ABRAHAM IBN EZRA, MEDIEVAL JEWISH POET AND WORLD TROTTER, INVENTED CROSS WORD PUZZLE

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Dec. 28.—That the cross word puzzle, which now holds the attention of all English-speaking countries, was originally a Jewish invention made as early as the twelfth century by one of the foremost Hebrew writers and poets, Abraham Ibn Ezra, is the opinion voiced today by the "Sunday Express."

The earliest known cross word puzzle is contained in the writings of Ibn Ezra and consists of five words reading the same way up and down, across and back. The text of this puzzle is as follows: Perashun, Raabathan, Sh'Bedvash, Nithaar, V'nisraf.

Abraham Ibn Ezra, the leading Hebrew poet furing the golden epoch in the history of the Jewish community in Spain, mathematician, astronomer and astrologist, globe trotter who visited twelfth century London, and clever epigramatist, chose the form of the cross word puzzle in his usual habit of veiled writing, to reply to a question submitted to him by a pious friend as to whether honey in fermented state is kosher for passover. When translated, it may mean, We have meripreted that the leaven in the honey are removed and burned, or it may mean, "We have taken the leaven out of the honey and it is re-

LEON BAKST, RUSSIAN JEWISH ARTIST.

DIES (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Paris, Dec. 29.-Leon Bakst, the Russian Jewish painter died here at the age of 57.

Bakst, a scion of one of the well-known Russian Jewish families, became one of the most famous artists which Russia has given to the Western He was an international figure in the world of art and the theatre. He gained particu-lar fame for his decorative work in the production of Maeterlink's and D'Annunzio's dramas. He was also very popular in America where an exhibition of his work was held in 1902.

Leon Balst was born in Petrograd in 1802. In 1903 he married the daughter of Treitiakoff, the governor of Petrograd. He graduated from the Petrograd University and studied at the Art

School in that city.

Dr. Chaim Weizmann, in a speech which lasted one hour, reported to the convention on the political situation of the Zionist movement and political situation of the Zionist movement and defined his attitude with regard to the report of the Permanent Mandates Commission, on the relations between the Zionist movement and Catho-licism, the Palestine immigration policy and the formation of the Jewish Agency.

ARAB EXECUTIVE ISSUES PROCLAMATION ON ECONOMIC SITUATION OF PALES-TINE ARABS

(Tewish Daily Bulletin)

Terusalem, Dec. 29.—A proclamation dealing with the economic situation of the Arabs in Palestine was issued to the Arab population by the Executive of the Christian Moslem Association.

The proclamation deals with what it terms a "critical situation" and urges measures to cope with the problem. "Increased production is necessary. this purpose, we need funds, but these funds do not exist in the country. The Arab Executive has studied the problem and has decided that there is only one way to solve it and this is to establish cooperative associations and savings boxes in the towns and villages." The proclamation points out that in Nablus there are thirty Arab cooperative and saving associations, and urges the Arab associations to carry on propaganda along these lines.

A promise is also made that the subject of co-

operative organizations will be a subject of serious consideration at the seventh Arab congress.

EXECUTIVE OF POLISH ZIONIST FEDERA-TION RESIGNS

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Dec. 29 .- At the first meeting of the convention of Polish Zionists here, the executive committee of the Polish federation, headed by Deputy Isaac Greenbaum, submitted its resignation.

A heated fight, which will determine the attitude of the Polish Zionist Federation towards the policy of the Zionist world executive commenced when Deputy Greenbaum, in behalf of his group which is in opposition to the policy of Dr. Chaim Weizmann, introduced a resolution demanding that the authority of the Zionist Congress should remain unlimited until a Jewish World Congress con-

The oppositional group, which is under the leadership of Dr. Joshua Gottlieb, introduced a counter resolution in which is expressed a wish for full confidence in Dr. Weizmann and for more constructive work in Palestine. It is predicted here that the Greenbaum faction will be completely defeated, as sentiment among Polish Zionists is strongly in favor of the policy of Dr. Weizmann.

