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## ROUMANIA CONCLUDES PACT WITH MINORITIES. VIENNA REPORTS STATE

Jews Said to Be Included in Agreement Made By Averescu Cabinet  
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Apr. 27.—An agreement between the governing party in Roumania and the national minorities, including the Jews, was concluded by General Averescu, the Prime Minister, according to reports of the Bucharest press.

By the agreement, the Jewish population in Roumania will be enabled to send eight representatives to the Roumanian parliament.

On the other hand, a news despatch from Bucharest to the "Neue Freie Presse" states that the negotiations with the Jewish representatives failed, because Averescu declined to recognize the Jewish population as a national minority.

## MANY CASUALTIES IN 1925 AMONG JEWS IN POLAND. STATISTICS INDICATE

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Apr. 27.—The unusually large number of casualties among the Jewish population in Warsaw during 1925 was made known by official statistics published here today.

The records show that during the year 22 Jews died from poisoning, 4 drowned, 10 were burned to death, 22 died from falls through windows, 9 choked to death, 6 died of pistol wounds and 8 by inhaling gas. These casualties included a great number of suicides.

## FINANCIAL COMPANY GRANTS \$3,000,000 LOAN FOR PALESTINE

Jerusalem, Apr. 27.—The granting of a loan of \$3,000,000 for house building purposes in Palestine was announced here by the Syndicate Levant, a Paris company.

A preliminary agreement on the loan was signed here yesterday by representatives of Jewish house building societies and the Syndicate Levant.

## RABBI PLOZKI LEAVES FOR THE UNITED STATES

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Apr. 27.—Rabbi Meir Don Plozki, chairman of the Executive Committee of the Union of Rabbis in Poland and leader of the Agudath Israel in Poland, left today for the United States.

It was stated that the purpose of his journey was in the interests of the Keren Ha'torah, the religious fund of the organization.

## SOUTH AFRICAN LEAGUE OF GENTILES RENEWS ANTI-SEMITIC ACTIVITY

Anti-Semitic Concert in Johannesburg to Precede Sokolow's Arrival  
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Johannesburg, Apr. 27.—Since the big campaign of the League of Gentiles last December very little has been heard of the League and its movement against the Jews. Its activities, it is stated, however, have been continued secretly. Anti-Semitic pamphlets have been circulated among Gentiles in Jewish employment. Recently at a political conference a delegate made a virulent anti-Semitic speech, to which several Jewish delegates present strongly objected. The League of Gentiles telegraphed to the anti-Semitic speaker commending him for his speech.

Placards have now been posted up in the city announcing a concert to be held in the Town Hall under the auspices of the League of Gentiles' Benevolent and Protection Society, and urging the citizens of Johannesburg to come and hear the truth about the Jews. The concert is to be held on a date just ahead of the arrival of Mr. Nahum Sokolow in South Africa to open the Zionist conference.

## MANCHURIAN JEWISH POPULATION EMIGRATING RAPIDLY TO MONGOLIA

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Harbin, Apr. 27.—The Jewish emigration to Mongolia from the town of Manchouli, in Manchuria, on the borders of Soviet Russia, which not long ago had a very large Jewish population, has during the past year grown to such an extent that the Jewish population has now decreased by half. All the emigration has been from among the younger and more energetic part of the population, with the result that the Jewish communal life in Manchouli is practically dying out. All Jewish social activity has ceased.

Manchouli is a transmigration centre for large numbers of Jews proceeding from Soviet Russia through Manchuria. Previously they were looked after by the local Jewish community who saw to it that they should be sent on to their destinations in Harbin, Tientsin, Shanghai, etc. This work has now been almost completely stopped.

## GLICENSTEIN HONORED AT INTERNATIONAL ART EXHIBIT

Venice, Apr. 27.—A salon d'honneur was allotted to the works of Henryk Glicenstein, well-known Polish Jewish sculptor, at the International Art Exhibition opened here yesterday by King Victor Emmanuel.

