Jews Translated Bible from Greek into Latin, Dr. Blondheim Shows

(Jewish Daily Bulletin) Baltimore, Md., Mar. 31.-Dr. David Simon Blondheim, professor of romance philology at the Johns Hopkins University, has received an award of 1.000 france from the division of the French institute at Paris known as the Academie des Inscriptions et Belles Lettres in recognition of his recently published book, "Les Parlers Judeo-Romans et la Vetus Latina.

The award represents the recognition of American scholarship by one of the most distinguished societies in the world. The Hopkins philologist is the first American ever to receive a prize from the institution for work in the Romance languages.

"Les Parlers Judeo-Romans et La Vetus Latina" is a work based upon Dr. Blondheim's knowledge of books, manuscripts and oral traditions in twenty-four languages and throws a (Continued on Page 3)

This discovery of Dr. Weizmann was said to have been a highly valuable weapon during the World War.

The defendants, the Synthetic Products Company, denied that they infringed on the patent rights of Dr. Weizmann, alleging moreover, that Weizmann's patent was not valid. The Synthetic Products Company introduced a counter-plaint for the revo-cation of Dr. Weizmann's patent. claiming that the process of produc-

FRENCH HIGH COMMISSIONER ARRIVES IN JERUSALEM

Arabs Proclaim Strike; Boycott State Reception for Jouvenel (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Mar. 31.-A number of stores, the owners of which are Moslems, were closed here yesterday, following the proclamation of a strike by Arab nationalist leaders as a protest against Henri de Jouvenel, French High Commissioner of Syria, who arrived here Monday as the guest of the Palestine government.

The French High Commissioner, accompanied by four of his advisors, was met at the station by Sir Ronald Storrs, governor of Jerusalem, and escorted to the Government House on the Mount of Olives. A state reception given in his honor last night was boycotted by the Moslem notables of Jerusalem.

Order was not disturbed throughout the day, which was unusually quiet as it was the first day of the Passover Feast.

The French High Commissioner conferred with the various department heads of the Palestine Government concerning the bringing about of greater cooperation between the governments of Palestine and Syria.

DR. NORDAU'S REMAINS WILL BE TAKEN TO PALESTINE

Paris and Jerusalem Arrange Tribute (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Paris, Mar. 31.—The remains of Dr. Max Nordau, the late philosopher and Zionist leader, will be transferred from France to Palestine the end of April.

The steamer Bragda, carrying the body, is expected to sail from Marseilles on April 27 and will arrive in Palestine on May 5.

Arrangements for the ceremonies are now under way in Paris and in Jerusalom. The daughter of the late Dr. Nordau, Mlle. Maxa Nordau, who is now in the United States, will accompany the body.

Sacramental Wine Figures Reflect State of Judaism in America

The amount of sacramental wine bought by the Jews in the United States for the Passover holidays this year, as reported by the Prohibition Office in Washington, is regarded by the "Jewish Morning Journal" (Mar. 29) as an indication of the condition of Judaism in this country today.

"Jews have bought, on government permits, half a million gallons of wine for the Seder ceremony," the paper says, "and if we accept one gallon per says, and it we accept one gainin per family as the average, which is cer-tainly not too much, it means that from this source alone five hundred thousand families have bought wine for the holidays. "As a matter of fact the average is

very likely smaller, for there are surely more families that use half a gallon than those that buy one and a half or more. And this shows that the half million gallons have been distributed among more than half a mil-lion families. To this must be added a considerable number of Jewish fama considerable number of Jewish ramilies that make their own wine, which is legally permitted. It is a conservative estimate to add at least another 100,000 families to that half million, and that gives as a total of 600,000 families, which, figuring five persons to a family, shows that over three mil-lion Jews practice Judaism sufficiently to buy or to make wine for Passover." The "Morning Journal" declares that

among the Reform Jews who are in a minority, about 200,000 persons, are some who perhaps also buy wine for the Passover, and, furthermore, the "economically radical masses are more Jewish than the sceptics would be-

On the basis of this estimate, the paper concludes that "three-fourths, maybe even-four-fifths, of the American Jews have not broken away from Judaism, and this is more encouraging for the Jewish future than all the fine speeches about the sacredness of the Passover."

Complete agreement between the two governments exists as to the necessity and the feasibility of the new line, it was stated. The construction of the line depends on the securing of a loan to the amount of £2,400,000, which, it is hoped, will be forthcoming.

JEWS WILL NOT BE EXCLUDED FROM PALESTINE FRONTIER FORCE, COMMONS HEARS

Defense Forces in Palestine Transjordania Reorganized; Pales-tine Defense for 1926 Will Cost £342,600

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) London, Mar. 31.-Jews in Palestine will not be excluded from the new frontier force, declared Col. Leopold H. Amery, British Colonial Secretary, replying yesterday in the House of Commons to a question submitted by Col. Josiah Wedgwood. The report that Iews will be excluded

altogether from the new frontier force is incorrect. A certain number of Jews who served in the now disbanded gendarmerie have already been selected for enrollment in the new force. However, as a frontier force primarily intended for service in Transjordania, the number of Jews will be small, Col. Amery stated. The Jewish members of the gendarmerie were offered a transfer to the Palestine police force, he added.

Replying to a question submitted by Commander Kenworthy, Lord Stanley, on behalf of Col. Amery, stated that the existing Arab legion in Transjordania will soon be disbanded, according to the plan of re-organizing the defense forces in Palestine and Transjordania.