GOVERNMENT SUBSIDIZES FACTORY ON CONDITION IT STOPS MANUFACTURE OF "TALEISIM"

Minsk, Dec. 29.—Jews in White Russia who at-tend the synagogue, will have to import Taleisin, the traditional religious mantle worn according to Orthodox Jewish custom during the services, owing to the action of the White Russian government closing the only Taleisim factory in the city of Drubrovna

The Government has assigned the sum of 60,000 roubles for the factory on condition that it cease making Taleisim and manufacture other articles instead. The factory was reorganized as a workingmen's company and employs six hundred Jewish workmen.

EMIGRATION FROM POLAND TO PALES-TINE INCREASES (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Dec. 29.-Nine hundred and fifty Jewish emigrants left for Palestine during December. A group of 250 left last week and another group of 350 will leave next week.

CARDINAL BARLASSINA ARRIVES IN

LONDON Evan Morgan, English Prelate, Lends Support to

Vatican's Claim

London, Dec. 22.—The arrival in Rome of Mgr. Barlassina, the Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem, is only one sign among others of the exceptional vigilance with which the Vatican is watching the situation in Palestine

A few weeks ago, Mgr. Evan Morgan, an English prelate who is one of the chamberlains to the Pope, was sent from Rome to Jerusalem on a special mission. The precise object of his journey was not dis-closed, but he was believed to be the bearer of confidential instructions to the Latin Patriarch.

The interest of the Vatican and the Italian Catholic Union for the Palestine Holy Places and Pilgrimages centers around the Coenaculum.

The allusion to the Coenaculum requires some explanation. The Coenaculum, the traditional scene of the Last Supper, fell into Moslem hands early in the Middle Ages. In the fourteenth century it was recovered by the King of Naples, and the ancient church which formerly stood on the site was replaced by another edifice, which is still in existence.

Shortly after the Ottoman conquest in the six-teenth century, the Coenaculum again passed into Moslem hands, where it has remained ever since. Mainly on the ground that it was recovered for Christendom by King Robert of Naples, the Italian Government has for some time laid claim to the Coenaculum, the possession of which, it is thought, would add to its prestige in the Near East.

This explains the special emphasis which is laid on the Coenaculum in the Italian (Roman) Catholic memorandum. The Italian Government has informed the memorialists that it watches Roman Catholic interests in Palestine with unremitting solicitude, and is doing everything in its power to safeguard them.

It is widely felt that the Vatican is engaged in a vigorous attempt to stake out as large a claim as possible in the holy places, and now has a decided advantage over its onetime rival, the Greek Orthodox to the loss of the financial and political support on which it could formerly count from Russia.

RAPID INCREASE OF IMMIGRATION TO CANADA REPORTED (Jewish Daily Bulletin Mail Service)

Montreal, Dec. 27.—The steps taken during the last year in the Dominion of Canada to increase her immigration indicate a rapid increase in the future, although during the first nine months of 1924 the number of new residents, 109,092, was only 2,119 more than in the same period last year; states

a Canadian Pacific bulletin.

"The chief accomplishment of the year has been the laying of the foundation for a sound and intelligent immigration policy, for in no previous year

ligent immigration policy, for in no previous year has there been so much interest in Canada, evinced in foreign countries," the statement says. Canada was visited during the year by a number of officials, delegations, parties of writers and independent journalists from Great Britain, Belgium Switzerland, the Scandinavian countries, Holland, Russica and Jestwhere, "all interested in the occurring Russia and elsewhere, "all interested in the economics of the country and primarily interested in finding settlement possibilities for the nationals of their own countries." The Hebridean delegation has reown to mines. The Fredheath designation has re-ported favorably concerning the islanders already settled in Canada, and the possibilities for a future movement on a larger scale, while the British com-mittee sent over by the Labor Government to investigate the juvenile immigration movement, stated that "only two farms were found where the course of training and general conditions were not favorable to the young immigrants.'

JEWISH COMMUNISTS PREVENT JEWISH EMIGRATION FROM RUSSIA

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Paris, Dec. 29 .- Jewish emigration from Soviet Russia is being impeded, according to the Russia correspondent of the Jewish weekly paper "Iz Tribune Juive". This is being done not so much by the government, which understands that it cannot place the monarchists who leave Russia for political reasons, in the same class with the Jews who are victims of the new order flying from their ruined homes in order to join their relatives ahroad.