The King congratulated the sculptor on his work.

## JEWISH SEJM DEPUTIES WILL OPPOSE POLISH GOVERNMENT BUDGET

Take No Action on P. P. S. Proposal to Join Opposition  
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Apr. 27.—The attitude of the Club of Jewish Deputies in the Polish Sejm toward the present situation in the Polish cabinet was discussed at a closed meeting of the Club today.

No official statement was issued following the meeting, but it was learned that Deputy A. Hartglass, president of the Club, reported to the members the result of his conferences with Prime Minister Skrzynski concerning the demands of the Jewish population and discussion ensued. The proposal of the Polish Socialist Party (P.P.S.), inviting the Club of Jewish Deputies to join the united opposition, was not acted upon. It was understood that the discussion was mainly devoted to defining the attitude of the Club toward the provisional budget for the months May and June, proposed by the government. It was decided that at today's session of the sejm, a declaration on behalf of the Club be read, declaring that the Club would vote against the budget for the following reasons:

1. The figures proposed by the government are not in conformity with a real budget policy and seem to continue the policy of the Grabski government;
2. The Jewish population is suffering from heavy pressure of taxation, in addition to being compelled by the Sunday Compulsory Closing Law not to work two days a week;
3. The Jewish youth finds it extremely difficult to gain admission to the state schools, while the development of private Jewish schools is hampered;
4. The Club of Jewish

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## POLISH CONCESSION LAW WILL GO INTO EFFECT. GOVERNMENT STATES

Threatens Economic Existence of  
30,000 Jewish Families; Postpone-  
ment Was Part of Polish  
Jewish Agreement

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)  
Warsaw, Apr. 15.—The concession law, which threatened the economic existence of 30,000 Jewish families, the carrying out of which was postponed at the request of the Jewish deputies in connection with the Polish Jewish agreement, will be carried into effect. This statement was made by the Ministry of the Interior in reply to an interpellation introduced into the Sejm by Deputy Poliakiewicz, who was active in bringing about the enactment of the law last June.

The work of revision in connection with the concession rights for the sale of articles taken over by the Financial Monopoly Act, promulgated by President of the Republic on December 27th, 1924, has not been cancelled and all financial chambers are engaged in preparing for this work of revision of the concession rights, the government stated.

The revision requires much work on the part of the financial authorities, especially in Little Poland, where during the war period large numbers of concessions were granted by the political authorities and the arrangements are therefore taking a long time. The work of revision, however, will be carried out within the prescribed period, the government stated.

In view of the urgent representations made at the time by the Jewish Deputies, the Government gave assurances that the law would not be carried into effect for some considerable time and that meanwhile the whole situation in regard to it would be reviewed.

Justice Gustave Hartman, of the City Court, was re-elected unanimously as president of the Israel Orphan Asylum. He has been president of the organization since its organization and is starting his fourteenth term. Vice-presidents elected were Moritz Neuman, Joseph Homser, William M. Engel and Mendel Schupria; treasurer, Oscar Schlesinger, and secretary, David Baum.

Included are sixty of the city's leading Jewish men and women, and forty non-Jews of prominence in civic and social life. Judges, lawyers, clerics, bankers, social workers, club heads and others make up the general committee of which Fred Bernstein and Judge Hugo M. Friend are associate chairmen, and James H. Becker is treasurer.

Mrs. Samuel Aischuler, incoming president of the Council of Jewish Women; Mrs. Edward Loewenthal, president of the Chicago Woman's Aid and Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick are on the committee, as well as Mrs. Joseph Mayer, a past president of the Chicago Woman's Aid; Mrs. Ignace J. Reis, Mrs. Hannah G. Solomon, honorary national president of the Conference of Jewish Women, which comprises some ninety clubs.

A number of prominent sports writers, among whom are Warren W. Brown of the "Herald-Examiner" and Harvey T. Woodruff and Walter Eckersall of the "Chicago Tribune" are listed. Meyer Morton, one of the official soccer and football referees of the Western Collegiate conference is a member.

