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SCHWARTZBAAD WITNESS, JEW, IS MURDERED IN PARIS BY UKRAINIANS Had Valuable Evidence on Pogrom

Period Under Petlura (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Paris, July 16.-Another political assassination in connection with the Ukrainian anti-Jewish pogroms and the trial of Sholom Schwartzbard occurred here today.

Peretz Stein, forty-one years old, a

Jewish immigrant from the Ukraine, was mortally wounded by the shots of two Ukrainians. The shooting occur-red in front of the Jewish Shelter

House. The assassins escaped. Stein, who arrived here recently from the Ukraine and was at the Jewish Shelter since May 11, was scheduled to appear as a witness in the trial of Sholom Schwartzbard, the Ukrainian Jew who killed Semion Petlura, leader of the pogrom bands in the Ukraine. Stein's eight year old son, who was with him when the murder was committed, declared that the two murderers exclaimed: "Dirty Jew, this is for Schwartzbard."

Several days ago Stein informed M. Henri Torres, Schwartzbard's counsel, that he possesses evidence of the Ukrainian pogrom period which would

be valuable in the trial. Stein's wife was killed in a pogrom

in Rostov Don, where Stein was wounded. Later he joined the Jewish Self-Defense body in the Ukraine.

RABBI A. J. KOOK DENIES STATEMENT ASCRIBED TO HIM BY AGUDAH LEADER Says He Never Urged Orthodox Non-

participation in Keren Havesod (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, July 16.—Denial of a statement ascribed to him by Jacob Rosenheim, president of the Orthodox Jewish world organization, Agudath Israel, was issued here today by Rabbi A. J. Kook, Ashkenazic Chief Rabbi of Palestine.

Mr. Rosenheim stated that Rabbi Kook had "urged Orthodox Jewry not to participate in the Keren Havesod collections.

Rabbi Kook emphatically denied this, declaring in his statement that he never uttered a word against Orthodox Jews participating in the Keren Hayesod. He expressed indignation at those Orthodox Rabbis who had prohibited Orthodox Jews from participating in the Keren Havesod.

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BRITISH M.P. APOLOGIZES FOR UNINTENDED SLUR AGAINST JEWISH PEOPLE

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service) London, July 4 .- The Jewish Board of Deputies issued for publication a correspondence it has had with Sir Alan Burgoyne M. P. in regard to a speech he delivered in the House of Commons

in which he had said:

"The Soviet ship of State is a noi-some hulk, rotten from truck to keelson, with a starving and verminous crew, which has been drawn from all the foul ghettos of Europe, and which is the scum of all the international prisons.'

Mr. Philip Guedalla, Chairman of the Press Committee of the Board of Deputies wrote to Sir Alan pointing out that only two of the eighteen members of the Russian Cabinet are Jews, and that the Communist Party Census of 1922 shows that whereas 32.8 per thousand Lithuanians and 16.3 per thousand Esthonians were members of the Communist Party, the corresponding figure was only 7.2 per thousand Jews, and asking him to withdraw his statemen as being inaccurate as well as offensive in the highest degree to a large body of loyal citizens and a considerable number of distinguished public men both in the service of the Crown and of the political party to which Sir Alan belongs.

Sir Alan replied expressing regret that his statement had in any way hurt the feelings of Jews. He had no idea that ghettos were purely Jewish locali-tics, he stated, and far from being in any way hostile to the Jewish faith, or to Jews, he has a very great number of close personal friends amongst them, and the last thing he would wish to do would be to cause any offense, he declared in his reply.

ENGLAND FACE SUNDAY CLOSING PROBLEM

English Jews Will Insist Hungary Abolishes Numerus Clausus (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

London, July 3 .- A situation similar to that prevailing in the United States is now facing the English Jews in the barber trade, following the recent adoption by parliament of a bill requiring the closing of barber shops on Sunday

The question was taken up recently at the meeting of the Board of Jewish deputies where Mi. Landa asked Col Charles Waley-Cohen, President of the Law and Parliamentary Commit-tee, whether the Committee had considered the Bill recently passed in the House of Commons for the closing of all barbers' shops on Sundays and whether his Committee had considered any steps for the safeguarding of the position of the Jewish barbers.

