

HUNGARIAN PARLIAMENT PAYS TRIBUTE TO MEMORY OF LATE JOSEPH VASZONYI

Succumbed to Wounds Received in
Anti-Semitic Attack

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budapest, June 1.—Tribute to the memory of the late Joseph Vaszonyi, Hungarian Jewish statesman and former Minister in the Hungarian cabinet, was paid by the Hungarian parliament at its session on Monday.

Following the eulogy delivered by the vice-president of the Parliament, Sivey, it was decided to "perpetuate the memory of the honest and brave political leader in the records of the parliament and to place a wreath on his grave."

The widow of Vaszonyi received condolences sent on behalf of the government. The funeral is being arranged by the city.

Deputy Vaszonyi, who died on Saturday, succumbed to injuries inflicted upon him by members of the Awakening Magyars on Feb. 16. Vaszonyi was attacked on his way to Parliament when he was hit over the head and seriously injured. His assailants were arrested. They carried firearms and would have used them had they not been prevented from doing so by passersby who disarmed them. A stormy meeting took place in Parliament at that time, when an interpellation concerning the matter was introduced by the opposition. Count Bethlen, Foreign Minister, promised to take measures immediately to punish the assailants.

COALITION GOVERNMENT FORMED IN LITHUANIA

Promises to Improve Situation of Jews

Berlin, June 1.—A change for the better in the situation of Lithuanian Jewry is in sight, according to reports received here.

The reports state that a coalition government was formed in the Lithuanian parliament, consisting of People's Socialists, Social Democrats and the national minorities. Negotiations are said to be in progress with the Jewish deputies concerning the reestablishment of the Jewish national autonomy in the Republic of Lithuania, the reopening of the Jewish National Council, the Kechil-lahs and the Jewish schools.

No Ministry for Jewish Affairs is planned. The Sejm will reopen on June 2.

JAMES N. ROSENBERG AND DR. KAHN ARRIVE IN BERLIN

MOSCICKI IS ELECTED POLISH PRESIDENT AS PILSUDSKI REFUSES TO ACCEPT OFFICE

Jewish Deputies Voted for Pilsudski; Hartglass, President of Club
of Jewish Deputies, Attacked by Political Adversaries

Warsaw, June 1.—Forty-six votes of the Club of Jewish Deputies, consisting of representatives of the Jewish population in the Polish Sejm and Senate, were cast at the session of the Polish National Assembly on Monday in favor of Jozef Pilsudski, who was elected by a majority of 292 against 193 votes for Count Alfred Blinks, candidate of the National Democratic party. Sixty-one deputies, including representatives of the Ukrainians and White Russians, refrained from voting.

Forty-five minutes after the election, it became known that Marshal Pilsudski had refused to accept the presidency. In a letter addressed to M. Rataj, speaker of the Diet and acting president, Marshal Pilsudski stated that he did not have power enough when president before and now he has no confidence in the men who elected him again.

Many demonstrations took place in the Warsaw streets following the election of Pilsudski. The demonstrators demanded that Pilsudski withdraw his

resignation, when it became known that he refused to accept the presidency.

On Tuesday morning at a second session of the National Assembly, Ignace Moscicki was elected president in accordance with the suggestion contained in Marshal Pilsudski's letter of resignation. Moscicki is manager of the Chorzow Nitrogen Works. This choice was a complete surprise, Moscicki being a chemist who had never shown any interest in public life.

Lieutenant Hartmas, who is in charge of the military unit guarding the house of Marshal Pilsudski at Sulejowek near Warsaw, declared in an official statement, that unknown persons fired at the Marshals' villa from four points. At the time of the attack the Marshal and his wife were not at the villa, but their daughters, Wanda and Jagusia were in the house. No one was hurt.

An attack on Apolynary Hartglass, president of the Club of Jewish Deputies, was made yesterday in the neighborhood of the Sejm building, by two Jewish students, members of the Academic Association which belongs to the assimilationist group.

Gustav Leinwandhaendler and Joseph Leisermann, the students who attacked Deputy Hartglass, were arrested. The attack was said to have been made in revenge of an article by Deputy Hartglass, criticizing the academic association for expressing sympathy with the former Minister of Education Stanislaw Grabski.

FOUR JEWS ELECTED TO ROUMANIAN SENATE; SIX TO PARLIAMENT

Bucharest, June 1.—Four Jewish senators were elected on the government list in the Senate elections which took place on Friday. The government had a complete victory, the opposition not having gained any seats.

