## EGYPTIAN EDUCATORS ARE ENTERTAINED PALESTINE GOVERNMENT

Educational Cooperation Between Egypt and Palestine Urged (Tewish Telegraphic Agency) Jerusalem, Apr. 19 .- Prominent Jew-

ish and Arab citizens were present at the tea given by the Government in honor of the Egyptian teachers and notables who are visiting here.

Rashid Bey, heading the teachers' delegation, when interviewed by the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, declared that he was impressed with everything he saw in Palestine, particularly with the Hebrew High School of Haifa and the children's colony, the Jewish achievements in the country, particularly at Tel Aviv. He expressed the hope that mutual visits between Hebrew and Egyptian educators will take place annually and that a periodical conference between the two countries will be arranged for the purpose of discussing the educational problems of Palestine and Egypt.

LORD READING FOR HIS SERVICES IN INDIA King's Representative Meets Ex-Viceroy on Arrival in England

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Apr. 19 .- An expression of thanks on behalf of the Jewish community in Great Britain and on behalf of the Board of Jewish Deputies to Lord Reading, retiring viceroy of India, was rendered at the monthly meeting of the Board of Jewish Deputies last Sunday.

Mr. D'Avigdor Goldsmid, president of the Board, in commenting upon the arrival of Lord Reading and the reception accorded by the city of London, stated that thanks are due to Lord Reading for the honor conferred upon British Jewry by the way he represented the King in India.

Lord Reading, returning to London after five years, was met at Victoria Station by Lord Colebrooke, on be-Station by Lord Colebrooke, on De-half of King George, and by Lord Birkenhead and Sir Ronald Water-house, on behalf of Prime Minister Baldwin.

Interviewed by newspapermen on board the Channel boat from France, the ex-Viceroy said, "All's well with India.

He declared that the years he spent there were a time of anxiety and hard work, but added that affairs there were better than when he arrived. never knew when trouble was coming," he said, "or from what quarter it would come. Day and night I was at work."

NO CLEAR POLICY TO JEWS EXPECTED OF AVERESCU'S CABINET IN ROUMANIA Joint Foreign Committee in London

Submits Report on Jewish Situation (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) London, Apr. 19 .- No clear policy

with regard to the Jewish problem in Roumania is to be expected of the new Roumanian cabinet, according to the report of the Joint Foreign Committee submitted to the Board of Jewish Deputies at the monthly meeting of the body last Sunday. The new Roumanian cabinet con-

sists of representatives of all shades of political opinion, the report states. Although Prime Mniister Averescu is not an anti-Semite, the Minister of the Interior, M. Goga, is known as a strong anti-Semite. The anti-Semitic disorders have been checked, but forther developments are to be awaited.

Dr. Leon Reich, former president of the Club of Jewish Deputies in the Polish Sejm, reported to the meeting on the situation of the Jews in Poland.

Czernowitz, Apr. 19. -The conflicting attitude of the new Roumanian cabinet toward the Jewish question was illustrated by the decision of the military authorities in Bucharest to permit the Jewish Cultural League to recommence activities here. The League was closed last November by an order of the previous government.

At the same time, the school author-

ities of Bukowina have prohibited the use of Hebrew and Yiddish as the languages of instruction in the Jewish schools, although this is a violation of the educational law of 1922, according to which the teaching of certain subjects in Viddish and Hebrew is permitted. Representations to the central government in Bucharest will be made by the Jewish community of Bukowina.

Progress of the expedition, which seeks ancient records in the buried city was announced by Dr. Robert Kerr, acting head of the seminary.

Buried walls have been unearthed and high points, where temples of worship probably stood, have been located at the site of the city, which flourished in 1500 before the Christian era.

# 100,000 JEWS HAVE SETTLED IN PALESTINE SINCE WORLD WAR Fact is of Prime Historic Importance,

Weizmann Cables from Jerusalem: Achievements Largely Due to Interest of American Jews. Dr. Wise States Arrival of the first hundred thousand

new Jewish settlers in Palestine was announced in a cable message received by Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Chairman of the United Palestine Appeal, from Dr. Chaim Weizmann, President of the World Zionist Organization, who arrived recently in Palestine after a year's The settlement of the first hundred

thousand Jewish pioneers in Palestine since the war was hailed by Dr. Weizmann as a "fact of prime historic importance," but at the same time he emphasized the imperative necessity of increased remittances from America so that the forward work could continue and the unemployed absorbed into productive labor through the creation of new settlements.

:Dr. Weizmann in his cable reviews the situation in Palestine since his last visit a year ago and states:

"Hearty greetings and congratulations on excellent progress United Palestine Appeal. Immigration figures just compiled show one hundred thousand new lewish settlers entered Palestine from 1919 to 1925 a fact of prime historic importance. Hundred thousand released from Ghetto bondage to free national life. Settlers absorbed in growing in-dustries and agriculture. Common Hebrew language established despite many tongues of origin. School system and University growing. Second hundred thousand on way. World's interest our progress continues unabated. Relations with Atabs satisfactory. Cooperation increasing with growth Jewish constructive enterprises.

"Owing to the economic collapse of European Jewry continued increased remittances from America are imperative in order to absorb the unemployed into productive labor by creating new settlements and maintain immigration.

# in Paris

The plan of the Russian monarchists to take advantage of an expected upheaval in Europe and to reestablish Czarism in Russia with the aid of Czarism in Russia with the aid of Italy, Hungary, Poland, Roumania, Serbia and the German monarchists, has been bared in three documents which fell into the hands of a Soviet agent in Paris and which are published in the New York "Herald-Tribune" of April 18.