He further wanted to know whether the Committee had considered the Bill prohibiting the adoption of children of alien parentage. He also desired to know Col. Waley-Cohen's opinion about the Home Secretary's reply to in which he used the term of "Britishborn aliens.

Colonel Waley-Cohen said that as regards the Barbers' Bill it was an im-portant matter which had to be given full consideration. The Bill regarding the adoption of alien children, howas afraid, could not be profitable dealt with. As for the Home Secret tary's attitude towards aliens, he would like to point out, he stated, that the present Home Secretary had taken more trouble to understand the alien question than any of his predecessors. The attacks on this point made against the Home Secretary were not worthy of the Jewish Community, he stated

Mr. Lucien Wolf in moving the adoption of the Joint Foreign Committee's report said that things in Poland and Roumania were at present quiescent. There are disturbing symptoms, he said. The new Roumanian Government, for instance, while more friendly towards the Jews, is adopting an attitude of intimidating the Jews against n. king complaints to the League of Nations. Brainin vs. Silver

The opinion that the statement of Michael Kalenin, president of Soviet Russia, regarding the Jewish colonization plan, can be interpreted favorably or otherwise, according to one's leanings, is expressed by the "Day" of July 16, in an editorial commenting on the statements, which appeared last Thursday in the press, by Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver and Reuben Brainin, both vice-presidents of the Zionist Organization, who gave divergent opinions on the colonization plan.

But quibbling about Kalenin's statement, the paper contends, is not of any importance. The important thing. we are told, is that-

"The Jews in America have to understand that the colonization work in Russia must be helped. For the millions of Russian Jews who are unable to emigrate to Palestine some-thing must be done on the spot and colonization is one of the chief remedies in this direction.

"It should also be clearly understood that the help for Russian colonization work must under no circumstances be given at the expense of Palestine, for Palestine is the first and most im-portant position gained by the Jews since the war. It is therefore neither in the interests of Palestine nor in those of Russian colonization that a vice-president of the Zionost Organization should use a statement by a Soviet official to attack the colonization plan, just as it is not good for Palestine when officers of the Joint Distribution Committee attack Zionism," the paper concludes.

Lauds Choice of Judge William M. Lewis

The choice by the Zionist Conven-tion of Judge William M. Lewis of Philadelphia to head Philadelphia to head next year's United Palestine Appeal for \$7,500,000 is regarded by the "Jewish Times" of Baltimore as a wise step.

PLIGHT OF RUSSIAN JEWISH REFUGEES IN GERMANY WILL BE PRESENTED TO LEAGUE (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

Berlin, July 3.—An appeal to the League of Nations concerning the plight of the Russian Jewish refugees in Germany will be submitted by the in Germany will be submitted by the Union of Russian Jews in Germany. Mr. J. L. Teitel, president of the Union declared in an interview in the "Rul," Russian daily in Berlin.

"Berlin," he said, "has become the refugees' cemetery. In spite of the economic depression prevailing since 1923, Germany is an important centre for refugees, even those who intend to go further west being obliged to make a more or less prolonged stay here. Those who succeed in leaving Germany have always some asset or other, be it health, courage or pecuniary re-sources. Those who remain are the more unfortunate refugees-the sick, those with large families, those whose courage has been sapped by their trials.

"The Russian and Russian-Jewish organizations of Berlin have a most difficult problem to solve. What is to be the fate of the refugees? There are," he declared, "only two alternatives: the Emperor Caligula's idea, the wish that the mass of refugees had but one head, which could be felled at a stroke, or a genuine means of preventing them from starvation to death.

