NO ANTI-SEMITIC RIOTS IN WARSAW DURING FIRST TWO DAYS OF PILSUDSKI COUP, J. T. A. CORRESPONDENT CABLES

Despatches Coming Through Vienna and Berlin Tell of Excesses;
Pilsudski Asks Witos to Protect Jews in Warsaw, Despatch Says

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, May 15.—During the first two days of the Pilsudski coup d'état no serious anti-Jewish riots took place in the capital. The Jewish quarter of Warsaw, which remained outside of the region of the military operations between the two contending parties, was not affected by the fighting.

Any reports of anti-Jewish excesses having occurred up to today are not true, the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency in Warsaw declares.

The correspondent found it impossible to send his regular despatches yesterday in view of the fact that the Jewish Telegraphic Agency office, located at Ulica Aleje Jerozolimskie Nr. 18, was within the region of the military operations.

Vienna, May 15.—What is considered to be the first authentic despatch received by the Polish Embassy here from the Polish Foreign Office declares today that Marshal Jozef Pilsudski and President Stanislaw Wojciechowski are jointly in charge of the affairs of the state.

A despatch of the Polish Telegraphic Agency received here from Warsaw declares that Marshal Pilsudski will, during the day, restore the normal situation in the Polish capital. The slow course of events was necessary because the Marshal desired to prevent unnecessary bloodshed.

The first official statement issued by Marshal Pilsudski and forwarded by the Polish Telegraphic Agency to

Vienna declares that "the Marshal has no intention of instituting a military dictatorship in the Republic of Poland, but wishes to create a non-party government."

The same despatches received here state that the Witos cabinet was interned in Wilanow in the vicinity of Warsaw.

Rail traffic has been suspended with a radius around the capital of 60 kilometers, where the forces of Marshal Pilsudski stop and disarm the adversary troops arriving in the capital.

During the anti-Jewish excesses which took place in Warsaw in Bank Square, Marshal Pilsudski, despatches received here state, sent emissaries to Wincenty Witos, asking him to issue instructions to the old government troops to extend protection to the Jewish population and to suppress the excesses.

The Polish newspaper of Lodz, "Lodzkie Wladonosci," published yesterday an interview with Marshall Pilsudski, which he granted following his entry into Warsaw.

"I have accomplished the overthrow of the Witos government because the injustice of the Polish government circles reached unbearable proportions," Pilsudski is quoted as having said. "I have never striven for power, but this time I was aggravated to the utmost. Besides, I am making no coup d'état but an armed demonstration."

Quiet prevailed in the Polish provincial towns, despatches received here state.

Berlin, May 15.—Twenty-five Jews were killed yesterday during the street fighting in Warsaw, according to the reports of Jewish refugees who arrived here.

Warsaw, May 15.—The forces of Marshal Jozef Pilsudski control central Poland completely and the largest part of the Eastern Provinces of the

SIX MILLION BY TONIGHT,
SLOGAN OF UNITED JEWISH
CAMPAIGN WORKERS IN N.Y.
Philadelphia Forwards \$250,000 to the
U. J. C. Headquarters

"Six Million by Monday night" is the slogan of the workers in the New York United Jewish Campaign.

Acting-Chairman Bressler announced that the total raised was \$5,301,050, leaving \$695,000 still to be raised.

Judge Grover M. Moscovitz, chairman of the Brooklyn division reported that the total for the borough had reached \$866,651. The Flatbush share in Brooklyn's total is \$116,000; the Eastern Parkway share \$131,000, the Bedford-Stuyvesant section's share \$65,300, and Manhattan Beach \$31,000.

Queen's County, under the leadership of Dr. Isaiah Frank has raised \$74,000 toward which Jamaica contributed \$32,000, Flushing \$22,000 and Astoria \$20,000. Richmond Hill, which "seceded" from the Jamaica division in order to run its own campaign has raised \$20,000.

Rabbi Ezekiel Lipschitz, President of the Union of Polish Rabbis, who is now on a visit to America, issued an appeal to his countrymen in New York urging them to contribute to the United Jewish Campaign.

"It was the will of God that I should come to this country at a time when it is possible for me to help in this great campaign. The great work done in Poland and other countries by the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee must be continued by the renewal of its funds through this campaign. It kept alive the body of Israel through the tragic years by feeding the hungry and healing the sick. And it kept alive the soul of Israel by maintaining the religious schools and academies where the Holy Torah is taught. "I call on you to make next Thursday, the second day of Shebuoth, a day of special moment to our people. Let those who have not already given do so

ROUMANIAN ANTI-SEMITIC MURDERERS ARE ARRESTED

Bucharest, May 15.—Lieutenant Morarescu, notorious Roumanian Jew baiter and murderer of many Jews, and Zelea Codreanu, murderer of the Jassy Chief of Police, Monciu, were arrested yesterday.