Dr. Ignatz H. Koerner, president of the Hakoah, will arrive in Chicago today and the team will come May 4.

The first game in Chicago will be played at the White Sox baseball park, on the south side, with an anticipated "full house" or 40,000 persons.

## DIGEST OF PUBLIC OPINION ON JEWISH MATTERS

### Jewish Soccer and Jewish Prestige

The victory of the Hakoah, Vienna Jewish soccer team, over New York all-star eleven, is greeted by the Jewish press as a gain in prestige for the Jewish people.

The "Forward," Jewish Socialist daily of New York, takes occasion to stress that the feeling of joy manifested by the Jews, even by the non-Zionist Jews, is not to be attributed to a spirit of chauvinism. "There is an impression extant," the paper says "that the Jews are weaklings and cowards, especially in the physical sense. Of recent years there have been numerous proofs to the contrary. But we are a minority everywhere, nevertheless, and are regarded as stepchildren. These Hakoah players have shown that they are splendid athletes, strong and fleet and brave. And they have demonstrated their prowess in a field where the English-speaking race has from time immemorial distinguished itself."

The organization of a vigorous American Hakoah club is urged by Jacob Fishman in the "Jewish Morning Journal." This, the writer explains, would be in line with the present tendency in American Jewry which has led to the creation of a Jewish Actors Guild, a separate organization of Jewish policemen, Hashomer, and Jewish students organizations in the colleges.

Mr. Fishman finds special satisfaction in the demonstration of the Hakoah players because, he declares, their splendid team work has proven that the Jews are not incapable, as has been charged, of harmonious co-work and united effort. The method of the Hakoah, it is advocated, can and should be applied to all other phases of Jewish activity.

In a feuilleton in the "Day" Z. H. Rubinstein remarks facetiously that the Jews in the diaspora have hitherto been known for good "foot-work" in escaping from persecution but they have now demonstrated their skill at another kind of "foot-work." Our national honor, he says, will now be defended "not by feet that escape, but by the feet that kick."

The New York "World" makes the following comment on the Hakoah:

"The spectacular soccer victory of a Jewish-Austrian team over New York's all-star eleven on Sunday is greeted as an augury of the day when international matches of association football may draw crowds here as huge as at Wembley, Buenos Ayres or Berlin. That day may never come; America seems firmly attached to its own development of the Rugby game. But the match is at least a reminder that in sport it is not the crack of the baseball bat that is heard round the world but the thud of the soccer-player's boot."

## NINETY-TWO INDUSTRIES BEING CANVASSED IN N. Y. UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN

Will Seek to Secure City's Full Quota  
By May 9

Ninety-two teams, to cover as many industries, started canvassing for the United Jewish Campaign Monday in an effort to secure the second half of New York City's quota of \$6,000,000 by May 9th, according to an announcement by David M. Bressler, vice-chairman of the drive. A total of nearly \$3,000,000 was raised at the three dinners held Sunday night which were attended by 1200 men and women.

The Bankers' and Brokers' Division, headed by Carl Pförzheimer, is expected to raise \$1,500,000. The quota of \$1,000,000 was allotted to the Real Estate Division led by J. Clarence Davies, and \$400,000 to the Clocks and Suits Division, headed by Jacob Sperber. Louis Vorhaus, who heads the Lawyers and Judges Division, assumed the burden of raising \$300,000 and Dr. Louis I. Harris, Health Commissioner of New York City, \$150,000 from physicians and surgeons.

A quota of \$250,000 each is asked of the Clothing Division, headed by Joseph Frankel; Cotton Goods, headed by Charles L. Bernheimer, and Metals and Minings headed by Ludwig Vogelstein; \$150,000 each of the Wholesale Jewelry Division, Zach A. Oppenheimer, chairman, and Millinery, Abe N. Adelson, chairman; \$100,000 each from the Chemical Division headed by D. A. Ansbacher, and the Insurance Division of which Joseph S. Blume is chairman.

