

ARABS AND ZIONISTS WILL SUBMIT MEMORANDA TO MANDATES COMMISSION

Both Formulate Demands to Government and League

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, May 6.—A new memorandum of the Executive of the Christian Muslim Association, known as the Arab Executive, will be submitted to the forthcoming session of the Permanent Mandates Commission which will take place in Geneva in June.

It was learned that the memorandum makes only two points, one referring to article 24 of the Covenant of the League of Nations, providing for the independence of Palestine and the second to articles in the Palestine Mandate providing for local autonomy.

Jerusalem, May 6.—A memorandum of the Zionist Executive in Jerusalem will also be submitted to the Permanent Mandates Commission. The memorandum contains in its first part information with regard to the progress made in Palestine. The second part of the memorandum of the Zionist Executive emphasizes the demands of the Jewish population concerning government grants for Hebrew education and land for Jewish colonization. The memorandum also contains for the first time a demand that the Palestine government participate in the Jewish health budget. The memorandum will criticize the British government for its reply to the letter to Dr. Chaim Weizmann of last October.

CLEVELAND HONORS BIALIK, FAMOUS HEBREW POET, AT PUBLIC FUNCTION

Cleveland, O., May 6.—Chaim Nachman Bialik was honored by the City of Cleveland today. A Hebrew poet corner was set aside near the Shakespeare Gardens where Bialik planted three Cedars of Lebanon.

The City Manager, William Hopkins, uncovered a tablet in the Park in honor of Bialik, commemorating his visit to Cleveland. Prof. A. Hutton, representing Western Reserve University, the poet Edmund Vance Cook and Rabbi Solomon Goldman welcomed the Hebrew poet in the presence of a large audience of Jews and non-Jews.

Bialik delivered an address in Hebrew which was translated by Rabbi Goldman. Bialik declared that the genius of Shakespeare represents the Anglo-Saxon race's contribution to the world; the Bible is the Jewish contribution to the world.

Bialik was tendered a luncheon at the Hotel Hollenden. Dr. Schmarya Levin and Bialik spoke of the achievements in Palestine.

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STATE DEPARTMENT RULING GRANTS ENTRY TO WIVES OF NATURALIZED CITIZENS

Applies to Those Married Before Sept. 22, 1922.

Washington, D. C., May 6.—The wives of naturalized American citizens, who were married before September 22, 1922, are now allowed to enter the United States in full enjoyment of their former matrimonial citizenship, it was announced by the Department of State.

The department is now making it possible for these women to overcome the presumption that they are not citizens (which may arise through their residence for two years in the country of their birth or for five years in another foreign country) provided their husbands have maintained their citizenship unimpaired.

A new ruling of the Department of State covering these cases was added to the regulations published in the issue of April 17, by a departmental order of April 22. This adds the following to the authorized evidence which may be prescribed to overcome the presumption of expatriation against naturalized citizens:

"In the cases of married women who acquired American citizenship through marriage or the naturalization of their husbands before September 22, 1922, and whose husbands are still residing permanently in the United States, that they themselves have made their plans to come immediately to the United States to reside permanently and are applying for passports for that purpose only."

Under previous rulings, these women

DR. ITELSOHN, JEWISH SCIENTIST, DIES OF WOUNDS INFLICTED BY ANTI-SEMITES

Berlin, May 6.—Professor Gregorius Itelsohn, well-known Russian Jewish writer and scientist, died here yesterday as a result of injuries he received when a group of Hakenkreuzler attacked him on Christmas Eve 1925.

The attack was made on him when he was walking on Kuferstendamm in Berlin. It was made by Baron Engelhardt, German anti-Semitic leader.

Baron Engelhardt shouted as he beat Dr. Itelsohn, "Knock down the Jew. Kill him!" Leaving Dr. Itelsohn unconscious and covered with blood, the Baron tried to escape but a taxi driver prevented him and handed him over to the police.

Dr. Itelsohn, who was 74 years old, settled in Berlin in 1885. He was an intimate friend of the Russian writers, Dostoyevsky and Turgenieff, and of the philosopher Dr. Herman Cohen, and Dr. Albert Einstein. He translated the latter's works into Russian.

MOTHER'S DAY IS URGED AS MEMORIAL DAY IN THE UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN

Campaign Work Progresses; Total Reaches More Than \$4,280,000

The amount now raised in New York City by the United Jewish Campaign is more than \$4,280,000, according to David M. Bressler, who announced the receipts for Tuesday as \$225,000. The Lawyers' Division, of which Louis J. Vorhaus is Chairman, announced contributions of \$190,000. The Real Estate Division is credited with \$436,368 and the Jeweler's Committee with \$20,000.

