Prime Minister, many prominent Jew-ish citizens of Kishineff participated, following the Prime Minister's interview with the delegations.

## GOVERNMENTS ALLOW CHASSIDIM TO TRAVEL WITHOUT PASSPORTS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Vienna, May 8.-Recognition of the Chassidic movement by the Czecho-lovakian and Roumanian governments

was granted in a special agreement concluded between the two governments, reports received here state.

The governments agreed to permit the followers of the Chassidic rabbi-called the Wishnitzer Rebbe, who lives

in Grosswardein, Hungary, to travel to Grosswardein five times a year without passports or visas. The governments appointed two Jewish citizens, Chassidic followers, to issue special permits to the Chassidim.

According to Chassidic custom the followers of the Rabbi leave their home and family and come to the rabbi on the five principal holidays.

## SENATOR JOHNSON TELLS DELEGATION HE FAVORS WADSWORTH'S NEW BILL General Averescu Receives Jewish | Approves Measure to Admit 35,000 | Wives and Children of Declarants

(Tewish Daily Bulletin) Washington, May 8.—Senator Hiram Johnson, chairman of the Senate Immi-gration Committee, in a statement made

to the delegation representing the Declarants Immigration League of New York, which called on him yesterday, announced that he favored Senator Wadsworth's new bill to admit 35,000 wives and children of declarants who entered America prior to July 1, 1924. Senator Copeland introduced the delegation to Senator Johnson. Each of the members of the delegation made a touching plea, describing the hardships which result from the separation of wives and children from the heads of the families and also told Senator Johnson of cases where wives abroad committed suicide because they could not secure visas to join their husbands

The delegation also called on Congressman Albert Johnson of the House Immigration Committee, who likewise manifested a sympathetic attitude with regard to the new bill, an almost sinilar counterpart of which has been in-troduced in the House by Congressman Perlman.

NON-JEWS CONTRIBUTE TO U. J. C. AS NEW YORK \$6,000,000 DRIVE ADVANCES Motion Picture Industry Prepares for Participation in Relief Campaign

Further evidence of sympathy by leading non-Jews with the \$6,000,000 United Jewish Campaign of New York is contained in letters received by Acting Chairman David M. Bressler, at the Hotel Biltmore headquarters of the drive. One of the letters was from U. S. Senator James W. Wadsworth, Jr., and the other from Welfare Commissioner Coler.

Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Chairman of Appeal, Made Campaign Possible, Neumann Declares Emanuel Neumann, General Director

I have simply followed the promptings of my heart in giving these months of service as my contribution to Palestine.

FOR OSCAR S. STRAUS DIGEST OF PUBLIC OPINION ON JEWISH MATTERS

> [The purpose of the Digest is informative: Preference is given to papers not generally accessible to our readers. Quotation docs indicate approval.—Editor.] Suggests That Ford Give \$1,000,000 to United Jewish Campaign

The suggestion to Henry Ford that he donate one million dollars to the United Jewish Campaign as a means of substantiating the claim made re-cently in the "Dearborn Independent" to the effect that, so far from being a Jew hater Mr. Ford is a Jew lover, being violently opposed only to the Jew-

ing violentry opposed only to the Jew-ish capitalists, is made by the "Ameri-can Israelite" of May 6.
"Now, talk is cheap," the paper writes, "and The Israelite" would sug-gest to Mr. Ford a very easy way to convince the Jews that he rather loves them than not. The misery and destitution and untimely deaths among the Jews of Europe caused directly by oppression and persecution is most pitiable and a great effort is being made to give what relief we can by raising \$15,000,000 for this purpose. Now Mr. Ford has an income of many millions a year and an accumulated fortune which is reported at a billion. In short, he is said to be the richest man in the world. Now if he were to take one of those millions and donate it to the United Jewish Campaign to be used for the relief of the suffering Jews abroad he would become not only a great benefactor of the Jews but to humanity as a whole."

149,000 - Where Are They?

Criticism of New York Jewry for its showing so far in the United Jewish Campaign drive for \$6,000,000, is voiced in the Forward" (May 8) by Zivion, who feels that the sum of money secured as well as the number of contributors, 10,000, are inadequate compared to the size and wealth of the Jewish community of Greater New York. Assuming that New York has a Jewish population of 1,750,000 the writer observes:

"In a population of 1,750,000 persons we can count close to half a million adults and, even reckoning that donors are exclusively males, there should have been at least a quarter of a million Jews in New York to contribute to the relief drive.

"Well, let us assume that not every one is in a position to give, though everyone should make a special effort to do so in this emergency, ready to deduct 50,000, even 100,000 of such that cannot contribute and there still remain 150,000 who are in a position to give. Up to now only 10,000 have contributed—where are the other 140,000 ?

