MISSIONARIES PLAN WORLD WIDE ATTACK ON ZIONISM; CHIEF ARRIVES IN THE U. S.

Will Hold Buffalo Conference; Converts Organized in Alliance of "Hebrew Christians"

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Apr. 21.—A world wide effort to increase the number of converts to Christianity among Jews is being planned by a group of converts terming themselves the International Hebrew Christian Alliance. Conferences in all parts of the world are to take place.

Sir Leon Levinson, president of the Alliance, has gone to the United States to participate in a converts' convention which is to take place in Buffalo, N. Y., April 25 to May 1.

Following the conclusion of the Buffalo conference, the president of the Alliance will, it was announced here, proceed to Cologne where a conference of converted Jews in Germany will take place.

Sir Leon Levinson, president of the International Hebrew Christian Alliance, arrived in New York yesterday. In an interview with the representative of the "New York Times," Sir Leon claimed that there are about 150,000 Jews who have been converted to Christianity throughout the world and that about 50,000 had been converted since the signing of the World War peace treaty.

SETTLERS RETURN TO COLONIES FROM TOWNS. AGROJOINT REPORT SAYS

Moscow, Apr. 21.—All Jewish settlers who returned to their home towns for the winter have gone back to the colonies with their families, according to a report of Mr. Lubarsky, agricultural expert, who is supervising the settlement work in the District of Cherson, addressed to the headquarters of the Agrojoint, the agency of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee.

The thirty-five colonies in the District of Cherson are almost filled; 2,600 Jewish families constitute the population of the colonies of this district.

The winter crops in the districts are good in some places, and satisfactory in others. Horses, implements and seeds are available in sufficient quantity. The colonists need loans for the purchase of cattle. House building is advancing rapidly. There is a scarcity of food and fodder pending the new harvest, the report states.

EARL OF READING MADE MARQUIS BY KING GEORGE

London, Apr. 21.—King George V conferred the title of Marquis on the Earl of Reading, in recognition of his services as viceroy of India. Lord Reading is the first Jew in the British peerage to bear this title.

PALESTINE RECONSTRUCTION IS A SPLENDID PLAN, SIR MATTHEW NATHAN SAYS

Governor of Queensland, Mentioned for Palestine Post, Says Jews Must Support Movement

Sir Matthew Nathan commented on recent developments in Palestine when interviewed yesterday at the Gotham Hotel by the representatives of the "Jewish Daily Bulletin." Sir Matthew, who is one of the prominent British administrators and former governor of Queensland, Australia, is in New York on his way to England. When Sir Herbert Samuel was about to retire from his office as High Commissioner of Palestine, the name of Sir Matthew Nathan was mentioned as a prospective candidate for the Palestine High Commissioner. Sir Matthew stated that no offer of this appointment had been made to him and he saw no advantage in now discussing whether he would have accepted it if it had been.

Sir Matthew, a member of one of the most prominent Jewish families in Great Britain, held important administrative positions under the British government when Sir Herbert Samuel was Postmaster General.

"People of the Jewish race or of the Jewish religion or of both, who have resided in countries such as those that make up the British Empire, where they enjoy complete equality with their fellow citizens, will certainly not desire to change their present nationality or permanently to leave the countries that they love," Sir Matthew declared.

RACE HATRED DENOUNCED BY NOTED EDUCATORS AT PHILADELPHIA CONFERENCE

Philadelphia, Apr. 21.—Racial hatred and the spreading of prejudice propaganda in the United States were denounced by some of the foremost American historians and other educators at a meeting called here for the purpose of conferring on the teaching of history with a view to international understanding.

The Council of Jewish Women, the Baptist Publication Society, the Young Men's Hebrew Association, the Young Men's Christian Association, the Friends' (Quakers) Peace Committee, and other prominent organizations recently organized a Peace Council, and it is under the auspices of this organization that the conference on history is being held. A speaker at one of the sessions was Dr. Solomon Solis-Cohen. "Anti-Rad propagandists and members of the Ku Klux Klan represent the type that does not recognize facts, but prefers to believe in bunk," said Dr. J. Montgomery Gambrill, professor of history in Teachers' College, Columbia University.

CONVENTION SESSIONS OF UNITED SYNAGOGUE CLOSED IN BALTIMORE

Rejects Resolution to Cooperate in National Education Conference Sponsored by Zionists

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Baltimore, Md., Apr. 21.—A decision not to cooperate in the forthcoming national conference on Jewish education, called at the initiative of the Zionist Organization of America, was taken at the annual convention of the United Synagogue of America, the last day of its sessions here.

A resolution to commend the Zionist educational movement was voted down. The delegates also tabled a resolution that the United Synagogue cooperate with other organizations to test the legality of teaching religious subjects in public schools.

