According to the recent statistics the Jewish population in White Russia reaches the figure of 371,-88, of which 189,540 are city dwellers and 20,000 are peasants. The rest live in the smaller towns and villages.

TEN THOUSAND PARTICIPATE IN OPEN-ING OF NEW STREET IN JERUSALEM

"The opening of King George Avenue is a symbol of Palestine's becoming a progressive state. This-process of progress-will continue if peace prevails in the country. Jerusalem will soon have a population of 100,000," Sir Herbert declared in

his opening speech.

Nashashibi, the mayor of Jerusalem, stated that the avenue is two kilometers long and twenty. meters wide.

PROFESSOR HARTMANN, HISTORIAN A DIPLOMAT, DIES

Vienna, Nov. 15—Professor Dr. Ludwig Mor Hartmann, iamous historian, died here yester at the age of sixty. Professor Hartmann v the first pupil of Mommsen, and devoted hims exclusively to the history of Rome. He publish many books on this subject which have been standard works in the Universities of Central E rope.

Being a Jew he was unable to obtain his pressorship at Vienna University until after collapse of the Austrian Empire in 1918. So after the formation of the Austrian Republic, Pi fessor Hartmann turned his attention to politi affairs, and he was appointed the Austrian arrairs, and ne was appointed the Austrian & public's first Ambassador to Berlin. He we counted one of the greatest educational authorities in Austria, and much of what has be achieved in the country in connection with the establishment of people's universities was due? his initiative and continued activity.

A few years ago Professor Hartmann, who w Freethinker, formally left the Jewish commi ity, joining no other religious community.
