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**UNION OF ORTHODOX RABBIS
HOLDS ITS 24TH ANNUAL
CONVENTION IN NEW YORK**

The twenty-fourth annual convention of the Agudath HaRabbonim, the Union of Orthodox Rabbis, opened at the Kensington Gardens Hotel in Far Rockaway on Tuesday in the presence of 200 Rabbis, delegates to the convention.

The first session was taken up with the addresses of Rabbi Israel Rosenberg, chairman of the Executive Committee of the Union, and Rabbi Ezekiel Lipshitz of Kalisch, president of the Union of Polish Rabbis, who is the guest of the convention.

Rabbi Rosenberg in his address reviewed the activities of the Union during the past year. He pointed out that the Union of Orthodox Rabbis of America was the first organized body of rabbis in the world. This became necessary in America in 1902 because of conditions. Following this example, the rabbis of Poland organized into a union for the purpose of strengthening religious life.

Rabbi M. Z. Margolies welcomed the convention and Rabbi D. A. Levintal of Philadelphia introduced Rabbi Lipshitz who is his cousin. Rabbi Lipshitz in his address described the conditions of the Jewish population in Poland and stated that 90 per cent of the Jewish population are on the verge of ruin. Credit is needed more than charity, he stated.

A resolution was adopted that "it is the duty of every Jew who is not a recipient of charity himself to contribute to the relief funds for East European Jews."

Rabbi Lipshitz also declared that of the 3,000,000 Jews in the Republic of Poland, 2,500,000 adhere to Orthodox traditions. He deplored the fact that because of the dire economic need, many Orthodox Jews are compelled to send their children to the secular Yiddish schools where, he charged, hatred of Orthodox traditions is being implanted in the youth.

**JULIUS ROSENWALD RETURNS
HOME FROM TRIP ABROAD
Did Not Visit Palestine Because of
Ill Health**

Chicago, Ill., May 5.—Julius Rosenwald, American Jewish philanthropist, and Mrs. Rosenwald returned to Chicago today from a trip abroad.

Mr. Rosenwald made the European trip for his health and therefore did not go to Palestine. The philanthropist was not well enough to stand the hardships and inconveniences attendant upon a longer tour, which would include the Zionist homeland, his son-in-law, Alfred Stern, stated.

The Chicago Industrial Museum, which Mr. Rosenwald proposed while abroad, is still the subject of conference, he said. Further plans will be announced later by a committee which has the matter in charge.

"Naturally as I made the tour for my health I had to restrict my journeying. Business and political conditions in the European countries where I did go are getting better and relief from the effects of the war are becoming more and more evident," Mr. Rosenwald stated.

**WEIZMANN IS HONORED
AT PARIS RECEPTION
Raise 200,000 Francs for Palestine
Foundation Fund**

Paris, May 5.—The amount of 200,000 Francs for the Palestine Foundation Fund was raised here last night at a reception given in honor of Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, who was detained here on his way to London on account of the British general strike.

The reception, which took place at the Hotel Continental, was attended by 300 prominent French Jewish citizens. Dr. Zadock Kahn, son of the late Rabbi Zadock Kahn and chairman of the Keren Hayesod, presided. Professor Victor Basch, Mr. Corcos, French author and organizer of the French Palestine Committee, Dr. Filderman, president of the Zionist Federation of France, Mr. H. Zlatopolsky and Mr. Ascher addressed the gathering.

Dr. Weizmann in his address stated that the most important problem of Palestine today is that of immigration. "Our relations with the Arabs are now much better," he stated.

**The Appeal to Christians for a Jewish
Relief Fund**

The appeal issued to non-Jews by the Christian members of the Amos Society for a \$15,000,000 fund for the East European Jews to match the fund of the United Jewish Campaign, is lauded by the New York "Times."

"It is a welcome and encouraging sign of the times," the paper observes, "when a number of prominent professors and clergymen and editors who are Christians unite in an appeal to aid the efforts of American Jews to relieve their coreligionists in Eastern Europe. As the great need is not confined to race or creed, neither should be the endeavor to meet it."