A resolution was adopted recommending to the various communities, the organization of "Vaade Kashrus" for the supervision of the supply of Kosher foodstuffs. The convention referred to the executive council a resolution that the constituent congregations of the various States be urged to exert influence upon their State legislatures to have Kosher laws enacted, similar to the one now in force in New York.

Dr. Herman Abramowitz of Montreal, Canada, was elected president of the United Synagogue of America at its annual convention today. Dr. Elias L. Solomon of New York, the retiring president, was named honorary president.

FATHER GAUDENZIO ORFALI IS KILLED IN ACCIDENT ON WAY FROM CAPERNAUM

Supervised Reconstruction of Ancient
Synagogue; Was Friend of Zionism

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Apr. 21.—Father Gaudenzio Orfali, Oriental scholar and counselor of the Board of Antiquities in Palestine, was killed last night in an automobile accident, when he was proceeding from Capernaum to attend the sessions of the international archaeological congress, now being held in Beirut.

Father Orfali, who was the dean of the Franciscan Archaeological School, supervised the work of restoring the ancient synagogue in Capernaum, where Jesus of Nazareth first addressed the Galileans. The work of restoring the synagogue was undertaken by the franciscans.

Father Orfali, who organized the Palestine Pavilion for the Catholic Missionary Exhibition recently held on the grounds of the Vatican, was known for his pro-Zionist sympathies. When the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency interviewed him in Rome last January he declared: "It is wrong to confuse ethnological and religious questions with political tendencies. I have never observed a lack of respect toward the Christian faith, the holy sites and Christian traditions, on the part of the Jewish colonists in Palestine."

"I reported to the Pope on the present situation in Palestine and His Holiness agreed with my views. Only Jewish work, capital and intellectuality will be able to revive Palestine and make it create new spiritual values for the world," Father Orfali had declared.

DR. I. FREUND'S FIFTIETH BIRTHDAY CELEBRATED BY JEWS IN GERMANY

Berlin, Apr. 11.—Dr. Ismar Freund, member of the Council of the Prussian Federation of Jewish Communities and lecturer at the Seminary for Jewish Science, is celebrating his fiftieth birthday today.

Born on April 11th, 1878, in Breslau, Dr. Freund studied at the Breslau University and the Breslau Rabbinical Seminary. He became lecturer at the Berlin Seminary in 1905. In 1908 he published his work, "The Legal Position of the German Jews in the Prussian School System." This was followed the same year by his "History and Emancipation of the Jews in Prussia" in two volumes, and in 1911 he published his "State, Church and Judaism in Prussia." All these works are intended as sources for a big work on which Dr. Freund is engaged, "The History and a Systematic Statement on the State and Church Rights of the Jews in Germany," projected as a complete statement on the legal position of the Jews in all the German States.

Dr. Freund took a leading part in the organization of the Federation of German Jews. He is the author of the constitution of the Federation and of the constitution of the Federation of Prussian Jewish Communities. He has for many years been on the Executive of the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith. His work, "Jew Hatred," published by this organization has appeared in many editions.

LO.E.B. CONVENTION URGES NEW HILL FOUNDATION

Beaumont, Texas, Apr. 21.—A resolution urging the establishment of a Hill Foundation at the University of Texas, at Austin, was adopted at the last day's session of the Convention of District Grand Lodge No. 1 of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith.

Local lodges were urged to institute a budget system for the various Jewish activities throughout the United States and for the specific B'nai B'rith institutions.

On the Results of New York's Palestine Appeal Drive

The successful conclusion of the New York drive for the United Palestine Appeal is regarded by the "Day" of April 21, as especially noteworthy in view of the exceptional difficulties which confronted the Palestine Appeal campaign.

"The campaign took place in a trying time," the paper asserts. "The campaign leadership was isolated both from the left and the right. The ultra-orthodox jumped at an unhappy expression of Dr. Wise and freed themselves from the work. The Reform Jews did likewise: they too jumped at words and threw the responsibility to Palestine off their shoulders."

"And yet, in spite of all this, the campaign was a success. The drive in New York this year was more successful than last year—more successful by a sum of \$600,000. This was due of course not to the attitude of the two wings referred to but to the unity of all Zionist funds. Whereas last year, when each fund had its own drive, the total for all of them combined reached only about \$800,000, this year's total is \$1,400,000. This is a colossal sum under any circumstances. Under the circumstances of this year it acquires a much bigger importance and significance."

