## **ARAB EXECUTIVE ASKS LEAGUE COMMISSION OF INQUIRY FOR PALESTINE**

Memorandum Submitted to League Through High Commissioner (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, May 10.—The demand that the League of Nations send a commission of inquiry to Palestine was made in a memorandum of the Palestine Arab Executive submitted to the High Commissioner, Lord Plumer, for transmission to the Permanent Mandates Commission of the League of Nations.

The Commission would not only help the League to arrive at a final decision on the Palestine question, but would also assist the Palestine administration which is now drifting into stagnation and corruption, the memorandum states.

The memorandum also demands the creation of a national democratic government in Palestine in accordance with Article 22 of the League covenant and Article 3 of the Palestine Mandate.

Next Friday what is termed the All-Palestine Congress is to be opened. It was stated that the purpose of the Congress was to reestablish the union of Arab parties.

## **JEWISH PAVILION OPENED AT DUSSELDORF EXHIBITION**

Dusseldorf, May 10.—The Jewish pavilion in the German Hygiene Exhibition was opened here yesterday with special ceremonies in the presence of many government representatives.

The pavilion is erected in the style of Solomon's Temple and contains several divisions, having exhibits of Jewish sanitary work, social service, Judaism and Palestine. Many persons visited the exhibition.

## **ROSENWALD GIVES \$5,000 TO VIENNA TECHNICAL MUSEUM**

Vienna, May 10.—A donation of \$5,000 to the Technical Museum in Vienna was given by Julius Rosenwald before he left Vienna, it was learned here today.

Mr. Rosenwald made his contribution following an investigation of the technical museum in connection with his plans to erect a technical institute in Chicago.

## **ROUMANIAN JEW WILLS 20% OF ESTATE TO PALESTINE**

Vienna, May 10.—Dr. Paul Weisen-grien, a Zionist, bequeathed 20% of his estate to the Keren Hayesod.

The estate of the late Dr. Weisen-grien, situated in Roumania, is considered to be of great value.

## **\$1,500,000 STILL TO BE RAISED IN GREATER NEW YORK UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN**

Numerous Contributions Received on Mother's Day, Report Shows

Contributions to the United Jewish Campaign reached a total of \$4,401,020, by Sunday, May 9. This leaves the amount of \$1,598,980 still to be raised toward New York's \$6,000,000 quota.

Contributions to the fund made by Jews and non-Jews in commemoration of Mother's Day were reported on Sunday.

The Brooklyn committee, headed by Judge Grover M. Moscovitz, which has a quota of \$1,200,000, passed the \$700,000 mark. This sum is \$50,000 larger than the entire amount raised from Brooklyn Jewry in the 1922 War-Sufferers' Campaign, when \$650,000 was raised in 22,000 individual contributions. The present \$700,000 total was obtained from slightly over 2,000 persons making a per-capita average contribution of approximately \$340.

Among the subscriptions a large number are from non-Jews in response to the direct appeal.

Mr. Thomas J. Stewart, sending \$100 wrote:

"Since a Gentile dollar will buy as much bread as a Jewish dollar, I am enclosing my check for \$100. This is a cause to which everyone should help."

Judge Salvatore A. Cotillo of the New York State Supreme Court, in sending a contribution of \$100, wrote:

"I have always admired the way in which the Jewish people in America take of their own, and they set an example that others might well follow. I regret

## **DAMASCUS WARFARE IS RENEWED, REPORTS SAY**

French Bombard Quarter

Jerusalem, May 10.—Renewed warfare is reported in despatches from Damascus received here today.

The rebels have concentrated in the Midan quarter where they have transformed the houses into fortresses and arsenals. Women and children have been removed from the quarter. The French are preparing a general attack on the city and bombarded the quarter of Midan today. In the fierce battle which followed the bombardment, 50 rebels were killed, the despatch states.

## **ANTI-SEMITES CANDIDATES IN ROMANIAN ELECTIONS**

Bucharest, May 10.—Anti-Semitic candidates will run for elections in the forthcoming parliamentary contest in forty-three election sections, it was learned today.

The candidates are supported by the Cuza party, followers of the anti-Semitic leader, Professor Alexander Cuza.

## **AMERICAN SYNAGOGUE COUNCIL, OF ALL SHADES OF JUDAISM, IS FORMED**

To Unite Reform, Conservative and Orthodox for Common Counsel

Organization of the Synagogue Council of America, embracing Reform, Conservative and Orthodox congregational groups of Judaism was announced by Dr. Abram Simon, of Washington, D. C., chairman of the new body. The aim of this organization is to promote fellowship and mutual cooperation in religious endeavors among all Jewish organizations in America.

