PALESTINE SHOWS £1,200,000 SURPLUS FOR FISCAL YEAR JUST CLOSED

Delphiner Will Establish Silk Plantations in Palestine

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, July 9.—The fiscal year

just closed shows a surplus of £1,200,000 on the part of the Palestine government, according to a report issued here.

The profits netted by the working of the railways which are run by the government amount to £100,000, the same report indicates.

It is understood that there is a likeli-

Lood that the British government will claim a part of the surplus for paying off money advanced to Crown Agents for the Colonies on account of a future loan which will amount to twice the total of the present surplus.

Vienna, July 9.—Max Delphiner, well known Austrian manufacturer, who has a silk factory in Tel Aviv, has announced his intention of establishing large silk plantations in Palestine.

This action follows upon Mr. Del-

This action follows upon Mr. Derphiner's recent step in reopening his factory in Tel Aviv, which had been shut down by him owing to the high import duties which were in force in Palestine up to recently.

The establishment of his own silk plantations in Palestine will enable Delphiner to reduce the expenses connected with the importation of raw material for his factory.

AKIM VOLINSKY, RUSSIAN JEWISH WRITER, DIES (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, July 9.—Akim Volinsky, also known under the name of Flexer, the noted writer and theatrical critic, died yesterday.

Akim Volinsky was especially known for his work on Leonardo da Vinci, which is considered as one of the best studies of the tamous Italian painter. For this work the Italian government conferred on Volinsky the honorary citizenship of Milan.

Volinsky's burial, which was attended by many writers and theatrical celebrities, took place in Leningrad today.

PETLURA'S WIFE BRINGS SUIT AGAINST SCHWARTZBARD

Paris, July 9.—The wife of Semion
Petlura, who was assassinated by
Sholom Schwartzbard, has announced
that she will institute a civil trial against

Schwartzbard. In making this announcement to Magistrate Peyre, before whom the case of Schwartzbard will be tried. Petura's wife stated that she has engaged the ttorney Campinchi as her counsel. He will shortly arrange for the trial which will have nothing to do with the prosesuiton being conducted by the state.

BILL PROHIBITING SHECHITA
IN BAVARIA PASSED BY
BAVARIAN PARLIAMENT
Jews Hope for Veto from Berlin
Government

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, July 9.—The Bavarian parliament has passed the bill which was introduced some time ago prohibiting the shechita, the Jewish method of slaughtering animals. The Social-Democrats joined with the

reactionaries and the anti-Semites in the vote on this bill, while the Communists voted against it.

The only possibility of preventing this measure from becoming a law is a veto on the part of the Berlin government. The Jews are hoping that such action will be taken by the Central Government when the matter will be brought before it.

Order That Jewish Reporters Be Kept
Out of Parliament Causes Trouble
(fewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, July 9—The restriction placed by Premier Averescu on parliamentary reporters, especially directed against the Jewish newspapermen, has resulted in a boycott on the part of all the parliamentary reporters against the government party. The reporters declared that they

will not report any of the speeches in parliament made by members of the government party.

The proposal to forbid the Jews from entering the government building to attend the parliamentary sessions was made by Professor Cuza, the leader of the Roumanian anti-Semites. His proposal was accepted, despite the protests of Foreign Minister Duca and the deputies of the opposition.

As a result of the boycott all the newspapers in Roumania today, with the exception of three government organs, appeared without news of parliamentary proceedings. The papers amounced that they will not publish any parliamentary reports as long as the strike of the newsparermen continues and the government does not withdraw its restriction against the press representatives.

MISSIONARY SOCIETY IN ENGLAND EXPLOITS MISERY OF POLISH JEWS (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, July 9.—An attempt to exploit the present distressful situation of the Jews in Poland for the purpose of missionary work will be made by the International Hebrew Christian Alliance, which has its headquarters here. The International Hebrew Christian Alliance is an organization of Jews converted to Christianity.

