ANTI-SEMITES CRITICIZE POLISH GOVERNMENT FOR PROMISING EQUALITY TO JEWS Says Bartel Promises More to Jews Number of Kehillahs Increased Ten Than to Poland

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, July 28.—The new course of the Polish government with regard to Jewish equality rights in Poland was severely criticized by the "Dwa Grosze," the leading anti-Semitic inurnal in Poland.

In an article entitled "Joy in Israel," the paper remarks that the the paper remarks that the Iews are satisfied with the Bartel government because Professor Bartel is the first Polish Prime Minister who promised more to the Jews than to Poland. He criticized the economic anti-Semitism and carried on negotiations with the Club of Jewish Deputies concerning the abolition of the commercial disabilities of the Jews, so it appears that the broad powers granted to the government will be profitable only to the Jews, the paper states. The paper asks whether Prime Minister Bartel "intends to deliver Poland into the slavery of international Tewish finance.

AMERICAN JEWISH SCHOLAR ARRIVES IN MOSCOW TO STUDY SLAVONIC TEXT ON JESUS

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, July 28.-Professor Solomon Zeitlin, professor of ancient his-tory at Dropsie College, Philadelphia, arrived here yesterday for the purpose of examining the Slavonic text of Josephus' "Jewish Wars," which is supposed to be translated from Aramaic and to prove that Josephus mentioned Jesus of Nazareth in his original text.

Professor Zeitlin left for Leningrad to take up the study of the manuscript at the Academy of Science.

PHYSICIAN, ORGANIZER OF GERMANY'S CHILD WELFARE CENTERS, DIES

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service) Berlin, July 11.-Dr. Karl Oppen-heimer, the famous authority on children's diseases, died in Munich at the age of 62.

Dr. Oppenheimer was the initiator of the organization of Welfare Centers for Children in Germany, an extensive system of welfare centers modelled after the first center, which Dr. Oppenheimer founded in Munich.

JEWISH STUDENTS REPRE-SENTED AT WORLD CONGRESS (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, July 28.-The Student World Congress was opened at Karlovci near Belgrade, Jugo-Slavia, on Sunday.

The World Union of Jewish Students is represented at the Congress by six delegates.

ATHEIST ORGAN DENIES EXISTENCE OF RELIGIOUS PERSECUTION IN RUSSIA

Percent, Quoted Figures Show (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, July 28.—The growth of religious life in the Union of Socialist reugious ire in the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics and an increased activity of Jewish congregations, is reported by the "Anti-religioniosnik", the organ of the Russian atheists.

The paper publishes figures showing that religious life in Russia is growing. Figures submitted to the Commissariat of the Interior show that the number of Kehillahs increased ten number of Kehillans increased ten percent from January 1 to November 1, 1925. The number of synagogues and Beth Midrashim (houses of worship and study) in the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics holds fourth place, after the houses of worship of Pravoslavie, Mohammedanism and Orthodox Pravoslavie. In the entire ten synagogues were closed in all the Soviet Republics. Synagogues were converted into cultural institutes only where there were no other suitable buildings, the paper states.

Neither the Jewish nor any other religion is being persecuted in Russia,

the paper declares.

PALESTINE DISTURBED OVER PORT QUESTION Official Says Harbor May Not Be Built at Haifa

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, July 28 .- Palestinian public opinion is greatly perturbed over the possibility that the planned harbor for Palestine, for which a large part of the Palestine government loan of \$22,500,000 is to be expended, will not be constructed in Haifa, as was originally projected.

The excitment was caused by statement of the manager of the Palestine railways in a conversation with Palestinian merchants that the harbor may be built at Port Fuad instead of at Haifa.

DR. GASTER IS RECEIVED BY KING OF ROUMANIA (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, July 28.-Dr. Moses Gaster, well known Anglo-Jewish scholar who was born in Roumania, was re-ceived by King Ferdinand upon his arrival here.

An invitation extended to Dr. Gas-ter to attend the meetings of the Roumanian Academy was refused by him as a protest against the anti-Semitic policy of the Academy.

It was stated that since the Academy is in existence, no Jewish scholar has ever been elected to membership, al-though the leading Roumanian philologists are all Jews.