Those who are responsible for the emigration restrictions of Jewish emigrants are the Jewish Communists. According to them, only contra-revolutionists leave Russia. They even demanded the compulsory repatriation of thousands of refugees who have been on the Roumanian frontier. This was realized without the intervention of the Soviet authorities, the correspondent states.

"In order to keep from the emigrants the alluring prospect of America, the "Social Committee" has ordered letters addressed to refugees from the United States containing affidavits which would enable the refugees to obtain visas, to be withheld. enable the refugees to obtain visas, to be withheld. "This Committee organized in 1920 the transfer

of the money address from America to the re-fugees by their relatives. It received this money in dollars and paid in the deflated Soviet roubles. It paid 250 roubles per dollar while on the market the dollar was 15,000 and later 30,000 roubles.

The representative of this Committee in New York, Mr. Dubrasky, assured the relatives that for a few dollars one could live well in Russia. 250 roubles per dollar; and at that time a pound of bread cost about 2,000 roubles!"

POALEI ZION CONVENTION HEARS RE-PORT OF ACTIVITIES

Over seventy delegates from various parts of the United States and Canada were present at the fifteenth convention of the Poalei Zion Party in which opened last Saturday night at America. Town Hall.

\$110,000 was transmitted to Palestine, to the Palestine Labor Bank and the Palestine Labor Fund in the last two years through the Poalei Zion, according to a report read before the convention by the Secretary, Mr. Hemlin. Eighteen thousand shares, amounting to \$50,000 for the Workers Bank were sold by the Paolei Zion in America. Seventy-one branches of the party are A Poalei active in social and cultural activities. Zion junior movement was organized with a mem-

bership of over a thousand.

Mr. B. Locker, Executive Secretary of the World Federation of Poalei Zion addressed the delegates.

The convention will last until December 31. Plans to interest Jewish labor in America in Palestine reconstruction work will be discussed.

ICA OFFICE IN CONSTANTINOPLE NOT CLOSED; STAFF REDUCED (Jewish Daily Bulletin Mail Service)

Paris, Dec. 17.-The Central Executive Committee of the Ica denies a report which was recently published in the press that the Immigration Bureau of the Ica in Constantinople has been closed.

The Ica declares that, in view of the fact that Jewish immigration from Russia has greatly diminished, and the new regulations introduced by the Turkish government prohibit the disembarkation of immigrants in Constantinople, the Administra-tive staff of the Immigration Bureau of the Ica has been reduced.

In this connection, the Ica calls attention to the fact that since December 1922, about 2,000 refugees have been transported from Constantinople to other points of destination entirely at the expense of the Ica.

LELIOT'S WARNINGS TO AMERICAN JEWRY DISCUSSED BY ORTHODOX AND REFORM RABBIS

"Survival of Fittest-Orthodox Jew," Orthodox Rabbi Argues

Rabbis, both in reform and orthodox pulpits, further discussed the problem of assimilation and preservation of racial characteristics of the Jews in America, forcibly presented by Dr. Charles W. Eliot in his address before the Harvard Zionist Society-

"The Melting Pot," like all catch phrases, has been superficially conceived or erroneously inter-preted," Dr. Nathan Krass, of Temple Emanu-El,

"America is a new nation composed of foreigners hailing from various ethnic and religious origins. That these elements have not intermarried so as to have lost their identity is not a theory but a fact," said Dr. Krass. "Americanism does not mean destruction of group gifts but the common allegiance of all citizens to the ideals, the institutions and the flag of the United States. It means the use of the vernacular as the common language of the country It means the interpretation of the common life of the people in terms of the democratic spirit as illustrated by the founders and preservers of our Republic.

