POLISH GOVERNMENT ANNULS KEHILLAH ELECTIONS ON AGUDATH ISRAEL REQUEST

Ministry of Education and Religions
Orders New Elections
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Apr. 15.—New elections to the praesidium of the Warsaw Kehillah were ordered by the Polish Ministry of Education and Religions.

At a recent meeting of the Kehillah Council, Deputy H. Farbstein and Mr. M. Feldstein, both Zionists, were elected president and vice-president respectively.

The Agudath Israel protested against this election in a memorandum submitted to the Ministry of Education and Religion. The Ministry annulled the elections and ordered new elections to be held.

COLONISTS' CONFERENCE REJECTS GREETINGS OF HE'CHALUTZ ORGANIZATION

Moscow, Apr. 15.—The greetings of the Central Committee of the He'chalutz, the Zionist pioneer society, to the conference of Jewish colonists, workers and artisans in Crimee, in session in Simferopol, was rejected by the conference by an overwhelming majority, the vote being 294 to 6.

Chalutzim and Zionist delegates to the conference were not permitted to speak. The Zionist Socialist group circulated a special proclamation, the purpose of which was to outline its attitude.

JEWISH AGRICULTURE BANK APPROVED BY SOVIETS

Moscow, Apr. 15.—The statutes of the Agro-Bank, the purpose of which will be to assist the Jewish colonization work in Russia, were approved by the All Union Finance Commissariat.

The preliminary steps for the organization of an agricultural bank were made in Moscow last October. The statute concerning the establishment is now passing through the last stage of official ratification. The Russian Central Agricultural Bank promised to enter the Jewish Agricultural Bank as the largest shareholder.

ROUMANIAN ANTI-SEMITES WILL RUN FOR ELECTION

Bucharest, Apr. 15.—Candidates of the anti-Semitic Cuza party will run for election in all Roumanian constituencies, according to an announcement made public today by the Christian Nation Defense League, of which Professor Alexander Cuza is leader.

The statement declared that the program of the League is not only anti-Semitism, but "the direction of public life on a new, moral basis."

NEW HILLEL FOUNDATION WILL BE ESTABLISHED AT UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN

700 Jewish Students Enrolled in Three
Existing Foundations
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cincinnati, Apr. 15.—Steps for the establishment of a B'nai Brith Hillel Foundation at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Michigan, were decided upon at the meeting of the Hillel Foundation Commission.

In presenting the summary of the activities of the B'nai Brith Hillel Foundation for the current year, Dr. Benjamin M. Frankel reported that the total enrollment in the three Foundations is seven hundred Jewish students. The work is done primarily through students' organizations comprising committees on dramatics, open forums, publicity, social welfare, Menorah, publications, recreational and social activities and religious education.

In all the Foundations both Reform and Orthodox services are held, Orthodox services being held on Friday and

JEWISH WORKERS REFUSE TO PARTICIPATE IN WARSAW CITY RELIEF COMMITTEE

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Apr. 15.—Representatives of Jewish labor have refused to participate in a relief committee formed by the city government of Warsaw for the purpose of coping with the immediate needs of the population.

The Government Commissariat invited the Jewish workers to participate in the Jewish section of the committee. In reply to this invitation Mr. Alter, labor leader, stated that the Jewish workers are unable to participate in this committee in view of the fact that they cannot raise funds because the Jewish workers have no money to contribute. In addition, they would not use a bourgeois committee for the distribution of the funds, Mr. Alter declared.

CONFERENCE ON JEWISH EDUCATION CALLED FOR MAY 16 IN PHILADELPHIA

The movement for the promotion of Jewish education in the United States, launched by the Zionist Organization of America, will take definite shape at a national conference which will take place on Sunday, May 16, at Philadelphia. Final arrangements for the conference are now under way.

A meeting of the Provisional Committee has been called for Sunday, April 18, at the Pennsylvania Hotel, New York, when final plans for the national conference in Philadelphia will be adopted.

Invitations to the conference are being extended to Jewish organizations and to leaders in Jewish public affairs throughout the country.

MIXED MARRIAGES INCREASE IN GERMANY, WHILE JEWISH MARRIAGES SHOW DECREASE

25% of Jewish Men Remain Unmarried
Because of Economic Conditions
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Apr. 15.—The number of marriages between Jews in Germany is decreasing, and the number of mixed marriages increasing, according to the figures drawn up by Herbert Philippstahl, published in the "Juedische Zeitung" of Breslau.

