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CIVIL GOVERNOR, OPPOSED TO ANTI-SEMITIC DISORDERS, APPOINTED IN BUCHAREST

Royal Family Objects to Anti-Semitism, Lady-in-Waiting Says
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Apr. 29.—General Rishkanu was appointed civil governor of the city of Bucharest, charged with the task of keeping peace and order in the Roumanian capital, by an order issued by General Averescu, Prime Minister.

General Rishkanu was the first of the Roumanian military to support the appeal issued by the Union of Roumanian Jews against the anti-Semitic movement in Roumania.

The newspaper "Halla Reshi" of Clausenberg yesterday published an interview with Madam Theodorescu, a lady-in-waiting at the Roumanian Court, in which she stated that the royal family is opposed to the anti-Semitic movement. Queen Marie, she stated, is a philo-Semite.

LORD READING IS FETED BY PILGRIMS IN LONDON

London, Apr. 29.—The Marquis of Reading was honored last night at a dinner given by the Pilgrim Society, under the presidency of Lord Desborough.

The United States Ambassador to England, Lord Birkenhead and Sir Jounson Hicks, British Home Secretary and four hundred other guests were present at the dinner.

In his address Lord Reading paid tribute to Lady Reading who, he stated, did much to cure the racial animosity by her work among the women in India.

SEPHARDIC JEWS PLAN MISSION FOR MARRANOS

London, Apr. 29.—A conference of Spanish and Portuguese congregations in Great Britain to consider ways and means of establishing a Jewish mission to the Marranos, was convoked by the Anglo-Jewish Association, one of the leading Jewish bodies in England.

This decision was taken as a result of the report of Mr. Lucien Wolf, secretary of the Joint Foreign Committee, who proposed the establishment of such a mission following his return from Portugal.

DENY HEBREW BOOKS ARE BARRED IN SOVIET RUSSIA

London, Apr. 29.—There is no bar against the importation of Hebrew books to Soviet Russia without reference to their contents, according to a statement issued by the Soviet Embassy here to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. The Embassy denied a newspaper report to the effect that such a prohibition existed.

JEWISH DELEGATION ASKS ADMISSION OF WIVES AND CHILDREN OF DECLARANTS

President Coolidge Expresses Hope
Relief Will Be Granted

Washington, D. C., Apr. 29.—Supporting the amendment to the Immigration Law proposed by Senator Wadsworth for the admission of 35,000 wives and minor children of declarants who arrived in this country before July 1, 1924, a delegation called on President Coolidge yesterday. The delegation consisted of Adolph Stern, Grand Master of the Independent Order B'rith Abraham, Elihu D. Stone, assistant United States Attorney of Boston, Judge Jacob Asher of Worcester, J. L. Simon of Salem and Henry Fruchter, manager of the Naturalization Aid League of New York, representing the "Jewish Daily Forward" and the "Arbeiter Ring."

It was learned that President Coolidge expressed the hope that some measure of relief will be granted.

Prior to calling on the President the delegation called on Senator Butler, who promised support for the measure.

HUNGARIAN EDITOR JAILED FOR ANTI-JEWISH ARTICLES

Budapest, Apr. 29.—A sentence of two months in jail and the payment of a fine was imposed by the court today on Laszlo Fenyves, editor of the Hungarian newspaper "Nepszava," for publishing a communication of the Executive body of the Awakening Magyars, inciting the population to anti-Jewish violations.

In the communication, the executive of the Awakening Magyars urged the local groups of the organization to see to it that all kinds of Jewish entertainments are prevented, if necessary by force and to attack wealthy Jewish families in case of a pogrom. The editor submitted in court the original letter of the Executive of the Awakening Magyars.

SOUTH AFRICAN JEWRY GREET'S ZIONIST LEADER

Cape Town, South Africa, Apr. 29.—Nahum Sokolow, chairman of the Zionist World Executive, was greeted by the South African Jewish community at a celebration which took place last night at the City Hall here.

The City Hall was crowded to capacity. The audience listened to an address by General Smuts, former Prime Minister of South Africa, who, describing the history of the Zionist movement and the issuance of the Balfour Declaration, stated that Lord Milner was the man in the British war cabinet who worked hardest for the acceptance of the formula for a Jewish national home.

DR. REICH SCORES POLISH GOVERNMENT FOR FAILURE TO FULFILL AGREEMENT

Minister Denied Thirty Points of
Agreement, Reich Charges

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Apr. 29.—Dr. Leon Reich, former president of the Club of Jewish Deputies, and negotiator of the Polish Jewish agreement, charged the Polish government today with complete failure to carry out the terms of the agreement.

The charges were made by Dr. Reich in the Sejm during the parliamentary discussion on the provisional budget submitted by the government for the months of May and June.