The Theatrical Division of the campaign which has a quota of \$400,000, will be participated in by representatives of all the branches of the Theatrical Profession and allied industries. The leaders of the Theatrical Division are: A. L. Erlanger, Lee Schubert, Carl Laemmle, Charles O'Reilly, Sam H. Harris, E. F. Albee, William A. Brady, Marcus Loew, Harry Warner, Al Johnson, Eddie Cantor, William Morris, B. S. Moss, Morris Goodman, Sidney S. Cohen, Jacob Wilk, Douglas N. Tausig, and Joseph Leblang.

Contributions totalling \$132,000 were made Monday night at a dinner in honor of David A. Brown in the Men's Club of Far Rockaway. The original quota for Far Rockaway was \$100,000, but Leo Lauterstein, chairman of the Far Rockaway Division, stated that a quota of \$150,000 was accepted.

The Sisterhood of the Central Synagogue, which has a membership of three hundred pledged themselves to contribute one dollar a week for the next three years, which will make a total of \$46,800.

The management of the drive, which announced after Sunday night's dinners that the grand total of pledges made at the three meetings was \$3,700,000, corrected this statement by putting the figure at nearly \$3,000,000. It was reported that the mistake was caused by an employee who attributed the \$3,000,000 total for all three meetings to one meeting alone—that held by the men's division for Manhattan and the Bronx at the Biltmore. ## BERLIN DEMONSTRATION PROTESTS AGAINST "JEW COMEDIANS" ON STAGE

Caricatures on German Stage Seen As  
Aid to Anti-Semitism

Berlin, Apr. 27.—A protest demonstration against the "Jew comedians" on the German stage took place here.

The protest was directed against Jewish artists in the German cabarets and theatres who act in caricature plays, ridiculing Jewish life. They were accused of increasing anti-Semitism in Germany through their actions.

Speakers at the meeting stated that the continuous warnings addressed to the managers and actors were disregarded. Several Jewish cabaret leaders and directors who attended the meeting faced the hostile demonstration and declared that they will, in future, avoid the so-called Jewish "jokes."

The Catholics and Jews of New York have set a pace in the generous and intelligent support of their respective charities. Bird S. Coler, Commissioner of Public Welfare, declared Monday at the new club of the Fort George Presbyterian Church, 186th Street and St. Nicholas Avenue, New York.

Prof. A. A. Michelson, University of Chicago physicist, whose recent experiments here substantiated certain parts of the Einstein theory, will go to Mount Wilson observatory, at Pasadena, Cal., where he will continue his measurements of the velocity of light. The scientist left Chicago Saturday for Washington, D. C., to attend a meeting of the National Academy of Sciences at which the tests at Mount Wilson will bring the measurement of light's speed to a higher degree of precision than has ever been reached. Dr. Michelson measured the diameter of the giant star Betelgeuse with his interferometer, one of the most accurate instruments known to science.

Prof. Michelson is returning to his work at the University of Chicago in October.

## \$775,000 IS ALLOTTED BY J.D.C. FINANCE COMMITTEE FOR IMMEDIATE RELIEF ABROAD

\$300,000 for Poland, \$75,000 for Cultural Relief, Balance for Russia

The sum of \$775,000, to be used immediately for relief and reconstructive work in Eastern Europe and Russia, during May and June, was voted by the Finance Committee of the Joint Distribution Committee, in spite of the limited funds as the disposal of the J. D. C., David A. Brown, national chairman of the United Jewish Campaign announced.

This action was taken in response to repeated cables from Dr. Bernhard Kahn, European Director of the Joint Distribution Committee, who is endeavoring to bring the largest amount of relief to the starving Jews of Poland, Bessarabia and other countries, and cables from Dr. Joseph A. Rosen, who is the head of its agricultural settlement work in Russia. Dr. Rosen cabled that a large number of new Jewish families are endeavoring to settle on the Russian prairies this Spring and unless funds would be forthcoming they are in danger of being stranded.