Rabbi Zirelsohn of Kishineff, Mr. Gutnic of Chotin and Mr. Strejtman of Bukowina were elected to the Senate. Mr. Elijah Mendelsohn was elected to the Senate by the Roumanian Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Mendelsohn is a citizen of Jassy and is affiliated with the Zionist Organization.

Among the deputies elected to parliament on the government lists are six Jews. They are Messrs. Wurmbrand, Gutnic, Jaroslavitsch, Guendrich, Aron and Dr. Ebner.

FIRE SWEEPS TWO JEWISH TOWNS IN RUSSIA

Moscow, June 1.—Fires were reported in Lida, government of Smolensk, and Horodok, government of Kiev.

The town of Lida was practically destroyed. More than 200 houses were burned, located mainly in the Jewish quarter. Several Christian children were burned to death.

In Horodok, 60 Jewish houses were destroyed. Many inhabitants were injured. Cattle was burned.

FUNERAL OF PETLURA TAKES PLACE IN PARIS

Jewish Deputies in Polish Sejm Issue
Declaration

Paris, June 1.—The funeral of Semion Petlura took place under police protection on Sunday.

Many persons who wished to enter the church and the cemetery were not admitted. No speeches were delivered.

A representative of Marshal Pilsudski, friend of Petlura, and former members of the Petlura government were present.

Warsaw, June 1.—Replying to a statement eulogizing the late Semion Petlura, issued by the Ukrainian National Committee in Poland, a general meeting of the Club of Jewish Deputies adopted a resolution in which it declared that it condemns acts of murder. The resolution however, establishes that "the murder of Petlura was an act of revenge for the hundreds of thousands of Jewish victims."

EGYPTIAN TEACHERS URGE PALESTINE ARABS ADOPT CONCILIATORY POLICY

Jerusalem, May 5.—The party of Egyptian teachers who visited Palestine are making complaints in the Arab press here of their treatment by the Arabs of the country because they have visited the Jewish schools and the Jewish settlements.

In a statement published in the "Meraat el Sherk", the teachers write: "We cannot understand why you boycott us. The Jewish teachers visited us and we welcomed them according to the laws of hospitality. They invited us to visit them and we accepted the invitation, believing that science knows no religion and no fatherland. If the Jews are your enemies they are not ours. Do you think the whole world regards the Zionist question as you do?"

"In our tour of Palestine we have learned much more of Zionism than you know. In visiting the numerous Jewish settlements we have realized what real colonization is, and the meaning of the Jewish national home. We could not have understood this in reading a thousand of your articles. Thus we shall be able to help you in this regard much more than you imagine. Having followed a negative policy in our country we found it useless, but you persist in this harmful practice. You have wounded us deeply by your attacks. We shall never forget that in certain towns we were refused water. We never expected an Arab country to act in this way."

Says U. S. Supreme Court Has Sanctioned Race Discrimination

The decision of the United States Supreme Court, upholding the right of house owners to stipulate in their deeds of sale that the purchasers will not sell the house to Negroes, is declared by the "Forward" (May 31) to be in effect a sanction of race discrimination on a broad scale.

"If the decision of the Supreme Court," the "Forward" asserts, "allows contracts discriminating against Negroes, then the same discrimination can be applied against Jews, Italians and other nationalities. Years ago such a decision would have been impossible. It indicates that race hatred has grown in this country, that the principles of equality have been weakened. . . ."

HAKOAH TEAM SCORES VICTORIES IN FINAL GAMES BEFORE ITS DEPARTURE

The two concluding games of the Hakoah Soccer Team's American tour, played in New York on Saturday and in Philadelphia on Monday, resulted in brilliant victories for the Jewish eleven. On Saturday the Hakoah scored its fifth victory, defeating the New York Giants, members of the American Soccer League, by a score of 2 goals to 1, before a crowd of 25,000. The game was played on a challenge to the Hakoah team by the New York Giants.

Part of the proceeds of the game went to the fund of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine.

The Hakoah defeated the Philadelphia Field Club of the American League before 25,000 spectators at Franklin Field on Monday. The score was 3-0.

Schoenfeld, centre forward for the Hakoah, was the hero of Saturday's game. He scored both the goals. The first tied the score after ten minutes of the first period and the second won the game after twenty minutes of the second period.

Eastern, right inside for the Giants, put his team in the lead when he made the first tally of the game five minutes after the opening.

The Giants won the toss and kicked off toward the home plate. Hakoah players dashed the ball into Giant territory within a minute of the kick-off and forced the play. Geudert, the Giant goal keeper, was kept busy stopping Hakoah shots.