"Twelve thousand young Jews," he says, "were killed in the war, which meant a falling off in the Jewish marriage market. Then came the economic distress of the post-war period, the unemployment and the housing shortage. Many occupations are entirely closed to Jews. Big enterprises like the Siemens concern will not accept Jews. There are even companies owned by Jews which have no Jewish employees. Twenty-five of every 100 Jewish men in Germany remain unmarried, generally because they cannot afford marriage. Of those who do marry, many are marrying non-Jewish women."

The number of mixed marriages has doubled since the war. In 1901 there were 3,878 Jewish marriages and 552 mixed marriages (16.8%); in 1905, 3,905 Jewish and 805 mixed (20.5%); in 1910, 3,880 Jewish and 973 mixed (25%); in 1915, 1,098 Jewish and 1,078 mixed (97%); in 1920, 7,497 Jewish and 2,033 mixed (27.1%); in 1921, 5,617 Jewish and 1,753 mixed (31.2%); and in 1923, 4,833 Jewish and 1,813 mixed (37.5%). The rise in the number of mixed marriages in 1915 is accounted for by the wave of war marriages.

DANISH JEW WINS FIRST CHESS TOURNAMENT PRIZE

Berlin, Apr. 15.—The first prize in the international chess tournament which closed yesterday in Dresden was won by Nimzowitsch, a Danish Jew. He gained a remarkable victory, winning 8½ out of 9 parties.

The second prize was won by Aljechin, who won 7 parties. The third prize went to Rubenstein, who won 6½ parties.

SOCIAL WORKERS STRIKE IN VILNA IS GROWING

Vilna, Apr. 15.—The strike of the Jewish social workers was extended today to the personnel of the soup kitchen for intellectuals. The kitchen distributes 1300 meals daily.

The Executive of the Kehillah requested the strikers' committee to permit the cemetery employees to bury the dead. No reply has yet been received from the committee.

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SPECIMEN VOLUME OF NEW
JEWISH ENCYCLOPEDIA
IS PUBLISHED IN BERLIN

A specimen volume of the Encyclopedia Judaica, the new Jewish encyclopedia in Hebrew and German, published by the Eske Publishing Company of Berlin, has been received in the United States.

The encyclopedia, which, it is planned, will also appear in English, will consist of ten volumes of 800 pages each. Preparations for the issuance of the new encyclopedia have been under way for the last two years. The editorial staff, consisting of prominent Jewish and non-Jewish scholars, is headed by Dr. Jacob Klatzkin, Professor I. Elbogen, Professor M. Guttman, Professor Weil, Dr. H. Torczyner, Dr. Nahum Goldman and Dr. M. Solowieschik. Professors Louis Ginsburg, Israel Davidson, Alexander Marx, Harry Wolfson, and Louis Mann are among the American contributors to the encyclopedia.

Dr. Jacob Klatzkin and Dr. Goldman, who are in this country in the interests of the encyclopedia will be honored at a reception on Sunday, April 18. Addresses will be delivered by Louis Lipsky, Professor Wolfson and Dr. Max Raisin. The reception will be given at the Hias, New York, under the auspices of the Histadruth Ivrit. Abraham Goldberg, President of the Histadruth, will preside. The specimen volume contains a number of treatises on the subjects of Jewish Arts and crafts, the Alexandria Jewish community, Alchemy and the Jews. The volume is profusely illustrated.

Prize winners in a contest for contributors, conducted by Young Israel, were just announced by Miss Wehl, editor of the magazine, Young Israel which is a magazine for Jewish children published under the auspices of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, offered prizes of \$100 for the best article, \$50 for the best short story, \$50 for the best poem, \$100 for the best illustration appearing in its publication from April, 1925, to April, 1926.

Max Robin is the winner for the best article, Salomith Ich-Kishor, for the best story, Yossef Gaer, for the best poem, and Penina Kishor for the best illustration.

American Zionists Demand Equality
in Leadership

That the American Zionists must be given a larger share in the leadership of World Zionism in order to preserve the integrity of the World Zionist Organization, which is "gradually disintegrating into parties and factions," is the statement made by the "New Palestine," organ of the American Zionists, in its April 16 issue, which will appear today. In the editorial, headed "Let The Heathen Rage," is in the nature of a statement of the position of the American Zionists in regard to the present situation in the Zionist movement. The "New Palestine" resents the attitude of the London "Jewish Chronicle" toward Mr. Lipsky's recent assertion that American Zionists want fuller participation in the leadership of the movement and denounces the London "Jewish World," which, we are told, "sees in the overshadowing presence of American Zionism the potential dictator of Zionist policy" and which seeks "to create prejudices" between the Zionists of Europe and the Zionists of America.