"It is by now a crime to give way to fond illusions and to imagine that everything will be settled somehow. All who are interested in the cause must be told that the charitable organizations find it absolutely impossible to be of any real assistance to the refugees. The Union of Russian Iews, in spite of its activities and its income of 150,000 marks cannot satisfy 5 per cent of the real need. Besides. all those in distress do not apply to the organizations." Mr. Teitel stated he knows families who are dying of hunger and refuse to reveal their desnunger and refuse to reveal their des-titution. "What Berlin can do is not enough; help is needed on a state scale, on an international scale. An appeal for this must be broadcast throughout the world," Mr. Teitel declared.

Mr. Teitel, accompanied by Mr. A. Goldenweiser, the Director of the Legal Section of the Union, is pro-ceeding to Geneva. They will present particulars of the material and legal situation of the refugees to the League of Nations through the International Labor Office. Mr. Albert Thomas, Director of the International Labor Office, in an interview granted to a delegation from the Union, when he was in Berlin suggested that a written report be submitted to him in Geneva, and promised to support the applica-tions made to Dr. Nansen, the High Commissioner of the League.

Says Karaite Jews in Crimea Maintain

"Matriarchal" System (By Our London Correspondent)

London, June 20.-That a Jewish sect, the Karaites of Crimea, maintain what resembles a "matriarchal" system, is the assertion made by Mr. D. B. Benny, in an article published here, wherein he describes his impressions of a visit to the Karaites.

"Singular in their rigid and meticulous adhesion to what they have come to regard as Mosaic ordinances are those anti-rabbinical sectaries, Karaites of the Krim-as the Crimean Peninsula should correctly be designated," Mr. Benny declares. "Not merely in matters of religion do they carry their respect for Pentateuchal injunctions to an extreme; but in the ordinary concerns of life, in their everyday occupations and domestic affairs they show the same inflexibility, the same tenacity where Bible teaching is concerned.

"On Friday afternoon, the Karaite housewife cuts, ready for the coming Sabbath, every slice of bread that is to be eaten in the four-and-twenty hours of the weekly day of rest, so that its sanctity may not be infringed by the act of cutting. During the en-tire duration of the Sabbath, she and the several members of the household sit absolutely still in one place, never moving from it, so as not to violate the scriptural ordinance against going abroad on that day. Throughout the Sabbath, not a single light is allowed to burn, not a trace of fire is suffered in a Karaite dwelling so that the command 'no fire shall be kindled' may be It is no rigorously complied with. light thing to observe a Karaite Sabbath. In winter, when the days are short and the weather is cold-the Crimean frosts are intense-four-andtwenty hours in one place, cold and in darkness, is no pleasant experience.

"But singular as they are, in these and cognate matters, they are more singular still in their regard for the 'Matriarchal' rights of the women. Among them, women are the rulers of the community. They direct and manage everything, and their head is fully recognized by the men.

"This 'matriarchal' principle is, per-haps, a survival from very old Semite days. It was the recognized thing among the Arabs till the time of Ma-homet and Islam, which, oddly enough, coincides with the first beginnings of Karaism. There are remains of the system of mother rule in Judaism. Descent is always reckoned through the mother, not through the father. There are traces of it in the Bible. Adoniyah—the rival of King Solomon—is termed 'the son of Hagith' his mother: and the famous Jewish captain Joab and his brothers, are always referred to as the sons of Zeruyah. Zeruyah was their mother, not their father. "For nearly eight centuries, the Ka-

FORMAL RELATIONS BETWEEN PALESTINE AND LEAGUE'S LABOR OFFICE PROPOSED

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service) Geneva, June 26 .- A number of definite proposals with regard to setting up formal relations between Pales-Office were discussed by Dr. Arlosoroff, of the Palestine Labor Party "Hapoel Hazair" and one of the members of the delegation of the Vaad Leumi, National Council of Palestine Jews, to the meeting of the Mandates Commission, with M. Albert Thomas, the Director of the International Labor Office of the League of Nations and Mr. Grimshaw, the repre-sentative of the International Labor Office at the Mandates Commission. Both M. Thomas and Mr. Grim-

shaw emphasized the importance of a closer contact being established between the International Labor Office and the workers of Palestine by means of circulating in Palestine the information issued by the Labor Office on labor conditions in the various countries and by systematic consideration of the labor questions in Palestine by the International Labor Office.