The first score of the game came on a determined rush by the Giants, with the Hakoah men pressing at all times. Fabian, the Hakoah goal keeper, had only one other shot to block since the game started. Schoenfeld got the ball past Geudert after a hot scuffle at the goal.

Following the Hakoah tally the Giants assumed the offensive for a few minutes and forced a corner. During the remainder of the first half the Hakoah team was always pressing hard.

Hakoah kicked off to start the second half and, though it met determined opposition, was again the aggressor after the first minute of play. Schoenfeld scored again for the Hakoah. The shot that broke the tie went past three Giants, massed in the goal mouth and Geudert.

Schoenfeld's goal was scored after a fine attempt by Neufeld failed. He had rushed the ball down the field for many yards and made a lateral pass in front of the goal mouth. Geudert kicked out, but Hakoah blocked the kick, passed to right and left, and then Schoenfeld made the tally from directly in front when the Giant defenders were confused.

Following the goal the Giant forwards pressed their hardest but their efforts were defensive. Fabian had to stop only two shots in ten minutes. Hakoah soon brought the play back to Giant territory after the brief periods at the other end of the field. Neufeld forced a corner and at least a

SABATH INTRODUCES BILL TO REPEAL "NATIONAL ORIGINS" QUOTA LAW

Washington, June 1.—A bill that would repeal "the most obnoxious, discriminatory, unfair, unreasonable" provisions for the ascertainment of national origin as provided in the 1924 Immigration Act, was introduced on Saturday by Congressman Sabath.

Mr. Sabath's bill is directed at the provision which goes into effect July 1, 1927, whereby the number of immigrants admissible to the United States will be based on the number of inhabitants in this country, according to origin of birth or ancestry and limits the number to 150,000 annually.

Mr. Sabath incorporated the present 2 per cent quota clause in his bill, but he based its operation on the 1900 census which would increase the number of immigrants admissible over the present law by 14,102. Under the 1890 census, now being used, 164,667 are admissible.

The bill also provides for the admission of the wives and children under twenty-one, also the fathers and mothers over fifty-five of American citizens. It would also admit children under eighteen of declarants who have resided in the United States for more than three years and have filed their declaration of intention to become citizens more than a year.

Mr. Sabath said the total number of immigrants that could possibly be admitted under the provisions of his bill would approximate 190,000, "and as the annual return is more than 50 per cent of those who arrive, therefore the net total increase from European immigration would under no condition reach 100,000 annually."

He estimates his bill will increase the quota from Belgium under the national origin plan from 260 to 749; Czechoslovakia from 1,320 to 3,521, Denmark from 1,092 to 3,298; Finland from 498 to 1,365. France from 2,763 to 3,734, Germany from 22,018 to 43,081, Norway from 2,433 to 6,857, Poland from 4,509 to 16,277, Roumania from 386 to 1,512, and Russia from 4,002 to 4,956.

The quota from Great Britain and Ireland would be reduced from 91,111 to 37,282.

GOES TO STUDY INSURANCE POSSIBILITIES IN PALESTINE

The following officers for the coming year were elected: Henry Rhine, President; Charles Rabbin, Vice President; Leon Taffee, Secretary; Walter Birn, Treasurer and Sam Goldberg, Athletic Manager.

NATIONAL FARM SCHOOL CONVENTION OPENS IN N. Y.

Delegates from every part of the United States are attending the National Farm School Conference which opened yesterday at the Biltmore Hotel, New York, and which will continue until June 7. The meeting is attended by representative agricultural and educational leaders.

R. W. Dunlap, Assistant Secretary of the United States Department of Agriculture, opened the conference. Senator Arthur Capper, of Kansas, is chairman. The delegates include special appointees by thirty-five Governors and fifty Mayors of the largest cities in the country.

Mayor Walker received the delegates at City Hall.

Scientific education for training expert farmers will be considered by the Conference.

The conference will devote a day to women's activities and the deans of women of colleges and universities where agricultural and home economics courses are given, will discuss plans relating to women's welfare in agricultural communities.

The annual convention of District Grand Lodge No. 4 of the B'nai B'rith will be held in Seattle, Wash., beginning Sunday, June 7. District Grand Lodge No. 4 embraces California, Oregon, Washington, British Columbia, Utah, Montana, Nevada and Arizona.

Property facing a full block was acquired as the site for a building that will be erected by the Jewish Young Men's Association of Rochester, N. Y.

It is expected that a drive for \$40,000 will be launched to erect the building.

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