Mr. Lipsky's reasons for demanding fuller leadership for American Zionism, are explained as follows:

"To stabilize the movement, and to place behind Dr. Weizmann, the acknowledged leader of the Organization, the intellectual as well as the moral strength of the Zionist Organization of America, it became necessary, in Mr. Lipsky's opinion, for American Zionists to participate more fully in the responsibilities of the leadership. If there are programs to be made, or policies to be devised the Zionists of America should not also be consulted, but they should be allowed to take the initiative. They should not always be the seconders of motions made by others, but also movers of motions on their own account and responsibility.

"It was not arrogance that dictated this statement. It was not an expression of great ambition on the part of American Zionists. This analysis of the situation, and the conclusion drawn from it, was dictated by a keen concern for the future of the Zionist Organization, was animated by a deep sense of responsibility. For what do we see going on in the Zionist movement? The Organization is gradually disintegrating into parties and factions. The factional spirit can scarcely be controlled. There are groups of Zionists, organized as parties, who are so engrossed in their party slogans and programs that they are willing to destroy anything that stands in the way of the assertion of their party rights.

"This is a state of affairs which we dare not allow to continue. It absorbs a larger part of our energies. It makes impossible the development of policies by any administration; for these same parties and factions appear at all Zionist councils and create the same diffi-

cult situation on every occasion. Government is elected, but Government is not permitted to rule. The Administration does not know where to find the authority whence will come a steady and certain, broad-minded and clear-visioned continuous support.

"This situation has produced the weakness of the Weizmann administration, not of Dr. Weizmann personally. The Herculean labors of Dr. Weizmann himself have not been able to change the situation.

"This is a frank statement of the attitude of American Zionists. It represents the truth of the situation. If any charge could be levelled against us, it is that we have been animated altogether too much by the spirit of humility and self-abnegation. To vulgarize the situation is an offense of the highest magnitude. To reduce it to dissatisfaction with Dr. Weizmann's leadership is to misunderstand, first, the relations existing between Dr. Weizmann and the American Zionist leadership, and, second, to underestimate the intellectual and moral calibre of Dr. Weizmann himself. We have given effective support to Dr. Weizmann at Zionist Congresses in his effort to establish a homogeneous Executive, and in all his struggles with factions. But if he is to be held in his position as President of an Organization worthy of the name, capable of making progress, an instrument with the ability to establish the Jewish National Home, our support must be given to him in such a form as to remove the possibility of a collapse which will affect him personally as leader, as well as the future of the Zionist movement. To free him for service untrammelled by unreasonable obstacles from within, to enable him to labor with a sense of secure support behind him, to liberate his mind from the worries and embarrassments that come with a weakened and confused Organization, is our object, and we have positive assurances that in pursuing this object we have Dr. Weizmann's unreserved personal approval."

The American Zionists, the "New Palestine" declares, refuse further to engage merely in the task of gathering funds without participating "upon a basis of equality in this readjustment."

"We represent one-fourth of the World Zionist Organization," the paper concludes. "It is a bit of silliness, as well as unfairness, to imagine that we shall allow the fact that we are bearing the financial burden for the past ten years to debar us from any field of Zionist endeavor or responsibility. We are not going to allow ourselves to be penalized for our single-minded devotion to our financial responsibilities. We are sure that the Zionists of Europe do not share the prejudices or the views of the 'Jewish World' in its absurd attempt to create prejudices between us and them."

POLISH ZIONISTS LAUNCH**ORGANIZATION MONTH**

65% OF UKRAINIAN JEWS PARTICIPATE IN ELECTIONS

Moscow, Apr. 15.—Elections to the Jewish Soviets in Ukrainian towns and villages were concluded, reports received here state.

Fifty to sixty per cent of the Jewish population participated in the elections.

Last year's officers of the Charity Chest of the fur industry were unanimously re-elected at a meeting of the directors. They are Michel Hersh, President; Max Cohen, Vice President; Adolph Engel, Treasurer; Simon J. Steiner, Secretary.

KAUFMAN LIBRARY OPENED IN HUNGARIAN ACADEMY;**RARE HEBREW MANUSCRIPTS**

Budapest, Mar. 19.—The collection of rare Hebrew manuscripts, first editions and incunabula left to the Hungarian Academy of Science by the late Professor David Kaufmann, who died in 1899, has been completely catalogued and is now open here at the Library of the Academy of Science.

The collection includes a number of priceless illustrated Haggadahs, Torah rolls and works of great importance as sources of Jewish history in the Middle Ages, especially in Hungary.

The exhibits have been carefully arranged in accordance with the catalogue of the collection which was drawn up during Prof. Kaufmann's lifetime. The arrangement of the collection is now so complete that it is already possible to send loan exhibitions from the collection abroad. Two important manuscripts have been sent to the Hebrew University in Jerusalem and one manuscript has been loaned to America.

