VOTE OF 46 JEWS IN POLISH SEJM IMPORTANT FACTOR IN PRESIDENTIAL ELECTIONS National Minorities to Vote for Wladyslaw Mickiewicz, Son of the Late Polish Poet

Warsaw, May 24.—The forty-six votes of the Jewish deputies and sena-tors in the Polish National Assembly which is to elect a new president will play an important part in the forth-coming elections. The Jewish group consists of 34 deputies and 12 senators.

The National Assembly will meet in Warsaw on May 31. Whether or not the right parties will participate in the Assembly is not yet known. Their candidate will be Stanislaw Wojcie-thowski, the president whom Marshal Pilsudski compelled to resign.

The candidate of the Left groups will be Marshal Pilsudski.

It was learned that the national minorities intend to cast their vote for a neutral candidate, Władysław Mickiewicz, son of the late Polish national poet, Adam Mickiewicz, Władysław Mickiewicz, who is residing in Paris, is known for his liberal tendencies.

"The great heart of New York has revealed itself magnificently in this campaign," said Mr. Bressler at the end campagn, said Air, Dressler at the end of the rally. "From the beginning, we were determined our quota would be filled. Originally, New York was asked to raise \$4,000,000 but with the leaders of New York Jewry cognizant of the situation abroad, we demanded that the quota be raised to \$6,000,000. After all, it was not a question of quotas-it was really a question of getting the largest sum of money possible in order to relieve the tragic distress of millions of human beings. Even if the quota had been \$10,000.00 and we had raised that amount, that would not be sufficient because the need is greater than can be met even by the \$25,000,000 national quota.

"As it is, the money raised in this campaign is the largest sum ever raised from the Jews of New York for any purpose and is a splendid refutation of the charge that is so often made-that this is a cold, indifferent, callous com-munity. FURTHER REVELATIONS REGARDING ANTI-SEMITIC INTERNATIONAL MADE

Planned Anti-Semitic Dictatorships in Roumania, Hungary, Austria

and Bavaria (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, May 24 .- Further details of the organization of the anti-Semitic International and its plans were learned here

It appears that the headquarters of It appears that the headquarters of the International, located in Vienna, are presided over by a directorate of five, consisting of Professor Alexander Cuza of Roumania. Theodor Fritsch of Germany, Mrs. Nesta Webster of England. General. Neschvolodov of Russia and Deputy Franz. Ulzin of Hungary. Anti-Semitic dictatorships were to be proclaimed in Roumania, Hungary, Austria and Bavaria during the month of April. This plan, however, could not be carried out because of the sudden disclosure of the Hungarian counterfeiting plot. It was also learned that the anti-Semitic international planned an attack on the "Iudaized Catholic church" because of the fact that numerous church leaders in Europe refused to turn the church into an instrument for anti-Semitic propaganda.

12,000 AT YESHIVA MUSIC FESTIVAL IN NEW YORK

JEWISH WAR VETERANS DEMAND RESIGNATION OF N. Y. FIRE COMMISSIONER Object to Insinuating Joke in Address

A demand that Fire Commissioner John J. Dorman be removed from office was presented to Mayor Walker by members of the Jewish Veterans of the Wars of the Republic.

The demand was made following a meeting of the Veterans at the River-side Synagogue on West 103rd Street. Resolution condemning the Commissioner were adopted.

The protest resulted from the recounting of a jest by Mr. Dorman; a quip about "a Mr. Cohen." It was told at the communion breakfast of the Firemen's Holy Name Society Sunday morning at the Astor Hotel. Morris Florea, a commander of the Manhattan post of the Jewish Veterans of the Wars of the Republic. heard the story over the radio.

"It seems," Mr. Dorman had marked, "that there was a Mr. Cohen whose two children were playing with matches in front of the house, and Mrs. Cohen chided them. Then Mr. Cohen raised his voice.

"Vot bummers!" he yelled. should play with matches on the side-walk! Come into the house and play with them!"

Mr. Florea recounted the story at the meeting of the war veterans. Mor-ris J. Mendelsohn, commander in chief of the veterans, protested against the Fire Commissioner.

