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ZIONIST CONFERENCE IN TRANSYLVANIA APPEALS TO KING TO COUNTER-ACT
ANTI-SEMITISM

Vienna, Sept. 12th (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) "Our personal and material existence is jeopardized; even the Jewish places of worship are not safe," is the conclusion of an addressed sent to King Ferdinand of Roumania by the Regional Zionist Conference which took place in Oradea, Transylvania. The Conference has decided to ask the King of Roumania to exert his personal influence on the government that it cease tolerating the brutal anti-Semitism which prevails in the country.

The wave of anti-Semitism feeling has caused such a situation in the country that no Jew can even pass the street safely; no Jew has the feeling of security even in his own home," declared Mr. Fisher, President of the Jewish National Union of Transylvania, to the Conference. He further pointed out the fact that the enforcement of the new Land Distribution Law in Transylvania was executed in such a manner that many Jews have lost their land possessions.

STANISLAW STEIGER TO BE BROUGHT BEFORE A COURT MARIAL TOMORROW

Lemberg, Sept. 12th (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Stanislaw Steiger, arrested on the charge of having thrown a gas bomb at President Wojciechowsky last Friday, will be put on trial before a Court Martial to-morrow. He was transferred to-day from the Police Jail to the County Jail. A Jewish lawyer, Bromberg, will appear in Court as his counsel.

Steiger emphatically denies that he participated in any way in the throwing of the bomb.

JEWISH PEOPLE MAY RELY ON GREAT BRITAIN'S HONOR SAYS COLONIAL
MINISTER THOMAS

Johannesburg, Sept. 12th (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The Jewish people may fully rely upon the honor and good name of Great Britain which is a sufficient guarantee for the realization of their hopes in Palestine, declared the British Colonial Minister, Thomas, on his visit here, in a reply to an address submitted to him by the

South African Zionist Federation.

Colonial Minister Thomas, in his reply, also praised the work of Sir Herbert Samuel and Dr. Chaim Weizman, declaring that he was proud to have been the first Labor Minister to announce in Parliament that the First Labor Government of Britain endorsed the Balfour Declaration concerning the up-building of the Jewish National Home in Palestine.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS CONGRESS OPENS IN WARSAW

Warsaw, Sept. 12th (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) The second World Congress of the International Students Federation opened here to-day with the participation of three hundred delegates, representing twenty-three countries. The Congress was created on behalf of the Polish Government by Prime Minister Grabski and Minister of Education, Prof. Miklashevsky.

The Polish Academic Youth is represented at the Congress by the Polish Students Association; "Bratnia Pomoc," which is a purely Polish Nationalistic body, not admitting to its membership students of non-Polish descent. The Jewish academic youth, as well as those of the National Minorities of Poland are therefore not represented at this congress. The Jewish Students' World Federation is however, represented by three delegates.

DR. LOUIS GINSBERG CALLED TO HEBREW UNIVERSITY IN JERUSALEM

New York, Sept. 12th (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Dr. Louis Ginsberg, famous Talmudical scholar and professor of the Talmud of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, has received a call from the Hebrew University in Jerusalem to become its first lecturer on the Talmud, according to the announcement made by the Jewish Theological Seminary.

The directors of the seminary, of which Louis Marshall is chairman, have granted Dr. Ginsberg one year's leave of absence and made it possible for him to accept the call.

Professor Ginsberg, who is regarded as the greatest Talmudical scholar, has been associated with the Jewish Theological Seminary for the last twenty years.

UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO WILL GIVE CREDIT FOR SUBJECTS ON
JEWISH HISTORY

Chicago, Sept. 12th, (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Credit for courses in subjects of Jewish history and ethics will be given to Jewish students in the University of Chicago, according to arrangements made by the B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundation with the university authorities.

Courses will be given on the following subjects: "History of Judaism"; "Social Ideals of Judaism"; "Jewish Ethics." The courses will be given by Dr. Moses Jung, Professor of Religious Education and Rabbi Benjamin M. Frankel, who will continue as Director of the Foundation.

JEW AWARDED PRIZE FOR SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH

Baltimore, Md. Sept. 12th (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Mr. David Israel Macht, lecturer in pharmacology at the John Hopkins Medical School, has been awarded one-third of the American Pharmaceutical Research Fund for 1924-25.