"During the period when the coalition government, headed by Skrzynski, was being formed, the Club of Jewish Deputies decided to take a friendly attitude of watchful waiting toward the coalition government, because its leader, Count Skrzynski, was the negotiator of the Polish Jewish agreement," Dr. Reich stated. "I must declare, however, that to our deepest regret, our hopes were not fulfilled."

Dr. Reich supported his statement by quoting a number of facts of present day life in Poland and he drew a pessimistic picture of the internal economic situation, as well as the situation in foreign relations.

The speaker particularly charged the Minister of Education, Stanislaw Grabski, with deliberate chicanery against the schools of the national minorities

JEWS OMITTED IN MINORITIES ELECTION PACT IN ROUMANIA

Bucharest, Apr. 29.—An agreement between the Averescu government and the national minorities in Roumania for the forthcoming elections was concluded, it was learned here today.

The election bloc concluded with the government includes the Hungarians, Germans and Bulgarians and secures a certain number of representatives for these minorities. No mention is made of the negotiated agreement with the Jewish electorate, apparently because, as it was reported, the government refused to recognize the Jewish population as a national minority.

Dr. Kligler was appointed member of the International Commission to West Africa to investigate yellow fever and other diseases, sent by the International Health Board of the Rockefeller Foundation.

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ROTHSCHILDS HERE TO STUDY CONDITIONS IN U.S.

Scions of Famous Family, Distinguished Leaders in Science, Philanthropy and Industry

Baron Henri de Rothschild, who is now on a visit to America with his son, James Henri, stopping at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel, is a Commander of the French Order of the Legion of Honor. He is a Doctor of Medicine and a Member of the Board of Directors of the Nord Railway Company of France.

Baron Henri de Rothschild belongs to the French family of Rothschild. His father, the late Baron James de Rothschild, was not exclusively occupied by financial affairs, but had achieved at the time of his death a prominent position in the world of letters, as well as a reputation for philanthropy.

Baron Henri is a Doctor of Medicine. He has published works on the promotion of infantile health, on milk and its production, on the glands of the throat and their maladies, on burns and particularly their treatment by "Ambrine." He also published a treatise on infantile pathology. During the past thirty years he has been active in social work.

Amongst the social works which have come within the sphere of his activities, the hospital founded by him in 1896 at Rue Marcadet, Paris, and which bears his name. The special object of this institution is the medical and surgical needs of the poorer classes of a large and populous district of Paris, as well as of members of the staffs employed in his various industrial and agricultural centers. He created in Paris the philanthropic work for the supply of milk, which was the first undertaking for providing fresh milk to the working population of Paris. This organization distributes tickets for milk to the indigent poor of the city.

On his estate of Vaux de Cernay, he has as the first to apply in France on a large scale the milking of cows by mechanical means through the American Alfa-Laval apparatus. He also organized the distribution of wine on a philanthropic basis, which allows the

PEACE PROSPECTS DEVELOP IN SYRIA; JOUVENEL MAY ACCEPT SYRIANS' PROPOSAL

Treaty Offered, Similar to Anglo-Iraq Document, to Substitute Mandate (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Apr. 29.—Prospects of peace in Syria increased today when a proposal was formulated by the Syrian National Government, the body chosen by the rebels. This proposal has the chance of being accepted by the French Mandatory power.

The program of the Syrian National Government proposes: 1. That instead of the Syrian mandate now defining the relations between Syria and France, a treaty be concluded between France and Syria similar to the treaty concluded between Great Britain and Mesopotamia for a period of 30 years. Mesopotamia was originally a mandated territory, where the mandate was substituted by a financial and military agreement; 2. That the Syrian people be permitted to enact a Syrian constitution; 3. That Syria maintain friendly relations with those Arab states under a mandate; 4. That a seaport be built for Syria.

The French High Commissioner, Henri de Jouvencel, in reply to this proposal declared that he agrees to the first and second points. As to the third and fourth, a decision would have to wait until the forthcoming Syrian parliament would ratify the proposed treaty between Syria and France.

I.O.B. CONVENTION TO MEET IN NEW YORK ON MAY 8

Alfred M. Cohen Will Be Guest of Honor At Banquet

An important event in the activities of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith, the largest American Jewish fraternity with a membership of over 60,000 throughout the United States, is the forthcoming convention of District No. 1, which will take place in New York City beginning May 8.

Hon. Alfred M. Cohen, Cincinnati banker and industrialist, who is the president of the Order, will arrive in New York to attend the convention. He will be the guest of honor at a banquet and reception at the Hotel Astor on May 9.

The convention, which will last three days, will be attended, it is expected, by several hundred delegates from the various Eastern States comprising the District.

Dr. Boris D. Bogen, formerly social worker during the war and representative of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee in various European countries, now executive secretary of the Order, will arrive today from Cincinnati to make final arrangements for the convention.