JEWISH AGENCY QUESTION DISCUSSED BY ZIONIST ACTIONS COMMITTEE

Weizmann Makes Promise Not to Grant Further Concessions to American Non-Zionists The question of the extension of the

Jewish Agency and the contemplated visit of Dr. Weizmann to the United States were features of the political discussion which developed at Tuesday's session of the Zionist Actions Committee, according to a London cable to the "Jewish Morning Journal."

Deputy Isaac Gruenbaum of Warsaw, Dr. Jerzy Rosenbiatt of Lodz, M. M. Ussishkin of Jerusalem, Louis Lipsky, president of the Zionist Organization of America, Abraham Goldberg of New York, Col. Frederick H. Kisch and Dr. Weizmann participated in the discussion.

Deputy Gruenbaum pressed Dr. Weizmann for a definite statement concerning his plans in the United States with regard to the extension of the Jewish Agency. He warned against granting further concessions to the non-Zionists in America with reand non-zionists in America with fe-gard to the Agency question. Louis Lipsky spoke on the question of the Jewish Agency and replied to the suggestion of Deputy Gruenbaum

that it is vain to hope for the participation of American non-Zionists in the Agency, the "Morning Journal cable states. Mr. Lipsky stated that Eurostates. Mr. Lipsky stated that Euro-pean Zionists were misinformed concerning the situation in America. European Zionists endeavor to influence ropean Zionists endeavor to influence the American Zionists to take too hasty steps, but Americans act only when they are faced with the realities of life. Mr. Lipsky expressed the hope that Dr. Weizmann and Sir Herbert Samuel will create the Agency.

Dr. Weizmann, according to the "Morning Journal," assured Deputy Gruenbaum and all those who are anxious over the Jewish Agency question that he hopes to create the Agency during his visit here in Oc-tober together with Sir Herbert Samuel and promised not to give fur-

DID NOT FORM WORLD UNION FOR PROGRESSIVE JUDAISM TO COMBAT ORTHODOXY Dr. Landman, Returning from London

Conference, Describes Its Achievements

The statement that the World Union for Progressive Judaism was not tormed to combat Orthodoxy, but for ence of Liberal Jews held recently in London. When interviewed by a rep-resentative of the "Jewish Daily Bul-letin", Dr. Landman stated:

"Positive good for Judaism the world over will follow the organization in London of the World Union for Progressive Judaism. The Union was founded, not for controversy, not for opposing Orthodoxy, but for strength-ening the cause of Progressive Juda-ism, and for the study and better understanding of the conditions that make for or against Jewish modernism in various parts of the world. Three continents and seven countries were represented by delegates, the largest number of whom naturally came from the United States. India, the farthest off and the latest country to report a Liberal Synagogue, was also represented.

"One American interjected the ques-tion of Zionism, which was ruled out of order, the attitude of the World Union being that a Liberal may take whatever attitude he please toward the novement.

"Strikingly typical of true Eberalism was the agreement in the Conference that while a 'Union' was being formed. there was no ann at 'uniformity. tually, there never has been uniformity in Judaism; neither in doctrine nor in observance. On the other hand, there

Prof. Askenazy, Termed Power Behind Pilsudski, Comments on National Minorities Problem

Dr. Simon Askenazy, well known Polish Jewish historian, at one time Poland's representative at the League roland's representative at the League of Nations, is looked upon by anti-government circles as the Polish Richelieu and the power behind the Pilsudski dictatorship, according to a Warsaw despatch to the New York "Times."

In an interview with the "Times correspondent, Professor Askenazy highly praised Josef Pilsudski and placed great hope in the present government.

Speaking on the question of the national minorities in Poland, Professor Askenazy stated:

"For the first few years of our in-dependence we were busy with wars, while our neighbors were engaged in iostering animosities among the mi-norities. These minorities are not entirely of our making. They were de-cided by the Treaty of Versailles and

TRANSJORDANIA TO HAVE NEW CONSTITUTION Arab Paper Opposes Extension of

Jewish Colonization Across the Jordan

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service) Jerusalem, July 7.-The Transfordian Constitution is being drawn up at the Colonial Office in London, according to "El Carmel," Arab paper. The con-stitution will include nothing new, apart from the establishment of a dynasty in the territory, of which the Emir Abdullah will be the founder, the paper states. A Council, resembling the district councils of Turkish times, is to be formed, and Hassan Khaled Pasha's new government will be announced.