Professor Kaufmann, who refused the offer of a professorship at the Jewish Theological Seminary in Cincinnati, preferring to accept instead the Chairs of History, Philosophy of Religion and Homiletics at the Budapest Rabbinical Seminary, a post which he held until his death, had in his library manuscripts of the first importance, incunabula and first editions, of which the Marco Mortara Library, which he acquired, formed the nucleus. As librarian of the Budapest Rabbinical Seminary he acquired the large library of Lelio della Torre of Padua, the library of the Seminary becoming by this addition one of the most valuable Hebrew libraries of Europe.

The bibliography of Prof. Kaufmann's works compiled by M. Brann in 1900 includes 546 items covering nearly every branch of Jewish science. His chief works included a survey of the Jewish and Arabic religious philosophy of the Middle Ages, "History of Jewish Religious Philosophy in the Middle Ages from Saddiah to Maimon," "The Last Expulsion of the Jews from Vienna," "The Families of Prague. According to the Epitaphs in the Old Jewish Cemetery in Prague," "Dr. Israel Conegliano and his Services to the Republic of Venice," "The History of Art in the Synagogues," the "History of Jewish Manuscript Illustration, etc."

Prof. Kaufmann was an active member of the Mekize Nirdamim, a society for the publication of old Hebrew manuscripts.

Julius Rosenwald has donated \$30,000 to be used by Prof. James H. Breasted in digging up and translating the inscriptions on the tombs of the Pharaohs of Egypt, it was announced by the board of trustees of the University of Chicago.

Prof. Breasted is now directing research work in the Valley of the Kings.

The Jewish Historical Society of Illinois has been extended an official invitation to participate in the festivities of the Sesqui-centennial Exposition in Philadelphia which is to take place this summer. The Jewish community of Philadelphia is to be host to the delegation that will come from the Historical Society.

120,000 JEWISH CHILDREN**IN RUSSIA AND POLAND****VICTIMS OF TUBERCULOSIS****New York Jewish Physicians Organize for United Jewish Campaign**

Nearly 120,000 Jewish school children in Russia and Poland have become victims of tuberculosis, according to cablegrams received by Commissioner of Health Louis L. Harris from Dr. Bernard Kahn, European Director of the Joint Distribution Committee, and Dr. Joseph A. Rosen, representative of the Joint Distribution Committee in Russia.

Dr. Harris read the cables at a meeting of Jewish physicians of Greater New York held in Hosack Hall, at which 100 physicians were present to discuss plans for supporting the New York \$6,000,000 United Jewish Campaign which will be held from April 25th to May 9th. Dr. Harris is Chairman of the Physicians and Surgeons Division of the Campaign.

Resolutions commending the United Jewish Campaign and assuring the active support of the Jewish physicians of New York were adopted.

Miss Irma May described the conditions in Poland observed by her on her three-months tour through the country.

Louis Marshall and David A. Brown addressed the meeting.

JEWISH ARTISANS EXHIBITION IS ARRANGED IN GERMANY

Berlin, Apr. 15.—An exhibition of work by Jewish master artisans, journeymen, artisans and apprentices will be held in Leipzig in May in connection with the conference of the Jewish Artisans' Union of Germany called for May 30th and 31st. The exhibition is intended to demonstrate the ability of the Jew as an artisan.

An appeal has just been issued by the Central Union of Jewish Artisans in Germany to all Jewish artisans in the country to help in setting up teaching centres for the Jewish youth.

Thousands of Jewish boys and girls, the appeal says, on leaving school, will be looking for a means of earning their livelihood. It is the duty of the Jewish master artisans to give the younger Jewish generation the opportunity of carrying on their work. Every Jewish master artisan in the country should take on one or more of these young Jews as apprentices.

The League for American Citizenship is arranging for field workers in citizenship to be located at P. S. 75, 25 Norfolk Street, every day next week, from 1 P. M. to 5 P. M. and from 8 P. M. to 10 P. M.

These field workers who will be found in the main entrance of the school, will give advice and assistance to all foreign born who seek to become citizens or who wish to secure their first papers. This is part of a drive the League is making throughout the city to reach those who have not had an opportunity to go downtown to fill in their applications.

Dr. Sam Burg, physician of San Antonio, Texas, and leader in Zionist circles in Texas, is leaving for Palestine where he will make his home.

Dr. Burg was born in Brody, Galicia, studied in Vienna, Austria, and was one of the first Academic Pioneers who joined the Zionist Movement, with Dr. Herzl.