Lieut. Morarescu was arrested in Onjezt, Bukovina, where he incited the population to an anti-Jewish pogrom. He distributed throughout the city many thousands of pamphlets urging an anti-Jewish pogrom. "I have killed 130 Jews. I will continue to murder them," he boasted. Codreanu was arrested in Focsany, where he threatened to kill the local chief of police.

OXFORD UNIVERSITY WILL HONOR LORD READING

London, May 15.—The honorary degree of civil law, honoris causa, will be conferred on the Marquis of Reading by the University of Oxford on June 23.

President Doumergue of the French Republic and a number of British statesmen will at the same time also be honored by Oxford in this way.

ACTIONS COMMITTEE TO MEET IN LONDON IN JULY

CONFERENCE ON UNIVERSITY
RELIGIOUS WORK TO MEET

Representatives of Jewish organizations interested in University Religious Welfare Work will meet in New York on May 25th for the adoption of a proposed constitution for the formation of a permanent organization.

At this meeting will be representatives of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, Central Conference of American Rabbis, Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations, United Synagogue of America, National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods, Women's League of the United Synagogue and Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations, the B'nai B'rith, and other organizations that are interested in formulating a program of unified action to further religious work for students at American universities. The call for the meeting was issued by Rabbi David Philipson, of Cincinnati, who was selected chairman of the Conference on University Religious Work at the first meeting held at Harvard last year.

JEWS IN TUNIS HELP TO
SAVE THE FRENCH FRANC

Tunis, Apr. 25.—The Jews of Tunis are active in the movement to help the Franc. The action here was led by a Jew, the manager of a moving picture house who started the campaign by giving the whole of the proceeds from the first presentation of a new film to the Committee to Save the Franc. Most of the Jewish shops in Tunis have given 25 to 50% of their gross receipts to the Fund.

The Boards of the Jewish Communities have issued appeals to the Jewish population and have started a collecting campaign.

The Building Committee of the Federation of Jewish Charities of Philadelphia has decided to begin construction of the new Convalescent Home which will replace the old structure at Torresdale, it was announced by W. Maurice Steppacher, president of the Jewish Convalescent Home.

PILGRIMS OF THE U. S. PAY
TRIBUTE TO LORD READING

Marquis Recalls Days When He Was
Ship's Boy

London, May 10.—A tribute to the Marquis of Reading was paid by the Pilgrims of the United States in a telegram sent to the dinner given by the Pilgrims in honor of Lord Reading.

"The American Pilgrims unite with their British brethren in honoring Lord Reading. As Ambassador and High Commissioner, he made a profound impression on our people. He contributed in a particularly broad way to the continuance and growth of harmonious relations and friendly understanding between the United States and Great Britain. The brilliant administration of Lord Reading and its influence on the Far East have been of the greatest assistance to the efforts now so hopeful for stabilizing the relations of nations and for peace and civilization. The world is richer for a life so full of achievement and success in many fields," the telegram from the society read.

The Earl of Birkenhead, Minister for India, spoke of Lord Reading's career at the Bar as one as meteoric as had ever been known, a career which was distinguished and embellished not merely by the arts of an advocate in dealing with matters of fact, but which never failed in competition with the greatest intellectual powers at the Bar. "I who claim to know the facts," Lord Birkenhead declared, "make this high claim for our distinguished guest, that his name will rank high in history."

Lord Reading referred to Lord Birkenhead's mention of his beginning as a cabin boy. "For accuracy," he said, "I would correct that into ship's boy. I was ship's boy. My duties were various, but consisted in the main of polishing the brasswork, scouring the deck, cleaning out the pig-sty—which I might have been spared in view of my origin—and generally of doing all the work that fell naturally to the lowest person in the ship's company.

"I remember well the day I left Calcutta, when I stood at the capstan head and helped to heave my small weight at the capstan bar in order to get the ship's head in to proper position. I remember we sang 'Good-bye Calcutta.' I know my dream was 'Good-bye Calcutta, I shall return but not on the forecastle head.' You may be surprised to hear that the then Viceroy utterly failed to recognize in me on the forecastle head that successor to him in the years to come, and I never even received an invitation to a garden party.

"I have left India with the deepest regret. India represents in population approximately four-fifths of the British Empire. There are less than 200,000 Europeans throughout the whole of India, and yet British rule has prevailed and still prevails. In the community of interests, of purpose, of ideals, lies the true future of the union between Britain and India as part of the British Empire," he declared.