"The Council of Ministers" will be abolished and replaced by an Executive Council. Each Department will

have a British adviser.

The new government is composed of Premier and Minister of the Interior. Hassan Khaled Pasha Abu-Alhuda; the Judicial Advisor, C. R. Seton, M.C.; Chief Justice, Hushem Al-Din Jarallah; the Chief Secretary, Aref Al Aref, the Financial Advisor, A. L. Kirkbride; two Arab Directors of Public Works and

Antiquities respectively.

"El Carmel" also publishes a letter from Transjordania stating that the Ordinance promulgated by Al-Rikabi, the former premier, allowing foreign companies to acquire real estate prop-erties in the Transjordanian territory, aims at facilitating the colonization of Transjordania by Jewish companies. The writer recalls Dr. Weizmann's statement in Palestine.

In an editorial note, the paper urges the Arabs of Transjordania to appeal to the Government and the British Representative for the convocation of a Constituent Assembly to draw up a lishment of a national government and safeguarding the rights of the inhabilants in accordance with the Somerset agreement which recognizes the autonomy of the country under British protection.

Changar and Kauk Tup, Peninsula and Island off Crimean Coast, Allotted for Jewish Colonization (By Our Moscow Correspondent)

Moscow, July 1.—The peninsula Changar, and the island, Kauk Tup, off the Crimean coast were allotted by the Ukrainian Comzet for Jewish colonization. The peninsula, adjacent to Crimea, consists of 18,000 desiatin land, of which 4,000 are not arable. It lies to the south of the Genitchesk region in the district of Melitopol and is divided by the Charkoff-Crimea railway

To the north, the peninsula curves into a narrow neck of land connecting it with the mainland. From all sides it is washed by the Sivash Bay. Along a distance of 23 versts (161 miles) the railway line cuts through Changar with its main stations at Changar and Sivash, so that the reserve for Jewish colonization is mainly within three to four versts of a railway station. remotest points are seven or eight versts from a railway station.

The reserve is 20 versts from the terminal at Genitchesk and 90 versts from the district town Meletopol.

The peninsula is connected with the north Ukraine by a small strip of land at the station Solokove, through which the Crimean railway passes. To the south, it is connected with the Crimean peninsula by the well known Dombe bridge and further to the east by a wooden bridge across the Sivash Bay. These reserves are 40 to 60 versts from the Crimean Jewish colonies and will be easily served by the Agrojoint.

J. Kantor, writing on the subject in the Communist daily "Emes" states: "In the district of Melitopol, which is the richest corn belt of the Ukraine, the Changar region is considered of an inferior class. This is the reason why this peninsula is as yet sparsely populated. In truth, however, in years of good harvest Changar produces the best crops, which often reach 250 pud per desiatin. It is true, the local population often suffers from bad crops, but this is explained by the fact that it still employs ancient methods of cultivating the land. The greater part of the inhabitants consider it more profitable to engage in the raising of cattle and they have therefore neglected the land. According to the opinion of expert agonomists Changar can easily feed its inhabitants with plenty, provided the land is well cultivated and if proper methods of cultivation are introduced. Some part of the land is good for truck farming because it is washed by the Sivash Bay.

When one considers the short distance to the railway stations and the nearness to such a consumer as the Crimean peninsula, it is obvious that truck farming would be very profitable.

"The entire peninsula can accommo-date 729 families. The old inhabitants consist of 273 families. With the ex-ception of a few villages, the old inhabitants are scattered on individual small farms throughout the peninsula Four hundred and fifty plots are avail-

ASK FOR MEASURES AGAINST ANTI-SEMITIC INTERNATIONAL Jewish Women Direct Appeal to Inter-

national Peace League (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service)

Geneva, July 8.—A memorandum dealing with the growing danger of the anti-Semitic movement in Europe was forwarded by the Jewish Women's League to the Fifth Congress of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom. The memorandum urges the Congress to take action by the creation of a special Commission within the League in order to counteract this anti-Semitic international movement and to bring about neace.