The documents, written by Grand Duke Nicholas, were distributed among the delegates of the recent Monarchist conference in Paris which elected the Grand Duke the new Czar of Russia. Outlining the program to be followed the Grand Duke predicted a Monarchist restoration not only in Russia but in Poland as well and expressed the expectation that an army of 150,000 would be mobilized suddenly to begin operations against the Soviets "when the catastrophe in Europe commences." We read among We read, among other things:

"Coming events throughout Europe, east of France, must be carefully studied. We must assume an attitude of opportunism and take advantage of these movements, catastrophic as they will be, and make immediate decisions.

"For that purpose, may I inform you that our movement has the full support of both the north and south German Monarchists. We have the unequivocal sympathy of Hungary, Roumania and Serbia. Poland even shows its sympathy materially. Austria only our sympathizers are not powerful. Czechoslovakia is the only country where we may encounter serious objection to the realization of our anticipations.

"I have been approached by a number of Turkish statesmen who have pledged me arms and men. But we must not come into any agreement with the Turks, for our century-old policy dictates that the destiny of future Russia will never be a happy one until we have driven the Turk from both shores of the Bosphorus. Our most powerful allies will be the Italians. I anticipate and I am reliably informed-that Italy's aspiration to redeem her ancient territory on the Turkish coast of the Mediterranean from the hands of the Turks will be realized early in 1927.

"If such an undertaking is not materialized immediately, even Italy's attempt will leave Europe in suspense and will necessitate the concentration of Soviet forces near the Turkish frontier, for the Soviet ambition is to make a gesture in support of Turkey. #### Jewish Social Relief Organizations in Europe Outline Aims

(By Our Berlin Correspondent) Berlin, Mar. 25 .- The plans for the future work of the Ort (Society for Promoting Agriculture and Handicrafts among the Jews), Oze (Society for Preserving the Health of the Jews) and Emigdirekt (United Jewish Emigration Committee), the three organizations of Jewish social relief which recently decided to unite for common action, were outlined to press representatives here today at a conference of the joint committee of the three bodies.

Dr. Singalowsy, who traced the organization and aims of the three separate federations, said that it was necessary for each of the three bodies to encompass the whole of Jewish life. "The Oze, for instance," he said, "could not restrict its activity to the healing of the sick. It must seek to prevent disease and epidemics, and consequently the whole social position of the Jewish masses came within its purview. Emigdirekt, too, had to work in close cooperation with the other federations if it was to solve the question of emigration. And similarly, the Ort could do its work only in close cooperation with the other two federations.

"These three federations had to care for 275 institutions of the most essen-tial character. The development of the work had gone so far that the local groups and the institutions themselves were able to cover the greatest part of their budgets. The capitals which the Joint Distribution Committee and other organizations had invested on the foundation of these institutions had borne rich interest. Nevertheless, the indescribable economic crisis in Eastern Europe had scaled up the local sources, and even if the prospects of the J. D. C. drive in America were justified, it would be impossible in view of the huge demands to place all hopes upon the J. D. C. The Jews of Western Europe must not withdraw from their duty of saving the East European Jewish masses from the annihilation which threatens them," Dr. Singalowsky emphasized.

Dr. Tcherikower, who reported on the working system of the three organizations, said that the Ort is directing 70 local organizations and 67 schools for technical training with 5,500 pupils, maintaining continuation training courses for artisans, and in recent years, with the assistance of the J. D. C., has supported about 11,000 Jewish peasant families and granted to 4,000 Jewish working class families credits in the form of raw material and machinery.

The budget for 1925 amounted to \$220,000

#### IN NATIONWIDE DRIVES FOR PALESTINE AND RELIEF

Newark and Columbus, O., Launch Joint Drives

(Tewish Daily Bulletin)

Columbus, Ohio, Apr. 19.-The campaign for a quarter million dollars for the Jewish Chest Appeal which includes the United Jewish Campaign, the United Palestine Appeal, the local Talmud Torah and the B'nai B'rith orphan home, will be launched tomorrow night at a mass meeting. Over one hundred thousand dollars has been received in advance pledges.

Rabbi James Heller of Cincinnati will be the principal speaker at the mass meeting.

Williamsport, Pa., Apr. 19.-The sum of \$18,000, the largest sum ever contributed by this community to any Jewish purpose, was pledged to the United Jewish Campaign at a meeting here. This sum represents almost three times the amount originally set as the quota for this city.

Mr. Henry Myers was chairman of the meeting.

Newark, N. J., Apr. 19.—Despite the fact that the formal opening of this city's joint drive for \$600,000 in behalf of the United Jewish Campaign, United Palestine Appeal and local Conference of lewish Charities is more than five weeks' away, \$133,350 or nearly one-fourth of the total amount was subscribed at a dinner of prominent Jewish citizens held at the Progress Club

The initiative, in the pledges of ini-tial gifts at the dinner, was taken by Felix Fuld and Louis Bamberger, prominent merchants and philanthropists. Mr. Fuld who presided, declared that he and Mr. Bamberger had decided to contribute \$30,000 each. Jointly their subscription will be \$60,000 or 10 per cent of the total amount to be raised.

A subscription of \$25,000 from Michael, Albert and Benjamin Hollander, was announced. Nathaniel King. president of the Temple B'nai Jeshurun, pledged \$10,000. Joseph Fish and Jack pledged \$10,000. Meyer each pledged \$3,000, and I. Dimond and Brother, \$2,500.

The principal speaker at the dinner was David A. Brown, national chair-man of the United Jewish Campaign.

Other speakers were Supreme Court Justice Samuel Kalisch, Aaron Levinstone and Morris Scheck, of Newark. Mr. Scheck is chairman of the United Iewish Appeal.

Be-tween 1921 and 1925, the Departments of the Hias and the Emigdirekt trans-mitted 21 million dollars to emigrants from their American relatives.
