

## OSCAR S. STRAUS, STATESMAN AND PHILANTHROPIST, DIES

**Passing of Noted American Jew Mourned Everywhere; "He Was a Lover of Peace and Harmony," Says Louis Marshall; "America Has Lost a Patriot of Rare Qualities," Declares Felix Warburg in Tribute to Late Statesman**

Oscar S. Straus, American statesman and diplomat, and one of the outstanding figures in American Jewry for half a century, died suddenly Monday morning from a heart attack. Mr. Straus was in his seventy-sixth year.

Oscar Solomon Straus, who was honored by five American presidents, was twice member of the United States cabinet and was United States Ambassador to Turkey, the first Jew to hold this post. He was a colleague of President Roosevelt in the formation of the Progressive Party and in 1912 was the candidate of this party for governor of New York. He was born December 23, 1850 and when he came to this country settled in Georgia, living at Talbotton, Ga., and in Columbus, until 1865, when he came to New York.

He received the degree of Bachelor of Arts from Columbia University in 1871, LL.B. in 1873 and his Master's degree in 1874. He also held degrees from Brown University, Washington and Lee, University of Pennsylvania. In 1882 he was married to Sarah Lavanburg.

### Served Under Five Presidents

He practiced law in New York from 1873 to 1881, following which he held various civic and governmental positions, being appointed Ambassador to Turkey in 1887, which post he held until 1901. He was appointed a member of the Permanent Court of Arbitration at The Hague in 1902 to fill the vacancy of ex-President Harrison. He was reappointed by Presidents Roosevelt, Taft and Wilson. Oscar Straus was Secretary of Commerce and Labor in the cabinet of President Roosevelt and was Ambassador to Turkey again in 1909.

He was chairman of the New York Public Service Commission in 1915 and held various positions in the National Primary League, the American Social Science Association, the National Civic Federation, the International Law Association. He was president of the New York Board of Trade and Transportation.

### Strove for Arbitration and Peace

He was also chairman of the arbitration commission to decide the wage dispute between eastern railways and their engineers in 1902. In 1919 he was chairman of the Paris Commission of the League to Enforce Peace, and was a member of President Wilson's second industrial conference.

Mr. Straus was the author of many works, including "The Origin of the Republican Form of Government in the United States," "Roger Williams, the Pioneer of Religious Liberty," "The Development of Religious Liberty in the United States," "Reform in the Consular Service," "United States Doctrine of Citizenship," "Our Diplomacy with Reference to Our Foreign

Service," "The American Spirit," and "Under Four Administrations."

The death of Oscar S. Straus was mourned throughout the country.

### Tribute from Louis Marshall

"Oscar S. Straus was a man who embodied all that was finest and most exalted in American citizenship," Mr. Louis Marshall stated. "Exceptionally versed in our national history, our constitutional principles, our traditions and tendencies, no man understood better than he the soul of America. As an historian of Roger Williams, the analyst of the controlling influences which shaped our government, and the author of a charming autobiography, he made notable contributions to our political annals. He was imbued with a broad sense of obligation to foster the public welfare and he fulfilled that duty, not intermittently, but continuously. In early manhood he retired from the legal profession, which he would have adorned, to devote himself exclusively to public affairs. His achievements in that field were impressive, both as a diplomat, as a cabinet officer, and as a member of important commissions, and in every capacity he was distinguished for his tact, learning and practical opinions. He became a publicist of international prominence and enjoyed a wide range of acquaintanceship among the most illustrious statesmen and thinkers of the world. He was loyal to the ancient faith of Israel and took an active part in dealing with the many problems which clamored for sympathetic attention and elevated constructive thought required for their solution. He was never found wanting in the hour of need. He was remarkably free from partisanship, was essentially a lover of peace and harmony, and invariably just and considerate in his conclusions. He was in every sense a builder and in no sense a destroyer. He treasured all that to him seemed morally and ethically precious, however ancient, and feared not the clash of ideas because they happened to be new. He had implicit faith in humanity, and as he deserved, enjoyed the unflinching confidence of his fellow-men, regardless of nationality, race or creed. His life was fraught with blessing, not only to his own generation, but to posterity," Mr. Marshall stated.

"Through the death of the Hon. Oscar Straus those who had the privilege

of knowing him intimately have lost a warm-hearted friend and splendid adviser; the city has lost an extraordinary citizen who took an interest in everything that pertained to the educational welfare of her people and the United States has lost a patriot of rare qualities," declared Mr. Felix M. Warburg. "His record stands as a lasting monument of what he has striven to accomplish ever since his early days.