DIGEST OF PUBLIC OPINION ON JEWISH MATTERS

"The Light That Threatens to Fail"

An appeal to those in charge of the relief work for East European Jewry to give attention to the problem of preserving the Jewish school systems whose existence is being threatened in Poland, Roumania, Lithuania, etc., is made by Vladimir Jabotinsky, in an article entitled "The Light That Threatens to Fail," to be reissued this week to the Jewish press of America.

"It is much more than just a network of schools: it is the only bright island in an ocean of misery and humiliation," Mr. Jabotinsky writes. "Jewish life in the vast territory stretching between Kovno, Lithuania, and Kishinev, Bessarabia—about 6,000,000 tortured souls of Israel—is now literally bare of any comforting influence, devoid even of hope. Their economic plight seems to be past redemption, owing not only to willful oppressing, but also to the competition of the young, but fast growing, Christian bourgeoisie. Their political condition is determined by an unprecedented outburst of local nationalisms. There is no joy in their life, but in the only old refuge of the Jew—in the field of spiritual activity.

"Yet, now it is no longer the Beth-Hamidrah: it is the modern Jewish school work. Roughly speaking, about 100,000 Jewish children of that whole region went, a year ago, to Hebrew schools, half that number to Yiddish schools. In Poland alone there are twelve Hebrew and three Yiddish high schools; 194 Hebrew and 101 Yiddish elementary schools—apart from kindergartens.

"Yet, unfortunately, that necessary and, in many respects, admirable network of schools is now actually tottering. The Roumanian government seems, despite all the minority clauses of the peace treaties, to have set its heart on exterminating both the Hebrew and the Yiddish languages of instruction in Bessarabia. In Lithuania, the Jewish communities have been deprived of their rights of self-taxation; American help has practically ceased; the parents are destitute; as a result, 15 per cent of the Hebrew elementary schools are already closed, the remainder in a precarious position. The situation in Poland, including Galicia, is hardly brighter.

"One hears so much just now about the physical hunger of the East European Jew; yet for our people, with its tremendous tradition of learning, the collapse of the Hebrew and Yiddish schools would be no less a tragedy. Let it be hoped that relief workers will not overlook this side of the problem. It is a terrible thing for a poverty-stricken mass to lose the only spiritual ray (apart from religion, whose magnetism is no longer what it used to be) illuminating its darkness!"

500,000 EXPECTED TO ATTEND UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN MASS MEETINGS ON SUNDAY

Louis Marshall Issues Call; Labor Groups Pledge \$65,000

A series of mass meetings to be held at the same hour on Sunday evening in hundreds of meeting places throughout New York are being arranged by synagogues, temples, Sabbath schools, clubs, fraternal and labor organizations in connection with the \$6,000,000 United Jewish Campaign of New York, which began this week.

Rabbis, teachers, community workers, and business, industrial and professional leaders, have joined with the campaign officers in instituting the meetings, in response to a request issued by Louis Marshall, honorary chairman of the campaign. An address by David A. Brown, chairman of the National campaign, will be read at all the meetings.

"Unusual conditions necessitate unusual methods," Mr. Marshall wrote. "For many months there has been presented to the Jews of America and particularly the Jews of New York, the tragic situation of the Jews in Eastern Europe and in Russia. The press—Yiddish, Anglo-Jewish and English—has revealed in hundreds upon hundreds of stories, the suffering, the actual starvation and the frightful economic condition of the Jews in Europe.

"The Six Million Dollar Campaign for Greater New York, which began on Sunday, April 25th, is to continue through to May 9th. It is the desire of the New York organization that every man, woman and child of the Jewish faith in this great metropolitan area participate in this Campaign.

"To accomplish this, it becomes imperative to call a number of mass meetings to be held in the synagogues, temples, sabbath schools, Talmud Torahs, private clubs, fraternal organizations, and social institutions of every kind. It is our purpose to have assembled in one evening, the greatest number of people that has ever been gathered in one evening, the greatest number of people that has ever been gathered together for a humanitarian cause in the history of this or any other country.

"There are in the city of New York, over 1,500,000 Jewish men, women and children, and we are hopeful of gathering together in the hundreds of meeting places in this city, not less than 500,000.

"We request you to call together on Sunday, May 2nd, your congregation or membership.

"We take it for granted that as a

Growth of Jewish Population in Poland Stopped By Emigration to Palestine

(By Our Warsaw Correspondent)

Warsaw, Apr. 2.—The natural growth of the Jewish population in Poland has been stopped by the volume of Jewish emigration from this country to Palestine. In other words, the surplus resulting from the natural increase in birth rate is being absorbed by Palestine. This is one of the interesting facts revealed by the statistics of the Palestine Bureau here which is in charge of the emigration to Palestine.

