CROWDS STORM PALESTINE IMMIGRATION OFFICE IN WARSAW

5,205 Register for Immediate Departure (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Feb. 8.—Four thousand one hundred and fifty-two men and 1,053 women have registered in the last few weeks at the Palestine Office of the Zionist Organization of Poland for certificates to leave immediately for Palestine, it was learned here today.

Fifteen hundred of this number are Zionist and Mizrachi Cholutzim, and the rest consist mainly of artisans and skilled workers.

A group of five hundred Jewish emigrants left here for Palestine on February 2. They proceeded to Constanza where they sailed on February 5. Additional groups are expected to proceed shortly.

During the month of January 1,100 Jewish emigrants left Poland for Palestine through the Warsaw Palestine Office. The same number is expected to leave in the months of February and March.

The present economic crisis in Poland had its effect on the emigration to Palestine and resulted in the besieging of the Palestine Office by applicants for Palestine visas. The Palestine Office of the Zionist Organization in Poland has received 2,500 certificates during the six months from October to March. All these certificates have already been distributed and immense crowds of those who desire to emigrate to Palestine are clamoring for certificates. All of those persons possess the necessary traveling papers and documents. All that they require is the Palestine admission certificate, being anxious to emigrate as speedily as possible. The Palestine office for this reason has been compelled to cable three times in the last three weeks to the Zionist Executive in Jerusalem, urging that another 2,500 certificates be sent immediately, at least 1,000

PROFESSOR EINSTEIN WILL RECEIVE HIGHEST ASTRONOMICAL HONOR FROM BRITISH ROYAL SOCIETY ON FRIDAY

Professor A. A. Michaelson Awarded Honor Three Years Ago (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Feb. 8.—Professor Albert Einstein, author of the theory of relativity, is expected to arrive here next Friday to receive the gold medal awarded him by the British Royal Astronomical Society.

The president of the Society, J. H. Jeans, will deliver a special address enumerating the reasons for awarding the medal to Professor Einstein.

The gold medal of the Royal Astronomical Society is the highest honor to which any astronomer can aspire and it is regarded as the blue ribbon of the astronomical world. Professor A. A. Michaelson, the American Jewish scientist, who was the forerunner of Einstein, received this medal three years ago.

ANTI-SEMITIC EXCESSES AT BUCHAREST UNIVERSITY RENEWED

Bucharest, Feb. 8.—Anti-Semitic excesses against the Jewish students at the Bucharest University were renewed yesterday.

The excesses were on a larger scale. A great number of Jewish students were mistreated and injured.

HUNGARIAN PRIME MINISTER ATTEMPTS TO AVERT ATTACKS BY DECLARING OPPOSITORS ARE JEWS

"Race Purifiers" Redouble Anti-Semitic Agitation (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budapest, Feb. 8.—An attempt to save his position by terming his opponents Jews is being made by Count Bethlen, Hungarian Prime Minister, now under fire of the Opposition in connection with the counterfeiting plot.

In reply to attacks launched against him by Count Emmerich Karolyi, Count Bethlen, ignoring Karolyi, declared the attack was inspired by the Radicals, led by Vaszony (a phrase which Hungarians interpret as Jews, Vaszony and many of his followers being Jews). Criticized for keeping Dr. Nadossy as Chief of Police for five years, he points out that it was Vaszony who, when Minister, first appointed Nadossy to that office.

Count Emmerich Karolyi, a relative of Count Michael Karolyi, is one of the largest Hungarian land owners and one of the country's wealthiest men, being closely connected with many financial and industrial enterprises. Among other things, he is president of one of the largest banks, the Hungarian Bank, Limited, which has many American connections. He has long been on friendly terms with Jewish circles and his lack of anti-Semitism causes him to be considered a Liberal.

Budapest, Feb. 8.—An intense anti-Semitic propaganda is now being waged by the "race purifiers."

Deputy Julius Goemboes, leader of the "race purifiers" who is implicated in the counterfeiting plot, declared yesterday in the parliament lobby that "the Jews, Free Masons and Socialists, storm our positions. We have taken immediate steps for an offensive and we will even apply violence."

The official organ of the party has started a pogrom agitation. "Vaszony's behavior causes the fear that anti-Semitism will be inflamed and bring about a situation where it is doubtful whether the government will be in a position to master it," the paper writes.

