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PALESTINE JEWRY WILL SUBMIT REPORT DIRECT TO LEAGUE COMMISSION

Weizmann to Confer with Emir Abdullah and Jovenel

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Apr. 13.—The voice of Palestine Jewry will be heard for the first time in international councils when the Permanent Mandates Commission of the League of Nations will hold its sessions in Geneva next June.

Besides the annual report of the World Zionist Organization on the progress in Palestine, the Vaad Leumi, the National Council of Palestine Jews, will send its report directly to the commission. It is also possible that a special delegation of the Vaad Leumi will proceed to Geneva at that time, it was learned here today.

Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, is proceeding today to Amman, the capital of Transjordan, to visit Emir Abdullah, the ruler of Transjordan.

Dr. Weizmann and Col. Frederick H. Kisch will go to Beirut next Sunday to confer with the French High Commissioner, Henri de Jovenel.

POLISH ORT CHANGES NAME ON GOVERNMENT'S REQUEST

Warsaw, Apr. 13.—The Polish branch of the Ort, the Jewish organization initiated in Russia for the purpose of directing the Jews into the trades and agriculture, will change its name, according to a resolution adopted at the annual Ort conference in session here.

The decision was taken in conformity with the request of the Polish government, which objected to the name Ort, in view of the fact that this name implies its Russian origin (the letters Ort are the initials of three Russian words, Obshchestvo Rasprostraneniya Truda).

The Polish branch will adopt the initials of the Polish equivalent for Society to Extend Professional Training and Agriculture Among the Jewish population.

THE CHIEF JEWISH CHAPLAIN OF LITHUANIAN ARMY DIES

Kovno, Apr. 13.—Rabbi Israel Kaplan, chief Jewish field chaplain of the Lithuanian army, died here yesterday at the age of forty-six.

His funeral took place today with military honors. High government officials attended the funeral.

500 JEWS LEAVE POLAND FOR PALESTINE TODAY

Warsaw, Apr. 13.—Five hundred Jewish emigrants will leave here for Palestine tomorrow.

A special train, which leaves the Warsaw station, will take the emigrants to Constanza where they will embark.

MORGENTHAU, OPPONENT OF POLITICAL ZIONISM, URGES NATIONAL PALESTINE LOAN

Loan Would Determine Country's Future; Praises Keren Hayesod but Denies Political Victory

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

Shanghai, Mar. 20.—The idea of a national loan for Palestine was again discussed by Henry Morgenthau, former United States Ambassador to Turkey, who arrived here on his tour around the world.

In an interview with Mr. Morgenthau the representative of "Israel's Messenger," Zionist paper of China, submitted to him a Jerusalem despatch of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency of last January in which Mr. Morgenthau described his impressions of Palestine when he revisited it and his enthusiasm for the proposed national loan.

Mr. Morgenthau admitted the correctness of the despatch but denied the statement which was "put in his mouth," he said, by the Agency, that the "Zionists have achieved a great political victory." That was untrue, he stated. "There was no such victory in sight," he declared, although he was fully prepared to admit that the "advance of Palestine since his last visit in 1914 was stupendous." This he attributed to the wonderful manner in which the Keren Hayesod was proceeding with the upbuilding of the country, although he felt that much could be done if "a national loan for Palestine" were floated. He was convinced that under half a dozen leading Jewish business men, it would be possible to determine Palestine's future, and all Jews would ultimately combine in a great effort to upbuild the country.

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DAMASCUS SURROUNDED BY REBELS, DESPATCH SAYS

London, Apr. 13.—Damascus is completely surrounded by the rebel forces, according to a despatch to the "Sunday Express" from its special correspondent in Damascus. The quarter, El Meidan, is in the hands of the rebels.

The correspondent of the "Sunday Express" confirms the recent report of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that while attending a funeral in Damascus, eight Jewish citizens were kidnapped by the rebels. Three of them were released immediately. The other five were released only after a ransom was paid by their families.

CUZA, THE RABID ROUMANIAN ANTI-SEMITIC, PROMISES TO DISCONTINUE PROPAGANDA

Promise Made When He Is Reinstated to Jassy Professorship

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Apr. 13.—Professor Alexander Cuza, for a generation leader of the anti-Semitic agitation in Roumania, has promised to discontinue his anti-Semitic propaganda.

This sensational news was sprung as a surprise to the Jewish citizens of Roumania today when it was announced that Cuza had been reinstated as professor in the University of Jassy.

Professor Cuza, President of the Christian Students' Organization, was to be brought up for trial on March 28 of last year on the charge of being involved in the murder of Monchu, the Jassy Chief of Police, by his constant incitement for the disturbances continually being carried out by the students at the Roumanian universities with the intention of forcing the Government to adopt the anti-Jewish policy of restricting the number of Jewish students at the universities. The decision to prosecute Professor Cuza followed the verdict of guilty pronounced against him by the Disciplinary Court of Jassy University which had been inquiring

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NEW ROUMANIAN MINISTER MAKES PROMISE TO JEWS

Bucharest, Apr. 13.—Betterment of the situation of the Jewish population in Bessarabia, the Russian province annexed to Roumania, was promised by M. Niza, the new Roumanian Minister for Bessarabia, to two Jewish delegations which appeared before him yesterday.

One delegation, representing the general Jewish community, and the other consisting of Zionist leaders, presented the case of the Jewish population to the new Minister who promised to favorably consider the needs of the Jewish population and to annul the order of the Bessarabian authorities which prohibited the use of Yiddish at public functions.

TWO JEWS ARE SUCCESSFUL IN MONTREAL ELECTIONS

SENATOR WADSWORTH WILL INTRODUCE NEW AMENDMENT

Asks for Admission of Wives and Children of Declarants Before July 1, 1924

Washington, Apr. 13.—Senator Wadsworth of New York is now preparing an amendment for a greatly modified form of relief for the admission of the wives and children of those aliens who took out their first papers prior to July 1, 1924, the number of same to be limited, however, to not more than thirty or forty thousand, in order to meet any opposition caused by the fear of an excessively large number of relatives who might be admissible under the unlimited number originally called for.

Senator Wadsworth will offer this amendment to the bill for the exemption of approximately five thousand alien veterans and their wives and children, which has been favorably reported by the Senate Immigration Committee, after the Wadsworth Bill was rejected. Senator Wadsworth feels, he stated, that the present temper of the Senate renders the outlook for his proposed amendment doubtful.

Action on the veterans' bill and a consequent decision upon the amendment is expected in a comparatively short time.

When questioned regarding the rejection Saturday by the Senate Immigration Committee of his relative exemption bill, Senator Wadsworth confirmed the extreme hostility which now prevails in the Senate against the further extension of immigration privileges.

order to create in Palestine "The Jewish National Homeland, but "A" homeland, without any emphasis being laid on the word "National." According to him, the Balfour Declaration was a mistake. According to Mr. Morgenthau Jews going to Palestine should eschew politics and talk more about cultural work and arts with a view to creating a spiritual centre only. What may happen say, after ten, twenty, thirty or forty years is not for us to determine, but must be left to future posterity to settle, he said. Mr. Morgenthau stated he believes he speaks for the elements of wealthy Jews in America and elsewhere, who are against political Zionism.

A third orthodox synagogue will be erected in New Orleans, La. The new synagogue which will be erected by the Sephardic community cost approximately \$60,000.

The President of this Congregation is Mr. Harry Russekoff.

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TEL-AVIV GIVES CORDIAL RECEPTION TO EGYPTIANS