Gov. Smith contributed \$200 and commended the purposes of the drive, saying:

"Called upon again and again to give generously to the unfortunate of the world, New York always finds sufficient resources with which to respond.

"The present plight of the Jew is particularly tragic because the gates of America and other countries are now practically closed to him. In the past his sufferings were mitigated by the outlet of migration. Now this escape is denied him. The American Jew, who has always been so generous in helping his less fortunate brother, will not be indifferent to this noble effort made by the American Jewish leaders who are at the head of the United Jewish campaign."

The suggestion that next Sunday, Mother's Day, should be utilized by the citizens of New York to honor their parents by making additional contributions in their names or memory, to the \$6,000,000 fund, has been taken up by many rabbis who will urge the plan from their pulpits next Saturday and Sunday.

"Most of the citizens of New York City are of foreign parentage, largely from those very countries of the terrific Jewish tragedy we are at-

CLUB OF JEWISH DEPUTIES DECIDES TO PUBLISH TEXT OF POLISH JEWISH PACT

Warsaw, May 6.—The full official text of the Polish Jewish agreement, concluded between the Club of Jewish Deputies and the Grabski government in July, 1925, will finally be published, according to a decision taken yesterday at a general meeting of the Club of Jewish Deputies.

The decision was taken following continual statements made by Minister Grabski, in which he disagreed with the Jewish deputies as to what constituted the agreement. He claimed that only the twelve points published at that time were the points of the agreement, while the representatives of the Club maintain that the number of points was 43.

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DR. SIGMUND FREUD, NOTED PSYCHOANALYST. 70 YEARS OLD TODAY

Einstein and Weizmann Felicitate on
Behalf of Hebrew University

Vienna, May 6.—Dr. Sigmund Freud,
noted psychoanalyst, celebrated his sev-
entieth birthday today.

The famous scientist received many
messages of congratulations from all
parts of the world.

Dr. Albert Einstein, author of the
relativity theory, and Dr. Chaim Weiz-
mann, chemist and president of the
World Zionist Organization, congrat-
ulated Dr. Freud on behalf of the gov-
ernors of the Hebrew University. "Con-
gratulations to our colleague and pioneer
in a new science, discoverer of new
regions of human understanding," Ein-
stein and Weizmann telegraphed.

Among the congratulations was a
message from the Executive of the
World Zionist Organization, wishing
Dr. Freud "continuation of the success-
ful work for the benefit of humanity
and to the honor of the Jewish name."

APPEAL TO FEDERATION OF LABOR FOR ADMISSION OF DECLARANTS' FAMILIES

Washington, May 6.—A delegation
representing the Declarants League
of New York today appealed to offi-
cials of the American Federation of
Labor to support Senator Wads-
worth's and Congressman Perlman's
Bills to exempt thirty-five thousand
wives and children of declarants from
the quota.

Messrs. Robins and Walsh, the offi-
cials of the Federation with whom the
conference was held, promised to
take the matter up with President
Green and the Executive Committee.
It is understood that this was the
first time that the matter was taken
up direct with national Federation offi-
cials. All members of the delegation
are members of unions and made their
appeal in this capacity.

MORGENTHAU RENEWS SUGGESTION TO STUDY THE PALESTINE LOAN QUESTION

Proposes Committee of Prominent
American Jews to Make Survey

The suggestion that a committee of
representative American Jews be sent
to Palestine in connection with ob-
taining a loan for the rebuilding of
Palestine was repeated by Mr. Henry
Morgenthau in an interview with a
representative of the Jewish Tele-
graphic Agency.

Mr. Morgenthau, who first made
the suggestion while in Palestine,
named Felix M. Warburg, Julius
Rosenwald, Herbert H. Lehman, Je-
rome J. Hanauser, Frederick Brown,
Benjamin Winter, Samuel C. Lampert,
Jacob Sperber and Dr. Joseph Rosen
as members of the proposed committee
to study the situation in Palestine and
obtain an accurate picture of conditions
there.

"Palestine," Mr. Morgenthau said,
"cannot be rebuilt merely through
charitable donations. Only when a
large loan will be obtained can 500,000
or more Jews be settled in Palestine.
The men I have mentioned are best
fitted to ascertain the prospects of
colonization in Palestine. They rep-
resent expert banking, agricultural,
manufacturing, transportation, mer-
chandising and realty knowledge, and
their judgment would carry the weight
of authority necessary to create that
confidence in the loan which it re-
quires in order to be successfully
launched."

