVANCE CAMPAIGN IN COLLEGES

New York, July 4 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency). The schools and colleges of the United States will be invited by Mrs. Edwin Zugsmith of Pittsburgh, Chairman of the Committee on Religion of the National Council of Jewish Women, to avoid scheduling examinations on the Jewish holidays during the approaching academic year. A very convenient calendar of Jewish holidays, with this plea for co-operation, is being issued to all college authorities and to local school superintendents and principals. Every Council Section in 233 cities will promote this campaign for holiday observance, through its local Chairman of the Committee on Religion. Considerable success has been achieved by the Council as a result of its efforts during these several years.

PALESTINE TELEGRAPHIC AGENCY DESPATCHES

FULL PROGRAM OF PEASANTS' PARTY FOUNDED IN HEBRON DISTRICT

Jerusalem, June 16 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail).. 1. The party will be formed of the peasant class of Palestine without distinction of race. It may grant membership to capitalists and specialists amongst townsmen if they can help the party. The admission of the latter shall be decided by the Central Committee. 2. The aim of the party is: to strive to protect local products, to reduce taxes paid by the peasant and to improve the present agricultural system. 3. To spread education, especially agricultural education in the villages. To see that some of the peasants' children are sent to Europe to study the profession of agriculture. 4. To strive for the preparation of a constitution which accords with the desires of the Palestinians. 5. One of the most earnest wishes of the party is to control the wakfs and their revenues, so that they shall be utilized in a manner benefiting all Moslems, equally, materially and morally. 6. To see that the townsmen and the peasants are treated alike. 7. The party is authorized to intervene in political questions connected with its program, provided that this is in the public interest. It may also cooperate with other Arab parties, as an independent group, if its deems it necessary to do so in the interests of the people. 8. In order to attain the abovementioned aims, the party will concern itself with the following matters: a, the introduction of new methods of land cultivation; b, the formation of cooperatives for sale of products, for purchase of agricultural machinery for common utilization; c, the holding of agricultural exhibitions and competitions and to give prizes for the best products; d, to ask the help of the Government with regard to the following: 1, the abolition or, at least, the amendment of the tithe, 2, a fair division of taxes amongst all classes of the population, 3, the amendment of other taxes which overwhelm the peasant, 4, the protection of local products by increasing custom dues on imported produce; 5, the opening of an agricultural bank which will lend money for long terms to peasants at a moderate and reasonable rate of interest, 6, the opening of agricultural schools and the sending of their best pupils to Europe to complete their studies there, 7, the nomination of agricultural experts who will apply new methods of cultivation, 8, rewarding of useful cultivation by means of the reduction of the export duty, or of taxes, or by giving money in cash. 9

9. The aims of the party are principally economic. But as political conditions, in so far as they relate to public order, peace and security without which no profitable work is possible in the country, affect the economic situation, the party declares that its earnest desire is: a, to live and co-operate in peace with all the inhabitants of the country; b, to acknowledge the mandate conferred on Great Britain by the League of Nations; c, to reach an agreement with the government in following a positive policy; d, to have a legislative body comprising representatives of all the people convoked as proposed formerly by the government.