Three hundred thousand dollars of the appropriation went to Dr. Kahn, who has advised the Committee that most of the money would have to be expended in Poland where nearly a million Jews are starving and threatened with epidemic of typhus and other hunger-diseases, Mr. Brown stated. Most of the balance was allotted to Dr. Rosen for Russian agricultural work. Likewise, in answer to the emergency situation in the religious and cultural work abroad, with rabbis and instructors who have not received salaries for the past six months and longer, the Finance Committee is making available to the Committee on Cultural Affairs, headed by Dr. Cyrus Adler, the sum of \$75,000.

In making this announcement, Mr. Brown pointed out that although these appropriations had been made, the Joint Distribution Committee did not know where the money would come from. "Nevertheless, the Committee decided to take the chance in view of the urgency of the situation. I pointed out to the Committee that with the New York Campaign and the great number of 'drives' scheduled all over the country in the next three weeks, it was warranted to make these appropriations against an empty treasury. As it is, all the demands were cut to the bare bone. Dr. Kahn's appropriation represents only 75 per cent of his minimum commitments for the period covered. Dr. Rosen's demand was for \$500,000. The Cultural Committee asked for a minimum of \$300,000 to cover the next five months.

"Whether the Joint Distribution Committee can actually meet these appropriations depends on the response of the Jews of New York and the rest of America within the next fortnight. If they measure up to what I have reason to expect that they are going to do—we shall be able to meet these appropriations, and able also to make additional appropriations covering the needs of all the important phases of its European relief and reconstruction work," Mr. Brown declared.

## HEBREWS KNEW DAYLIGHT SAVING, IRISH SUN DIALS, FOUND RECENTLY, SHOW

The adoption of Summer time is so novelty, but only a reversion in a modified form to a custom that existed for thousands of years prior to the twelfth century A. D., according to the Dean of St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin, an Associated Press despatch from Dublin states.

An Irish sun dial of the sixth century recently discovered in County Down and another in County Kerry confirm conclusions to that effect drawn from the Gezer dial in Palestine. The hour varied in length according to the season and latitude, the daylight hour in Ireland being in mid-summer eighty minutes and decreasing in Winter to forty.

The great Summer time novelty, says the Dean of St. Patrick's is thus merely a mild effort to correct the disadvantages arising from the invention of the mechanical clock, which divided the day into equal hours.

At the opening session Rabbi Jacob R. Wise of New York, son of Dr. Isaac M. Wise, founder of Reform Judaism, spoke on "Jewish Personality." Other speakers were: Mrs. Jonas F. Rosenberg, President of the local sisterhood; Mrs. J. Walter Freyer, of Cincinnati; President of the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods, and Mrs. Albert of New York, and Dr. L. L. Szymanski of New York, who is representing the Union of Young Jewish Temple Leagues.

## ARRANGEMENTS ARE MADE TO SELL PALESTINE MATZOS IN THE UNITED STATES

Mr. Sam Aaronsohn, who recently returned to Palestine, issued the following statement to the representative of the "Jewish Daily Bulletin." Mr. Aaronsohn was in this country on behalf of the Palestine Flour Mills. His statement read:

"I have succeeded in interesting the Manishevitz Brothers Company in the Palestine matzos. They are most anxious to help this new branch of the Palestine Mills. Owing to the lateness of the season, we could not, however, make a big start this year. I brought with me only ten thousand pounds of matzos which were disposed of in a few hours. We are not aiming at, nor is it possible, to supply the entire American matzos requirement. All we want is to get the Jews here into the habit of buying a percentage of Palestine matzos with their other matzos. This will successfully be done with the cooperation of the Manishevitz Brothers, the largest matzos distributing agents in the world. Dedication of the just completed synagogue of the Congregation Redef Zelek, Chicago, will take place in May. Dr. Benjamin A. Buchal is rabbi of the congregation. Sam J. Cohen is president. The synagogue was erected at a cost of \$250,000.