The growth of the movement to Palestine can be judged from the report which shows that there is even a small margin of decrease in the Polish Jewish population owing to the ever-increasing number of Jews who are leaving for Palestine, some owing to the dreadful economic conditions and some owing to Zionist idealism. It appears that since 1922 the emigration of Jews from this country to Palestine has increased more than five-fold. The actual figures are:

Of the 17,740 who emigrated to Palestine in 1925, with the assistance of the Palestine Bureau, 6,759 were workingmen, 3,247 went on affidavits made out by their relatives in Palestine, and the remainder were of the "capitalist" class, nearly all of whom, however, were former well-to-do and even wealthy persons who had been completely ruined by the economic crisis in Poland; some of them had saved or salvaged a small part of their former fortunes, in most cases a bare few hundred pounds, and had decided to start anew in Palestine.

Lately the emigration of Jews with a capital of several hundred pounds has practically ceased, owing to two reasons: on the one hand the so-called "capitalists" have found that it is not possible to accomplish much in Palestine in the way of business with such a sum, on the other hand, the economic crisis with its particular effects on the Jewish population has reached such a stage that there are very few Jewish individuals of the business class who can raise several hundred pounds, even after selling all their present possessions. Thus, the latest emigration to Palestine consists largely of workmen with no means to speak of, chalutzim and those who go to their relatives and are assured of some help when they reach Palestine.

The number of applicants for Palestine visas is constantly growing, but there are tens of thousands who do not apply because they haven't even the fare to make the trip. There are many Jews here who some time ago possessed the means for going to Pal-

PLANS FOR JEWISH INSTITUTE BUILDING AT HEBREW UNIVERSITY NEAR COMPLETION

Committee of Sol Rosenbloom Memorial to Meet in Europe in August

Steps toward the erection of the building to house the Institute of Jewish Studies at the Hebrew University on Mount Scopus in memory of Sol Rosenbloom, the late Zionist leader, were decided upon at a meeting in New York of the American members of the Rosenbloom University Memorial Committee. The American members are Mrs. Sol Rosenbloom of Pittsburgh, Federal District Judge Julian W. Mack, and Rabbi Stephen S. Wise.

It was decided to call a meeting of the European members and the American committee during the early part of August. The design being prepared with the cooperation of Professor Patrick Geddes, the architectural counsel to the Hebrew University, will be considered and final authority given for proceeding with the erection of the memorial.

It was pointed out that whereas the \$250,000 given by the late Sol Rosenbloom as a fund, the income from which was to be applied towards the maintenance of two professorships in the Institute of Jewish Studies, the Institute proper was being housed in rented rooms. It is proposed, stated Mrs. Rosenbloom, that the Institute shall be accommodated in the memorial building, besides providing for scientific archaeological research.

"My husband had always expressed the wish that in the Institute of Jewish Studies the traditional viewpoint in teaching Judaism shall be observed. He believed that the chief function of the University should center around the expounding of the philosophy of Judaism, its spirit and ideals, in a traditional manner," Mrs. Rosenbloom stated.

"I am ready to proceed with the erection of the building, and I hope that by the early part of this coming spring the cornerstone may be laid. The administrative offices of the University and the Jewish Institute are severely pressed for room and the need for space is urgent. I hope that before the end of next year the building will be dedicated," Mrs. Rosenbloom concluded.

The working of this factory is in the hands of the Societe des Traitements Chimiques, founded by Baron Henri. The laboratories are equipped for the study of industrial chemistry.

Baron Henri de Rothschild is also interested in literature and the drama and has produced a number of plays.

Baron Henri's son, James Henri, is on his second visit to the United States. He was a pilot aviator during the war and received the "Croix de Guerre." His wife, the former Mademoiselle Claude Dupont, is accompanying him.

The purpose of their visit to America, Mr. Rothschild stated to a representative of the "Jewish Daily Bulletin," is to study recent scientific and industrial developments in the United States and to make connections with persons who might be interested in the model theatre which he is having built in Paris. He will discuss methods of making known in France the various artistic and literary works of America.

in Poland and particularly against the Jewish schools. The Minister took this negative attitude, despite his solemn promises during the negotiation and conclusion of the Polish Jewish agreement. Dr. Reich stated.

"It is true that Count Skrzynski was in good faith when he concluded the Polish Jewish agreement. However, he displayed little energy in carrying it out." Dr. Reich stated.

Dr. Reich charged Minister Grabski with reducing the number of the terms of the Polish Jewish agreement from 42 to 12.

"I declare solemnly before the Sejm and before world opinion that the agreement concluded between the Polish government and the Club of Jewish Deputies in the Polish Sejm included forty-two points, including twelve which were to be realized immediately," Dr. Reich stated. He cited a number of instances proving the existence of a numerus clausus against Jewish students in the Polish universities and the continuation of the campaign against Jewish merchants and trades.