"Cooperation in good works between different churches and denominations and forms of worship has visibly been increasing in recent years. No manifestation of it has been more striking or more grateful than this gesture of sympathy and offer of aid which Christians are making in connection with a charitable work at first thought of as strictly Jewish."

Jewish Team Work

The greatest achievement of the Hakoah players, as seen by the New York "Sun," is their refutation of the old notion that Jews are incapable of team work.

"There is a curious superstition among non-Jewish athletes which, while it readily admits the Jew's ability to shine in such competitive sports as boxing, tennis, track and field meets and the like, insists that Jewish genius is too individualistic for assimilation in a system calling mainly for team play," the "Sun" writes editorially on May 4.

"Before a large crowd at the Polo Grounds on Saturday the Hakoah players knocked this idea into the proverbial cocked hat. Each man was good enough to play well on any eleven in any country, but they played not as eleven stars but as one team. Almost perfect coordination of purpose and technic gave their open field work an appearance of ease and grace which is the ideal of correct form in any athletic endeavor."

Reflective minds cannot fail to see more than an ordinary significance in the Hakoah movement, declares the Chicago "Evening Post," in an editorial welcoming the Hakoah Soccer team, which is to play in Chicago on May 9. "After centuries of exile and persecution the Jew in Europe is again coming into his own. Greater days are in store and the Hakoah is laying foundations for them," the paper remarks.

"It is for this reason that an interest attaches to the Hakoah soccer players far transcending the ordinary interest in trained athletes."

ZIONISTS AND AGUDISTS ACCEPT COMPROMISE IN WARSAW KEHILLAH DISPUTE

Arrangement Agreed to by Both
Groups Ends Conflict

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, May 5.—The conflict between the Zionist and the Agudath Israel groups in the Warsaw Kehillah was brought to a close yesterday when both parties agreed to a compromise proposal.

According to the compromise accepted by both, Deputy Kirschbraun, representative of the Agudath Israel, will continue as president of the Kehillah Council, while the first vice-president will be a Zionist and the second vice-president an Agudah member. The president of the Executive of the Kehillah will be Deputy H. Farbstain, a Mizrahi member, while the first vice-president of the Executive will be an Agudah member and the second a Zionist.

MANY ZIONISTS IN RUSSIA ARE SENTENCED TO EXILE

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, May 5.—Many members of the Executive Committee of the He'chalutz, the organization of Palestine pioneers in Soviet Russia, although the He'chalutz is a legalized organization, were sentenced to exile and detention, according to reports received here at the He'chalutz headquarters.

Simonowsky, a member of the committee, was sentenced to three years exile in Siberia. Altschuler, Zerubabel and Yevserichin were sentenced to detention for three years in a concentration camp.

Galperin, Kletschnosky, Calmansohn, Frumkin and Misses Brodskaya, Robinson, Goland and Neida, members of the Zionist Socialist group were exiled to Siberia for a term of three years.

REMAINS OF DR. NORDAU BURIED IN PALESTINE

Tel Aviv, May 5.—The remains of Dr. Max Nordau were laid to eternal rest here yesterday with impressive ceremonies. Hundreds of wreaths were laid on the grave.

Col. Frederick H. Kisch, representative of the Zionist Executive, M. M. Ushishkin on behalf of the Vaad Leumi, Dr. M. Glikson, representing the Hebrew Writers' Association, M. Dizen-Goff, Dr. Ben Zion Mosessohn and Miss Maxa Nordau delivered eulogies.

Miss Nordau, speaking in Hebrew, stated that she sees here how deep was the love for her father and how his dream of Palestine is being fulfilled. She declared that in her sorrow, she is happy that he is laid to rest in Palestine.

PERLMAN INTRODUCES BILL SEEKING ADMISSION OF DECLARANTS' RELATIVES

Husbands of American Citizens to Be
Admitted Under Bill

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, D. C., May 5.—A bill, in main similar to Senator Wadsworth's amendment to admit thirty-five thousand relatives but differing somewhat in detail, was introduced into the House by Congressman Perlman.