"Should this committee come to an
adverse conclusion with regard to the
possibility of large immigration to
Palestine, it would finally dispose of
Palestine as the means for a practical
solution of the Jewish question," he
stated. "Palestine would then be des-
tined to become a cultural center."

"I do not believe that the British
Government has an obligation, on ac-
count of its Mandate, to endorse such
a loan. The loan would have to be
based entirely upon the confidence of
the Jewish public in the authority of
this committee and in its belief in the
future of Palestine."

"The Jewish settlements in Pales-
tine have made great progress since
I was there last. When I stood upon
Rothschild Boulevard and Herzl St.
in Tel Aviv, I was impressed by the
remarkably rapid growth of this Jew-
ish city. But I wonder whether the
foundations of this city are sound. If
the Committee which I spoke of found
that the introducing of new industrial
enterprises would be feasible, the
loan of \$50,000,000 would then create
opportunity of employment for the
newcomers. I discussed this plan
recently with Dr. Ruppiner, who until
recently was the head of the Zionist
colonization work in Palestine and he
felt, as I did, that only through a
large loan could development in Pales-
tine attain that scope which it re-

Believes Framers of Pro-Nordic Im- migration Law Have Not Succeeded

That the framers of the new immi-
gration law, based upon "national
origin," to go into effect July, 1927,
have not succeeded in their purpose
of giving exclusive preference to the
so-called Nordic type of immigrants,
is the statement contained in the New
York "Evening World" of May 6.

Pointing out that more than half the
immigrants eligible to admission next
year will come from Great Britain and
Ulster, giving nationals of those coun-
tries an increase over the present law
of almost 150 per cent and that the
quota from the Irish Free State will
be heavily reduced, the paper writes:

"The alleged purpose of the new
law is 'to preserve the old Colonial
stock', most of which came from
Great Britain and Northern or Pro-
testant Ireland, and to accomplish
this end, basing immigrant quotas
upon 'national origin', the framers of
the law have gone to the censuses of
1890 and 1910.

"Even so, the table prepared by
John B. Trevor, an expert on popula-
tion, contains surprises that may as-
tonish even the framers of the bill.
Thus Italy will have an increase
Sweden a decrease of almost 66 2/3%.
Germany will have a reduction of 60%
and Russia will have an increase of
almost 100%. This can hardly con-
tribute much to the happiness of Mr.
Johnson, the Chairman of the Com-
mittee on Immigration."

"The law is deliberately intended
for discrimination, and, despite the ex-
traordinary recourse to the censuses
of 1890 and 1910, it does not appear
according to Mr. Trevor's table, to
have worked out as hoped. The
Scandinavian countries, Germany,
France, Belgium, the Irish Free State
and Switzerland are reduced, and
Great Britain, Ulster, Austria, Russia
and Italy are increased."

The Late Oscar Straus and the American Press

The manner in which the news-
papers of America are writing about
the late Oscar S. Straus, shows, we are
told by Jacob Fishman, in the "Jewish
Morning Journal" (May 6), that there
is no feeling of anti-Semitism in the
American press.

"It is a source of deep gratification
for American Jewry," Mr. Fishman
writes, "especially since nearly all the
newspapers did not forget to empha-
size that Straus started his career as a
poor Jewish boy. Such observations
must have their effect on the wide
American masses. They indicate, at
any rate, that the great American
press is far removed from anti-Semitic
tendencies, and it is a comfort against
the barking of Ford's 'Dearborn In-
dependent.'"

RABBIS CONVENTION CONSIDERS MEASURES TO STRENGTHEN CONGREGATIONAL UNITY

Hears Complaints of Dis Harmony in Communities Over Religious Matters; Appoints Commission of Inquiry

The adoption of measures to bring about greater unity in the ranks of the Orthodox congregations, particularly in relations between the congregations and the rabbis, as well as between the rabbis themselves concerning the supervision of the sale of kosher meat; occupied the attention of the twenty-fourth annual convention of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis in session in Far Rockaway.

The question came up when the communication of a number of Rabbis in Boston asked the convention to intervene in a dispute among the local rabbis in the state of Massachusetts.

Rabbi Eliezer Silver, member of the Executive Committee of the Union, sharply criticized a number of Orthodox rabbis who, because of their unwillingness to cooperate with the other rabbis, bring about disharmony and lower the rabbis in the esteem of the public.