"World" Correspondent Sees Polish Government Responsible for Success or Failure of Agreement

Whether the Polish-Jewish Agreement is to remain a dead letter or be converted into a vital factor for bettering the Jewish situation and improving the relations between Poles and Jews, is entirely up to the Polish government, according to the special correspondent of the New York "World." Writing from Warsaw under date of April 1 the correspondent outlines the circumstances which led to the Polish-Jewish Agreement and observes ("The World," April 18):

"To the Polish Government it meant nothing else than a declaration of a new nationalistic policy comparable only to the new economic policy of Lenin in Russia. Next to this the greatest achievement of the 'Jewish Polish Locarno' up till now is the abatement of the daily barrage of anti-Semitic propaganda in the Polish press. To be sure, one finds enough of anti-Semitic agitation in the Polish newspapers even now, but anti-Semitism has at least ceased to be the only feature of Polish journalism."

"Apart from this change of general tone, however, the Government has so far done but little to justify the expectations and even the promises of the Understanding. It granted to the

UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL CELEBRATES SUCCESSFUL CONCLUSION IN NEW YORK

\$1,404,268 Raised; Nathan Straus Charges Wealthy with Reluctance to Give; Dr. Wise Urges Zionist Participation in United Jewish Campaign

The amount of \$1,404,268.86 was raised by New York Jewry for the United Palestine Appeal which had set a quota of \$1,500,000 for New York City, it was announced by Morris Zeldin, director of the United Palestine Appeal in New York, at a dinner at the Hotel Astor Tuesday night, marking the conclusion of the New York drive.

Nathan Straus, Louis Lipsky, Dr. Stephen Wise, Chaim Nachman Bialik, Emanuel Neumann, Morris Zeldin, Benjamin Winter, Dr. Schmarya Levin and Dr. Israel Goldstein addressed the gathering, which included over 800 campaign workers of the various districts throughout the city.

Benjamin Winter, chairman of the United Palestine Appeal drive for New York City, opened the proceedings and handed over the gavel to Louis Lipsky, who acted as chairman of the evening.

Mr. Lipsky, in his opening remarks, reviewed the situation preceding the inauguration of the United Palestine Appeal. The United Palestine Appeal, because of the unification of the forces and placing Palestine in the center of attention, succeeded not only in maintaining the interest of American Jewry in the rebuilding of Palestine, but also in extending the effort, he said. The receipts of the United Palestine Appeal this year are much larger than in preceding years. Every campaign for Palestine brings additional strength and prepares for the success of the forthcoming campaign. The Zionist workers who were in the appeal are glad that they were in it and that they emerged triumphantly, Mr. Lipsky declared.

Nathan Straus stirred the gathering with a short address in which he urged greater interest of American Jews in the rebuilding of Palestine. The period of education in giving has passed and the time for action has arrived, he stated.

Mr. Lipsky read the text of a letter Mr. Straus addressed to David A. Brown, national chairman of the United Jewish Campaign, in which Mr. Straus declares that the raising of the \$15,000,000 should not be difficult if those American Jews who acquired wealth in the last 25 years would give in proportion to their wealth. He charged the wealthy with reluctance to fulfill their duty.

Dr. Stephen S. Wise, national chairman of the United Palestine Appeal, reviewed the difficult period through which the United Palestine Appeal went, beginning with September 13. He urged the Zionist workers to participate in the United Jewish Campaign.

"There is no need to urge our fellow Zionists to do this. We Zionists always fulfill our duty. The difference between us and the others is this: We Zionists work for the present with a view toward the future, while the others

work only for the present. It is the duty of every Zionist to help to bring temporary and palliative relief to our brethren in Eastern Europe, at the same time continuing the work for building the Jewish future in Palestine," he stated.

"Tomorrow, Wednesday, April 21st is the fifth anniversary of the establishment of the Keren Hayesod in the United States. Great progress has been made since then. The results achieved in the present campaign in New York are four times the sums obtained in New York in the first campaign for the Keren Hayesod," Mr. Neumann stated.

"I am certain that in the next few years the progress will be even more striking and that we will come to the Jews of New York and ask them for as large a sum as we are now asking the Jews all over the country. I am certain too, that they will give it.

"Our campaign for this year in New York has now closed and the relief campaign for three years is about to open. Although we have had certain differences with those who are prominently connected with the relief effort, and although they have withheld their support in our campaign, we will nevertheless, not withhold our support and there will be no retaliation at the hands of Zionists at the expense of suffering Jewry.

"The attitude still maintained by certain anti-Zionists forces on one the impression that they are possessed, as it were, with a kind of a Dybbuk which has to be exorcised by the use of texts and the blowing of the shofar. These texts are being created in Palestine. We will use them to exorcise their Dybbuk and the blowing of the Shofar Shel Moshiah, will provide the other required means.

"I feel convinced that those who are staying out of the work for Palestine are missing a great deal of pleasure and gratification. There is a symphony that issues from Palestine to which these people are not listening and from the joy of which they are depriving themselves. It's true, of course, that some of them have no ear for music. But Palestine is in the air and they had better tune in," Mr. Neumann declared.