"And while I am trying to find out what happened to the Jewish masses when they were called on to give a little for the relief of their fellow-Jews in Eastern Europe, I would like to know where the thousands of New York's wealthy Jews have hidden? "The truth is," Zivion believes,

#### LEAGUE OF NATIONS LABOR OFFICE PUBLISHES FIGURES ON PALESTINE IMMIGRATION (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

Geneva, Apr. 28.—The migration movement in Palestine is dealt with in the current issue of the "Monthly Record of Migration", issued here by the International Labor Office of the Learne of Nations, under the heading "Migration in Mandated Terri-

During the year 1924, says the re-port, 13,553 immigrants entered Palestine, of whom 42 per cent came from Poland and 39 per cent from other parts of Eastern and South Eastern Europe. The corresponding figure for 1923 was 7,991. The increase was particularly marked among persons of independent means, merchants, shopkeepers, and manufaceurers who, by their activity and need of houses, created a demand for labor.

In the second half of 1924 there was wry little unemployment among the Jews; this is attributed to the above-mentioned fact, to the reaction upon Palestine of a world-wide economic revival, and to careful restriction of immigration in 1923. Practically no unemployment in the accepted sense of

the term exists among the Arabs.
Emigration amounted to about 2,500
as compared with 4,947 in 1923. Exact figures are available only for the secagues are available only for the sec-oud half of the year and during that time 967 pre-war residents (212 Jews, 321 Christians and 236 Moslems) and 342 post-war residents (295 Jews, 32 Christians, and 15 Moslems) emigrated.

There was, therefore, a considerable diminution in the emigration move-ment accompanied by a big increase in immigration, and it will be noted that the great majority of the emi-

grants were pre-war residents.

Of the 13,553 immigrants, 12.856 were Jews and 697 non-Jews. They may be classified in the following catgories: 5,420 persons of capital or assured income; 2,327 dependants of residents in Palestine; 3,451 working men and women and others coming to employment; 2,203 dependents of those in the previous category; and 152 persons with assured incomes settling for religious purposes.

The principal countries from which the immigrants came were Poland (5,702), Russia (2,157), Lithuania (750) (504), Yussia (5137), Linuania (527), Roumania (528), Germany (552), Ukraine (504), Yemen (445), Turkey (389), United States (361), Bulgaria (358) and Greece (337). It will be noted that the overwhelming majority of the immigrants came from Central Eastern and South Eastern Europe. The number of persons rejected at

the frontiers or ports for failure to comply with the immigration regulations was 450. The British Government states in its

replies to the questionnaire of the Permanent Mandates Commission of the League of Nations for 1924 that

#### OUR DAILY NEWS LETTER

(By Our Paris Correspondent) Paris, Apr. 15 .- A bird's eye view of

the leading Jewish communities in Morocco is contained in a report issued by the Central Committee of the Alliance Israelite from its secretary, Mr. Bigart, who visited the Morrocan Jews on behalf of this Committee in order to study their economic and moral conditions as well as the work of the schools founded by the Alliance in that country. The main points of Mr. Bigart's report follow:

Tangier, Feb. 14, 1926.—I arrived here on Feb. 12th and was met at the pier by Mr. Abensor, President of the Jewish Community, and by Mr. Cohen, the vice-president. On the 14th I visited the Boys' School which is located in a very fine building, the class rooms being large and well distributed, with good ventilation and abundant light. The Girls' School is located in a very fine house, a real palace, which although it was not built for a school, meets all the requirements of a model and modern school. The teaching staff is of the best and the courses of study up to standard.

The first school founded by the Alliance in Morocco was that at Tetuan in 1864 and in Tangier in 1864. Larache, Feb. 15 .- The Principals of the schools at Larache report that the

conditions here are lamentable. I visited one of the schools and found in a class room 50 students when there should not have been more than 20 or 25. I called the attention of the Principals that the Alliance could not allow such unsanitary conditions to exist. On visiting the village I discovered that there was no suitable house for a school to be had and under the circumstances it was decided that it would be worse to close the schools than to allow the existing conditions to continue. number of students is around 300 and they come from every part of Morocco.

El Ksar, Feb. 16.—The Jewish community consists of approximately 2,000 and is very poor. The Spanish Consulate has founded a school for the Jews. The number of students is around 250. The School buildings are worse than in Larache, being dark, damp and smail.