At a meeting at the Harmonie Club, New York, at which there were present representatives of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, the Central Conference of American Rabbis, United Synagogue of America, Rabbinical Assembly, Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations, and Rabbinical Council of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations, a constitution was adopted to create a permanent organization. The constitution is subject to ratification by the six constituent organizations.

The first conference, out of which the Rabbinical Council of America grew, was called by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, following a resolution passed at the last biennial convention of the Union.

A declaration of purposes of the new organizations states that it "recognizes the fundamental spiritual unity which binds us as Jews, believes that the synagogue is the basic and essential unit in Jewish life, and believing in the desirability of taking counsel together for the sacred purpose of preserving and fostering Judaism in America, desires to speak and act unitedly in furthering such religious interests as all these constituent national organizations share in common." The new organization will not attempt to interfere with the religious or ad-

## **SABATH INTRODUCES DEPORTATION BILL**

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, May 10.—Congressman Sabath has introduced a drastic bill for the deportation, without trial, of aliens arrested for carrying concealed weapons, owning or operating gambling or lottery devices, violating the narcotic law, the white slave laws or owning houses of ill fame.

Congressman Sabath described the measure as "The most stringent deportation bill ever introduced," explaining that he had always been in favor of protecting America against the above-mentioned classes. The deportation bill reported by the Committee, however, is unnecessarily harsh against certain classes," Congressman Sabath stated.

# I.O.B.B. WILL RAISE \$2,000,000 FUND FOR EXTENSION OF ORGANIZATION'S WORK

Louis W. Osterweis, New York At-  
torney, Elected President of  
District No. 1

Louis W. Osterweis, a New York At-  
torney, was elected President of the  
District No. 1, Independent Order B'nai  
Brith, the largest American Jewish frater-  
nity with a membership of over sixty  
thousand, at the seventy-fourth annual  
convention of the Order held Sunday  
at the Astor Hotel. He succeeded Ber-  
tram M. Aufessser.

Over 200 delegates representing ninety  
lodges in the district were present  
when Mr. Aufessser, retiring president,  
delivered his annual message in which  
he reviewed the activities of the order  
during the last year and declared that  
the fraternity is about to launch a cam-  
paign for \$2,000,000 for the purpose of  
continuing and extending the work of  
the fraternity. The fund is to be used  
for various social service and relief  
work, particularly for the maintenance  
of the B'nai Brith Hillel Foundations  
which are functioning now in the State  
Universities of Illinois, Wisconsin and  
Ohio. A fourth foundation is to be  
established shortly in the University of  
Michigan.

A lively discussion took place at the  
convention with regard to the Old Age  
Home owned by the District at Yonkers.  
The Home which was established  
in 1882 has a capacity of housing 110  
persons while the present number of  
inmates is only twenty-eight. The  
President, in his message, suggested that  
the home at Yonkers be sold and a new  
one be erected at another site so as to  
comply with the present needs. The  
membership of the Order has attained  
such a degree of prosperity that it is  
unlikely that the number of inmates of  
the Home would be much larger, was  
one of the arguments.

The newly elected Executive Commit-  
tee consists of the following: Maurice  
Bloch of New York, first vice-president;

## ALFRED COHEN, PRESIDENT OF I. O. B. B., HONORED AT NEW YORK BANQUET

Says Oscar Straus Would Not Have  
Been Admitted to U. S. Under  
Present Immigration Law

"Oscar S. Straus, late United States  
Cabinet Member, Ambassador to  
Turkey, philanthropist and statesman,  
would not have been in a position to  
serve this country in the manner  
which he did had the immigration law  
then been similar to that in operation  
now," declared Hon. Alfred M. Cohen,  
Cincinnati banker and industrialist  
and President of the Independent  
Order B'nai Brith, at a dinner given  
in his honor Sunday night at the Astor  
Hotel by the District Grand Lodge,  
No. 1.

Mr. Cohen, who was elected to the  
presidency of the Order last year at  
the Convention of the fraternity in  
Atlantic City, came to New York for  
the purpose of delivering the presiden-  
tial message to the convention of the  
District No. 1.

Maurice Bloch, leader of the Democ-  
rats in the New York State Legisla-  
ture, Supreme Court Justice Mitchell  
May, Louis W. Osterweis, the newly  
elected President of the District,  
Bertram M. Aufessser, the retiring  
President of the district and others  
were speakers at the dinner which was  
attended by 500 persons.