"He was deeply imbued with sympathetic understanding for Jews all over the world in all stations of life, and his compassionate aid was always given freely to the oppressed.

"He had a true appreciation for the beauties of Jewish literature and a special interest in such movements as

**Leonard Montefiore Elected President of Anglo-Jewish Association**

London, May 3.—Leonard Montefiore, communal worker and member of the council of the Jewish Colonization Association, was elected president of the Anglo-Jewish Association at its meeting here yesterday.

Mr. Lucien Wolf, secretary of the Joint Foreign Committee of the Anglo-Jewish Association and the Board of Jewish Deputies, submitted a report in which he stated that the situation of the Jewish population in Roumania has changed with the advent of the new government. While during the regime of the previous government the Joint Foreign Committee received numerous reports from Roumania concerning anti-Jewish excesses, since the new government is in power, only two such reports have been received.

The recommendation to convoke a conference of the Spanish Portuguese congregations in Great Britain and America to consider a mission to the Marranos was adopted.

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## UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN ENTERS SECOND WEEK WITH \$3,525,050 RAISED

With \$2,474,960 still to be raised to complete its \$6,000,000 quota, the United Jewish Campaign began the second week of its drive with a series of meetings in synagogues, temples, sabbath schools, talmud torahs, club-houses, Y. M. H. A.'s, community centers, lodge rooms and labor unions, which, according to an estimate by Vice-Chairman David M. Bressler, brought the message of the campaign directly to 300,000 people.

An appeal was addressed to the pupils of the several hundred Jewish religious schools in the boroughs of Greater New York, except Brooklyn, which will have a Children's Day next Sunday.

The results of "Children's Day" was approximately \$75,000.

An address by David A. Brown, national chairman of the United Jewish Campaign, was read at all of the mass meetings last night. In this address, Mr. Brown said:

"Never in the history of the Jewish people, dating back for centuries, was there a situation like this, and never before in the history of the Jewish people was there an emergency as great as this.

"Women and children are dropping on the streets from hunger in Bessarabia. Many others are found dead in their homes in Poland. A horrible scourge of typhus is sweeping over the Jews in both lands, adding to the toll of death.

"In thousands of homes, men, women and children are sick to the point of utter exhaustion from hunger. There is another gruesome picture that is given in the cables received by me and by the Joint Distribution Committee in the last few days: That unless substantial help comes quickly, the Jewish orphan asylums will be compelled to close because their resources have been exhausted to the last penny. Thousands of children will be turned out into the streets to roam about aimlessly, helplessly, blindly.

## HAKOAH TEAM MAINTAINS PRESTIGE IN NEW YORK AND PROVIDENCE GAMES

Lose to New York's Best Team by 3-0  
Before Record Crowd; Score Tie  
in Providence Game

The Hakoah soccer team maintained its reputation as champions of the game in two spectacular contests at the Polo Grounds, New York, on Saturday, and in Providence on Sunday. A record attendance of over 40,000 and over 6,000 in Providence witnessed the Hakoah eleven's contests with America's best players.

Both in New York, where the Hakoah lost to the New York Giants and Indiana Floorings with a score of 3-0 and in Providence where the score in their game with the Providence team of the American Soccer League was a tie of 2 to 2, the skill and swiftness of the all-Jewish team was recognized and highly praised.

The Hakoah team left New York with an even break against the best New York could place in the field.

While defeated, the men of Hakoah were by no means disgraced. They gave a brilliant exhibition worthy of the record crowd. Although behind at half time by 1-0, they had most of the play in the first half, during which New York, after ten minutes, scored through what many regarded as a lucky break.

Of a total of eight corners in that period six went to the credit of Hakoah. The team work of the Hakoah was superb and time and again had the crowd on its feet. In shooting, on the other hand, they fell below the standard

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Many children already on the streets eat what they can find in garbage cans, or what they can pilfer from a shop or a stand. They sleep in alleys, in cellars. They are ragged. They are tattered and their morals are being destroyed.

"My European correspondents inform me that hundreds are killing themselves, are hastening death because their sufferings have made them impatient of its arrival.

"This, without the slightest attempt of exaggeration is the situation in which millions—I repeat millions—of Jews in Europe are trapped. This is the situation which thus far we have coped with almost in vain. The little money—comparatively little—which the Joint Distribution Committee have been able to send abroad in the last three months has meant virtually nothing at all. It has been able to stave off for another day or two, the day of doom for thousands.