"The organization of the anti-Semitic International," the memorandur
asys, "is now an accomplished fact.
The danger of such an International
not only to the Jews but to the whole
work of peace, is self-evident. The
proposed special Commission to fight against anti-Semitism," the memorandum states, "should concentrate on fighting the anti-Semitic propaganda

among young people."

The memorandum urges the Congress to adopt a resolution declaring the necessity of organizing in every country a local force to resist the anti-Semitic movement, and demanding that the national sections be empowered to carry the resolution into effect in their own respective countries, as the Ger-man section has already been doing. Attention was drawn to the resolu-

tion adopted by the First Congress of Child Welfare held in Geneva in August, 1925, in which it was declared that race-hatred is detrimental to peace and that it is essential to combat the anti-Semitic movement, especially among the youth in the schools and Universities.

"We hope that your Congress," the memorandum concludes, "will give its attention to this problem, and work out a series of measures which will enable the national sections of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom to fight more successfully against this subversive and demoralizing force called anti-Semitism.

SEPHARDIC JEWS ASK FOR GREATER SHARE IN

PALESTINE COLONIZATION (Jewish Telegraphic Agency Mail Service) Jerusalem, July 2.—The President of the World Union of Sephardic Jews, Mr. Picciotto left Palestine for Europe where he will conduct an active propaganda campaign in Western Europe on behalf of Sephardic Jewry, especially in England, where the Manchester Branch of the Sephardic World Union has

promised its cooperation. The problem of Sephardic colonization still nas many difficulties, a statement of the Union declared. Of the sum of £E10,000 appropriated by the Zionist Congress for the colonization of Sephardim in Palestine which was subsequently reduced by the Zionis Executive to £15,000 as a result of th. general curtailment of the sums available for colonization, only £E2,000 has been granted so far.

This money was distributed as fol-lows: The Colony of Saidoun £E300: to the Georgians in Petach-Tikvah, £300; to the Georgians recently settled at Petach-Tikvah £E900, half of which was advanced by the Labor Bureau of the Labor Organization; credits offi-cially promised to the Sephardic colonists of Beer-Jacob and not yet dis-

tribued £E1,000.

The S-phardic Federation is daily approached by Sephardic farmers who ask to be settled on the soil, as otherwise they have no possibility of earning a livelihood The Sephardic farmers of Zichron-Jacob have for over a year been negotiating with the Colonization Department of the Zionist Executive to be allowed to form a separate group Their request is meeting with many obstacles in spite of the fact that they have been waiting for years to be established on land and possess documents proving that they have already worked on the land in Palestine, the statement declared.

PHILADELPHIA SYNAGOGUE DESTROYED BY LIGHTNING WAS HISTORIC LANDMARK (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Philadelphia, Pa., July 28.-A historic landmark of the orthodox Jewish community of this city was destroyed, when lightning struck the B'nai Abraham Synagogue, causing a conflagration which destroyed the entire structure early Sunday morning. The damage is estimated at approximately Very little is covered by in-\$75,000. surance

While hundreds of men and women stood in the drenching rain, watching the fire, a group of three rushed into the building, aroused the sexton and rescued twenty-three Torahs. Responsible for the rescue were Emanuel Uram, who risked his life to carry out the Scrolls of the Law, his brother-in-law, Abe Zeliznik and Louis Simon.

The Congregation B'nai Abraham was founded in 1882 by the first group of Jewish immigrants to come to this city from Russia. With the exception of the Portuguese Synagogue, Mikve Israel, there was no other Orthodox house of worship in this city, although there were a number of small congregations. The B'nai Abraham was organized and Rabbi Eliezer Kleinberg, father of Rabbi B. L. Levinthal, was invited to become its rabbi. At Rabbi Kleinberg's death, some thirty-five years ago, Rabbi B. L. "The immigration to Changar has great advantages: first, a Jewish majority can be created on the peninsula because of the fact that it is almost separated from the other regions This has great significance. At any rate, there is no compact non-Jewish long settled population. Secondly, additional significance is given by the nearness of the railway centers of outside world. It is also near the larger Jewish reserve in the district of Djankay."