ZIONIST PARTY COUNCIL IN POLAND TO CONSIDER POLITICAL CRISIS IN JEWISH DEPUTIES CLUB

Council Convenes Today (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Feb. 8.—The crisis in the Club of Jewish Deputies in the Polish parliament will be the subject of consideration at a special meeting of the Zionist Party Council in the Republic of Poland.

The praesidium convened the Council for February 9 and will consider the resignations of deputies Reich and Rozmarin from the Council and the resignation of Deputy Schipper from the Club.

The Jewish deputies who were elected on the platform of the labor group, Hitachduth, submitted the question whether they should remain in the Club, to the group's committee.

"Ha'yom," the only Hebrew daily outside of Palestine, was suspended today because of lack of funds.

Warsaw, Jan. 20.—The attitude of the Political Commission of the Cabinet in raising, during the discussion preceding its decision to give effect to a number of points in the Polish-Jewish Agreement, the question whether the Polish-Jewish Agreement concluded by the previous Cabinet binds the present

CHAIM NACHMAN BIALIK ARRIVES TODAY

American Authors and Zionists to Greet Guest at Pier; Louis Lipsky and Dr. Levin Arrive

Chaim Nachman Bialik, poet of the Hebrew renaissance, is arriving today on the Mauretania, on his first visit to America.

Mr. Bialik is known as the greatest Hebrew poet since Jehudah Halevy. His works have been translated into English, German, Russian, French and Spanish and he is ranked by critics as among the foremost living lyric poets.

He is making his first American visit at the invitation of the United Palestine Appeal, of which Dr. Stephen S. Wise is Chairman, and he will make addresses in the leading cities of the country in the interest of the \$5,000,000 United Palestine Appeal.

A reception will be given in honor of Mr. Bialik at Mecca Temple tomorrow, under the auspices of the United Palestine Appeal.

A delegation of American Zionist leaders and American literary personalities will go down the bay on the Mayor's boat to greet him at quarantine. Representatives of over two hundred Jewish organizations and hundreds of pupils from the Hebrew schools of the city will be at the pier to welcome him.

Louis Lipsky, Chairman of the Zionist Organization of America, and Dr. Schmarya Levin are also passengers on the Mauretania.

INDIANA STATE ACCEPTS \$400,000 JOINT QUOTA FOR UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL AND UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 8.—Four hundred thousand dollars was accepted as a joint quota of the United Palestine Campaign and the United Palestine Appeal, at a conference held here yesterday. The United Jewish Campaign is to receive \$300,000 over a period of three years; the United Palestine Appeal will receive \$100,000 this year, it was decided.

The Zionist state organization was completed with the election of J. A. Goodman of Indianapolis as chairman, vice-chairmen, Minnetta Baum of Fort Wayne, E. Horn of Evansville, J. Bloom of Gary, L. Brown of Terre Haute, treasurer, I. Feibelman and Max Pfesser, secretary.

Two hundred delegates attended the conference.

Not a "Nordic" Monopoly

Courage is not a monopoly of the Nordics, the New York "Times" and the "World" (Feb. 7 and Feb. 8 respectively) point out, listing the names of the President Roosevelt's boat crew, including that of the Jewish sailor, Jacobowitz.

"Among those who carried the work to its splendid conclusion there are the names like Diaz and Wilke, Abertz and Arenada, Franelich and Fugelsang, Hahn and Jacobowitz. Americans all in citizenship and ideals..." the "Times" says.

"The tablets which commemorate the contribution of America to the late war for the world's freedom have accustomed us to the fact that courage is the monopoly of no single racial strain. In contemplating the stirring feat of the President Roosevelt, we are made aware that the heroism of peace is likewise part of the common tradition of mankind. Those who are prone to see in our immigrant peoples some danger to American ideals may well ponder the names of the gallant men who to the honor of America saved the Antioch's crew."

The "World," terming them "All Nordics," remarks:

"If courage and competence are a monopoly of the much-lauded 'Nordics,' these men qualify."

Urges Jewish Audience to Banish Jew Caricature From Stage

The charge that the Jew is being ridiculed on the American stage, made in the New York "American" by Alan Dale, dramatic critic, is endorsed editorially in the English section of the "Day" of Feb. 7, which declares its opinion that the banishing of the Jewish caricature from the stage rests with the Jewish theatre audiences.