Mr. Cohen in his address reviewed  
the history of the Order which was  
originated in New York City 84 years  
ago when the Jewish population in the  
United States was less than 25,000.  
The originators of the fraternity set  
out on a work of bettering the posi-  
tion of the Jew and maintaining his  
high reputation in the United States.  
The Order has in the course of its  
existence functioned as a social  
service agency, as an Americanization  
agency and has occupied a central  
position in Jewish life in America,  
serving as a factor for uniting the  
community.

Mr. Cohen lamented the fact that  
much strife and division is to be  
noticed at present among American  
Jews and made a strong plea for unity.  
He pointed to the fact that the In-  
dependent Order B'nai Brith is a democ-  
ratic organization striving to minister  
to the need of the Jew as well as to  
his strength. He dwelt particularly  
on the work of the B'nai Brith Hillel  
Foundations.

The cornerstone of the new building for the  
congregation of Ohav Zedek Synagogue, at  
118 West Ninety-fifth Street, New York, was  
laid Sunday. The principal address was  
delivered by Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein, of the  
Institutional Synagogue. Other speakers were  
Dr. Louis L. Harris, Health Commissioner,  
and Judge Henry M. R. Goodman. Cantor  
Joseph Rosenblatt sang. The cornerstone was  
set in place by William Weiss, William  
Friede and Emil Neid.

It is the fifth time in its fifty years of existence  
that the increase in the congregation has  
compelled the synagogue to seek a new home.

The campaign to raise funds for the Yeshi-  
vah in Hebron, Palestine, will be launched  
Sunday evening, May 16 when Rabbi Mordecai  
Friede Epstei, dean and founder of the  
Yeshivah, will be honored at a \$100-a-plate  
banquet at the Hotel Astor.

Morris Stern, Chairman of the dinner com-  
mittee, announced that more than 1,000 per-  
sons are expected to attend the dinner Sunday.

## DIGEST OF PUBLIC OPINION ON JEWISH MATTERS

### On Conditions in Palestine

Observations on the present situation  
in Palestine are contained in the New  
York "Times" of May 9 from its Jeru-  
salem correspondent, T. Walter Wil-  
liams. The correspondent praises the  
Zionist immigrants, who, he stresses,  
have changed the appearance of the  
country, but he offers criticism on a  
number of points. Thus, he writes, in-  
ter alia:

"There is a slump in business in  
Palestine at the present time because  
of a lack of capital and the inexperience  
of the people. There has also been  
trouble with the labor organizations,  
whose leaders are mostly Russian Com-  
munists and are trying to get control  
of the Municipal Governments in Jeru-  
salem, Haifa and Jaffa. Wealthy Jews  
who came from Europe and America to  
invest their money have gone away be-  
cause they could not see any prospect  
of a good return."

Voicing the opinion that stricter im-  
migration laws are needed to keep out  
old people who have no capital and are  
liable to become public charges, the  
correspondent gives the following views  
on Tel-Aviv:

"Tel-Aviv, the new Jewish city which  
adjoins ancient Jaffa, is going ahead  
and has a population nearly 40,000.  
What they are all going to live upon I  
have not been able to discover, as no  
one I have met in this country seems  
to know. They say trade, in a vague  
sort of way, and also express the hope  
that wealthy Jews who have retired  
from business in the United States will  
come to Tel-Aviv to end their days.

"In 1924 there was a large influx of  
Jews from Poland with moderate cap-  
ital, which caused a real estate boom in  
Tel-Aviv. They bought large tracts of  
land from the Moslem owners. When  
the fluctuation of the zloty came in  
Poland, most of them lost their for-  
tunes and further immigration into  
Palestine from that country of men  
with moderate capital stopped. About  
twenty-five of the leading speculators in  
Tel-Aviv went bankrupt through the  
stoppage of their credit by the banks  
and had to dispose of their land hold-  
ings at heavy losses."

In conclusion the correspondent  
summarizes his general impressions,  
in the course of which he lauds Col.  
Frederick H. Kish, the political repre-  
sentative of the Zionist Organization  
in Palestine.

"Those who have known the pre-  
war Palestine," he declares, "are  
much surprised when they visit the  
country to find how the Zionist im-  
migrants have changed its appearance  
by building substantial farm houses  
and good roads and tilling the land in  
every direction. In the rock sections  
the old terraces of the Bible days have

# WINTER IS REELECTED PRESIDENT OF POLISH JEWISH FEDERATION Convention Adopts Protest Resolution Against Polish Government's Treatment of Jews

A resolution protesting against the Polish government for the mistreatment of Jewish citizens of Poland was adopted at the annual convention of the Federation of Polish Hebrews which held its session in Newark. About 300 delegates participated, in the meeting which took place under the chairmanship of Benjamin Winter.

