## ROUMANIAN CHIEF RABBI WILL BE JEWISH REPRE- SENTATIVE IN SENATE

Will Serve Till Reorganization of  
Jewish Communities

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Apr. 9.—Rabbi Niemirower, Chief Rabbi of Old Roumania, will be the temporary representative of the Jewish population in the Roumanian Senate, pending the organization of the Federation of Jewish Communities in greater Roumania, according to a statement made by the Federation of Jewish Communities in Old Roumania to the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency here.

The Jews in Roumania have the right, under the constitution and the electoral law, to have their representative in the Senate with the right to vote. Because of the fact that the reorganization of the Jewish communities in Roumania has not been completed, the Jewish population has been unable to exercise its right up to the present. The present action has been decided upon in order to prevent this clause from remaining unobserved.

## ROUMANIAN STUDENTS STRIKE COMES TO END

Government Will Not Tolerate Disturbances, Minister Declares

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Apr. 9.—The strike of the anti-Semitic students demanding the introduction of a numerous clause against Jewish students in the Roumanian Universities, came to an end yesterday following a conference between the new Minister of the Interior and the presidents of the anti-Semitic student bodies.

The strike having come to an end, the Roumanian universities will be opened Monday. The government declared that it will not tolerate any disturbances. The students promised to discontinue agitation, declaring confidence in the government which has granted amnesty to all offenders.

## ARCHAEOLOGICAL CONGRESS OPENS ITS SECOND SESSION

## CHICAGO JEWRY RAISES \$200,000 FOR UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL AT MEETING OF 400 LEADERS

Second Largest Community in the United States Gives Rousing Reception to Chaim Nachman Bialik; Former Non-Zionists Join Work

Chicago, Apr. 9.—Following a rousing reception on his arrival here Thursday, Chaim Nachman Bialik was tendered a dinner at the Palmer House last night attended by four hundred leaders of Chicago Jewry who contributed over \$80,000, bringing Chicago's total for the United Palestine Appeal to \$200,000. More than half of the sum has been received in cash.

Judge Harry M. Fisher was chairman at the dinner which officially launched the Chicago campaign for half a million dollars. A large number not previously identified with Palestine work were present, as well as leading Reform Rabbis who, besides having endorsed the campaign before their congregations, made substantial contributions. ## NON-SECTARIAN CHAPEL WILL BE ERECTED AT PHILADELPHIA EXPOSITION

Philadelphia, Apr. 9.—A Palace of Education is now being erected for the Sesqui-Centennial Exposition of American Independence, which will contain a great non-sectarian chapel, where all religious bodies, including the Jewish, are expected to be represented.

The outstanding feature of the Palace will be the chapel. At the north end will be placed an altar, unadorned with symbols or decorations of any particular religious group, but accentuating the chief purposes of religion.

The altar will be surrounded by a chancel rail before which visitors may pray in the posture which the observance of their faith calls for. The altar will be the gift of a well known New Yorker. Back of it will be erected three stained windows that will illustrate both the history and purposes of

## NEW TEMPLE EMANU-EL WILL BE DEDICATED IN SAN FRANCISCO

One of Most Beautiful Ecclesiastical  
Buildings in Country  
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

San Francisco, Cal., Apr. 9.—The New Temple Emanu-El will be dedicated Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, April 16, 17, and 18 with special exercises at the newly completed building. At the first Sabbath Services on Friday, Mr. Henry L. Mayer, President of the Congregation, will receive the Building from Mr. Louis Bloch, Chairman of the Building Committee.

Mayor James Rolph and Rev. C. S. S. Dutton of the First Unitarian Church, will be among the speakers.

The New Temple Emanu-El is one of the most beautiful ecclesiastical buildings in the country. The architects were the late Sylvian Schnaitacher, the firm Bakewell and Brown, with D. K. Maybeck and G. Albert Lansburgh, consulting architects.