"The Jews of America must immediately respond to this effort; they must raise a sum of money greater than has ever been raised in the history of the Jews of this country, in order that the tragedy which is overwhelming millions of their own flesh and blood shall be stayed."

### Jewish Papers Object to Turning Yeshiva Into "Jewish College"

Objection to the statements, made last week at the Yeshiva luncheon by M. Adolph Lewishohn and Mr. Gustavus Rogers, regarding anti-Jewish discriminations in American colleges, are voiced in the Jewish press, on the ground that those statements were "irrelevant" in connection with the Yeshiva idea.

The "Jewish Morning Journal" and the "Jewish Daily News" both point out that Mr. Lewishohn errs in regarding the Yeshiva as a Jewish college with "a theological department" and emphasize that the Yeshiva is not intended to solve the problem of anti-Semitism in the American colleges.

While it is true, the "Jewish Morning Journal" writes, that there are Jews who are convinced that there is anti-Jewish discrimination in the colleges, it is also true that "some Jews are prone to interpret discrimination made against them individually on grounds of personal shortcomings as attacks on their 'Jewishness.'"

"There are also Jews," the paper proceeds, "who discriminate against Jews, against Jewish institutions in which they are themselves officials, Jews who have completely or in part cast off the old Jewish feeling that every Jew must be responsible for the whole Jewish people and these should be the last persons in the world to discuss Jewish problems in America."

Whether the charges of discrimination against Jewish students are true or not, the "Jewish Morning Journal" further explains—

"It must be made clear that the new Yeshiva is not being erected to provide a college for those Jewish boys who cannot, or think they cannot, gain admission to Yale or Harvard. It is a Yeshiva-college that is being built, not a college. The Yeshiva is the primary and chief purpose of the big enterprise.

"It is not a question of anti-Semitism but of the un-Jewish atmosphere in the institutes of general education; the boy who wants to become a specialist in Jewish studies, a teacher of Jewish religion or a spiritual leader in American Jewry, must be educated differently than the boy who is preparing for a general profession or a business career.

"The discussion of the treatment of Jewish students in the colleges is therefore beside the point and irrelevant."

The "Jewish Daily News" (May 2) goes a step further and asserts that to erect a Jewish college because of charges of anti-Jewish discrimination, such as made by Messrs. Lewishohn and Rogers, would be equivalent to creating "a ghetto for the Jewish children." If it is true that Jews are discriminated against, it does not yet

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# PHILADELPHIA LAUNCHES UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL DRIVE FOR \$375,000 QUOTA

**\$130,000 Raised at Dinner; Jules E. Mastbaum Leads Contributors**

Philadelphia, May 3.—The sum of \$130,000 was subscribed by the Jewish community of this city as its initial contribution to the quota of \$375,000 for the United Palestine Appeal, at a dinner Sunday night.

More than 600 attended the dinner, at which Dr. Stephen S. Wise, chairman of the Appeal, delivered the principal address.

Judge William M. Lewis, chairman of the Philadelphia campaign, acted as toastmaster.

The campaign will continue in Philadelphia until May 12.

Three hundred prominent Philadelphia Jews are giving their entire time to the city-wide canvass. Twelve hundred men and women have been organized into teams and groups.

Jewish women are playing an important part in the campaign, forty-four teams having been allotted to them.

# BUFFALO JEWS LAUNCH CAMPAIGN FOR NON- SECTARIAN HOSPITAL

**Raise \$325,000 in Two Hours; \$642,000 Is Sought**

Buffalo, May 3.—Pledges totaling \$325,914.50 were subscribed in two hours here last night at an enthusiastic gathering of the Jews of this city, opening the week's drive for \$642,884.50, in the campaign of the Jewish Hospital Association of Buffalo, funds of which will be used to erect a five-story hospital building, with 100 beds.

While the hospital will be non-sectarian in character, it will be conducted in accordance with Jewish Dietary laws. A site has been purchased of sufficient acreage to permit expansion.

The largest individual subscription, was that of Mr. and Mrs. Isaac S. Given, who donated \$50,000. Rabbi Joseph L. Fink, Rabbi M. M. Eichler and Arthur Victor, chairman of the drive, were among the speakers at the meeting. Frederick Ullman is president of the Hospital Association. The campaign slogan is "Give While You Live."

Henry Landau of the Young People's League of the United Synagogue of America was elected President of the newly formed American Federation of Youth on Sunday after a discussion of youth's problems Saturday, at the Community Church, New York City.