Rabbi Ezekiel Lipschitz of Poland, Rabbi Joseph Kanowitz of Newark, Rabbi I. Z. Grohbar, Louis Lipsky, and David A. Brown addressed the convention.

Other resolutions adopted urged the membership to support the Palestine rebuilding work, to participate in the American Jewish Congress movement, to aid the United Jewish Campaign and to demand representation for the Federation in the Executive of the Joint Distribution Committee.

A budget of \$28,500 was adopted for the coming year, \$13,000 having been raised at the convention in response to an appeal by Mr. Winter.

Mr. Winter was reelected president and Charles Green, vice-president. Other members of the Executive are Mr. S. Rosenfeld, Mr. H. Tash, Mr. A. Schmidt, A. Rosenstein, H. Berman and Mr. S. Katz.

The convention also decided to take steps toward building a center in New York city for the members.

The cornerstone for the new synagogue being built by the Shaarei Zion Congregation, in Baltimore, Md., was laid. Rabbi Adolph Cohen, of the Chink Anno Synagogue; Rabbi Samuel Hurwitz, of the Ahavas Shalom Synagogue, and E. Milton Altfield, Assistant State's Attorney, were the principal speakers. Simon Lane was chairman of the committee on arrangements. Emanuel Gorfin was the master of ceremonies.

The eighteenth annual convention of National Young Judaea, American Jewish youth organization, will meet at the Hotel Scarborough, Long Branch, N. J., on May 23.

The thirty-first annual meeting of the Home for Hebrew Infants was held in the main building of the institution, Sunday morning. Dr. Louis I. Harris, Commissioner of Health, was the principal speaker, and Aaron E. Norman, President of the Home, presented the annual report.

# STOPPAGE OF INCOME FROM EASTERN EUROPE AGGRAVATES PALESTINE SITUATION

American Zionists Urged to Greater  
Efforts; Ask for \$1,000,000 Cash  
in May

The serious situation in Palestine caused by stoppage of income from Eastern Europe, as revealed in reports from the Palestine Zionist Executive, which emphasize that up-building activities have had to be curtailed in consequence, has resulted in the launching of an intensive collection campaign to raise one million dollars in cash during May from pledges made to the United Palestine Appeal, a statement issued by the Zionist headquarters declared.

Leaders of the United Palestine Appeal took this action following receipt of a cable from Colonel Frederick Kisch of the Palestine Zionist Executive which stated:

"Stoppage of income from Eastern European countries creates a serious situation which I am constrained to call to your attention. The mounting deficit has already forced a curtailment of our activities. Thousands in Poland are unable to immigrate to Palestine. Colonization, expansion and consolidation jeopardized, schools overcrowded and unable to advance sufficient credits to combat unemployment. America is doing splendidly but must do even better. Substantial increase of May remittance essential or we will be forced to make further curtailment."

Plans for collecting a Million Dollars cash during May were worked out by a National Conference of regional directors which took place in New York. During April, \$503,249 was received at national headquarters on account of United Palestine Appeal contributions, making a total of almost \$2,000,000 cash received thus far during the campaign.

A call issued by Herman Conheim, National Treasurer of the United Palestine Appeal, urges prompt conversion of pledges into cash to meet the present emergency.

# ABRAHAM HERMAN ELECTED PRESIDENT OF THE HIAS

Mr. Abraham Herman was elected president of the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society of America to succeed Mr. John L. Bernstein, who held the office of president for nine years, and Mr. Joseph Baroness was elected vice-president at the last meeting of the Board of Directors of the society.

Mr. Baroness, who was nominated for the presidency, declined to accept because of his participation in other Jewish organizations.

# RACE DETERMINING FACTOR IN REGARD TO HARVARD APPLICANTS. HE ADMITS

Racial Characteristics Making for  
"Isolation" Are Part of Students'  
Record

Boston, May 10.—Race and place of residence are to be part of the qualifications of candidates for admission to Harvard College under the new rule of "character, personality and promise," according to Henry S. Pennypacker, Chairman of the Committee on Admissions which administers this rule.

Mr. Pennypacker's statement was contained in the Gaddy, publication of the Harvard Student Liberal Club, on Saturday.

A committee of six undergraduate and graduate students, all members of the Liberal Club, interviewed Mr. Pennypacker recently and asked him the following questions:

How far are the new regulations designed to preserve a balance between racial groups? Between social groups?