According to a statement issued by this organization, a plan is being prepared to create a Jewish settlement in Poland where employment will be offered to Jews on condition that they accept Christianity. For this purpose 200 acres of land will be bought by the (Continued on Page 4)

EASTERN PENNSYLVANIA RAISES QUARTER MILLION FOR U. J. C. DRIVE QUOTA

With the conclusion of campaigns in Scranton and Pottstown, the Eastern district of Pennsylvania, outside of Philadelphia, passed the quarter-million in its endeavor to raise its quota of \$2,000,000 in the United Jewish Campaign, a statement issued from the national headquarters of the Campaign

The sum thus far pledged by the smaller Jewish communities of Eastern Pennsylvania represents an average increase of about 50% over the original quotas assigned to them at the regional conference held in Philadelphia last March, the statement declared. The amount of \$25,000 was forwarded

to the national headquarters by Albert H. Lieberman, chairman of the Eastern Pennsylvania Campaign. check represented pledges in those communities where campaigns were conducted in the course of the past few months

Scranton, Scranton, Pa., oversubscribed its quota of \$100,000, the statement re-

Reports from the West, the statement declared, showed that Seattle, Wash., has exceeded its quota of \$160,000 in its combined campaign by \$3,088. A total of \$48,865 was raised in the state outside of Seattle, with five cities not yet heard from.

Forty-three thousand dollars was raised in Kansas up to July 1.

The standing of the Southern states as of June 30th was reported as follows: Arkansas \$78,000, Alabama \$140,000, Florida \$111,000, Georgia \$143,000; Louisiana \$185,000, Mississippi \$37,000, North Carolina \$82,500, South Carolina \$15,600 and Tennessee \$76,000.

The complete returns of the Flower Day of the Jewish National Fund in New York showed a total raised of \$52,000, dimost twice the sum raised last year. The results are due mainly, it was stated, to the large number of organizations saricinating in the work

That the Communist press in Russia is ignoring the story of the assassination of Petlura by Schwartzbard, al-

though besides being a pogrom leader Petlura fought against the Soviets, is the information contained in an article in the "Jewish Daily News" (July 7) from its Moscow correspondent The reason for this attitude of the Communist press is explained by the correspondent as follows: "During the tumultuous time of the British strike the paper in Russia carried a brief item that a certain Ukrainian by the name of Schwartzbard shot Petlura. The 'Prayda,' official Communist organ, published an article declaring that Petlura was a

On the whole, the first impression made was Schwartzbard was a patriotic 'Ukrainian' who took revenge on Petlura for tivities in Ukraine. Later, an item appeared in the press that Schwartzbard is a French citizen, and this was amazis a French citizen, and this was amaz-ing. Finally, the Jewish Communist press once published an excerpt from the foreign Jewish press to the effect the foreign Jewish piess to the effect that Schwartzhard is a Jew, who took revenge for the Jewish pogroms. That was all. There is a desire to avoid telling about the attitude of the Jewish press to Petlura. For a long time it was stated in the papers here that the Was stated in the papers here that the Zionists are with Petlura on the ground that Jabotinsky at one time made an agreement with him aiming to protect the Jewish population from pogroms. Whenever a Zionist, especially in the Ukraine, would be arrested, he would immediately be reproached as being a Petlura man. And suddenly it is learned that the entire Zionist press denounces Petlura as a pogromist and his name is hated even more than in the Communist press. This indicates clearly of course, how false were the charges made by the Jewish Communists that the Zionists were for Petlura. This explains at least in part the attitude of the Communist press to the Petlura incident."

Criticizes Attitude of Yevsektzia to Jewish Writers The charge that the Jewish section of

the Communist Party in Russia demands of Jewish writers who live in Russia or who want to enter that country, not only submission but enthusiasm for the Communist cause, is made in the "Jew-ish Daily Forward," New York Socialist paper, by Abraham Cahan, the noted Jewish Socialist leader of America.

Mr Cahan contracts the attitude of

former Czarist government, stating:
"At the time of the Czarist regime. whenever a revolutionist escaped from Russia and later desired to return, the Czarist government demanded of him a 'petition for mercy,' that is, a request to be forgiven, and no more. If the reports are true, the "Jewish Chronicle" declares, "it will provide further evidence, altogether unneeded, of his (Sir Herbert's) interest in Zionism."

"The step, if really contemplated," the paper writes further, "is extraor-dinary if not unique. Sir Herbert may be setting a new and approved precedent for Mandated territories. This does not, however, in the least argue the value or the desirability of resuscitating the Jewish Agency pro-posals. Indeed, Sir Herbert's record-ed views on the Jewish future of Palestine, limited as is their concept to the maintenance and development of the Jewish Communities there, and abjuring all national aims, tend to show that the proposal which he is said to intend actively to champion is not one which should commend itself to Zionists."

London, July 1.—A reply to the charges levelled against him by the opponents of his political policy with regard to Palestine was made by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, in an interview given to the representative of the "Ha'olam," the official Hebrew organ of the World Zionist Organization, published here.

