Terusalem, Aug. 10 .- A suggestion that the Palestine-Arab leaders send another delegation to Lord Plumer, the High Commissioner, or to the London Government, to present the Arab claims, was made by "Merat Ul Sherk. the Arab newspaper.

The newspaper published a letter from a prominent Arab resident in the United States of America to Sheik Solimon Alfaruk. The writer of the letter claims that "the Palestine-Arab cause has many supporters in America and that many members of the United States Congress have promised to assist the Arab movement.

The "Merat Ul Sherk" further publishes a sensational report with regard to the results achieved by the last Arab delegation to London. It is declared that at that time the British Government had proposed to the Palestine-Arab delegation to create in Palestine an immigration control board to be composed of five Arabs and one Iew, with a fixed maximum of annual Jewish immigration of 3,000 persons. Should it be found that Palestine could right of suspending all immigration.

The paper complains that the Arab delegation to London submitted no report of its activities, and the fact has now come to light that Naj Tewfik Effendi Hamad, a member of the delegation, was the principal opponent to accepting this offer. The result is that Jewish immigration to Palestine for the past five years has been not 15,000, but 80,000, the paper states.

The Arab organ, however, expresses doubt as to whether the American Government would interfere in Palestine affairs. "Such interference would never be tolerated by the British Government," the paper says.

JACOB FISHMAN, BACK FROM LONDON, DISCUSSES "NEW SPIRIT" IN ZIONIST RANKS Urges Defense Fund for Presenting

Data on Ukrainian Massacres Further light on the decisions of the Tionist Actions Committee meeting in London and the new harmony which resulted therefrom in the major Zionist groups, was shed by Mr. Jacob Fish-man, Managing Editor of the "Jewish Morning Journal" and first member of the Actions Committee to return from London to the United States.

When interviewed by the representaine of the "Jewish Daily Bulletin," Mr. Fishman objected to Mr. Emanuel Neumann's definition of the last Actions Committee session's resulting in harmony as the "Zionist Locarno." "The comparison hardly holds good. Locar-to reminds one of the evils before Loamo. The Zionist differences at the Congresses can never be likened to the pre-Locarno period in world politics.

"The meaning of the 'new spirit' which found expression at the recent Actions Committee meeting is simply that internal Zionist differences are never fundamental, and that our greater responsibilities are never forgotten in maze of dogmas. Catholic Church Prepares New Version of the Vulgate

(By Our Rome Correspondent) Rome, July 20 .- A new version of

Saint Jerome's famous Latin text of the Bible. known as the Vulgate, is being completed by the Vatican Bibli-cal Commission, which began its work in 1912, it was learned here from Cardinal Aidan Gasquet, who presides over the Commission This fact will be of considerable in-

terest to Jewish Biblical scholars who are familiar with the Vulgate, for Saint Jerome's version, written as early as the 4th century, contains a number of deviations from the extant Hebrew text and has therefore been the subject of research by Jewish as well as Christian students. Information regarding the new ver-sion was issued following an interesting ceremony which recently took place in the Vatican, when Cardinal Gasquet presented the Pope Pius XI

But as the number of Latin-speaking Christians increased, Latin versions translated from the Greek began to pullulate. Saint Augustine, an almost exact contemporary of Jerome complained bitterly that everybody who had a smattering of Latin and Greek had thought himself qualified to put in circulation a new version in the Latin tongue. The variations of text became so startling that in the year 380 Pope Damascus charged Saint Jerome with the task of collating the various versions in use, so as to pro-duce a uniform text. OBSERVANCE OF HOLIDAYS BY JEWISH YOUTH INCREAS-ING, SAYS WELFARE BOARD

Report Shows High Record of Religious Attendance Last Year

The observance of Jewish holidays is increasing in the United States, according to a report issued by the Jewish Welfare Board.

Last year, a high record was established when more than 600 mass gatherings with a total attendance of about 200,000 persons were arranged by the affiliated Y. M. H. A.'s, Y. W. H. A.'s, and other Jewish Centers in connection with the observance of Jewish and patriotic holidays

This year, reports compiled by the above record has been surpassed. hundred eighty-seven holiday celebrations with an approximate attendance of 250,000 persons of both sexes and all ages were conducted by the societies associated with and receiving stimula-tion from the Jewish Weliare Board. The holidays included Independence Day, Succoth, Armistice Day, Chanu-kah, Chamisho Osor B'Sh'vat, Lincoln's and Washington's Birthdays, Purim, Passover, Lag B'Omer, Mothers' Day, Memorial Day, and Shevuoth.

In addition to the mass celebrations, the individual clubs also observed these holidays in a fitting manner. Thousands of boys and girls who are members of these clubs learned to appreciate many valuable Jewish customs and traditions by means of these observances. As far as possible, the organizations endeavored to utilize the mass affairs as the culminations of series of educational activities carried on in the clubs for weeks preceding the holidays. The programs consisted of dramatic productions, tableaux, pageants, addresses based on the significance of the celebrations, recitations, musical numbers, with stereopticon slides.

Later the Dominicans and the Franciscans had their rival champions in the art of improving upon the existing texts. Various Commissions were established for the production of authorized versions. Pope Sixtus appointed a Commission which reached highly scientific conclusions in 1583. The Pope, however, was dissatisfied with what he considered the meagre result of their labors and superintended in person the printing of a ver-

Cardinal Gasquet's Commission began work in 1912. The task with which they were faced was formidable. In the first months they traced the exist-ence of 700 versions previous to the year 1000 A.D. The problem was how the innumerable variations of these versions, scattered in libraries all over the world, were to be sorted and weighed against each other. The librarics would never have surrendered all their treasures for the use of the Commission during the considerable period of years required for this work, while a vast staff and enormous expenditure would have been needed had each manuscript been subjected to this searching scrutiny in its own place of safe keeping.