This sentiment was the dominant feature in the long discussion in which Rabbi Joseph Kanowitz, Rabbi Boruchow and Rabbi Zevi Cohen of Montreal, Rabbi Rubinstein of Providence, Rabbi Buening of Trenton, Rabbi Marcus of Baltimore, Rabbi Berger and Rabbi Guzik participated. The proposal was made that those rabbis who work against peace in the communities should be excluded from the Union. A special committee to inquire into the situation and propose further remedial measures was appointed, consisting of Rabbi Gordon of Norfolk, Va., Rabbi Schwartz of Baltimore, Rabbi Ossinsky of Pittsburgh, Rabbi Rubinstein of Providence and Rabbi Popkin of New Bedford.

The convention also considered the relation between the congregational rabbis and the local schochetim, ritual butchers, concerning which the resolution was adopted by which all schochetim who do not accept supervision of rabbis will be declared unfit for their profession after a thirty days' warning.

A resolution was adopted to establish a communal board in communities where there is more than one rabbi.

Rabbi Meyer Berlin received an ovation, addressing the convention before leaving to settle in Palestine. Rabbi Berlin spoke hopefully of the religious and educational progress made in Palestine, especially the growth of the Jewish spirit and religious traditional consciousness. Rabbi Berlin praised the Mizrahi efforts as being responsible for the change. He noted great changes on his last visit to Palestine and hopes to see more in the same direction. He appealed for strengthening the Palestine rabbinate. Rabbi Kanowitz replied and the entire delegation rose.

The evening session was presided over by Rabbi Silver. A gold watch was presented to Rabbi Meyer Berlin by the convention.

A reception was tendered Rabbi M. M. Epstein, Dean of the Hebron Yeshivah and Rabbi Lipshitz of Kalish. Rabbi Lipshitz spoke of the thousands of war agunoth and relief

was urged by him. He asked the rabbis to make an appeal for the revival of landsmanschaften, after the fifteen million dollar United Jewish Campaign drive. Rabbi Finkel of the Mir Yeshivah described study under war and post-war conditions. The convention adopted a resolution for the landsmanschaften revival by acclamation. The Ezra's Torah fund to aid impoverished rabbis, was discussed by Rabbi Rosenberg, Chechnowitz, Rubinstein, Redelheim, Burack, Teitelbaum, Rosen and others. Rabbi Rosenberg pointed to the falling receipts of the fund from eighty thousand to seventeen thousand annually. A resolution to tax each congregation \$25 annually and donations at Bar Mitzvahs was adopted.

HIGHER COURT ACQUITS JEWISH WORKER SENTENCED IN THE AFULEH INCIDENT

Haifa, May 6.—The Jewish workman, Segal, who was sentenced to 12 years imprisonment last June as a result of the quarrel in Afuleh where Jewish workmen had to defend their right to work against neighboring Arab villagers, was acquitted yesterday by the district court here.

Segal was sentenced to 12 years imprisonment and another Jewish workman, Paz, received a sentence of six months' imprisonment at that time by the court in Nablus. Upon appeal, the higher court recently annulled the sentence of the Nablus court and transferred the case to the district court, which acquitted Segal.

Eight Jewish workers and two Arabs were wounded and one Arab was killed in the fight which occurred last November at Afuleh when Jewish workmen who were ploughing on a strip of land were prevented from working by Arabs who threw stones at them. The Jewish workmen then fired on the Arabs.

An official investigation made at the time into the causes of the conflict established the fact that the land over which the fight occurred was not disputable land, but belonged to the American Zion Commonwealth and that the Arabs had no claim on the property. It was also established that only one shot was fired by one of the Jewish workmen.

PALESTINE MORTGAGES TO BE ISSUED IN U. S. DOLLARS

Palestine Government Grants Approval Following Negotiations

Jerusalem, May 6.—The bonds of the General Mortgage Bank of Palestine will be issued in United States dollars for a period of fifteen years, according to a decision of the Palestine government yesterday.

The government finally approved the new statute of the General Mortgage Bank as suggested by the Palestine Securities, Inc., an American Jewish company representing American investors in Palestine mortgages.