Pilsudski and the Jews in Poland

What can the Jews expect from Pilsudski if he succeeds in returning to power? This question is asked editorially by the "Day" (May 15), which analyzes the situation as follows:

"As is the case with most Socialists Pilsudski is stronger as a critic of the present than as a builder of the future. And as regards the future of Poland, it seems that he has no definite program. One thing can be said with certainty: Jewish pogroms or anti-Jewish economic oppressions do not belong to his program. This separates him from the various outspoken anti-Semitic parties in Poland. The Jews therefore have no reason to be disturbed by Pilsudski's victory—although his 'legions' in their time did not stop at destroying Jewish communities whenever they could—but neither have they any special cause to be happy over it. Even if we have full confidence in Pilsudski's good intentions to protect the weak and abused, we must not forget the Polish people itself which expresses its will through its representatives, who for a long time made the life of Pilsudski himself bitter. Moreover, the Jews have had the opportunity to become convinced that Pilsudski does not understand the Jewish national demands. He is familiar with the concepts of the Jewish right and left assimilationist elements, but not with the concepts of Jewish cultural autonomy."

Wants Mandate System Applied to
Minority Treaties

The Minority Treaties ought to be as active a force in world politics as the Mandate system has already become, it is urged in "Foreign Affairs," May issue, of London. The writer, Mrs. Edgar Dugdale, explains:

"Treaties and Mandates both recognize and guarantee certain rights to populations in need of protection, and both permit criticism of a State's administration by the League Council. In the case of Mandates the Council is assisted by a strong and completely independent advisory body, the League's Mandate Commission. The Powers who accepted the Mandate accepted at the same time the obligation to report periodically to these expert critics. Of course, no such duty could have been laid upon the States who absorbed Minority populations into territories in which they were absolutely sovereign. No counterpart to the Mandates Commission could be added to the League's Minorities organization except at the desire of the treaty signatories. There is no hope of that content being given at present. Nevertheless proposals for local supervisory Commissions have been actually considered by the League, and something of that kind is in existence in Upper Silesia, where exceptional conditions

**RUSSIAN TRADE COMPANY
MANAGER IN PALESTINE
IS TO BE DEPORTED**

Jerusalem, May 2.—The High Court of Palestine dismissed the appeal brought by Mr. Gleser, manager of the Arcos, Russian Trade Company, in Palestine, against the deportation order made out against him.

In a statement to the Palestine Telegraphic Agency, Mr. Gleser said that the Palestine Government had informed the Arcos that while it did not object to the continuation of the trade activities of the Arcos in Palestine, it did object to Mr. Gleser's presence in Palestine because it suspected him of engaging in political propaganda activities.

Mr. Gleser declared that this allegation of political activity on his part was entirely unfounded. The Head Office of the Arcos, he added, had decided to close down its Palestine branches in Haifa, Jaffa and Jerusalem, as a protest against his deportation.

The officers of the Executive Committee of the United Palestine Appeal in Minneapolis are: J. E. Goldenberg, Chairman; Max J. Kaplan, Treasurer; Julius Fligelman and A. N. Bearman, Vice-Chairmen; M. K. Cohen, Secretary. Jesse B. Calmenson is the Campaign Director.

Moscow, May 15.—Instructions to commemorate the tenth anniversary of the death of Sholom Aleichem, the late Yiddish humorist, were issued by the Commissariats of Education in Ukraine and White Russia.

Memorial meetings are scheduled to take place on Thursday in Jewish and non-Jewish schools, clubs and factories. Many schools and streets in the Ukraine and White Russia will be named after the later writer.

The observance of Peace Week, sponsored by the League of Neighbors, the Union of East and West, and the Fellowship of Faiths, was launched in New York City at a mass meeting held in Temple Emanu-El. The speakers included Judge Jacob A. Panken, Ellis Chadbourn, President of the Federated Youth Movement of New York, Kennie Smith, M. P., Directing Secretary of the British National Council for Prevention of War, Miss Jessie Wallace Hughan, of the War Registration League, Kedar Nath Gopal, of the League of Neighbors, and Bishop Paul Jones, of the Fellowship of Reconciliation, who presided.

More than 1,000 prominent Jews attended a \$100-a-plate dinner at the Hotel Astor, New York, at which Chief Rabbi M. M. Epstein, dean and founder of the Yeshivah in Hebron, Palestine, was the chief guest. The dinner inaugurated the drive for funds toward maintaining the Yeshivah.

Morris Sorn was Chairman of the Dinner Committee. Other members included S. Kaufman, N. Bayer, J. Weinstein, S. A. Israel, P. Herring, F. Hillman, M. Salit, A. Solomon, A. Marcuson, S. Bernstein, S. Golding, S. Kamlet, I. Haft, A. Isserman, L. Margolis, R. Miroslovsky, H. Schiff, Rabbi Isaac Dwoletz, Dr. S. M. Machtat, Ben Z. Silver, Benjamin Shapiro are Treasurer of the campaign.