"I know that the Jewish public would like to hear from me a word or so about the political affairs of the movement. I purposely refrained from speaking on this matter not because I do not ascribe any importance to the political work of the Zionist movement, not because I beileve—as some fools and some vicious men ascribe to me—that politics is my 'private affair' and nobody else has any business to interfere. The conany business to interfere. The con-trary is true. 'I wish that all of God's people were statesmen, on the condi tion, however, that they understand that not every hysterical noise is a political action and not everybody who signs his name under a document, bit even a memorandum to some min

istry, is a man of political affairs. . . Dr. Weizmann stated.

"I am almost ashamed to answer to

all the arguments that were made against the policy for which I am re-

sponsible. It was said that my policy was by its very nature one of com-

promise. They make believe that there really are among us people who de-

mand much and people who are satis-

fied with little and voluntarily relin-quish the rest. It is ridiculous to answer such arguments. After all, we all know each other; the work and intentions of every one of us are known. I will therefore limit myself to this short declaration: "There is no fundamental difference of opinion among the Zionists con-cerning the beginning, the middle and the end of the Zionist plan. There is, however, a great difference in the measure of responsibility which rests upon us. Some may perhaps speak in

high tones and large words because these words do not impose any obligation on them. He, however, whose every word is an obligation, internally as well as externally, is not in such a happy state as to be able to give free expression to the sentiments of the neonle.

"With us the policy is conducted, as far as we can, in a permanent way and in a manner which is in our opinion truly political. Should we find it necessary to summarize our achievements in this field, we could perhaps point to many improvements and what is more important, we could also show in this respect, like in the question of the agricultural settlement in Palestine, that there is the confidence of a clearly defined and paved way.

our needs and our aspirations. Sometimes, we meet much success and sometimes we achieve little or nothing. This is the fate of every policy. At least, we have gained respect everywhere." Discussing the questions of the Palestine frontier force and the Arab-

Jewish relations, Dr. Weizmann declared: "There are false prophets who come and bring the sad message that the sword and the sword alone will decide

between us and our neighbors. These false prophets, while proclaiming this message have not-and cannot havea sword of their own. To this we say: the Book will decide and the Book we have in our hands."

Referring to the matter of agricul-tural and industrial development in the country and immigration, Dr. Weizmann stated:

"Our Eretz Israel is a 'working Palestine.' It progresses and sees the fruit of its work, particularly in the field of agriculture. The colonies, the old as well as the new, are no doubt becom-ng stronger and are on the road to prosperity. Even those in which the sitution is not completely firm, can say that they at least see 'the end' and that that end is not far off.

"It is true that not all of the human material which has attempted to find refuge in the agriculture in Palestine was fit for it. We take note of this, certainly with regret and deep sorrow. But we have no right to close our eyes to the fact that a certain part of the new settlers, particularly those of the middle class category and even some of the Chassidic settlers, will be compelled to leave their places. This happens, not because those elements don't want to work; the contrary is true, they have shown and they still show a sacred devotion to the ideal of work and the national resettlement, but there are physical and psychological obstacles over which no effort can avail. Much is due to century-old training which cannot be overcome in one generation. However, after a sort of 'natural selection' will take place, even those colonies will go on an upward road.

"Those left behind in the agricultural process will, therefore, return to the town and will add to the clas of 'luft-menschen' which is already there. We consider it our duty to tell 'the truth from Palestine,' that a certain part of this human material which has gathered in the country, together with the fourth Alijah, is not fit for Palestine and the country is not fit for them. Some of them will, perhaps, be absorbed by the industries and commerce which are now undeveloped and which cannot become too large at present. No matter how much we regret it and how much it hurts us, we must say that In London, in Paris and in Geneva, as some of these people will find it neces-well as in Jerusalem, in the Emek and sary to leave the country." he declared.

BILL PROHIBITING SHECHITA IS PASSED IN BAVARIA

(Continued from Page 1) in Bavaria was before the Constitutional Commission of the Diet last March, when a resolution to prohibit Schechita was rejected, but it was decided that the Government should limit the practice of Shechita in accordance with the proportion of the Jewish population in Bavaria.

The action of the Bavarian parliament is a result of a movement con-ducted over a long period by the Bayarian anti-Semites and the Munich Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. This society sent a memorandum to the parliament on April 7, 1926, which, after quoting authorities tending to show that Shechita is cruelty to animals, said that only one out of every hundred of the population on German soil belongs to the Jewish faith, and a large part of the Jews themselves do not observe the Jewish dietary laws. It is therefore Jewish dietary laws. wrong, the memorandum stated, to take into consideration the religious scruples of less than a hundredth part of the population and to ignore the feelings of humanity of the other ninety-nine.