The defense cost of Great Britain in Palestine for 1926 will amount to 4342,600, according to the estimates for the Middle East, published here yester-day. The cost of organizing and maintaining the defense force in Iraq will be £2,455,500, while the cost for the Transjordanian frontier force will be £108,000.

Rebbi Judah L. Levin, for thirty years leading Orthodox Rabbi of Detroit, Mich, died at the age of sixty-five. Rabbi Levin was noted as one of the National Organizers of the Mizrachi and was an influential figure in the Jewish community for the past quatter of a century.

Blondheim shows that Greek bible was translated into Latin by Jews in a way largely peculiar to themselves and that many of the Latin words used by them are found in the Vetus Latina, an older Christian translation in Latin on which the Vulgate is largely based. He concludes that it is very probably that the Vulgate and through it our English Bible were influenced extensively by these Jewish traditional translations.

The work is important, it is said, to students of the Bible and of the Romance languages.

Seeking the Key to the Language of the Hittites

(By Our Jerusalem Correspondent) Jerusalem, Feb. 18 .- The archaeologi-

cal problem of finding a bi-lingual Hittite inscription (similar to the Rosetta Stones and the Egyptian inscriptions of Beisan) that would give a clue to the language of the Hittites, one of the seven people recorded in the Bible as the inhabitants of Palestine prior to the Israelite conquest, is occupying the attention of the archaeologists who are excavating on the site of the City of Mizpah. This was explained here in an interview by Dean William Bade, noted archaeologist and Professor of Semitic Literature at the Pacific School of Religion, which is associated with the University of California.

The lack of such a key to the Hittite language, Dean Bade said, hindered the deciphering of many inscriptions in existence. But that was not the principal object of his present expedition. He had hoped to pursue his investigations in Syria, where possibilities of such a find existed, but the present state of affairs in a part of the country he had hoped to explore, rendered any immediate work there unfeasible.

Dean Bade himself is organizing and outfitting his own initial enterprise. work of excavations on the site of Mizpah is being conducted under the auspices of the Pacific School of Religion and the American School of Oriental Research, of which the Pacific School is a supporting institution. The ancient site of Mizpah is where Jacob and Laban, according to Genesis, made a compact. Later it was fortified. "The mound of Mizpah, a very sight-

ly hill, is situated some seven miles north of Jerusalem, at the left of the Nablus Road, and two and a half miles this side of Ramallah," Dr. Bade declared. "It is quite close to the village of El-Birch. We saw the upper part of the fortifications, probably Old Canaanitish, in the mound, sticking up out of the ground at a slant, or glacis. "While of course I can make no posi-

tive statement, I am hopeful of finding at least a Canaanite, Phoenician or even Philistinian sanctuary. I think we can expect to find relics of these times. "We have found a spring at the bot-

tom of the Hill," continued Dean Bade, "that seems to indicate that we shall come across a watershaft. In those times, it was the custom to fortify a spot close by a spring, so that in times of siege the water-supply could be ren-dered adequate. We find traces of this strategy at Mizpah.

"The builders then would run a tunnel from the interior to the spring outside the place. The tunnel would pass under the outer wall of the fortifica-tions, and provide an easy means of underground egress to the spring. Of course, such tunnels would not be necessary at most Canaanite and Phoenician fortifications where the spring is at the hilltop; but we may count upon the discovery of a shaft in connection with Mizpah."

PASSOVER OBSERVED THRU. OUT COUNTRY

New York Throngs Jam Subways Hurrying to Seder Celebrations; Rabbis in Sermons Urge Aid for Palestine and Relief in Europe

The first two days of Passover, commemorating the Exodus of the Israelites from Egypt, were observed in temples, synagogues and Jewish homes throughout the country.

An interesting incident occurred Monday, on the eve of the first Seder, in New York City when steps taken by the officials of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Transit Company, to cope with an unusually heavy night rush hour in the cloak and suit and fur districts in Manhattan because of the fact that the celebration of the Passover began at sundown, were insufficient.

They stationed guards at every en-trance and exist of the Union Square station of the Broadway subway except one near Sixteenth Street, with orders to permit no one to go in or out, and at the Twenty-third Street station closed all entrances and all the exits except one at Twenty-first Street.

The result was that streets in the vicinity of those two stations became filled with a throng, most of whom finally sought other and farther subway stations, clogging them beyond hope of clearance. and delaying crowded trains by their endeavors to enter the trains. The situation lasted enter the trains. from 4:30 to 6:30.

Rabbis of more than fifty congregations-liberal, reform, conservative and orthodox-joined in signing a procla-mation calling on New York Jews to answer the call for aid from the millions of Jews who are suffering un-usual hardships in Eastern Europe.

"The House of Israel is in distress." the proclamation, given out by Rabbi Israel Goldstein, chairman of the Committee of Rabbis of the United Jewish

Campaign in New York, began.
"Millions of Jews are suffering a catastrophe of poverty, disease, starvation, homelessness and despair-in Poland, Russia, Galicia, Bessarabia, Austria and other countries.

"Suicides, which have been the rarest phenomena among our people, are becoming more and more frequent in the stricken and blighted sections of Eastern Europe.

"As rabbis concerned for the moral and spiritual integrity of the House of Israel as for its physical welfare we are deeply grieved and gravely alarmed at the physical and spiritual crisis which impends over a large portion of our people.
"We feel that in the hands of Amer-

ican Jews who are blessed with prosperity and happiness lies the possibility of saving the stricken Jewries of Europe from annihilation.

"In the name of our religion and in the name of our Jewish brotherhood, we, the rabbis of Greater New York, call upon all the sections of our people