The Temple is in the Levantine style of architecture, and is composed of a group of three buildings, the Temple proper, the Administrative Building and the Temple House. When completed, the group of buildings will cost \$125,000. The Temple House is still in process of construction, and will not be completed until 1927. Temple Emanu-El is the oldest Jewish Congregation on the Pacific Coast, having been founded in 1850; it celebrated its 75th Jubilee recently. The officers and Board of Directors are: Mr. Henry L. ## AMERICAN ORIENTALISTS ENTERTAINED BY DROPSIE

Ancient Ninevah Tablet Confirms  
Bible Story of Deluge; Noah Knew  
Not Prohibition, Scholar Says  
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Philadelphia, Apr. 9.—Members of the American Oriental Society were the guests of the Dropsie College yesterday at a luncheon arranged in their honor at which Dr. Cyrus Adler presided. The second day's session of the annual meeting of the Society, which is being held here, took place throughout the day at Dropsie College.

The Jewish participants in the discussions of the day were Professor William Rosenau of Johns Hopkins University and Dr. Julian Morgenstern, President of the Hebrew Union College.

Professor Rosenau spoke of Judah Ibn Tibbon as translator who, he said, should be known beyond the circle of students of Rabbinical literature. Apart from his acquaintance and compilation of medieval and later Jewish information along the lines of religious-philosophical thought, by means of his translation from the original Arabic into Hebrew, Ibn Tibbon may be said to have created, through three Arab linguistic influences, a new lexicography of syntax for the Biblical language. This is true when strange Hebrew forms are explained in the light of Arabic terms and idiomatic expressions.

Dr. Morgenstern, President of the Hebrew Union College, discussed the Passover Matzoth Festival in the Biblical period. "Scholars," he said, "have generally recognized the Biblical Passover Festival developed out of a combination of two festivals originally independent of each other, the Passover festival, rooted in primitive pastoral life, beliefs and practices of the early Nomadic Israelites and the Matzoth Festival indigenous to the agricultural life and religious beliefs and practices from

## CONVERT POLTAVA TEMPLE INTO A SOVIET HALL

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Riga, Apr. 9.—The confiscation of a synagogue for the accommodation of the local Soviet is reported in despatches received here from Poltava.

A dispute concerning this temple has been going on for the last few years between the local Jewish section of the Communist party and the temple board, the Communists demanding that the temple be converted into a Communist school.

The authorities have now reached a compromise and the synagogue will not be turned into a Communist school, but will be used for the accommodation of the local Soviet.

The Jewish Communist press displays great indignation at the discovery that the government of Buriat, the Mongolian Soviet Republic, is supporting the local Hebrew schools, in accordance with the demands of the parents. The Central Bureau of the Jewish Section of the Communist Party intervened in the matter, demanding that the Hebrew schools be discontinued and Yiddish schools be introduced instead.

## Resents Idea of Conflict Between Anglo-Saxons and Others in America

The assertion made by Hugh A. Adams at a conference of patriotic societies that there is a great conflict in America between the Anglo-Saxons and other races, the recently arrived immigrants, for control of the country, is seen by the "Day" of April 9, as a utopian and an insult to immigrants.

"Not to speak of the fact," writes the paper, "that the freest immigration could not possibly bring about a state of affairs where the natives would be in the minority, the assertion is in general a piece of impudence."

"Since when is America the property of the Anglo-Saxons? Why are the Anglo-Saxons more privileged than other elements of the population?"

"America is a land that has been built up with human energy, by human hands and the human spirit. But many races and different people contributed to this process. No one people or race has more claim to America than any other people or race that helped create America."

## Reading and Samuel

The distinction of Jews as political administrators is discussed by the "Jewish Daily News" in an editorial on the occasion of the recent retirement of Lord Reading as viceroy of India. The paper draws a comparison between the roles of Lord Reading and Sir Herbert Samuel.

"The great difficulties encountered by Samuel in Palestine," the paper says, "were perhaps even more complicated than those which confronted Lord Reading. It was a situation unparalleled before in the history of High Commissioners. When two men like Reading and Samuel distinguish themselves in such a manner it proves again the abilities of the Jews even in the field of statesmanship, from which Jews were debarred so long."