Rabat, Feb. 18 .- Yesterday we had an audience with Mr. Steeg, the Resident General of Morocco. We also called General of Morocco. on Mr. Hardy, Director General of Public Instruction, to whom we outlined our plans and I am glad to say that my impression is that the Protectorate expects to carry out a complete and prompt reorganization. The Boys' School is located in the barracks which are unsuitable for such purposes, but Mr. Hardy promised to remedy the situation as soon as the war with the Riffs is over. The principal of the Girls School is Mile. Pereyre who is an excellent teacher and is obtaining splendid central teacher and is obtaining specially submitted to the Alliance in due time. a Jewish population of 20,000, most of them having come from the interior. from the South and other points of the South are extremely poor; however, there are a number of rich Jews and others are quite comfortable. schools are in poor condition, there being too many pupils for the size of the buildings in which they are located.

The Jews of Morocco are of a unique origin, those from the interior are from Arabic extraction, whereas those from the North and West are of Spanish and Portuguese extraction. This difference in origin can be detected in their feat-

ures, faith and mentality. In Tangier and the seacoast towns where the Jewish population is of Spanish extraction and speaks the Spanish language, the Jews are more advanced, of higher mentality and more Europeanlike than those of Meknes, Fez or Marrakech who are mostly from the interior and act like Arabs or barbarians. In short, our schools have given better results in the coast than in the interior and the contact of the Jews with the foreigners of all nationalities is bene-

ficial to them Azemour, Feb. 22 .- We stopped this Azemour, Feb. 22—We stopped this morning at Azemour, a village of the interior from where the Jewish population has emigrated largely, there being now only approximately 500, most of them having gone to Casablanca or Mazagan. The French-Jewish school is under a Catholic teacher who is doing splendid work and is on excellent terms with the Jewish people. I was exceedingly pleased to find in this village a school suitably quartered, well managed and where are taught the principal ele-

mentary subjects. Mazagan, Feb. 22.—The school here is beautiful having been built by the community on a plot given by the Alliance. The class rooms are large and there is plenty of light. The pupils are intelligent but there are quite a number of albino children having poor eye sight. The school has given excellent results, the children are well dressed, speak nicely and in general have a European appearance, in fact much more European than many large villages of France an than many large vineless of rance and this speaks very highly of our meth-ods of education and the system em-ployed. The French-Jewish school is under Mr. Jordan and this will be turned over by us and a new building will be constructed by the community with funds advanced by us which they will refund. This proposition will be submitted to the Alliance in due time.

immigration continues to be regulated so that it shall not exceed the capacity of the country to absorb new arrivals. It is now controlled by a Permits Section of the Government and passport control is in the hands of Customs Officers. The Palestine immigration Officers. The Palestine immigration officer in Europe was transferred during 1924 from Trieste to Warsaw owing to the large proportion of immi-grants coming from Poland. The He'chalutz Organization has been

formed with the support of the Zionist Organization for the purpose of training prospective Jewish immigrants in agriculture and manual labor. T+ has branches throughout Eastern Europe and its membership reaches 20,000. It maintains training farms. apprentices, prospective immigrants to Jewish landowners for instruction, and has established workshops for training in the building, engineering and metal trades, joinery, cabinet-making, etc. 10,000 ex-members of the Organization are already settled in Pales-

The total Jewish population of Palestine amounted at the end of 1924 to about 108,000, of whom 23,000 were engaged in rural pursuits. In 1924. 21,000 acres of agricultural land were purchased by Jews and 14 new settlements were established. The total area of land in Jewish ownership was about 319 square miles.

Preliminary figures have been issued for 1925 showing that 33,801 Jews entered Palestine as immigrants in that year and that 2,141 Jews departed.

so that it shall not exceed the capacity of the country to absorb new arrivals. It is now controlled by a Permits Section of the Government and passport control is in the hands of Customs Officers. The Palestine immigration officer in Europe was transferred dur-ing 1924 from Trieste to Warsaw owing to the large proportion of immi-grants coming from Poland. The He'chalutz Organization has been

formed with the support of the Zionist Organization for the purpose of training prospective Jewish immigrants in agriculture and manual labor. has branches throughout Fastern Firrope and its membership reaches 20,000. It maintains training farms. apprentices, prospective immigrants to lewish landowners for instruction, and has established workshops for training in the building, engineering and tnetal trades, joinery, cabinet-making, etc. 10,000 ex-members of the Organization are already settled in Pales-

The total Jewish population of Palestine amounted at the end of 1924 to about 108,000, of whom 23,000 were engaged in rural pursuits. In 1924. 1,000 acres of agricultural land were purchased by Jews and 14 new settlements were established. The total area of land in Jewish ownership was about 319 square miles. Preliminary figures have been issued

for 1025 showing that 33,801 Jews entered Palestine as immigrants in that year and that 2141 Jews departed.