JUDGE MACK AND RABBI LANDMAN DEBATE ZIONISM

A debate on Zionism and the attitude of Zionists toward the rebuilding of Palestine was held at the Men's Club of the Free Synagogue, 40 West Sixty-eighth Street, New York. Judge Julian W. Mack took the stand for Zionism and Rabbi Isaac Landman defended the views of the non-Zionists.

Judge Mack pictured the upbuilding of Palestine and the establishment there of a Jewish majority as a necessity to the development of Jewish culture and outstanding Jewish contributions to the world. He declared that Zionism sought that end as rapidly as possible. The Jews were the only people in the world without a home. He denied that he sought particularly a Jewish Free State or objected to Palestine's being a dominion of an empire, but sought a home or centre for Jews and their culture.

Rabbi Landman declared that Zionists pictured non-Zionists as opponents of the upbuilding of Palestine, but this was not the case, he said. Every Jew desired rehabilitation of Palestine, but the fault with Zionism, he declared, was the political element.

Rabbi Landman then declared: "Let the forthcoming Convention of the Zionist Organization of America declare definitely against the idea of Jewish nationalism as inherent in the ideal of Zionism. I will then stand by the offer I made to Samuel Untermyer in 1922, that I am prepared to devote the rest of my life, to work towards organizing American non-Zionists for Palestinian reconstruction. If the Zionist Organization cannot or will not make such a declaration, then non-Zionists cannot but conclude that Zionism places Jewish nationalism above the rehabilitation of Palestine."

Justice Joseph M. Proskauer, of the Supreme Court, was elected president of the Ninety-second Street Y.M.H.A., succeeding Sol M. Strock, who resigned, to accept the presidency of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies. As president of the organization, Justice Proskauer becomes head of the oldest Y.M.H.A. in the country, the Manhattan association having been founded in 1874. Justice Proskauer, until his election, was a trustee-representative of the Y.M.H.A. and the city-wide board, affiliation with any of the ninety-one constituent societies of the Federation, as an officer precluding eligibility as a representative of the general public on the board.

Since 1906, the Ninety-second Street Y.M.H.A. has had three presidents: Felix M. Warburg, who left the office to become the Federation's first president in 1918; Irving Lehman, who resigned to become associate Justice of the New York State Court of Appeals; and M. Strock, whom Justice Proskauer succeeds.

"Ivriah," the Mother's Branch of the Jewish Education Association, has issued a call to the Jewish mothers of New York, to enroll as workers for the cause of Jewish religious education, in order that it may be enabled to carry out its program of bringing 10,000 additional pupils into the Jewish religious schools of this city during 1926. The decision to issue a call for workers was made at a recent meeting of the organization.

Mrs. Joseph Leblang, well-known philanthropic and communal worker, is chairman of the committee which is to enroll the workers.

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ESPERANTO ASSOCIATION HONORS ITS FOUNDER

Warsaw, Apr. 15.—A memorial at the grave of Dr. Ludwig Zamenhoff, the author of the international language, Esperanto, erected by the International Esperanto Association, will be unveiled on April 18.

Dr. Bernard Drachman will preside. Among the speakers will be Senator Royal S. Copeland, Capt. N. Taylor Phillips, Dr. Cyrus Adler of Philadelphia, Congressman Emanuel Celler and Nathan D. Perlman, Hon. Jos. Barondess, Rabbi Samuel J. Levinson, Assemblyman Samuel Mandelbaum.

The twentieth anniversary of Tremont Temple, Congregation Gates of Mercy, at Grand Concourse and Burnside Ave., Bronx, N. Y., was celebrated during this week. Tremont Temple is the oldest congregation in the Bronx. It was started in 1906, when fourteen women organized the Tremont Sisterhood for the purpose of establishing a religious school for Jewish children in the sparsely populated Tremont section of the Bronx.

The present house of worship was dedicated in 1921. The congregation numbers about two hundred members. The religious school has a registration of 265, and the Sisterhood numbers two hundred and fifty.

The appeal urges individual members to render assistance to the campaign.

The town of Bardwell has a population of 1,500 with only a few Jewish residents.

A new chapel, part of the enlarged Temple Mishkan Tefila of Boston, was dedicated Sunday evening.

The new chapel is located within the present structure, but is a step toward the fulfillment of plans for an enlarged group of structures. Moses Michel is president of the Congregation.

In appreciation of services covering a period of twenty-five years the Trustees and Members of Congregation B'nai Jeshurun have subscribed to a fund to cover the expenses of a trip to Palestine for M. Z. Levinson, sexton of the synagogue, and his wife.

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
