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PUBLIC HEARING SET FOR PERLMAN IM-MIGRATION BILLS

(Jewish Daily Bulletin Special Despatch)

Washington, Dec. 10.—January 6th was set by Chairman Johnson of the House Immigration Committee as the date for the public hearing of the two bills introduced by Congressman Nathan D. Perlman—one to exempt from the quota certain additional relatives of citizens and declarants and the other to admit, free from quota restrictions, holders of old immigration visas who were nons, adders of our intringration visas who were excluded by exhaustion of quotas under the previous law. This would enable the entry of the thousands of refugees stranded in various ports, who are unable to proceed to the United States because their old visas are now invalid.

Congressman Perlman stated that he expects to be in New York tomorrow, when he will confer with Louis Marshall and other prominent Jews and ask them to appear at the public hearing in January to support his bills. He expressed hope that the bills will ultimately be adopted, even if considerable modification is deemed necessary. He stated that the reference of President Coolidge in his message in favor of humanizing the immigra-tion law will help the proposed legislation a great deal. Congressman Perlman admitted, however, that considerable opposition has already been expressed by restrictionists against his bills and that a strong fight must be expected.

BELMONT, AMERICAN BANKER OF JEWISH ORIGIN, DIES

Belmont known as the "father of American racing" and builder of the New York clevated and
subway lines, who died Wednesday at the age of
seventy-one, was of Jewish origin. He was born
in New York City in February 18, 1833. His parents were the late August Belmont and Caroline
Stidell. August Belmont, Sr., was a native of Alzey, in Rhenish Essen, where the family was
known under the name of Schoenberg. He came
to America in 1841 as Consul General for the
Austrian Government, a post which he held until Austrian Government, a post which he held until 1850. Three years later he was appointed Ameri-can Charge d'Affaires at The Hague.

He soon left his official position to engage in banking and became one of the most powerful factors in international finance, acting as the American representative of the Rothschilds for many years.

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POLAND SITUATION OF **JEWS** IN DESCRIBED IN DECLARATION OF DEPUTIES

Legal, Economic and Political Discrimination Is Government Policy; Vote Against Budget. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Dec. 11.—The legal, political and economic position of the Jews in the Polish Republic was vividly described in an official declaration read in the Polish Parliament by the Jewish Dep-uty Schreiber on behalf of the Club of Jewish Deputies. Deputy Schreiber explained the reasons why the Jewish members of the Polish Parliament voted against the government budget.

"The policy of the present Polish Government

undermines the hope of the Jewish population that they will ever be able to enjoy the equality of rights guaranteed to them in the Constitution. The government, in spite of its many promises has not yet removed the old legal restrictions which originated in the time of the Czaristic regime.

"In the field of cultural needs, the Polish Gov-

ernment completely ignores the demands of the Jewish population. Jewish schools are refused subsidy and the existence of private Jewish schools is made difficult. In the private high schools

practically a numerous classus for Jewish students is being enforced, the deputy stated. In his declaration, Deputy Schreiber further described the economic position of the Jews in Poland, which, he stated, is approaching a catastrophic state of ruination brought about by the policy of the Polish Government. The proposed bill to withdraw the concessions on monopolized articles threatens the existence of tens of thousands of Jewish families. Government offices are completely closed to the Jews. Employment over which the Government has control is also withheld from Jews. Sekretarczyk, the leader of the Polish anti-Semitic bands in Posen, who was sentenced anni-semule-panes in rosen, who was sentenced to jall for his activities, enjoys freedom in spite of the verdict of the court, under the pretext that "the jails are overcrowded", the declaration states. The Sejm passed on the budget with a majority vote. An exception was made with one item

amounting to 100 Zlotys which was taken out on the motion of the Left as an expression of lack of confidence in the Minister of Education. The resignation of Professor Miklaszewski is probable.

This figure treats as taxation, however, the gross receipts of the Railway Department and of the Post Office, which are almost wholly spent upon the services rendered by those Departments, and which are non-taxed revenue, and also Municipal rates, which are in payment of local services rendered. The actual taxation upon the people is in fact £1.750 per capita or precisely half the figure stated in the memorandum.