"The most effective way of banishing the low caricature, which passes as Jewish portraiture on the stage leads," it is emphasized, "not so much through the editorial offices of the newspapers as through the aisles of the theatres and vaudeville houses. The Jewish audiences that travel up and down these aisles nightly at the expense of good money are the only constituencies that can have the final say in the matter of the Jewish comedian. If they only refuse to be entertained by calumnies on their own people the Jewish comedian will disappear without leaving even a trace."

"World" Favors Wadsworth-Perlman Bills

"In principle," writes the New York "World," "the Wadsworth-Perlman bill, so amending the Immigration Law that wives, husbands and other near relatives of American citizens may be admitted as non-quota immigrants, should be enacted. Without abandoning the policy of exclusion or the quota method, surely some of the cruelty-breeding excrescences of the law can be pared away."

Benjamin Franklin Aided Jewish Congregation

The names of Benjamin Franklin, William Bradford, the printer; David Rittenhouse, the celebrated astronomer; Charles Biddle and John D. Sargeant, are signed on the subscription list of Congregation Mikve Israel, the oldest Jewish religious organization in Philadelphia, we read in the New York "Times" of Sunday.

These names, the article states, were put to the first appeal addressed by the congregation in 1788 to "their worthy fellow-citizens of every Re-

\$93,000 RAISED TOWARD NEW YORK QUOTA IN UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL

Additional contributions of \$93,000 were announced Sunday night as the result of two meetings in the interest of the United Palestine Appeal, which is raising \$1,500,000 of its \$5,000,000 Palestine colonization and immigration fund among the Jews of New York.

At the \$100 dinner given by the Borough Park section of the campaign at the Hotel Commodore, Isaac Ipp, Chairman of the committee, who presided, announced that \$53,000 had been raised toward the section's \$90,000 quota. The largest contributors were Morris Bergman and Morris Kulok, each giving \$5,000.

Morris Binstock, member of the Temple Beth-El, contributed \$1,000. The Congregation Anshe Sfard has raised \$8,000. Members of the Temple Emanu-El have contributed \$7,000 and the Congregation Shomre Emunah have raised \$6,000. The B'nai Zion Mizrahi have pledged a minimum of \$1,000 to the Shomre Emunah. Three thousand dollars in pledges were secured through the Hadasah group under the leadership of Mrs. Jacob Louria.

Speakers at the dinner included Judge Julian W. Mack, Rabbi Meyer Berlin, President of the Mizrahi Organization of America; Dr. Joseph Silverman, Rabbi Emeritus of Temple Emanu-El, and the Rev. H. Masliansky.

At a mass meeting of the Williamsburg section at the Congregation Glory of Israel, Brooklyn, Max Blumberg, Chairman of the Williamsburg Committee and Treasurer of the New York campaign, announced that \$40,000 of the \$75,000 quota had been contributed. Nahum Sokolow, President of the Executive Committee of the World Zionist Organization; Congressman Emanuel Celler, Rabbi A. D. Burack and Dr. Nathan Balber addressed the meeting.

LEADERS' CONFERENCE SEEKS COOPERATION OF JEWISH RELIGIOUS BODIES IN UNITED STATES

Representatives of the Joint Conference of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, Central Conference of American Rabbis, United Synagogues, Union of Orthodox Rabbis and Congregations met yesterday at the Harmonie Club for the purpose of considering a program of cooperation in religious endeavors among Jews in the United States.

Rabbi Abram Simon of Washington, former president of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, presided at the Conference.

A resolution was adopted that all pronouncements of the Joint Conference will have the approval of the constituent organization as expressed through a majority of each delegation.

Dr. Abraham Burstein, Rabbi Solomon Foster, Rabbi Jacob Kohn, Rabbi Elias Solomon, Morris Engelman, Rabbi Louis Wolsey, Capt. N. Taylor Phillips, Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein, Rabbi Samuel Schulman, Jacob J. Pollack, Ben Altheimer and the Chairman Dr. Simon, were representatives at the Conference.

The conference will meet again on March 8.

TEXAS STATE CONFERENCE INCREASES UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN QUOTA TO \$350,000

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Dallas, Texas, Feb. 8.—Texas was the first state to increase its quota in the \$15,000,000 United Jewish Campaign. At the state conference held here yesterday a quota of \$350,000 was accepted instead of the assigned sum of \$250,000.