In addition to exempting from the quota thirty-five thousand wives and children of declarants who entered prior to July 1, 1924, Congressman Perlman's bill would grant preference within the quota to the wives, husbands and children under twenty-one of all declarants regardless of when they entered America and exempt the husbands of citizens. It would also exempt children from eighteen to twenty-one of citizens. At present only the children under eighteen are exempt.

Congressman Perlman conferred with Assistant Secretary Husband about the latter class and was given the impression that the Labor Department would look favorably upon this provision, since the estimated number of children of this age is not large. Congressman Perlman believes that Senator Wadsworth will accept his changes upon his return to Washington.

JEWS LEAVING SALONICA BECAUSE OF GREEKS' HATE

Berlin, May 5.—The Jewish community of Salonica, once a stronghold of Jewish life, is gradually decreasing in numbers, according to a despatch from Salonica to the "Berliner Tageblatt."

As a result of the bad economic relations between the Greeks and the Jews in Salonica, many Jewish families are emigrating, and the Greek element is continually increasing. The Jewish population, which was at one time the majority population in Salonica, has decreased 30 per cent, thus losing its majority.

JEWS UNDERTAKE NEW GERMAN BIBLE TRANSLATION

Berlin, May 5.—A new translation of the Bible into German was undertaken by Dr. Martin Buber, well known German Jewish writer and Dr. Fosenzweig, founder of the Jewish Seminary at Frankfurt am Main.

Many Catholics and Protestants are supporting this undertaking. While following the Luther translation, the new translation will present the Bible in modern German.

IMPRESSIVE CEREMONIES MARK FUNERAL OF STRAUS; NATIONAL LEADERS ATTEND

Noted Americans Act As Honorary
Pallbearers

Over 3,000 prominent citizens filled the Temple Beth-El, and more than 1,000 waited outside, during the funeral services yesterday for Oscar S. Straus, former Ambassador to Turkey and first Jewish Cabinet member, who died on Monday.

Dr. Simon Cohen, acting rabbi of the temple, officiated. The funeral service was read by Dr. Stephen S. Wise, rabbi of the Free Synagogue. The eulogy was delivered by George Foster Peabody, a boyhood friend of Mr. Straus.

The honorary pallbearers were Dr. Cyrus Adler, Dr. Edwin Beer, Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler of Columbia University, Bainbridge Colby, former Secretary of State; Dr. F. M. Cledenin of St. Peter's, West Chester, N. Y.; Alfred A. Cook, railroad financier; George B. Cortelyou, former Secretary of the Treasury; Abram I. Elkus, former Ambassador to Turkey; Daniel Guggenheim, George S. Hellman, biographer of Robert Louis Stevenson and art critic; Hamilton Holt, editor and educator; Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Commerce; Dr. Robert Underwood Johnson, former Ambassador to Italy; Darwin P. Kingsley, President of the New York Life Insurance Company; Eugene Meyer, financier; William Loch, Secretary to President Roosevelt; Henry Morgenthau, former Ambassador to Turkey; Adolph S. Ochs, publisher of the New York "Times"; Kermit Roosevelt, Lewis L. Strauss, banker, and William R. Wilcox.

The interment took place in the family vault in Beth-El Cemetery, Salem Fields.

ANTI-SEMITES ATTACK JEWS IN JUGO-SLAVIA

Sarajevo, Jugo-Slavia, May 5.—An attempt by a body of anti-Semitic students to institute anti-Jewish excesses here was frustrated by the intervention of the police.

Anti-Semitic students broke up a theatre performance arranged by the Jewish Students Association, Kadimah. Twenty-one of the anti-Semitic students were arrested. When they were searched, it was found that one of them carried a bomb.

The event caused a feeling of panic among the Jewish population here.

UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN IN GREATER NEW YORK PASSES \$4,000,000 MARK

10,000 Make Contributions, \$2,000 to Be Reached Yet, Warburg Says

Contributions to the \$6,000,000 United Jewish Campaign in New York has reached a total of \$4,002,050. The sum was given by 10,000 contributors. In the last Jewish relief campaign in New York \$2,000 persons contributed. This, Mr. Felix M. Warburg stated before the campaign workers rally at the Hotel Biltmore, leaves 72,000 still to be heard from. Brooklyn contributed \$628,000 to the total and the women's division, \$300,000. Far Rockaway reported contributions of \$72,000 more than its quota of \$100,000. Among the larger contributions announced were: Temple Emanu-El, \$30,000; Michael Friedsam, \$25,000; Bricklen Construction Company, \$15,000; Mount Neboah Congregation, \$13,563; Carl Laemmle, \$10,000; Otto Kahn, \$10,000 and Mr. and Mrs. Philip Lehman, \$7,500 and \$5,000 each from Robert Lehman, Mr. and Mrs. Harold M. Lehman, Arthur Lipper, Max Weinstein, Morris White, William J. Wellman, Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Prince, Max Lowenstein and Levy & Baird.

Mayor James J. Walker, speaking before a meeting of the Grand Street Boys' Association Tuesday night, appealed to them and to the citizens of New York City to respond to the \$5,000,000 United Jewish Campaign, declaring that never in his life had he heard of a cause that deserved and required help so much as the effort that is being made by the Jews of America to bring speedy relief to the millions of their destitute co-religionists overseas.

Judge Max Levine who had previously pledged the Grand Street Boys to a \$30,000 contribution announced that on Judge Otto A. Rosalsky's motion, the quota was increased to \$100,000. Judge Levine presided at the meeting.

Judge Otto A. Rosalsky and Judge Gustave Hartman also addressed the meeting.

JUDGES ASK FOR CHANGE IN NATURALIZATION PROCEDURE; TAFT HEADS PETITIONERS

Bill Pending in Congress Sponsored by Department of Labor
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, May 5.—Chief Justice William Howard Taft of the United States Supreme Court, with a group of Federal District and Circuit Court Judges from New York, Boston and Los Angeles, appeared before the House Immigration Committee to urge passage of a pending bill to relieve the Federal Courts of much of the detail in connection with the naturalization of aliens.

The measure, sponsored by the Department of Labor, would permit the appointment of naturalization commissioners by Federal district judges in cities of more than 500,000 population, who would hear the petitions of applications for naturalization, examine their character witnesses and administer the oaths of renunciation and allegiance to accepted candidates for citizenship. When the list of accepted candidates prepared by the commissioner had been signed by the district judge, the naturalization would be complete, under the bill, which also provides for the right of appeal to the district court from the commissioner's denial of naturalization.

In urging enactment of the bill as a means of relieving congestion in the Federal courts in large cities, Chief Justice Taft suggested that the measure be amended to include authorization for the appointment of the proposed commissioners in any city of more than 250,000 population. Twelve cities of more than 500,000 which would be affected by the bill in its present form are New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Detroit, Cleveland, St. Louis, Boston, Baltimore, Pittsburgh, Los Angeles, Buffalo and San Francisco.

Justice Taft stated: "Judge Augustus N. Hand, of New York, who is here with me, says that the whole courthouse in New York is swamped with hundreds of persons seeking naturalization. That is not a good atmosphere for the courts and it makes going to court burdensome for the litigants. We have enough work with bootleggers and other criminals. Judge Hand thinks this bill would relieve almost intolerable conditions in his district and his is the worst in the country for delays in trials because of the congestion."

984 POLISH JEWS EMIGRATE TO PALESTINE DURING APRIL

Warsaw, May 5.—During the month of April, 984 Polish Jews emigrated to Palestine. The majority of these emigrants belong to the middle class and possess some means.

The Palestine Exhibition which was opened here for six months and attracted wide attention, returned to Palestine yesterday. The Polish Government extended all possible facilities for the import and export of the exhibits.

