JEWS IN TURKEY TO RENOUNCE MINOR-ITY RIGHTS Follow Action of Armenians: Conference of

Notables Called

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Constantinople, Mar. 25 .- The renunciation by the Jewish population in the Republic of Turkey of its reminority rights" guaranteed under the international peace treaty, will be considered at a conference of Jewish notables which is to take place here shortly.

The conference was called by the Constantinople committee for the reorganization of the affairs of the Jewish communities in Turkey. The purpose of the conference will also be to prepare a new constitution for the administration of the Jewish communal affairs in the Republic.

A special representative of the Turkish Minister of the Interior will attend the conference, it was

declared.

This action by the representatives of the Jewish communities is being taken in conjunction with the plan of other national minorities in Turkey. delegation of Turkish Armenians has proceeded to Angora for the purpose of presenting to the government its desire to renounce the minority rights.

PALESTINE NOT JEWISH STATE BUT NA-TIONAL HOME, BRIAND SAYS ON BE-HALF OF FRENCH GOVERNMENT

Paris, Mar. 25 .- A meeting of the France-Palestine Committee, which was held here yesterday, listened to a message from Aristide Briand, French Prime Minister, who expressed the French Govern-ment's sympathy with Zionism.

Briand stated in his message that the French Government considers Palesting not a Jewish state

but a national home, on condition that the rights of the Arabs are safeguarded.

Messages were also received from President Doumergue, honorary president of the committee, Paul Painleve, Herriot and Leon Blum.

HEAD OF BALDWIN LOCOMOTIVE WORKS URGES LIBERAL IMMIGRATION LAW

Philadelphia, March 25.-Samuel Vauclain, president of the Baldwin Locomotive Works, a Philadelphia concern which does business with every advanced country, in a speech delivered here said that the United States immigration laws are a great mistake, inasmuch as they bar certain classes of foreigners who desire to come to this country and would undoubtedly become useful in the labor world.

"The immigration laws," said Mr. Vauclain, "put up a bar against those people who not only would come to this country for their own good, but who would no doubt become useful citizens.

LORD ALLENBY WELCOMED BY AND NON-JEWS IN CANADA

Zionist Delegation Presents Conqueror of Palestine with Hebrew Address (Tewish Daily Bulletin)

Toronto, Mar. 25 .- A reception in honor of Lord Edmund Allenby was given here by Jews and non-Jews. He received Zionist delegations in this city and in Hamilton, accepting addresses from thein. Lord Allenby described the campaign of the Al-

lied forces in Palestine before a large gathering at Massey Hall, Toronto.

At a civic reception by the Toronto City Fathers, the conqueror of Palestine was presented by a Zionist delegation with an address written Hebrew on vellum. The address read:

PLUMER PRAISES PALESTINE LORD PROGRESS AT EXHIBITION OPENING

Tel Aviv. Mar. 25 .- The progress of the Jewish reconstruction work in Palestine was emphasized by Lord Plumer in his address at the opening of the second Near East Exhibition and Fair, arranged by the Judea Industrial Corporation, a New York

This exhibition, in comparison with that of last fall, marks the progress of Palestine industry, the High Commissioner stated, adding that although the achievements of the industrialist must be recognized, the rights of labor and its contribution to the de-velopment of Palestine should not be overlooked. Advantages must be given to the laboring classes to enjoy the fruit of their work. He expressed the wish that the Exhibition become a permanent institution in Tel Aviv.

Mr. Nahum Chazan, president of the Judea Industrial Corporation spoke on behalf of the American Jewish Order Sons of Zion and the Judea Company. CLUB OF JEWISH DEPUTIES IN POLISH PARLIAMENT CONSIDERS ADOPTION OF OPPOSITIONAL POLICY

Delegation Will Submit Demands of Jewish Population to Polish Government (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Mar. 26.-The Club of Jewish Deputies in the Polish parliament will proceed to opposition against the present coalition government, if the demands formulated by the Club tending to improve the economic and political situation of the Jewish population of the Polish Republic will not be taken into consideration by the government, it became clear following a special meeting of the Club held

The meeting was called by Deputy Appolinary Hartglass, president of the Club, for the special purpose of considering the question of proceeding to the opposition, in accordance with a resolution adopted at the last conference of Polish Zionists authorizing the Jewish deputies, members of the Zionist Organization, to adopt an oppositional policy toward the government. Members of the Club who belong to the Agudath Israel asked for a postponement of the meeting, declaring that they would not participate in it and that any resolution taken at the meeting would not be considered binding by