"Assimilation means the taking into one's soul of these political ideals and of the adoption of the modus vivendi that best expresses these ideals. Assimilation does not mean that each religious group, similation does not mean that each religious group, Jews, Catholics, Protestants, should throw its re-ligion into the 'melting pot' and wait patiently for a new religion to emerge. It does not mean that each ethnic group should surrender whatever virtues peculiarly its own it possesses and out of the 'melt-

peculiarly its own it possesses and out of the inter-ing pot choose a fused resultant.

"Our democracy can best be likened to a symphony orchestra. Each instrument is individual, yet all work together to produce harmony, not discord, guided by a common leader. Each religious or ethnic group in America can contribute the best it has, the best with which God dowered it. America demands unity, not uniformity, and with prophetic insight and foresight our fathers chose a flag of many colors and adopted as the motto of the land 'E pluribus unum'—'one out of many.'

"Diverse individualities competing for the com-mon advancement are a greater asset than a fused, colorless, unindifferentiated mass. A perfect Jew, a perfect Catholic and a perfect Protestant are three mighty forces for genuine Americanism. Three

nondescripts will weaken, not strengthen, our re-markable and unique Republic." Dr. Herbert S. Goldstein, rabbi of the Institutional Synagogue, 37 West 116th Street. preaching on "The Symague, 57 west 110th Street, preacting on The Strivial of the Fittest—the Orthodox Jews," de-clared himself to be heartily in accord with the views recently expressed by Dr. Charles W. Eliot, President emeritus of Harvard University, con-

cerning the Jew in America.

"Dr. Eliot deprecated as an observer any attempt to break away from the traditions of the Jewish faith on the part of the Jewish people," said Dr. Goldstein. "That, in his judgment would be a loss to America. I am happy indeed to note the pure attitude of Dr. Eliot on what Americanism and America should mean to all of us. America is not the melting pot of the respective world's faiths. America is made richer by the contributions that Catholic, Protestant and Jew bring through their religious to the enhancement of the moral and

spiritual wellbeing of our beloved country.

"Our beloved country will lose every vestige of racial and religious hatred when we will emphasize our non-sectarianism, not by breaking down the multiudinous sects, but by encouraging each and every one of them to bring their spiritual offerings."

DR. STRATON DISPUTES WITH FORD ON JEWISH QUESTION

JOHN L BERNSTEIN ISSUES STATEMENT IN REPLY TO ACCUSATIONS AGAINST HIAS

"Kundes", Yiddish Weekly, Asked Hias to Account for \$316,000

In reply to charges made against the Hebrew an reply to charges made against the riebrew Immigrant Aid Society of America, Mr. John L. Bernstein, the president, issued a statement in which a copy of this letter dated Dec. 20, 1924, to Mr. Jacob Marinoff, editor of the "Kundes" is reproduced. Mr. Bernstein's statement reads as follows:

To the editor of the "Kundes": "Under the headline, "We Want to Know you made certain assertions and insimuations against the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society, its directors and representatives abroad. In order to prove to the Jewish public that these assertions and insimuations have no foundation and in order to give you the 'knowledge' which you seek, we propose that you and a committee of responsible persons selected by you make a thorough and complete investigation of all the affairs and documents of the Hias. are prepared to grant to such a committee com-plete access to all books, papers, protocols, re-ports, letters and other documents and any in-formation which may be required. We propose that such a committee should also engage an acountant to make a thorough and complete in-centration to make a thorough and complete in-vestigation of the finances of the Hias for the fairre period or any part of the time the Hias has been in existence.

"We are very anxious for such a committee to

commence its investigation immediately.

"John L. Bernstein, President."

"It is needless to say that if the one who brought the charges would be concerned with finding the truth, he could have done it very easily before making public his charges and insinuations. An inquiry at the Hias-would have convinced him that there is not a word of truth in his assertions. Under the circumstances, there is little surprise at the fact that he rejected the proposal of the Hias to make an investigation with a committee selected by him. He does not desire the truth. All he wants is lies and libel.