The award to Dr. Macht was based on research work which he is doing to determine a method of standardizing alkaloidal drugs. This work is being carried on by noting the general effect of solutions of these drugs on seedlings of plants.

LONDON PAPER CRITICIZES SIR HERBERT SAMUEL

London, Sept. 11th (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) "To retain as High Commissioner of Palestine a man like Sir Herbert Samuel who is opposed to the Jewish National idea, would not be conducive to the interests of the future of the Jewish Palestine" states to-day the "Jewish World", commenting upon the report recently circulated that Sir Herbert Samuel will remain in office after his present term of administration expires.

"Samuel desires to see the upbuilding of a national home of the Churchill Memorandum, but not that of the Mandate," the paper further states.

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MEXICO HAS GREAT POTENTIALITIES SAYS S.C. LAMPORT

New York, Sept. 12th (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) "Mexico has untold potential. . . strength. It has prodigious natural possibilities that are dormant and undeveloped", stated S.C. Lamport, well-known merchant and philanthropist who has large interests in Mexico, in commenting upon the possibility of starting Jewish colonization work in Mexico, in a statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

"This offers a particularly interesting avenue for the effort of Jewish immigrants who would bring into that country their indefatigable energy and untiring ambitious effort and application to the various tasks to which they commit themselves in shaping their careers," further states Mr. Lamport. "History is replete with the narrative of the success following in the footsteps of tolerance and consideration given to the Jewish people. I think that the same would hold true in Mexico, for Mexico is ready for the application of the industrial stir and untiring will to be successful that Jewish immigration would bring into contact with the undeveloped natural advantages which Mexico holds.

"It is rather noteworthy that President C alles makes comment on the fact that in some circles the opinion prevails that the Jewish masses are not for agricultural labor. It would be well worth the effort to analyze the history of attempts in the direction of agricultural activity that have been made by Jewish settlers in various parts of the United States. One would do well to study particularly the section in the immediate vicinity of New London, Conn., where hundreds upon hundreds of Jewish immigrants became farmers and took possession of small units of land less than a generation ago. That section has grown to be very prosperous indeed and land values have risen under the intensive cultivation and rapid development which resulted from Jewish aggressiveness along agrarian lines in that section. These immigrants of 10 and 20 years ago are today some of the most respected and desirable citizens in that community. I do not think that this is at all exception, but that it is rather the usual experience of Jewish attempts in agricultural districts.

No one ever yet accused the Jew of being lazy, whether it be in industrial endeavor or in the field of agriculture, and earnest application such as the Jewish immigrant is always ready to give to his task is always bound to meet with its fitting reward, with the resultant successful development of the community in which he lives.

It is of course quite advisable to await further development and have the proper facts before us prior to any assertive move being made towards settling any particular district in Mexico

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with Jewish immigrants as a single unit. I have an abiding faith in the possibility for success of an attempt in the direction of settling Jewish immigrants anywhere in Mexico whenever they will have an assurance of tolerance and fairness and an opportunity for self expression and self development. concludes Mr. Lampport.

PALESTINE DESPATCHES

WAHABBIS ADVANCE TOWARD MECCA; MASSACRE POPULATION OF TAIF

Jerusalem, Sept. 12th (Jewish Telegraphic Agency.) The Wahhabis forces are advancing rapidly toward Mecca, the Holy City of the Moslems. The troops of King Hussein are fleeing in a panic. Taif, sixty miles from Mecca, was occupied by the Wahhabis who have massacred the population of the city. Many other cities have been burned and pillaged by the invading forces.

PRICE MOVEMENT THROUGHOUT PALESTINE

The general level of Wholesale Prices has again risen by 2.7% in one month and is now only 1.3% cheaper than last year. The chief contributing factor was the advance of cereals and flour and moderate seasonal changes in meat and dairy produce.

Prices of wheat which declined in June, rallied again early in July, remained firm for a while and were then followed by still greater advances. Local flour remained unchanged for the first three weeks, but has since risen by .15 per sack of 100 kilos, while foreign flour rose by leaps and bounds throughout the month due to the reports of poor crops in the United States, Canada and Russia.