The League of Zionists-Revisionists have established headquarters with offices and club rooms at 42 Union Square, New York City. The office of "The Zionist," the official organ of the League, is also located at that address. It may here be pointed out that the Karaites, unlike all other Jews are not allowed to engage in trade or in com-merce. They must keep to agriculture or some form of husbandry, winegrowing or tobacco-raising. They may market the product of their industry, but not do business of any kind apart

from this. "As a consequence the Karaite Jewess is largely the 'farmer's wife' always busy out of doors directing, managing, con-trolling. Nothing can physically be better for her development. And nothing is more noteworthy than the contrast she presents to the small and undersized Jewish woman of Russia and Poland. The Karaite-whatever may be thought of their anti-Rabbinic doctrine-are a fine race, tall in statue and broad in build, and their women are fully their equals. Tall and well-proportioned, they are types of what a woman should be, assured and confident, their very gait proclaims their physical, their men-tal and moral freedom. They do no tal and moral freedom. They do no hard field-work such as falls to the lot of the women in the Jewish Agricultural colonies of Ekaterinoslav. The men do that, the women direct and control."

"With regard to the Jewish Agency, Mr. Jacob Rosenheim, chairman of the Agudah Political Executive stated that 'the participation of the Agudath Is-rael in the Jewish Agency was im-possible, because the Keren Hayesod appeared to be indissolubly bound up with it, and the Keren Hayesod, because of its support of radical, irreligious institutions could not be supported by traditional orthodox Jews.' "This is the principle which has always guided the Agudah: in cultural and spiritual matters unity can only be achived on the basis of the Torah. Let Zionism free itself of its negative cultural program, and it can in reality be-come a movement of the whole Jewish people.

"Specific mention was made of the Religious Communities Ordinance, and of 'the opposition of the Agudah to of the opposition of the Aguam to the unity of Jewish communal organi-zation in Palestine. To our definite knowledge neither the Agudath Israel. nor the Ashkenazi Town Council of Ierusalem has ever raised any objection to the systematic organization of the Palestine Jewish Communities. At the conference held between the Zioniists and the Agudah in London last year, detailed and moderate proposals were made by our organization for the establishment of a united Jewish representation in Palestine. It is a pity that the English Zionist Federation Conference was not informed that these proposals had never even received a reply.

"It must be remembered that 7,000 family heads (representing some 35,000 Jewish souls) petitioned the Pal-estine Government in support of the Agudah claims, and for that reason more than half of the eligible electorate deliberately abstained from the last Vaad Leumi elections. It would not therefore appear that the orthodox Jewish elements in Palestine are so microscopic," the statement declared.

New Jerusalem. The family was known in Spain and Holland as Espinoza or d'Espinoza. The methods adopted against the Marranos by the Catholic inquisition had been impressed in the minds of the Amsterdam Jewish community which consisted mainly of former Marranos. Unconsciously, the Amsterdam Jews applied the same methods to the dissenters as were ap-plied against them by the Catholic In-

If Spinoza suffered much because of the methods of the Amsterdam Jews and because of his expulsion from the Amsterdam community, he had, the author says, much to be thankful for in this environment. It was in this environment that he obtained the beginnings of his knowledge. The knowledge which Spinoza obtained while still a child enabled him to reach, in his later years, the high degree of development in the field of philosophy which other learned men of his epoch did not achieve. The culture which was instilled in Spinoza in his young years had the strongest influence on his maturing mind, the author says.

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