Herbert Marcus, of Dallas, was elected State Chairman. N. D. Naman of Houston, Gilbert Lang of San Antonio, and Adolph Schwarz of El Paso, were chosen Vice-Chairmen. J. K. Hexter was chosen Treasurer, and Sidney P. Miller of Dallas, Secretary.

Three hundred and fifty delegates were present at the conference.

David A. Brown, National Chairman of the United Jewish Campaign, declared in his address that the greatest accomplishment of this campaign will be the revitalization which will come to American Jewry and enable it to carry out huge communal undertakings in the future. Mr. Brown laid emphasis on the conditions in Poland and the great need for immediate help there. He told of the great suffering of Jews in all parts of Europe and explained in detail the work of Russian colonization. He refuted the argument that the Jew would not work on the land, by giving the history of one million acres of land now under cultivation by Jews in the United States.

The delegates to the conference pledged to raise the quota for Texas within the next thirty days.

ORTHODOX BODY URGES SUPPORT FOR UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL

A call to Orthodox Jews to support the United Palestine Appeal was issued by Rabbi Meyer Berlin, President of the Mizrahi Organization of America and Rabbi B. L. Levinthal, Vice-President. The appeal was also signed by the other members of the Executive Committee. The Mizrahi organization consists of Orthodox rabbis and laymen.

"It was considered natural from the outset and clearly understood by the Mizrahi Organization as well as orthodox Jews generally that the United Palestine Appeal which embraces not only those two great funds, but also the health activities of Hadasah, and what is most important for the spiritual strengthening of our people the Mizrahi religious and cultural activities as well as the necessary means for assisting Mizrahi Chaluzim and Mizrahi colonization undertakings, merits full support and cooperation," the appeal read. "It should be remembered in this connection that out of the direct funds of the Keren Hayesod, the Mizrahi schools in Palestine are assisted, schools which are religious in the best sense of the word and which are more and more taking the place of the general Zionist schools. Out of the same funds, also, assistance is given the religious colonies."

AGUDAH LEADERS ARRIVE

Mr. Jacob Rosenheim, publisher of the German Jewish paper, "Der Israelit" in Frankfort, Germany, and Mr. Leo Wreschner, leaders of the Agudath Israel, the Orthodox Jewish world organization, arrived in New York on the steamer Albert Ballin on Sunday.

It is understood that the purpose of their visit to the United States is to assist in the collections of the Keren Ha'yishub, the Palestine fund of the Agudath Israel.

The College of Jewish Studies, an institution of higher Jewish learning, which was organized by the Jewish Education Committee of Chicago in January, 1925, opened registration for the Spring semester.

This College offers training for social workers, Sunday school, Congregational school and Hebrew school teachers, and club leaders.

Government, and to leave the question of principle open until it has been decided by the Clubs of Deputies of the various Parties constituting the present Coalition, is commented on in statements made to the Press here by Deputies Leon Reich, I. Gruenbaum, leader of the Opposition in the Club of Jewish Deputies, and Drs. Insler and Reizes.

Deputy Dr. Reich in his statement said: "It is the custom in political life that a new Government has the right to repudiate something that has been done by its predecessor. In the Governments of the Great Powers, however, it is traditional to maintain a continuity of policy. What the Government now intends to do casts a shadow upon the traditions of Polish politics. But in actual fact there will be no great changes, since after all, everything depends not on the promises but on the realization. Even if the present Government accepted the Agreement but did not carry out its provisions the situation would be in no way changed.

"The Prime Minister, Count Skrzyński, must in any case feel himself bound by the Agreement, of which he was one of the creators. Furthermore, in his statement of policy in the Sejm on assuming the Premiership, he gave assurances that he would carry the agreement into effect. He must as a man of political integrity, and also in my opinion for the good of the State, carry out the consequences of the situation which has been created.

"The Club of Jewish Deputies will make its attitude towards the Government dependent on the concrete steps which it will take towards realizing the obligations of the previous Government towards the Jews."