NEARLY \$2,000,000 CASH IN UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL THROUGHOUT UNITED STATES

Seek \$1,600,000 Cash During May for Maintaining Palestine Budget

A quota of \$1,000,000 cash as the goal of an intensive collection campaign to be carried on throughout the country during May, was adopted at a conference of regional directors of the United Palestine Appeal held at the Hotel Pennsylvania. Emanuel Neumann, National Director of the Appeal, presided at the conference. Speakers emphasized that the success of the United Palestine Appeal this year was the beginning of greater efforts for Palestine on the part of American Jewry in succeeding years.

With \$503,249 cash received during April, making the total cash collections for the United Palestine Appeal almost \$2,000,000 thus far, the directors agreed to raise \$1,000,000 cash during May to meet the present situation in Palestine and provide the funds necessary to carry out the budget so that immigration and colonization work should not be curtailed.

Mr. Neumann in his report on the national campaign, pointed out the success of the present effort. He mentioned New York City which raised \$733,000 last year and \$1,450,000 this year; with \$700,000 cash already turned in; Florida with \$6,000 last year and \$96,000 this year; Chicago which has already sent in \$100,000 cash with another \$100,000 cash promised by June 1st; Pittsburgh with \$26,000 last year and \$78,000 already raised this year; St. Louis which has raised \$60,000 this year as against \$18,000 last year and with \$37,500 cash already remitted; and the Chicago Region which last year raised \$100,000 and which guarantees \$500,000 this year.

Reports submitted by the Regional Directors showed the following results in their territories:

New England—\$105,975.90 last year, \$241,627.06 this year, including \$149,755.47 in cash with \$200,000 cash promised by convention time; Connecticut and Rhode Island—\$93,556.85 last year, \$136,350 this year, including over \$80,000 cash with \$25,000 cash promised by the convention; New Jersey—\$106,846.35 last year, \$75,000 this year including \$38,609 in cash (These figures do not include Newark from which \$100,000 is expected); New York State—\$29,859 last year, \$49,000 this year, including \$72,000 cash; Eastern Pennsylvania—\$219,079.31 last year, \$82,000 so far this year (Several important campaigns are yet to be held, including Philadelphia's \$375,000 effort, just opened in which \$130,000 has already been raised.)

Seaboard—\$123,666.88 last year, \$130,000 thus far this year, including \$74,033.55 in cash, with several important campaigns yet to be completed; Detroit—\$35,158.88 last year, \$105,000 thus far this year, including \$50,000 cash and with \$100,000 cash promised; Ohio and Kentucky—\$68,722 last year, \$20,000 this year, including \$101,000 in cash; Pacific Coast—\$62,699 last year, \$125,000 this year, including \$40,000 cash and with the big Los Angeles campaign just started; Texas—\$29,494 last year, \$75,000 this year, including \$35,000 cash.

The Masonic Club of Bay Ridge presented an American flag to the Congregation Sh'ema Israel of Bay Ridge, Brooklyn, as a token of friendship. Mr. Harry Caul, ex-president of the Masonic Club, made the presentation and Rabbi S. Leo Horowitz, rabbi of the Congregation, gave the acceptance speech.

One-third of the \$375,000 Philadelphia quota of the United Palestine Appeal was raised in the first day of the drive.

The amount reported by the 140 team captains was \$126,000.

American Citizenship, which declared that "the career of Oscar S. Straus, as publicist, exemplifies the opportunities America affords to immigrants and the service they have rendered to the upbuilding of this country, and that in his passing America has lost an outstanding public servant." The resolution was signed by Nathaniel Phillips, President.

A resolution of the League of Nations Non-Partisan Association declared: "In the death of Oscar Straus the cause of international cooperation has lost a pioneer and the League of Nations Non-Partisan Association a valued member and officer. An active Vice President of this association since its founding, his counsels will be greatly missed within our ranks. Oscar Straus was one of the members of the group which drafted the four basic principles eventually embodied in the covenant of the League of Nations, and was in attendance in Paris at the Peace Conference. It is impossible to estimate to what extent the achievements of the League in the last six years have been due to the statesmanlike sagacity and high idealism of this distinguished public servant."