At the meeting Dr. Leon Reich proposed that before any decision is taken, the formulated de-mands of the Club of Jewish deputies be submitted to Prime Minister Skrzynski. The proposal of Dr. (Continued on Page 4)

GOVERNMENT PROMULGATES PALESTINE MILITARY FORCE ORDINANCE

Clause Excluding Jews from Force Omitted (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Mar. 26 .- The last word of the Palestine government on the question of reorganization of the Palestine and Transjordanian frontier force, which caused great discussion in Palestine and resounded throughout Jewish communities the world over, was given out yesterday when a special issue of the Palestine official Gazette was published.

The special issue contains the text of the ordinance promulgated by the Palestine government concerning the organization of the frontier force. text contains the conditions of enlistment, discipline, resignation and punishment. Contrary to a previous text, which contained a clause excluding Jews from the force and which caused the indignation of the Palestine Jewish population, the present text of the ordinance makes no mention of the racial composition of the force.

The ordinance authorizes the High Commissioner to employ the force outside of the mandated territory if necessary for the defense of Palestine and Transjordania.

HOUSE PASSES KOSHER BILL FOR DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Mar. 26.—The Dickstein Kosher Bill for the District of Columbia was passed by the House despite opposition on the ground that the existing general laws against fraud and falso pretenses covers Kosher violations and that the Kosher Bill is superfluous. Congressman Dickstein stated that the present general laws are in-effective to protect Kosher meat consumers. The Bill now goes to the Senate for action.

CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION AND LABOR FEDERATION PROTEST AGAINST PORTATION AND REGISTRATION BILLS

Informal Decision to Maintain Limitation Period Taken, Congressman Johnson Assures

(Tewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, D. C., Mar. 26.—A delegation representing the American Civil Liberties Union appeared before the House Immigration Committee yesterday, in protest against the Deportation and Registration Bills. Their protest was directed chiefly against the abandonment of the present five year limitation period, after which aliens may not be deported.

Chairman Johnson called attention to the fact that the Committee has already informally decided to retain the five year limitation period, and, moreover, not to deport alients for illegal entry alone, if they entered prior to July 1, 1924, but the committee intends to recommend the deportation only of other-wise undesirable aliens. Chairman Johnson also stated that the registration bill has not yet been taken up.

Professor Ernst Freund of the Chicago University Law School objected to that feature of the bill, placing the burden of proof of an undeportable status upon the alien which, he stated, was opposed to all the fundamental principles of American legal procedure, which has always imposed the burden of proof upon the prosecuting authorities.

Representatives of the American Federation of Labor and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers submitted the protest of organized labor against any extension of the present law regarding deportation which, they contended, is adequate. They also objected to the whole principle of alien registration. Others who opposed the measure were: Allen S. Olmstead, a Philadelphia attorney who presented the witnesses. HOUSE COMMITEE FAVORABLY REPORTS DICKSTEIN BILL TO ADMIT RABBIS' FAMILIES

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Mar. 25.—Congressman Dickstein's bill to admit the wives and minor children of Rabbis, regardless of when they arrived in America, was ordered favorably reported by the House Immigration Committee. By to this time, the migration authorities have admitted only those relatives of rabbis who arrived before. The House but not of those who arrived before. The House is expected to take action on the bill shortly.

The committee also favorably reported the Bacon Bill to restore citizenship to American women who married alien husbands and thereby lost their citizen status.

Congressman Dickstein's bill includes a provision legalizing the admission of a small group of approximately eight aliens who arrived between May 26 and July 1, 1924, and were technically inadmissible because affected by the date when the present quota law went into operation. They were temporarily admitted and Dickstein's Bill seeks to make their admission permanent. The report states that both provisions of the bill are amended to solve this purely technical hardship of the present law.

\$1,025,000 SUBSCRIBED FOR UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN IN NEW YORK S. O. S. Call Brings Response from Many Communities

The first million dollars in individual contributions toward the \$6,000,000 fund which the United Jewish Campaign of New York is seeking as New York's share in the \$15,000,000 overseas chest, has already been pledged, according to an announcement made yesterday by Dr. David M. Bressler, vice-chairman of the New York Campaign. These

gifts are made up of contributions from thirteen individuals and total \$1,025,000.