Deputy Gruenbaum, the leader of the Opposition in the Club of Jewish Deputies declared: "These decisions have not come to me as a surprise. They only show how naive and politically unwise have been those who concluded the Agreement with a Government which was not even able to hold by the conditions of the Agreement. The creators of the Agreement should, in my opinion, bear the full responsibility for what they did. I am only surprised that the people who concluded the Agreement are being allowed to continue to conduct Jewish political affairs in Poland."

"Since the Agreement is to be submitted for consideration to the various clubs composing the Coalition Government, the question arises whether the Polish-Jewish Agreement still exists," Dr. Mosler declared. "Can it be binding only on one of the parties to the Agreement—the Jews—and not the Government? Our answer must be clear and independent of whatever decision may be adopted on the matter by the Polish Clubs. The position of the Club of Jewish Deputies is in any case a difficult one at present, and we must see to it that we draw the right conclusions from it."

Deputy Dr. Reizes said: "One thing stands out as characteristic of the attitude of the present Government. The Minister of Education, M. Grabski, puts the question of the numerous clauses against Jewish students at the Universities in a very nebulous fashion. The numerous clauses is being enforced with great severity at present. At a time when the whole world is fighting against the numerous clauses and it has been raised before the League of Nations, it is impossible for us to be friendly or even neutral in regard to a Government which applies the numerous clauses against us."

JEWISH COMMUNAL ACTIVITIES

Seventy-five thousand dollars were subscribed to the joint campaign of the United Palestine Appeal and the United Jewish Campaign in Jacksonville, Fla.

Four hundred persons attended the banquet at which the joint drive was launched.

Steps will be taken by the Baltimore Zionist District to combat the activities of the Agudath Israel in that city, it was decided at a meeting of members of the Zionist body. The Agudath Israel, it was stated by speakers, is in direct opposition to all successful work in Palestine.

The twentieth anniversary of the founding of the Derech Eimanoth Synagogue of Arverne, Long Island, will be celebrated on February 14 at a banquet.

Samuel Brandler is President of the Congregation.

The Jewish Theatrical Guild, which was organized three years ago, staged its first benefit performance Sunday night at the Manhattan Opera House. The receipts were announced as more than \$50,000. The money will be used as the nucleus of a fund for the erection of a memorial hall in the theatrical district.

The completion of the Inwood Hebrew Congregation's new synagogue was celebrated Sunday night at the Hotel Pennsylvania.

Rabbi Abraham Borstein is the spiritual leader, Louis P. Rucker, president, and Harry E. Wasserthal, secretary. The synagogue was erected at a cost of \$100,000.

BREVITIES

An alien visiting this country on a temporary permit who marries an American citizen would be permitted to remain in the United States as a non-quota immigrant under a bill introduced in the House by Representative Oliver of New York.

"Under the law," said Mr. Oliver, "if a male citizen of the United States while abroad marries an alien he is entitled to bring his wife over as a non-quota immigrant. If, however, an alien is visiting here on a temporary permit for a period of six months and while here is married to a citizen of the United States, the law compels her to leave the country at the termination of her temporary permit and to apply to a Consul in a foreign country for a passport as a non-quota immigrant.

"Nothing is gained by imposing this inconvenience and expense on the wife of an American citizen."

A bill has been presented by Representative Black of New York to permit the child of an American citizen who was deportable for any reason to remain under bond in the sum of \$10,000 to \$20,000 to guarantee that such child should not become a public charge.

Lady Swaythling, who arrived in this country from London last week, was the honor guest at a reception given by the National Directors and New York Committee of the English-Speaking Union of the United States. Lord Swaythling and his daughter, the Hon. Joyce Montagu, also were guests.

By the will of Isaac M. Oppenheimer, probated in the Orphans Court, Baltimore, Md., \$10,000 bequeathed to the Hebrew Hospital and Asylum Association and \$3,000 to the Hebrew Orphan Asylum, both as a memorial to the testator's father, Moses J. Oppenheimer. The Jewish Home for Consumptives was left \$2,000 and the Chink Animo Synagogue \$500. The rest of the estate was left to the testator's brothers and sisters and other relatives.

of which are for those who have already liquidated their homes and must emigrate immediately.

Those who stormed the office asking for permission to go to Palestine comprise three classes: those who were completely ruined by the economic crisis and see their only hope in emigration from the country; Zionist idealists, mainly young men and women prepared previously for agricultural work; and those who go to relatives and friends who have prospects of settling in Palestine with their aid.