## A Dip Into History

Maryland was one of the last states to remove the civil disabilities of its Jewish citizens even after it became part of the United States, a writer in the Baltimore "Evening Sun" points out, on the occasion of the celebration of the establishment of religious tolerance in that state.

"Is it not also remarkable," we read further, "that in Georgia which could not protect or give justice to Leo Frank a couple of years ago under Governor Slayton, forty Jewish immigrants were welcomed in Savannah by Gov. James Edward Oglethorpe on July 11, 1733. Spectacular also is the incident that Reuben Etting, a Jew, was appointed by President Jefferson in 1801 United States marshal for Maryland, whereas under Maryland State laws he could not have held the position even of a constable."

## DAVID A. BROWN REVIEWS PROGRESS TO DATE OF THE UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN

Communities Throughout Country Display Unparalleled Devotion to Relief Cause; Bases Report on Observations in Forty-Five States; S. O. S. Call Brought \$491,141

Drives are in progress in many hundred cities and towns in this country to raise local quotas accepted by them in the \$15,000,000 United Jewish Campaign, according to a report addressed by Chairman David A. Brown, to the 1200 members of the national committee in which he predicts that the original objective of the campaign will be left far behind and that the amount that will be raised will run close to \$25,000,000.

"Never in all the history of Jewish philanthropic effort in this country," says Mr. Brown in his report, "has there been such an outpouring of service and self-sacrifice, of loyalty and devotion, as has been displayed in this campaign. The great cry which has come to us from over the seas seems to have penetrated every Jewish heart and every Jewish soul to such an extent that all differences of opinion, all controversial questions which usually divide the Jews of this country into distinct groups, have been wiped out and the Jews of America present a solid front in a concerted movement to save their brethren of Eastern Europe.

"During the past six months, it has been my privilege to meet the representative Jews of forty-five states. I have seen how they reacted to this appeal. I have heard the words that have fallen from their lips—eloquent, burning words in which they have pledged time, effort, service, money to this cause. Scores and scores of men have thrust all their business aside to make this campaign their major business, until that business has been successfully accomplished."

Calling attention to the million dollars raised in Chicago, and the Campaign now in progress in New York City to raise \$6,000,000, Mr. Brown's report continues:

"Alabama, which has a quota of \$100,000, is organizing for a campaign toward the end of April; Arizona has already raised \$15,000 toward its quota of \$25,000; in California the campaign to raise \$750,000 starts in Los Angeles on April 15th; (the California Campaign is being conducted jointly with the United Palestine Appeal.) Throughout Canada, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, the Jews have been mobilized to raise \$250,000 within the first and the fifteenth of May.

"Colorado, New Mexico and Wyoming, which have decided to run their campaign as a joint effort, get into action on April 26th, to raise a joint total of \$190,000. The many Jewish communities of Connecticut, with a quota of \$350,000, are already in line, with local drives in actual progress. The Florida quota of \$350,000 seems to be assured, if one may judge by the results already obtained by the local drives now in progress," Mr. Brown states.

"On May 2nd, Georgia will set out to raise \$200,000 with a drive in Atlanta, with the understanding that all of the local drives must be over by June 1st.

The handful of Jews in Idaho are working hard to raise their quota of \$10,000. The sixteen zones of Illinois, exclusive of Chicago, which have accepted a quota of a half million dollars, are preparing for early action, and five of the zones are having their local drives at the present time. Indiana's campaign for \$300,000 begins the first week in June.