7.-It is stated that farmers give, in the form of tithe and land-tax about 15 per cent on the produce of their land.

This statement is not accurate, the figure being not more than 13 per cent. 8.-It is stated that salaries of Government em-

ployees, particularly the highest, ought to be reduced, seeing that they were fixed "four years ago when the cost of living was three times as much as it is now. No facts whatever can be deduced to indicate

that the decline has been anything approaching this

figure.
9.—"The Governor's office in Jerusalem occupies a huge building which would have been capacious enough to hold all the departments of the ex-Government. nment," your memorandum states. Your Committee must be fully aware that the

building in question is accommodating not only the overnor's office but the offices of the High Com-lissioner of the Secretariat, the Attorney General, the Treasury and Audit Department.

10 .- It is stated that Hebrew "is spoken by less

This would mean that Hebrew is only spoken by four thousand persons; as the total Jewish population is now approaching one hundred thousand this statement is wholly inconsistent with facts that are common knowledge.

11. "Wine, which is exclusively manufactured and exported by Jews, has been exempted from ex-portation tax contrary to all other products," your

memorandum states.

. The fact is that the export duty on wine was abolished many years before the British Occupation; the only concession, so far as export of wine is concerned, and one which all local manufacturers alike enjoy, is that the excise duty is charged in accordance with the Ottoman Law only to the extent of about one-quarter upon wine exported.

12 .- "All new roads and railway extensions built

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after the war were from or to Jewish Colonies." it is stated.

This also is contrary to fact. One branch rail-way line was built to Petach-Tikvah. A financial arrangement with the colonists was made which secured the Government against loss, and the line was largely constructed from advances provided by them. The only other railway extensions have been built to the military camp at Sarafand paid for from Army funds, and to the quarry at Beit Nabala. Main roads that have been made or re-constructed since the war have included roads from Nazareth to Tiberias and Safed, from Afuleh to Nazareth and Haifa, from Tulkarem to Kalkilieh. In fact, no high roads have been made at all to any Jewish colonies, except one from Beit Dagan to Richon and on to Rechovoth. This road is designed to be continued as the high road adjoining Gaza with the main road system. In addition about 200 kilometers of secondary roads have been constructed by village labor in various parts of the country under the auspices of the Government. One of these roads at present leads to a Jewish Colony; but it is by no means for its exclusive service and fol-

lows an old track used by the adjacent Arab villages.

13.—The Kabbara concession "was secretly granted (1921) to a Jewish land company to use for several purposes and cultivate an extensive area of land lying on the coast between the two ports of Jaffa and Haifa, for a period of 200 years against The one hundred and a nominal yearly rental. seventy families who still live on that land and who cultivate parts of it and own it were treated as a negligible lot. This concession which, until recently, was a Government secret, is now being enforced by Government influence and armed your memorandum states on page twelve. This Concession, which is for the draining and

reclamation of a malarial area, was originally ap-proved by the local authorities under the Turkish regime, but had not been endorsed by the Government at Constantinople before the war. In its original form, it provided for the sale of the land at a low price. The new Concession provides for a lease (except in respect of a small area of 2,500 dunams) and for a rent to be paid, which is by no means a nominal one and which is subject to revisions at intervals of thirty years in accordance with the ascertained value of the land.

The interests of the 170 families referred to, far from being treated as a negligible quantity, were most carefully considered by the Government, as well as by the Concessionaires. Under the arrangement which has now been made, they have been glad to accept an area of 3,500 dunams in a neighbody to decept an area of 5,500 dunams in a neighboring district as their absolute property in exchange for the 2,500 dunams over which they had previously exercised grazing rights. In addition they are receiving a sum of money for their expenses of removal. No disorder has taken place, and the reference to enforcement by the Government armed forces is purely imaginary.

In referring to these thirteen instances of misstatement, it must not be assumed that the High Commissioner accepts as accurate the remaining allegations in the memorandum. Most of them, however, are questions of opinion, and the minor errors of fact which they include, are not of sufficient importance to require attention here. Signed, RONALD STORRS,