Delegates from eleven organizations were present and agreed with the object expressed by the constitution, "to unite groups of young men and women in order to interest them in local, national and international problems, to encourage them to take an active part in the life of the community, to secure an expression of opinion of youth on its problems, to develop in youth a sense of responsibility to a share in life's problems, and to instill in youth a spirit of fellowship and a sense of whatever race, spirit, creed, social condition or political affiliation."

Hockett of the Metropolitan Federation of Unitarian Young People, Ellis Charbonneau of the League of Youth of the Community Church, and Miss Evid Thorpe of St. Philip's Parish, Harlem. Vice President: Miss Beatrice Price of the Fellowship of Youth for Peace. Recording Secretary: Miss Lee Brammell of the Jack and Jill Club. Corresponding Secretary, and Edward Perry of St. Philip's Parish, Harlem, Treasurer.

Funeral services for Max Reiss, philanthropist, who died Friday, were held Sunday at Temple Shaari Ezer.

Mr. Reiss had been President of Temple Shaari Zeidek for twenty-four years. He was 69 years old. He was a trustee of the Brooklyn Hebrew Orphan Asylum, Philadelphia, and the Jewish Hospital of Brooklyn, and interested in many other Jewish philanthropies.

Presbyterians in Manhattan, the Bronx and Staten Island gave \$1,592,336 to charities during 1925, an average of \$42 a member. They gave to the support of their own churches \$1,530,610; an average of \$40 a member. According to the annual report of the Presbytery of New York, sent by the Rev. Dr. Harlan G. Five churches have been built in the United States every day for the last twenty-five years, according to statistics compiled by Dr. Henry K. Carroll, religious statistician, made public by "The Christian Herald."

"In the quarter century ending with 1925 the number of church edifices has increased from 190,205 to 236,964, a net gain of 46,759, which is at the rate of 1,846 every year," says Dr. Carroll.

# PRESIDENT COOLIDGE IN MESSAGE COMMENDS NATIONAL FARM SCHOOL

**Conference Will Be Held in New York June 2 to 7**

Washington, May 3.—President Coolidge endorsed the conference called by the National Farm School to be held at the Biltmore Hotel, from June 2nd to June 7th, for the purpose of aiding young men and women in the larger cities throughout the country to adopt scientific agriculture as a profession, and to insure their success in this field after graduation from the National Farm School.

The President's endorsement of the aims and purposes of the conference was sponsored by Secretary of Agriculture William M. Jardine and Senator Arthur Capper of Kansas, who is Honorary Chairman of the National School Conference. The President's approval is contained in a letter from him to Mr. Abraham Erlanger of New York City, National Chairman of the Farm School.

"I wish to express my sincere wish for the success of the coming National Farm School Conference. Its purpose to interest the young men and women of the large cities in scientific agriculture as an honorable and useful vocation is to be commended. Not only do you hold out the advantages of such a life work but you aim to make available the training necessary for such a career."

"Will you be good enough to convey my greetings to the conference delegates?" the President wrote.

The purposes of the conference are to interest young men and women in the larger cities of the country who have neither the means nor educational requirements for entering other universities and colleges in accepting the gratuitous facilities of the National Farm School at Doylestown, Pennsylvania, where an intensive three-year course of twelve months a year is given in practical farming, scientific agriculture and home economics without charge for tuition or board.

## NO DISORDERS IN WARSAW JEWISH QUARTER DURING MAY DAY CELEBRATIONS

Warsaw, May 3.—There were no disorders in the Jewish quarter on last Saturday, when the labor party celebrated May Day. Demonstrations arranged by the Jewish labor party, Bund, and Left and Right Poale Zion passed quietly.

The clash between the Polish Socialist party and the Communists resulted in seven deaths and 23 injured.

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mean, the paper contends, that the Jews must have their own college.

"To create a Jewish college on these grounds would be a false step which American Jewry should avoid," we read. "We do not want to create with our own hands a ghetto for Jewish children. We do not want to stamp ourselves as outcasts from society. We do not want to give an opportunity to the colleges to say to us: 'You have your own colleges—keep away from ours.' If we leave the colleges because we are not wanted there, we will have to leave business, industry, real estate and all other fields of activity because we are not wanted here any more than in the colleges.

"Of course," the paper continues, "the aim of this enterprise is not a Jewish college, but a Yeshiva. The college is merely incidental to the great work of instruction in the Torah.

"It is deplorable that men like Lewissohn and others speak with authority on a subject with which they are so little familiar and present the idea of the Yeshiva in the wrong way. At least they might have informed themselves on the aims of the Yeshiva before making public statements on the subject."



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