Thirty clubs representing the Intermediate Department of the Central Jewish Institute will hold their Annual Convention at the Institute, 125 E. 85th Street, New York, on Saturday evening, May 22nd. Officers will be elected for the governance of the Intermediate activities. Harold K. Addelstone is President.

Work will soon be started on a building to be erected by Jules E. Mastbaum of Philadelphia for housing his collection of Rodin sculptures, which he purchased recently in Paris. Both building and sculptures have been donated to the city by Mr. Mastbaum. The Museum will be designed by Jacques Greber and Dr. Paul P. Cret.

on that day, and those who have already contributed, give something more," the rabbi urged.

Texas is within \$50,000 of its \$350,000 goal, a statement from the national headquarters of the campaign declared. Texas's original quota of \$250,000 was increased at the state conference.

Arkansas has raised its quota of \$75,000, the statement reported. Little Rock exceeded its quota of \$35,000 by \$5,000.

In Ohio, Cleveland raised four-fifths of its \$550,000 quota at one meeting. It still has \$150,000 to raise toward its total. Akron, with a quota of \$35,000 raised the total at its initial dinner. Canton raised \$6,000 more than its quota of \$30,000 by May 8th, and extended its quota to \$40,000, the statement read. Detroit with a quota of \$600,000 in a joint campaign, has already passed the \$400,000 mark, all but \$50,000 of which was raised at its initial dinner. Wisconsin has only \$100,000 more to raise. In a joint effort in which the quota of the United Jewish Committee is \$300,000, Madison, Wis., raised \$24,000 at one meeting toward its quota of \$25,000.

Massachusetts, where there is a statewide campaign in progress, exclusive of Boston, has raised \$60,000.

In Western Pennsylvania, Butler had an original quota of \$8,000, which it increased to \$10,000 which has been raised. Altoona raised its \$15,000 quota in one night, increased its quota to \$25,000 and now aims at \$35,000. Colorado had raised \$64,000 up to May 12. New Mexico, \$11,500. Portland launched the Oregon campaign by raising one-fourth of the State quota. The \$50,000 raised represents only two contributions, \$20,000 from Ben Selling and \$30,000 from Meier & Frank. The other \$150,000 is now being sought.

Louisiana has raised over half of its quota of \$350,000. New Orleans has contributed \$102,156. Mississippi reports \$34,350 toward its quota of \$30,000. Alabama has only \$10,000 more to complete its quota of \$110,000. In New Jersey Trenton has raised its quota of \$60,283, the largest sum ever raised by the Jews in that city, the statement read.

Philadelphia, May 15.—Leaders of the Philadelphia Jewish community at a luncheon meeting subscribed the sum of \$250,000 which was immediately forwarded to the Joint Distribution Committee as the first payment of Philadelphia's pledge to contribute \$1,600,000 toward the United Jewish Campaign.

Mr. Jules E. Mastbaum, Honorary Treasurer of the Local Committee and Dr. Cyrus Adler, Honorary Chairman of the United Jewish Campaign for Eastern Pennsylvania and Chairman of the Cultural Committee of the Joint Distribution Committee, addressed the meeting.

Republic. Notwithstanding this fact, mobilization of the reserve officers are enrolling in great numbers in preparation for the last battle which is to take place against a ten thousand men strong army under the leadership of General Jozef Haller. The army of General Haller, who is one of Pilsudski's bitter opponents, is advancing on the capital and is two days march from the city.

Baden, May 15.—The latest despatch of the Polish Telegraphic Agency received here confirms the report that the Witos cabinet fled from Warsaw and that the Belvedere, the presidential palace, has been occupied by Pilsudski.

Contrary reports are being received from Cracow. One report states that the Pilsudski forces are marching ahead and another states that certain parts of the city of Warsaw were retaken by the Witos forces.

MOSCOW YIDDISH THEATRE GETS 70,000 ROUBLE GRANT

Moscow, Apr. 26.—The Commissariat of Education and Fine Arts have decided to grant to the Yiddish State Theatre (Chamber Theatre) a sum of 30,000 roubles to pay off its debts; 20,000 roubles as a subsidy for the coming theatrical season.

Philadelphia, May 12.—The dates for the Ku Klux Klan Klonvocation at the Sesqui-Centennial Exposition have been announced as September 9, 10 and 11.

On Saturday, the Klan will hold a parade, beginning at probably one of the many historic points in the center of the city, and passing down the principal thoroughfare, Broad Street, to and through the exposition grounds, winding up with ceremonies in the stadium.

Palestine Pilgrims, a newly organized body comprised of young men and women who have visited Palestine, will hold their first gathering at the Central Jewish Institute on Thursday evening, May 29th. Judge Julian Macé and Judge Rosenblatt are scheduled to speak.
