Kovno, Nov. 19.—The Lithuanian Parliament passed the bill providing for a compulsory Sunday Rest Law in its third reading today. According to the provisions of the law all stores and fac-tories must be closed on Sundays and Christian holidays.

# POLISH MINISTER OF EDUCATION PAYS TRIBUTE TO DIRECTOR OF JEWISH ARTISAN SCHOOL AT FUNERAL (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Nov. 19.—Professor Miklaszewski, Minister of Education, representing the Polish Government, attended the funeral of Maximilian Halperin, director of the Artisan School maintained by the Warsaw Jewish community, who died here yesterday at the age of 68.

Dr. Halperin, who was an ardent Polish patriot, was banished by the Russian Government for his participation in the Polish insurrection of 1881. He remained in exile in Siberia for three years. He served as director in several Polish technical schools and was one of the few promoters of tech-

The Minister of Education placed a wreath on the grave in behalf of the Government. He culogized Dr. Halperin and declared that the Republic had lost a loyal son.

### WAHABIS ADVANCE TOWARDS JEDDAH; ALI PLANS RENEWED ATTACK ON MECCA

### \$1,250,000 NEEDED BY COUNCIL OF JEWISH

### Conference Adopts Resolution Demanding Admission of Refugees Who Hold American Visas.

\$1,250,000 is required by the National Council of Jewish Women to carry on its work in the fields of social welfare, religious education and civic work during the next three years, it was stated at the Conference of the National Council of Jewish Women at the Hotel Commodore, New York.

The Conference adopted a resolution, petitioning Congress to permit the entry into the United States of refugees stranded in the European ports, who hold American visas, but are prevented by the immigration law from entering the country.

immigration iaw from entering the country. A resolution was adopted urging Congress to abolish the present regulation, which prevents newly naturalized men married in Europe from obtaining American citizenship papers for their wives fort of one year and to permit the entry of wives

of such citizens, irrespective of the quota law.

That the Council of Jewish Women is responsible for the revival of interest in Jewish music was stared by the President in rendering the report of the Organization. "Our new service for the Synagogue which was prepared by Professor A. Z. Idelsohn, an authority on this subject who holds the Chair of Music at the Hebrew Union College of Cincinnati, will receive its first public rendition at the Hebrew Union College at a special Sabbath afternoon service on November 28th."

A meeting of presidents of the various sections of the council from 235 cities in the United States will be called in New York, when a campaign to raise \$500,000 to carry on the work of the council

will also be started.

Mrs. Nathaniel E. Harris of Bradford, Pa., chairman of Foreign Relations, reported that the Jewish women throughout the country were manifesting great interest in the approaching Quinquennial of the International Council of Women which is to meet in Washington, D. C. in 1925. Mrs. Harris was named Chairman on Arrangements.

### ERNST BLOCH'S OPERA PRESENTED IN PARIS

M. Bloch came here from Geneva. He had previously been in the United States where he devoted himself exclusively to Jewish music.

### DAILY DIGEST OF WORLD PUBLIC OPINION ON JEWISH MATTERS

Have "Minority Rights" Obligations Been Fulfilled?

The "Jewish Morning Journal", writing extorially on Nov. 18, disputes Mr. Louis Marshall assertion, made the other day in his annual repet before the American Jewish Committee, to the effect that the east-European governments are figling their obligations with regard to "minoring rights."

"This may be true according to Mr. Marshall own conceptions of this matter, but it is doubtfull the Jews living in the countries referred to wood agree with him," says the "Morning Journal."

"Reports coming here from the young republic of eastern Europe and from the enlarged Remania show that the Jews in those countries and denied their 'minority' rights, as well as they human rights in general."

The resolution adopted last Sunday by the Conference of New York organizations, which was convened by the American Jewish Congress, calling for the reorganization of the "Kehillah" at New York, is considered by the "Day", in its editorial of Nov. 18, to be a step in the right direction. "Among all the worthless and unnecessary resultions adopted by the conference the only practice of the "Kellith" and dealing with the reorganization of the "Kellith". It is none the less important the organization of American Jewry is impossible as long as the Jewices of New York, Chicago, Detroit and every other town and city remain an unorganized state.

"We hope that this will not be merely another 'resolution', but that it will result in something practical and concrete."

# REBUILDING PALESTINE IS IN HARMONY WITH THE SPIRIT OF THE AGE, DE-CLARES ALBERT H. PUTNEY, FORMER CHIEF OF NEAR EASTERN DIVISION

OF THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR Favorable comment upon the report of the Zion-

ist Organization, acting as the Jewish Agency, to the Permanent Mandates Commission of the League of Nations was made in a statement of Albert H. Putney, former Chief of the Near East-ern Division of the Department of State and Dean of the School of Diplomacy and Jurisprudence of the American University.

"I read with great interest the first report made by the Jewish Agency to the League of Nations regarding progress in Palestine. As I read it my thoughts went back to that other Autumn, only eight years ago, when the realization first began to arise in the minds of a handful of enthusiastic Jews, and of a still smaller handful of observant non-lews that one of the by-products of the great European World War was to be the creation of an opportunity for the actual erection of a restored Palestine of which the Jewish race has been dreaming for more than eighteen centuries.

"It was not, however, until a year later, that is, only seven years ago, that the Balfour Declaration first awakened the great masses, both Jewish and non-Jewish, to the fact that a restored Jewish homeland in Palestine was at least a strong possibility. With this proclamation came the beginning of the real opportunity for the Zionist Organiza-

"These dates should be carefully remembered: for what the Zionist Organization has accomp-lished in Palestine must be judged, first of all, with relation to the length of time which has elapsed since their work in Palestine began. Judged from this standard it appears to an unprejudiced\_outsider, that they have accomplished as much as could be fairly expected by this time. The policy of the organization is one which manifestly is concerned with the laying of a solid foundation rather than with mushroom growth. With great wisdom and foresight the corner stone of the foundation has been made the ownership of the soil of Palestine.

"Perhaps the greatest ground for confidence by the Zionist Organization is the knowledge that their work is in complete harmony with the spirit of the age. It is becoming realized that, not only (Continued on Page 4)

NEWSPAPERMAN, LOUIS MARSHALL APPEALS ON BEHALF NTS, DIES AT OF REFUGEES IN RADIO SPEECH

"What, under these circumstances, is your duy and my duty toward these ten-times stricken, wretched human beings?" said Mr. Louir Marshall in a speech over the radio Tuesday night from station WGBS, appealing on behalf of the Emerstation WGBS, appealing on behalf of the Emer-gency Committee on Jewish Refugees. "Are we to deafen our ears to the call of humanity? What is to be done to rescue those who are stretching is to be done to rescue those who are stretching forth their hands from a dozen European ports-Southampton and Caerbeurg, Antwerp and Rotterdam, Bremen and Hamburg, Danzig and Libag, Reval and Riga, Constantinople and Marseilles', Are they to be left to perish and to go down to destruction? Are the refugees in Cuba to be permitted to succumb without a helping hand extended to them? The laws of the United States, whether we agree with the policy which enacted them or not, must and will be observed. Congress has the power to enact a joint resolution by which the sign manual of our Government, as exemplified in the visas which have been placed upon the passports held by the 8,000, may become effective. To give official recognition to these visas would save our country from just reproach But if that cannot be brought about—and in any event it would take a long time do do so—then the duty is incumbent upon us Americans to save these children of God who have now been cast as

derelicts upon inhospitable shores.

"With that thought in view, the Emergercy Committee for the Relief of Jewish Refugees has been organized.