"It is beneath the dignity of the men who are at the head of the Hias, who have devoted their best years and powers to serving the cause of the Jewish wanderers to defend themselves against unfounded assertions and insinuations. The Hias has an excellent record of work; it has too much love, respect and confidence from the Jewish people all over the world to be afraid of insinuations made against it. While the Hias does not want to have anything to do with the man who has refused to verify his statement, it does not desire the slightest suspicion to remain on anyone in the administration. "DEARBORN INDEPENDENT" ADVOCATES TAX ON FOREIGN LANGUAGE PRESS

Referring to a report for 1921 that the foreign language publications in the United States number forty-odd tongues from Albanian and Arabie to Ukrainian, Welsh and Yiddish, the "Dearborn Independent" writes, in its issue of December 29. "Without as much as hinting that these should be prohibited, it is only a matter of self-protection against a strongly disintegrating influence and of furthering the cause of Americanization that their growth should be checked and that measures English, the language of the nation. If the alien

grown should be enecked and that measure should be promptly taken to curtail their circula-tion. This is not a question involving the limita-tion of free speech. It is entirely proper to con-tend that every foreign language publication in this country tends, unwittingly, perhaps, but non-the less powerfully, to discourage the learning of English, the language of the nation If the alian prefers not to learn it he is quite within his right not to learn it, but the exercise of that right is of the nature of a luxury for which he should be willing to pay. It has been suggested that this can be accomplished without incurring any noticeable burden, through imposing an insignificant tax. such as one cent on every copy of such a daily, five cents on every copy of such a weekly, and ten cents on every copy of such a weekly, and ten cents on every copy of such a monthly, quar-terly, pamphlet, book, and so one. Also, it is urged, every public placard or notice in a foreign language should have a government stamp varying from one cent upward, according to the size. It is stated furthermore that such an impost while bringing in a welcome revenue, estimated at from \$25,000 to \$50,000 a day, would, at the same time, work effective good in a constructive sense, through furthering the solution of that grave na-tional problem, Americanization."

256,288 KEREN HAYESOD AGRICULTURAL OUTLAY IN ONE MONTH

Jerusalem, Dec. 6 .- A total of £56,288 was expended up to the month of October by the Colonization Department of the Palestine Zionist Executive from the funds placed at its disposal by the Keren Hayesod for the supply of draft animals, machinery, seeds, cattle, and poultry in the forty odd cooperative and individual holding set-tlements founded by the Fund. This huge outlay approximating half of the total Keren Hayesod agricultural budget of ,125,000 is, of course, unusual and is made only once a year, at the beginning of the new agricultural season when most of the preparatory work must be commenced a little in advance of, or immediately after the first rains. In this month it is necessary to place at the disposal of the Zionist Settlers the necessary animals and machinery.

BOOKS FOR JEWISH NATIONAL LIBRARY BROUGHT TO PALESTINE

WRITERS ASSOCIATION ASKS AID OF KEREN HAYESOD

Jerusalem, Dec. 10 .- At the last meeting of the Central Committee of the Hebrew Writers Association, it was decided to establish an Aid Fund for writers who are in need and to demand that visas should be sent to writers now abroad.

"This Thing of Giving" (Plymouth Press) by Henry Rosenielt, who was National Director of "The American Jewish Relief Committee" for eight "The American Jewish Rener Committee for eight years, is a dramatic record of the means by which of millions for relief were collected in America. The narrative of this feat, unparralleled in the annals of charity, is told with a wealth of detail which gives honor alike to the many, obscure, devoted workers and the few great leaders and givers. The inside story of episodes which have become history, such as Julius Rosewald's sensational donation of one million dollars, is revealed. The book is strewn with anecdotes and incidents which transform the bare chronicle of events into a gripping tale. The Drive for Jewish Relief, in which all American Jewry participated, emerges as one of the heroic chapters in Jewish history.

Besides giving a detailed picture of the poignant nessues giving a detailed picture of the poignaincent self-sacrifice of the poor and the magnificent generosity of the rich, the book is a genuine contribution to the science of philanthopy, the technique of fund-raising with least waste and most profit. Sixty-three millions were not raised by sentiment alone. Mr. Rosenfelt gives an admirable, practical demonstration of how vast sums were required and how vast sums were raised. This story of effective, organized charity is a fascinating one.