"When the Fire Commissioner uttered these words he deemed it a joke, Mr. Mendelsohn said. "But it was no joke, particularly when uttered by a public official. That official is unfit for the position he holds, and I suggest a resolution to dismiss him from office."

Col. Maurice Simmons, past commander of the veterans, was the next speaker. He termed the story a "foul and vicious aspersion on the Jewish race" and said:

"I, as a taxpayer and as a former member of the Mayor's cabinet, denounce this foul slander, this implica-tion that a characteristic crime of the Jewish race is arson. The Fire Commissioner should be removed from pub-

"Whereas, it is reported that a Fire Commissioner of the City of New York, in a public address this day, did by unseemly innuendo cast invidious aspersions on his Jewish fellow-citizens, all posts of the New York Jewish Veterans of the Wars of the Republic do hereby condemn the base, undignified and vicious attack, and ask the Mayor, in the event of the report being substantiated, to dismiss the Fire Commissioner from public office."

The Contribution of John D. Rockefeller, Jr. to the U. J. C.

John D. Rockefeller's contribution of \$100,000 to the United Jewish Campaign, which is the largest sum ever given by a non-lew to a purely lewish fund, is the subject of editorial praise in the Jewish press.

The "Day" (May 24), pointing out that Jews have always been generous

donors to non-Jewish causes, ob-serves: "Rockefeller's act is a new step. It is not merely a gesture, but a gift in proportion with the needs of the Jewish relief cause as well as with the size of Mr. Rockefeller's contributions to other causes.

"The result of the New York campaign is a wonderful achievement which will prove of inestimable value as a stimulating factor in the further development of organized philanthropy in this city and throughout the country. New York, richer today than when the campaign began, because it has made an investment in happiness for itself and for our people across the sea which will pay increasing dividends as time rolls on. It has set itself a proud record, discovered its own heart, and its own ability to do fine things. ANCE CO.; \$400,000 RAISED Meeting of National Advisory Committee of Company Hears of Plans for New Step

Over \$400,000 were raised for the establishment of an American brauch of the Judea Insurance Company at a meeting of the national advisory committee of the company at the Waldorf

Astoria Hotel on Sunday evening. "Five hundred thousand dollars worth of shares of capital stock have been sold prior to this meeting," Judge Jacob Strahl, president of the company stated. Two hundred thousand dollars have been cabled to the l'alestine office, \$25,000 of which was used for the establishment of the Tel Aviv Exhibition and Fair. The value of the Exhibition is estimated today at \$100,000. Up to April 30, insurance amounting to \$1,100,-000 was written in Palestine," the president reported.

The history of the New York Life Insurance Company shows that during its first year the company only wrote \$750,000 worth of insurance, a record which is not surpassed by any other American insurance company, Judge-Strahl declared.

"Almost forty per cent of the total business of our company comes from Egypt where our company maintains offices in Alexandria and Cairo. Offices in Palestine are located in Tel Aviv, Haifa and Jerusalem. There are no restrictions in Palestine concerning investment of our reserves and we are therefore in a position to transmit all funds for Palestine investment. The Judea now has \$100,000 in first mortgages averaging \$3,000 each. Seventy thousand dollars of our reserve funds are invested in municipal bonds of Tel Aviv.

"Our aim is now to start activities in the United States. Application for license for an American branch of the Judea will be made upon the return of our auditor, Theodor Racoosin, who will complete arrangements in Palestine for this step," Judge Strahl declared. Col. F. H. Stoddard, former commissioner of the insurance department of the state of New York, declared that while no branch of a foreign insurance company is now operating in the United States, a way could be found to enable the Judea to start activities here. Judea Life Insurance Company can in many ways be helpful to Palestine. Insurance companies are always concerned about the conditions under which their policy holders live and are therefore engaged in improving health standards," he declared, pointing to the work in this direction by the American insurance companies.

"There is no better way of combining an altruistic effort with a financial enterprise than through the medium of in-surance companies," he concluded. "The mortality in Palestine is much

Frankel, according to whom tuberculosis which is a large mortality factor, hardly exists in Palestine. Dr. L. Fraudberg was chairman of

For similar reasons he expressed himself in favor of the work of the Judea Insurance Company because by providing funds for mortgages it enables increased building activity and the employment of Jewish workmen.