Mr. Pennypacker stated that the traditional policy of freedom from discrimination on the grounds of race or religion is still of binding force and effect. He then declared:

"Race is a part of the record. It is by no means the whole record and no man will be kept out on grounds of race. But those racial characteristics which make for race isolation will, if they are borne by the individual, be taken into consideration as a part of that individual's characteristics under the test of character, personality and promise."

The new rule which the Committee on Admissions will interpret and which it is alleged will result in discrimination particularly against unfavored races reads:

"Candidates should bear in mind that in all admissions to the university regard is given to character, personality

# J. N. F. WILL RAISE \$5,000,000 FOR PALESTINE REBUILDING

A resolution recommending that \$5,000,000 be raised through a loan for the rebuilding of Palestine was adopted at the conference of the Jewish National Fund on the occasion of the celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of its establishment. Judge Bernard A. Rosenblatt presided at the conference, which was held at the Pennsylvania Hotel. Louis Lipsky, Mr. Remez and Mr. Abraham Hartzfeld of the Palestine Jewish Labor Federation, Rabbi H. Masliansky, Dr. S. Bernstein and Dr. A. E. Abramowitz were among the speakers.

The convention also favored the proposal to inscribe in the Golden Book of the Fund the names of the six presidents of the United States who endorsed the Jewish Homeland movement. They are John Adams, Benjamin Harrison, Theodore Roosevelt, Woodrow Wilson, Warren G. Harding and Calvin Coolidge.

Although the Jewish National Fund is twenty-five years old, the convention was the first held in America. More than 150 delegates were present.

ministrative autonomy of any of the constituent members, it was stated.

The first united endeavor of the Rabbinical Council will be to arrange for a Jewish religious and educational exhibit at the Sesqui-Centennial exposition at Philadelphia. Rabbi Herbert Goldstein, of New York, Rabbi Solomon Foster, of Newark, and Rabbi Louis Wolsey, of Philadelphia, were appointed as a committee to arrange for this exhibit, and to enlist the co-operation of the American Jewish Historical Society and other organizations in arranging for it. To meet the expenses of the exhibit a fund of \$10,000 will be sought. ## HAKOAH WINS IN CHICAGO GAME WITH SCORE OF 6-1

Chicago, May 10.—The Hakoah soccer team of Vienna defeated the Sparta club, of the Chicago major league, at the White Sox park, yesterday, by a score of 6 to 1. A crowd of 15,000 watched the game.

The Hakoah team made a brilliant attack and a sustained defense that had the Sparta players completely baffled.

It was the playing of Neufeld, at outside right, and Gruenwald, at inside left, that gave Hakoah its triumph. Neufeld outsmarted the Sparta defense continually and made one goal, while Gruenwald sent the ball crashing into the net for three tallies. Fabian, at goal, played a great defensive game.

Ike Walker was the outstanding star for Sparta.

Both teams threatened in the opening minutes, Gruenwald scoring the first goal when the period was about half gone. Clever offensive work by Neufeld drew the Sparta defense out of position and gave Gruenwald a clear shot. The Hakoah inside left again found the net five minutes later with a hard drive after Schoenfeld had headed the ball to him. Before Sparta could recover the Jewish eleven rushed the ball down the field for another goal. Neufeld worked the ball down to the 18-yard line and passed to Wortmann, who netted the shot. The half ended with Hakoah leading, 3 to 0.

Sparta returned in the second half with an altered line-up and opened up with a drive that brought its only score. After the ball had been booted within the 18-yard line, Nevrla sent a drive straight at the net. Fabian blocked the kick, but was knocked down by the force of the blow. Krabec took the ball on the rebound from Fabian's chest and drove it into the net before the Hakoah goal could regain his feet.

Schoenfeld scored for Hakoah near the middle of the half on a short hard kick that did not leave the ground. Eigbrecht got his hands on the ball but could not hold it and it trickled through for a point. Gruenwald narrowly missed another marker a moment later when his kick hit the crossbar and bounded into the right field bleachers. Just before the final whistle he again crossed the Sparta defense for his third goal.

"For purposes of identification," he said, "as evidence of character, personality, and promise, only very vague in the case of candidates not seen."

The board decided to issue a monthly periodical in the interest of furthering religious education.

Plans for the erection of a new synagogue in New Brunswick, N. J., have been adopted. The building will cost approximately \$50,000. It will be erected for the Ohav Amet Ansh Ungarn congregation composed of over 250 members.