Judge Bernard A. Rosenblatt, President of the Palestine Securities, Inc., commenting on the cablegram declared:

"Our contention that Palestine mortgages should be recorded in American dollars has been finally approved by the Palestine Government. This will enable us to sell mortgage bonds in this country in dollar denominations instead of in pounds sterling, as was the case with the bonds of Tel Aviv. It means that holders of Palestine mortgage bonds will not be affected by any change in the exchange rate but will receive their interest and principal in American dollars. It has taken us a whole year to clear up this matter but our directors are now confident that we can dispose of the entire first issue of \$1,000,000 bonds in a short time and realize the plan of encouraging the building of a thousand homes for Jewish immigrants in Palestine. Nearly \$300,000 has been already subscribed by our directors and their friends. A special meeting of the Board of Directors will take place on Monday evening, May 10, at the Zionist headquarters, to deal with this new and favorable situation. As is well known, the Palestine Securities, Inc., is not a private company; it is owned and controlled entirely by the Zionist Organization and the American Zion Commonwealth, in the public interest and for the benefit of Palestine. Our Finance Committee, consisting of Mr. Israel Matz, chairman, Mr. Morris Dilgash, who has agreed to purchase \$50,000 of these bonds, Mr. Jacob Gold and Mr. Isaac Meister, will now make effective plans to raise enough money quickly so as to relieve the housing situation and to solve the unemployment problem that still confronts us in Palestine."

DEAN OF HEBRON YESHIVAH WELCOMED BY N. Y. MAYOR

Rabbi Moses Mordecai Epstein, dean of the Yeshivah of Slabodka, now located in Hebron, Palestine, who comes to this country to obtain additional funds for continuation of the Yeshivah, arrived Wednesday on the Olympic.

This is Rabbi Epstein's second visit to the United States.

Rabbi Dr. S. M. Machtel, former director of the American Hebron Yeshivah Committee, was at the head of a group of welcoming rabbis who met the visitor at the pier.

tempting by this fund, to alleviate," said Mr. Bressler. "But for the circumstance of an earlier immigration by themselves, but more especially by their parents, the vast bulk of New York's Jewish population would have been trapped in Poland, Russia, Roumania, Austria, Germany and the other lands in the hunger belt. Instead, they are enjoying the peace, the political and economic security which is denied to the Jews of Europe. In sheer gratitude to Providence, in especial gratitude to their parents who, by coming to this country, secured them against the calamity that is overwhelming fully one half of the Jews of the world, they should rejoice to utilize Mother's Day for a concrete expression of their thanksgiving. 'Honor thy father and thy mother' is a commandment which Jews have shown to the world that they know how to obey, and I believe that they will demonstrate this again next Sunday."

Fifteen hundred members of the Jewish Theatrical Guild pledged support to the drive. William Morris, president of the Guild, and Sam Bernard, second vice-president, contributed \$1,000 each.

George Jessel was elected chairman of the Jewish Theatrical Committee of the United Jewish Campaign. This Committee will form part of the general Theatrical Division, which has under projection a number of benefit entertainments, the proceeds of which will go to the Campaign.

Mr. Bressler announced a contribution of \$7,500 from Mrs. Henry Morgenthau, wife of the former Ambassador to Turkey, who last week donated a similar amount to the fund. A gift of \$5,000 was received from Mr. and Mrs. Philip Weinstein and also from Max Lowenthal, chairman of the Rubber Division.

A total of \$7,857 was reached by the Accountants' Committee, it was reported by William Greenfield, chairman. The Picture Frame Committee which had a quota of \$10,000, was reported by its chairman, Aaron Scheyer, as raised, and a new goal of \$15,000 set.

22 PASSENGERS DROWN ON WAY TO PALESTINE

620 Immigrants Arrive in One Day

Bucharest, May 6.—Twenty-two passengers were drowned when a steamer going from Odessa to Jaffa was wrecked, according to reports received here.

A radio report from steamers which came to the rescue of the ship said that the majority of the passengers were saved. The name of the boat is not given and no further details are known, except that the steamer flew the Russian flag.

Jerusalem, May 6.—Six hundred and twenty Jewish immigrants landed in Palestine yesterday. The majority of them came from Poland.

have been allowed to enter the United States in the status of non-quota immigrants, as alien wives of American citizens. The new provision recognizes the rights of citizenship which they legally acquired by their marriage to American citizens before the 1922 law.

The women affected by the new ruling include hundreds of wives whose husbands, after coming to this country, have acquired citizenship while leaving their families abroad during the growth of their children, but whose intention of ultimately coming to the United States to join their husbands permanently is now being realized.

The wives, however, of citizens who have been naturalized since September 22, 1922, may acquire citizenship only by their own naturalization. In order to enter the United States they must come as aliens, being admitted with a non-quota immigrant visa as the alien wives of American citizens.