Mr. Warburg heads the group of contributors with a gift of \$400,000 which he piedged at the Philadelphia conference held last September when plans for the launching of the \$15,000,000 fund under leadership of David A. Brown, were adopted. Fox is second on the list with a donation of 000. The other contributions are as follows: \$250,000. \$250,000. The other contributions are as follows: Herbert H. Lehman, \$50,000: Louis Marshall, \$50,000; Benjamin Winter, \$50,000; Henry Ittelson, \$40,000; Paul Baerwald, \$30,000; Commodore Louis D. Beaumont, \$30,000; Jacob J. Newman, \$25,000; Samuel C. Lamport, \$25,000; Joseph Frankel, \$25,000; Henry A. Dix, \$25,000; Gregori Benenson, \$25,000.

"Unquestionably, this is a splendid showing, for which we all have reason to be satisfied," said Mr. Bressler, in making this announcement. "It is unprecedented that so large a sum of money should breezelented that so large a sum of money should be subscribed in advance of a drive. It demon-strates two things: one, that the Jews of New York are beginning to understand the great need, the great tragedy, and second, that they are beginning to understand their responsibility to their brethren overseas."

"The example set by New York will be an added stimulus to the rest of the Jews of this country," Mr. David Brown, national chairman, declared.

With assurance from many communities that they are taking active steps to respond at the earliest possible moment, over \$100,000 has been received at National headquarters of the United Jewish Campaign in response to an "S.O.S." recently issued by David A. Brown.

The "S.O.S." was a message sent by the cam-

paign chairman to all of the members of the national committee of the United Jewish Campaign, to all the state and community campaign officers calling upon them immediately to forward to head. quarters 10% of the first year's quota in order that a substantial measure of relief might be rushed to Poland, Bessarabia and other Tast European countries where hundreds of thousands of Jews are reported to be in the direst distress.

The Good-Will Movement-Pro and Con

"It was fitting," writes the Newark "Star-Eagle" (Mar. 20), "that the recent gathering of 500 representative Christian and Jewish leaders at the kosher dinner in New York should adopt a message to the American people reminding them that this nation was 'founded in neither race nor creed, and that 'our forefathers guaranteed to every man freedom of worship and the rights of citizenship regardless of faith or place of origin."
"Political equality of Christian and Jew was an

axiom from the birth of our republic. Religious tolerance between the creeds was not unknown among Americans in the eighteenth century. is coming now to crown all this is a spirit of social brotherhood.'

The Chicago "Daily News" (Mar. 22) writes on "Fraternalism in Religion" with reference to the exchange lectureship on religion recently estab-lished at Garrett Biblical Institute, affiliated with

Northwestern University.

"When it is recalled," the "Daily News" comments, "that many of the wars of history were caused by religious differences, that many thousands of lives in modern times have been sacrificed by pogroms, and that the bitterest antagonisms by pogroins, and that the interest antagonisms and hatreds are aroused over religion, it will be realized that the movement thus locally undertaken is worthy of being extended broadly throughout all lands

A view differing from the foregoing voiced by B. Z. Goldberg (the "Day," March who likens the goodwill movement to the Polish-Jewish Agreement and holds that it is a result of what he terms the fawning attitude of some rabbis

Mar. Goldberg bases his objections on the ground that "the Jews never quarreled; they were always willing to overlook differences and forgive wrongs." He especially takes exception to the statements made recently by the rabbis at a goad-will meeting in Kochester. "The Jewish role," he declares, "has been the role of the beaten, the oppressed. The hands of the Jews are not be-smirched with blood. If the Chirstians wish to wash their hands, they are surely welcome to do so, but Jewish hands should not be dragged into the same bowl. If the Episcopalian church in Ro-chester desires good-will between Jews and non-Jews all they have to do is to tell the members what the Christians did to the Jews, how barbaric it was and how harmful for the soul of the Christian himself, and to lift them to a spirit of re-pentance. That is all. The good-will of the Jews

was always present, even when they were spat on. "We Jews have no peace to make, for we never waged war. The ill-will came entirely from the other side, and it is up to that side to prove its good-will now. The mediation and compromise of

a rabbi is as brutal as it is absurd.

PROGRESS OF JEWISH SPORTS MOVEMENT IN EUROPE TOLD AT DINNER HONORING HAKOAH REPRESENTATIVE HERE.