BREVITIES

Ten thousand orphans and crippled children from homes and hospitals of Philadelphia attended the interesting performance of the Ringling Brothers-Barnum and Bailey Circus in Philadelphia, as the guests of Ellis A. Gimbel of the department store firm of Gimbel Brothers of New York and Philadelphia.

Mr. Gimbel started the custom twelve years ago, when 200 children were taken to the circus.

Hugo Rosenberg, retired Pittsburgh manufacturer, died on Monday in New York. He was much interested in philanthropic work. He was 72 years old. Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Pauline Hanauer Rosenberg, former President of the National Council of Jewish Women, and three sisters.

The building and site of Temple Emanu-El, Fifth Avenue and Forty-third Street, passed back into the hands of Benjamin Winter, real estate operator, it was learned yesterday.

The site was purchased in January by William B. Ward, head of the Ward Baking Corporation, and was reported to have been \$650,000. Mr. Ward decided to withdraw from the deal at a loss of \$450,000.

DEPORTATION MEASURE CRITICIZED BY SABATH

Washington, D.C., May 5.—A minority report regarding the Deportation Bill, criticizing the Bill as being too harsh, has been prepared by Congressman Sabath. While he does not object to the original draft of the bill aiming at the deportation of criminals, he finds fault with the present form as reported by the Committee.

Congressman Sabath charges that the original draft was sidetracked as a result of influence which he intimated came from the Ku Klux Klan. His principal criticism is directed against imposing the burden of proof upon the aliens in the deportation proceedings. He also criticizes the increase of the time limit for deporting certain classes, including public charges and mentally deficient persons, as well as deporting aliens guilty of committing any offense punishable by one year imprisonment, instead of crimes involving moral turpitude as provided by the present law. Congressman Sabath will offer amendments to the bill when it comes up for action in the House.

JEWISH COMMUNAL ACTIVITIES

Rabbi Solomon N. Bazell of Altoona, Pa., was the principal speaker at a mass meeting held in Lewistown, Pa., on Sunday night, in connection with the launching of the United Jewish Campaign. The quota of Three Thousand Dollars was over subscribed and a new quota of Five Thousand Dollars was accepted.

Temple Emanu-El, of which Louis Marshall is President, acquired from Mrs. Jessica E. Smith of 11 East Sixty-fifth Street, the properties at 9, 11 and 13 East Sixty-fifth Street, New York, at a purchase price of \$75,000.

This property, together with the Vincent Astor property at the corner of East Sixty-fifth Street and Fifth Avenue, which the congregation has recently acquired, at a figure said to have been about \$350,000, will enable the trustees to erect a much larger community house than was originally planned.

Last December contracts were signed for the sale of the present Temple Emanu-El, on Forty-third Street and Fifth Avenue, and on Jan. 28 of this year Supreme Court Justice Levy granted the plea of the congregation for the sale.

With \$22,880 subscribed at the banquet Saturday night, the United Jewish Campaign in Wilmington, Del., was launched. David Snellenburg was toastmaster and the speakers included Rabbi Nathan Kohn of Temple Emanu-El, New York; Rabbi Louis A. Metchnick, of Temple Beth Emeth; Bishop Philip Cook, of the Protestant Episcopal Diocese of Delaware; the Rev. J. W. Colona, district superintendent of the M. E. Church, A. G. Wilkinson, of the University of Delaware; Louis Topkis and Louis Rosenblatt.

At a mass meeting Sunday night Miss Irma May delivered an address. Rabbi Aaron Titelbaum, of Brooklyn, N. Y., and the Central Relief Committee, also spoke at the meeting.

A conference of Jewish Social workers from all parts of the country will be held in Cincinnati, May 22 to 24. Six hundred delegates are expected to attend.

The executive committee which will receive the visiting delegates is headed by Mr. S. P. Halle. The reception committee is presided over by Mrs. Marc J. Grossman.