JEWISH COLLEGE PROPOSED FOR SOUTHERN FRANCE

Paris, Apr. 21.—A proposal to establish a Jewish College at Montpellier in Southern France, where Indian and American colleges are already in existence, has been made by Prof. Geddes. Prof. Geddes offered to house six students free for a year, if the World Union of Jewish Students arranges for the establishment of the college.

OVER \$1,000,000 LIFE INSURANCE WRITTEN IN PALESTINE BY JUDEA INSURANCE COMPANY

Jerusalem, Apr. 21.—The Judea Insurance Company, Ltd., the Palestinian Jewish Insurance Company, for the first ten months of its activity in Palestine has written more than \$1,000,000 life insurance, according to an announcement made by Mr. Nathan Chasan and Mr. Jacob Miller, Resident Director and General Manager respectively of the Judea Insurance Company, Ltd.

Sixteen first mortgages on homes in various parts of Palestine, aggregating an amount of \$50,500 have been granted by the Judea Insurance Company out of its capital and premiums. Of its reserve \$17,000 has been invested in the bonds of the municipality of Tel-Aviv.

The Cooperative Loan and Savings Bank of Palestine, of which Mordecai ben Hillel HaCohen is President, and which operates on the same principle as the Building and Loan Associations of New Jersey and Pennsylvania, has concluded a contract with the Judea Insurance Company, Ltd., whereby the Bank accepts installment payments of premiums on policies from all of its shareholding members who have obligated themselves en masse to take out life insurance policies of not less than \$1500 each. This represents the largest single life insurance contract consummated in the Near East. A clause in the contract provides that the Judea Insurance Company, Ltd., undertakes to furnish first mortgages on improved real estate in Palestine, owned by the Cooperative Loan and Savings Bank, and its members.

WOMEN'S WEAR DIVISION PLEDGES \$25,000 TO N. Y. UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN

The sum of \$25,000 was pledged at a special meeting of the Women's Wear Division of the United Jewish Campaign. Approximately 200 members affiliated with the various sub-committees of the Women's Wear Division were present. Moses Mossesohn presided. The meeting was addressed by David A. Brown, national chairman of the United Jewish Campaign.

Announcement was made by David M. Bressler, vice-chairman of the United Jewish Campaign of New York, of the organization of the East Side under the leadership of Judge Max S. Levine, president of the Grand Street Boys. Headquarters have been opened at 133 Second Avenue.

One of the largest special committees formed for the Trade Division of the United Jewish Campaign of New York, was organized at a meeting at the drive headquarters.

Fourteen New York theatrical producers and two stars accepted office as co-chairmen of the Theatrical Committee.

clared. "I am satisfied, however, that the Jewish National Home, being made possible in Palestine through the administration of that country under mandate from the League of Nations, should be a tremendous boon to those who go there from the East European countries where they have suffered oppression. The immigration of such Jews to Palestine and their settlement on the land in that country is a splendid scheme deserving of every support from their brethren who have lived under happier conditions. I agree that a national language will contribute greatly to the creation of a national home and that the language of their literature and of their prayers is the natural one for a people to adopt for this purpose," he stated.

Asked as to the status of the Jewish community in Australia, Sir Matthew stated that the Jews in Australia, as a part of the British Empire, the commonwealth of nations, enjoy a similar status to that of the Jews in Great Britain. "Some of our co-religionists hold high positions in the various states and are held in high esteem by the people."

Asked whether there is a possibility for Jewish immigration to Australia, Sir Matthew stated that the general policy of the Australian government is to facilitate the admission of producers, mainly agricultural workers. "I have lived in agricultural Queensland for five years and I have great admiration for the primary producer. His is a hard but attractive life," he said.

Jews certain small concessions, chiefly relating to Jewish religious life, but it did nothing as yet as far as the abolition of the economic discriminations of the Jews in Poland is concerned, which have always been the chief subject of Jewish complaint.

"This has quite naturally led to dissatisfaction and to a growing suspicion in certain Jewish circles that the Understanding is not the result of a sincere change of heart on the part of the Government toward the Jews, but that it is only another mode of propaganda devised by the Government to white wash its name abroad in order to obtain a foreign loan more easily. These suspicions, aggravated by sufferings resulting from an economic catastrophe the like of which Poland has never seen yet, are chiefly responsible for the crisis which has arisen now, and which has nearly wrecked the entire interesting political experiment."

Describing the economic crisis in Poland the "World" correspondent emphasizes that "in the midst of these sufferings the Government does not cease to differentiate between Jews and Poles," and concludes thus:

"The fate of the 'Understanding' now lies with the Polish Government. It can make of it what it pleases: an interesting curiosity, or a strong moral force in the relationship between Jews and Poles, as well as a guide for the treatment of other minority problems in Europe."