"From Ghetto Boys to Jewish Youth," Dr. Koerner, President of Hakoah, Describes Purpose and Career of Jewish Sport Club

"Aus Judenjungen junge Juden—from ghetto boys, Jewish youth." This slogan, coined by Theo-dore Herzl, has been the purpose of the Hakoah Sport Club of Vienna, Dr. I. Herman Koerner, president of the Club, declared at a dinner given by the Zionist Organization of America, in his honor last night at the Hotel Pennsylvania. Joseph Barondess acted as toastmaster.

"The Hakoah was the answer the Iews of Vienna made to the anti-Semitic movement when it assumed made to the anti-semitic movement when it assumed a violent character," Dr. Koerner stated. In his address, he traced the history of the Jewish sport movement in Central Europe, giving

a picture of Jewish life thirty years ago, when this movement began. "There was a time when Jews were welcome in general sport clubs in Europe, but when the anti-Semite wave set in they were expelled and the Jews were forced to band themselves together in Jewish sport clubs," Dr. Koerner declared. "When Trong German students challenged the Jew. declaring him to be inferior by reason of his birth and unworthy of obtaining 'satisfaction by the sword' honor was offended, the yound was offended, the Jewish youth gloriously responded to Theo-dore Herzl's call and scores of Ger-man students were best

by the Jewish students. "It was the Hakoah which, when the Jews of Vienna were threatened with excesses during the High Holi-days, guarded the synagogues. Not a single Jew

was molested, due to the vigilance of the Hakeah,"

he continued.

"The Hakoah has played with first class teams in all parts of the world and that old veteran Zionist, Joseph Cowen, had tears in his eyes when a famous English team was defeated 5-0 by the Hakoah.

"The Hakoah engages in various activities, maintains fourteen sections, among them activities which are of almost a charitable character. Hundreds of young boys and girls are taught to swim and the starving sons and daughters of Russian and Galician refugees are given milk and bread after their We would like to extend to them more exercises. aid if our means would only enable us to do so.

"It was a source of deep disappointment to all those brave Jewish soldiers who fought during the world war, who were highly praised and decorated for their brayery, to find on their return that anti-Semitism had increased to unparalleled heights and had assumed a most vulgar character and that all their sacrifices and proofs of loyalty had been of no avail."

Mr. Abraham Goldberg delivered a spirited address in which he pointed out that the Jew, even in Biblical times, created what was known as a sportsman, today included in the term gentleman.

"The Jews are called the Children of Israel, not

the children of Jacob, because they wanted to be the children of Israel who fought with the angel and overcame him in a courageous fight. Samson, the strong, was willing to be bound by a woman, living up to the modern standard of gentlemanli-

"The Jew has enriched the sport life of America. When one glances through the sport pages of our metropolitan papers, one is struck by the many Jewish names: Caplans and Rosenbergs. It is a sign of our times that they no longer try to hide behind non-Jewish names such as Leonard and Ryan,

who are of Jewish origin. When one watches the Jew in the field, one observes that the Jew plays with his wits. He doesn't waste energy and wins not because he is of superior physical strength but be-cause he is superior mentally," Mr. Goldberg declared.

Mr. Phillip Wattenburg, president of the Federation of Galician Jews, gave a graphic description of the effectiveness with which the Hakoah guarded the Zionist Congress in Vienna against the Haken-kecuzler. "Every Zionist felt secure because he knew that the Hakoah boys were on guard," he said.

Mr. Morris Symonds, president of the Sidney, Australia, Zionists, was given a hearty welcome. Mr. Symonds told of the progress of the Zionist movement in Australia and of the interest which Australian Tews take in the development of Palestine.

JEWISH STUDENTS' CONFERENCE HELD IN ODESSA

Urges Necessity of Better Jewish Education (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Mar. 25.-The first conference of Jewish students in Soviet Russia was held in Odessa in the presence of 252 delegates representing 3780 students of 21 universities and colleges.

A report of the credentials committee showed that 99 of the delegates were the children of workers, 27 of peasants, 20 of artisans, 71 of clerks. Fifty-nine were members of the Communist party, 44 of the Comsomol, the Communist Youth Asso-

A resolution adopted by the conference obligated the student body to take active part in the cultural activities of the Jewish masses, and emphasized the necessity of "a better Jewish education and the knowledge of Yiddish." The conference also decided to establish courses for the instruction of

Another resolution adopted by the conference protested against "that part of the Zionists who attack the colonization plan in Soviet Russia."