If the succeeding letters equal the first in style and spirit, they will form an important addition to the literature about new Palestine.

Mr. Friedman answers in the affirmative the question of whether the Jews are worth preserving as a people, on the score that variability of cultures and groups enriches the general culture of humanity. The author, rejecting religion as a lasting common bond for the future on the grounds of the general broadening of religious tenets and falling off of traditional ceremonial. offers as the only real means for survival, the establishment of a Jewish Homeland in Palestine, which he considers also an advantage for the assimilationists and those Jews who wish to remain in the Diaspora and preserve their Jewish heritage. An alternative solution that the author fails to give serious consideration to is rights for national minorities which are guaranteed under the Versailles Treaty in several East-European countries, and which while quite inadequate at present may be developed into full cultural autonomy for national minorities.

In all: "Survival or Extinction" is a lucidanalysis of the Jewish problem based on a thorough study not only of the social, but the natural sciences as well. The book is an important contribution to the subject as a fundamental and scientific treatise, with the added advantage that its popular treatment makes it accessible to the

general public.

Jewish Colonists in Argentine Prove Their Worth

Group Buenos Aires Correspondent)
Buenos Aires, Dec. 7.—If one wished to indulge in hyperbole one might at this time exclaim: At last the Jewish colonists in Argentine are coming into their own. In fact, there is a great deal of truth in this, if one stops for a moment to consider the strange predicament under which the Jewish colonists here have labored for years.

Jewish colonists here have labored for years. Ever since the Ica has been doing its work of colonizing Jews as farmers in Argentine it has followed the policy of belittling the very men whom it helped settle on the land, so that whereas the Jewish colonists have achieved wonders in their work of building up splendid colonies, which excel in beauty, efficiency and productivity the non-lewish colonies in the country, public opinion and, particularly, the government have always re-garded them with a deprecating attitude. This is not the place to describe the reasons for the policy of the Ica in spreading the impression that its colonists were unreliable, inefficient, etc. But such was the fact and the colonists suffered in consequence. They made attempts to explain their case in the press, they sent memorandums to the Minister of Agriculture and even delegated their representatives to see the Minister personally on this matter, but all their efforts were in vain. The word of the Ica went further.

Now, however, something has happened which has helped to vindicate the cause of the Jewish colonists better than any memoranda or delega-

tions could have done.

No doubt you have read in the newspapers about the Agricultural Exposition which was opened here recently. This is not the first exposition of the kind in Argentine. Every year there in such an exposition here. But this is the first time that the government permitted the exposition to be held in a Jewish town, Bassal Viosa. The significance of this for the Jewish farmers cannot be overestimated. Another Injustice Contemplated

While endorsing the bill which has been intro-duced in Congress by Representative Aswell for the registration of all non-naturalized aliens, the N. Y. "Herald-Tribune", in an editorial on Sun day, points out that the collection of some \$40,000,000 to \$70,000,000 from the aliens, in the form of fees of \$10 for first registration and \$5 for each annual renewal, would constitute a great injustice to the aliens, as the appropriation for administration of this law is only \$500,000. The intention of the Department of Labor to use the surplus revenue to force Americanization on the aliens is clear, says the "Herald-Tribune" which concludes its editorial with these words:
"This is going too far. As an administrative

measure for enforcing the exclusion policy registration is an urgent necessity. As a device for compelling naturalization and the spreading of a superficial Americanism it seems scarely American; and the probable effect of high fees and closer regulation than necessary would be to encourage evasion and defeat the main purpose of the proposal. All we want is some way to distinguish legal entrants from the bootlegged.

An Opportunity That May Be Loat The "Mundo Israelita" of Buenos Aires prints an article, in its issue of Nov. 28, from the pen of one of its contributors, Moses Shenderi, who discusses the question of the thousands of east-bound chalutzim who are unable to get into Palestine, owing to lack of means and the immigration restrictions of the Palestine government. He says:

"The Jewish people are committing a crime at this moment by allowing the thousands of chalutzim, thousands of potential builders of the Jewish land, to remain outside of Palestine. We must realize that if we do not grasp the opportunity of today we may regret it in the future."