"States which hold their campaign this month are Kentucky, with a quota of \$200,000, April 11-17; Louisiana, \$350,000, April 11-17; Massachusetts, \$1,000,000; Mississippi, \$50,000; Montana, \$15,000; Nevada, \$10,000; North Carolina, \$200,000; North Dakota, \$50,000; Ohio, with the exception of Cincinnati, \$1,000,000; Oklahoma, \$175,000; Pennsylvania, \$3,000,000; South Carolina, \$50,000; Tennessee, \$125,000; Texas, \$350,000, with \$250,000 already raised; Kansas, \$100,000; Virginia,

## NO DISAGREEMENT BETWEEN AMERICAN ZIONISTS AND WEIZMANN, LIPSKY TELLS PRESS REPRESENTATIVES

Regrets Zionist Courtesies to Jabotinsky Created False Impression; Zionist Educational Movement Discussed

That the plan of extending the Jewish Agency has not been abandoned, and that Dr. Weizmann is in full agreement with the American Zionist Executive with regard to the policy it pursues in connection with this question, was the statement made by Mr. Louis Lipsky, president of the Zionist Organization of America, at a luncheon given Thursday by the Zionist Organization to representatives of the Jewish press.

"There has been no abandonment of the plan to extend the Jewish Agency, but we have come to the conclusion that the plan may have to be carried out on a different basis. Whatever we have said or done in this regard has been with the full knowledge and consent of Dr. Weizmann," Mr. Lipsky declared.

"All rumors concerning disagreement between the American Zionist Organization and Dr. Weizmann are absolutely baseless. We consider him the strongest personality in the Zionist movement and the only man capable of commanding authority. What we are engaged in doing is to reorganize the Zionist center, to give to the general Zionists in the movement that position which they deserve, in order that Dr. Weizmann as president may be surrounded by efficient administrators and advisors. It is unfortunate that the discussions which have taken place in this connection have coincided with Mr. Jabotinsky's stay in this country and that rumors were set afloat connecting Mr. Jabotinsky with these discussions."

"The Revisionists do not indicate a new direction for the Zionist movement to take. We are dealing with the realities of life and our program of action has to conform with the needs and possibilities of our movement. I can very well imagine that we could adopt one or two points emphasized by the Miz-

## GOVERNOR'S WIFE AIDS WOMEN'S DIVISION OF N. Y. UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN

Mrs. Walker, Mayor's Wife, Made Honorary Chairman

Mrs. Alfred E. Smith, wife of Governor Smith, and Mrs. James J. Walker, wife of New York's mayor, will serve in association with Mrs. Jacob H. rachi, one or two points emphasized by the Revisionists. Even the demand for Jewish military units in view of recent events in Palestine may receive justification which until now it did not have. If, for example, it were proven tomorrow that the Kutzotz will enable us to make Jewish settlers in Palestine self-sustaining, we would adopt this method despite the bourgeois views of many of the center group. I regret that the courtesies extended by us to Mr. Jabotinsky have in some quarters been construed as an endorsement of his program."

Mr. Lipsky dwelt at length on the membership campaign which is to be inaugurated in connection with the "Zionist Organization month" and the plan of the Zionist Organization for entering into educational work.

"If we want to win the Jewish youth of this country, we must not be neglectful of educational work. We cannot leave this field to other groups in American Jewish life," he said.

With an appeal to the newspapermen to support the Zionist Organization in its contemplated actions, Mr. Lipsky concluded his remarks.

In the discussion which developed later, several speakers voiced doubts as to the advisability of the Zionist Organization entering the field of educational work in America. This view was emphasized by Dr. A. Coralnick of "The Day." Mr. S. Erdberg of the "Jewish Daily News" criticized the manner in which the committee sponsoring the educational movement was composed. Mr. David Edelsberg, Dr. I. L. Brill of the "Jewish Daily News," S. Dingol, managing editor of "The Day," Sophie Irene Loeb, Dr. S. Melamed and L. Kusman participated in the discussion.

the pre-Israelite Canaanite inhabitant of Palestine. The original Passover Festival was celebrated in connection with the appearance of the new moon. The original Matzoth Festival was celebrated at the time of the spring equinox. Ultimately these two unrelated Festivals were combined." Dr. Morgenstern also discussed the possible time when this combination took place, under what circumstances and for what purposes. That beer and wine were favorite beverages from the earliest times and that a supply of both made up part of Noah's cargo in the Ark was disclosed by Paul Haupt, Professor of Assyriology at John Hopkins University.

These facts were substantiated through the translation of a tablet found in Ninevah by George Smith of the British Museum and restored by Professor Haupt. This tablet had previously been deciphered, but Dr. Haupt said his recent translation was more comprehensive.

The translation relates how Noah cut down trees in the jungle and laid the frame of his ark. The ark consisted of six decks, divided into seven compartments.

"The tablet read," said Professor Haupt. "For our food I slaughtered oxen and killed sheep day by day. With beer and brandy, oil and wine, I filled large jars as with water of a river."

religious observance. Fresh flowers will be kept on the altar at all times.

The chapel will have a seating capacity of 350, and individual seats will be installed after the manner of those in a Protestant Episcopal church in this city. The walls will be decorated with appropriate murals by well known artists.

There will be no lecture or pulpit in the chapel. It will be consecrated by the chosen representatives of all denominations and will be dedicated to the use of prayer and meditation.

Various religious organizations have already signified their intention of exhibiting in a part of the chapel to be set aside for the purpose. Among these societies are the American Tract Society, the American Bible Society, the Moody Bible Institute, the Christian Business Men's League, and the Catholic Historical Society.

G. B. St. John, who is in charge of this feature of the Exposition, has signified his intention of trying to obtain similar exhibitions from Jewish organizations.

For the first time in its history the Folk Shulen, a society that supports schools for the study of Yiddish and Hebrew and Jewish history and legend, will conduct a campaign in Philadelphia to raise \$25,000 for a maintenance and building fund.

The two week drive began with a banquet Tuesday night. The speakers included M. Katz, editor of "The Jewish World," who is chairman of the campaign; Professor Hyman Finkelman, of Temple University, and Dr. Yehuda Kaufman.

There are four Folk Shulen in Philadelphia.

\$200,000; Wisconsin, \$300,000; West Virginia, \$100,000; where campaigns are under way in the Wheeling zone, and preparations are now being made for campaigns in the Charleston zone.

"In May the following campaigns will take place: in Delaware with a quota of \$100,000, May 7-9; Iowa, \$200,000, May 1-14; Michigan, \$400,000, beginning with Detroit on May 3; Minnesota, \$300,000, May 2-9; Missouri, with the exception of St. Louis, \$700,000 and South Dakota, \$50,000, May 1-13," the report states.

"The New Jersey campaign, with a quota of \$750,000, swings into action in Newark on April 29th. Other local drives will be held simultaneously or during the early part of May.

"Arrangements are now under way to organize conferences preliminary to campaigns in the following states: Maine with a quota of \$40,000; Maryland, \$500,000; New Hampshire, \$25,000; New York State, outside of New York City, \$1,000,000, conference April 18; Oregon, \$200,000; Rhode Island, \$150,000; Vermont, \$10,000; Washington, \$150,000.

"I feel that I ought to comment also on the very fine response we have received at this office up to date to the S.O.S. which I broadcasted on March 17th, appealing to the National Committee, State and local committees to forward to this office at once at least 10 per cent of their first year's quota, in order that the startling conditions in Eastern Europe should be met immediately by some measure of relief. Up to the time this report is issued the actual total received in response to this call is \$491,141.17.

"A great part of this money has come from communities where campaigns have not yet been organized, and where the men to whom I have appealed have either personally advanced their own checks, or have negotiated loans from local banks. This is a splendid showing, but yet, I feel compelled to say that the response does not yet measure up to what we have the right to expect from the Jews of this country at this time.

"A large number of communities are still to be heard from and it is gratifying to know that many of them are making arrangements adequately to respond to this S.O.S. appeal at the earliest feasible moment.

"But, let it be distinctly understood that, whatever the Jews of this country may give, be it \$15,000,000 or \$50,000,000, we will still not have enough for the millions overseas who are going through all of the tortures of hell, and who, without our help, are doomed," the report concludes.
